# SWOS auditorium dedicated to former Chairman of JCS

The auditorium in Weakley Hall at the Surface Warfare Officers School Command was dedicated to the former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff as part of ceremonies March 1 for 49 graduates of Department Head Class 215.

# Diversity in military celebrated

The Center for Service Support celebrated African-American history and the military's journey through the civil rights movement during a lunchtime event held Feb. 29.

Dr. Olenda Johnson, an associate professor and the first African-American woman to serve on the Naval War College faculty, was the guest speaker for the tribute.

Johnson spoke about the importance of honoring

diversity and the rich histories of our varied cultures. She also recounted her family's own experiences through the civil rights era, reflecting upon how the works of her father paved the way for her successes and helped open the door for change and equal opportunities for all.

"When we celebrate diversity and our diverse histories, we are celebrating much more than the historical accomplishments of a particular

group," Johnson said. "I believe we are celebrating the primacy of American values. We are acknowledging the changeability of once unmovable institution. When we celebrate diversity and our diverse histories, we, together, continue to march toward transforming our future for future generations to come."

By blending the event with a celebration of history and a challenge for people to seek ways to make a

difference in their lives, Johnson motivated event participants to do their part in continuing the nation's and the military's march toward equality.

"Dr. Olenda's genuine spirit for positive change came through her infectious storytelling of transformation in her own life ... all delivered in such a compelling way that the entire audience was hooked from, 'I'd like to share some stories with you,'" said Cmdr.

## Security exercise to affect NAVSTA

Exercise Solid Curtain-Citadel Shield 2012 will be conducted on naval bases and installations throughout the continental United States March 19-24

This annual exercise is designed to enhance the training and readiness of Navy Security Forces to respond to threats to installations and units. Exercise Solid Curtain-Citadel Shield 2012 is not in response to any specific threat, but is a regularly-scheduled exercise.

**RETAIL OPERATIONS:** The following retail operations will close down at noon on March 22 and not reopen until March 24: The Commissary will reopen at 1 p.m. on March 24 and all Navy Exchange facilities will reopen at noon on March 24 (package store, dry cleaners, clothing sales shop, main base mini-mart/gas station) with the exception of Green Lane Mini-mart.

**MORALE, WELFARE AND RECREATION (MWR):** All MWR facilities including Gym 109, the swimming pool, Leisure Bay Internet Café and Coffee Shop,

Hewitt Hall Café, Information Tickets and Travel Office, Officers' Club, Recreation Center and Seaview Bowling Center, Chief Petty Officer and Enlisted Clubs, Liberty Center and Outdoor Recreation Rental.

**MEDICAL FACILITIES:** Naval Health Clinic New England is reminding patients to expect delays getting into the compound that week, but especially on Tuesday morning, March 20, and again from noon March 22 through noon March 24. Patients are being encouraged to not attempt to come to the clinic during those times. Individuals who have a medical emergency during those times should call '911' or go IMMEDIATELY to the nearest civilian medical facility for care. Emergency room visits are a TRI-CARE covered benefit. Pharmacy patients should plan accordingly to avoid prescription pick-ups from noon March 22 through noon on March 24.

## Navy Relief Society launches fund drive

The president of the Naval War College kicked off the start of the 2012 active duty fund drive for the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society (NMCRS), Newport on March 1 in a ceremony at Naval Station Newport.

The annual drive, March 1-31, will support financial, educational, and other programs provided for active duty and retired Sailors, Marines and their eligible family members in time of need.

“My heart is behind the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society because I’ve seen what it does for our Sailors

and our Marines,” said Rear Adm. John N. Christenson, NWC president.

Christenson, a 1981 graduate of the Naval Academy and the fourth of six sons of a Navy Skyraider pilot and Navy nurse, recalled that his mother was a very active volunteer with the Relief Society.

“I remember that when she passed away she left a little box of her treasures that contained her wedding ring and a Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society hours volunteer pin,” Christenson said.

He said his wife, Theresa, is a volunteer with the Relief Society’s Thrift Shop, Newport. “She has told me

MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS) — 'Who Will Stand Your Watch' is a new substance abuse prevention campaign recently launched by the Navy Alcohol and Drug Abuse Prevention (NADAP) office officials said Feb 28.

The focus of the campaign is to educate Sailors on the negative impact substance abuse can have on their careers, family and shipmates.

"Sailors have a personal responsibility to consider the effect their absence will have on their unit and their shipmates if he or she is removed from duty as a result of a substance abuse incident," said Dorice Favorite, NADAP director.

NADAP is using television public service announcements, posters and pamphlets to heighten awareness of how poor decision making by Sailors in abusing drugs or alcohol diminishes command readiness.

"A Sailor's decision to use drugs has a bad impact on the workforce," said Yeoman 1st Class (SW/AW) Latashia Graham, Navy Personnel Command (NPC) secretariat office. "Now you put Sailors that work for you or work with you in the position of having to do your job and theirs which makes it more stressful for everyone."

According to Favorite, the number of alcohol incidents and Sailors testing positive for illicit drugs has decreased over the years, but substance abuse continues to put lives and missions at risk. For that reason, it benefits everyone to prevent substance abuse from occurring.

## Kids war game plots course to 'sink Bismarck'

Twenty-two of the Naval War College's (NWC) youngest war-gamers participated in "Sink the Bismarck," a family event held in the college's McCarty Little Hall, Feb. 24.

Children age 8 to 17 participated in a war-gaming exercise to acquaint them with NWC's mission in preparing future maritime leaders to make key decisions in a competitive, time-pressured environment.

"This is a fantastic opportunity to get the families in to see what we do in our department and expose the kids to the idea of role-playing as a team," said Lt. Cmdr. Larry Johnson, one of NWC's war-gaming directors. "This really expands the perspective and point of view to their approach for problem solving, competition and working together."

The scenario was based

on the World War II, naval Battle of the Denmark Strait between the German Kriegsmarine and the British Royal Navy in May 1941. Each team was com-

posed of a captain, navigator, operations officer and an engineer. Crews had one to three minutes to design a plan, report to the battle bridge and carry out their mission.

The fleet's arsenals consisted of a main and secondary battery, torpedoes and mines, and whichever team scored the most damage points in the allotted amount of time would prevail as the winner.

For 10-year-old Mayla Ward, captain of the British battle cruiser HMS Hood, the key to success was in

figuring out the other team's plan, and counter-acting their strategy. In May 1941, the Bismarck sunk the Hood with a direct hit at her aft powder magazine. The cruiser exploded, and sank in 2 minutes. Of 1,400 crewmen, only three survived.

"So far we're doing really well. Our strategy is for all of our ships to do the same things and to put as much battle damage on the other ships as possible," said Ward, a fourth grade pupil from Aquidneck Island Christian Academy and daughter of Dave Ward, who is a contract war game specialist at NWC.

"As you can see, the Bismarck has sustained a large amount of damage."

This is the third year NWC's War Gaming Department held the event during the local school winter break. Pete Pelegrino, NWC war-gaming senior military analyst, said the game not only gives the kids an idea of what NWC does to prepare future military leaders but also provides them a bit of a history lesson.

"It's a very kinesthetic game and it harkens back to the old retro-style of gaming NWC conducted back when they used mold-lead ships on a large classroom floor at the turn of the century," Pelegrino said. "This is just a modern version of those components. Good old floor games and board games can be powerful educational experiences."

Pelegrino said this event all started when he purchased a couple of battleship models on eBay and evolved into purchasing more model ships to form British and German fleets. He then developed the game that is now known as "Sink the Bismarck" battleship war-gaming experience.



# SECNAV maps initiatives to maximize sea services

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Speaking to the fleet during a worldwide All Hands Call on board USS Bataan (LHD 5) which was televised and web-streamed live to the fleet March 5, Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus announced the establishment of the 21st century Sailor and Marine initiative.

The secretary explained that the initiative consolidates a set of objectives and policies, new and existing, to maximize Sailor and Marine personal readiness. The programs are divided into five categories, or "areas": readiness, safety, physical fitness, inclusion, and continuum of service.

"The new defense strategy will put increased responsibilities on the Navy and Marine Corps in the years to come," the secretary said. "You are the department's most essential asset, and it is the duty of the department's leadership to do all we can to provide each individual Sailor and Marine with the resources to maintain that resiliency."

Various programs fall under the readiness area, all of which help ensure we have the most mentally prepared service members and family in department history.

Continued emphasis on the responsible use of alcohol, zero tolerance for drug use, suicide reduction, family and personal preparedness, and financial and family stability all work together to prepare Sailors, Marines and their families for the challenges that they may face and reinforce healthy alternatives on liberty or off-duty. A new initiative will include breathalyzer tests when Sailors sta-

tioned onboard ships, submarines and at squadrons report for duty and randomly elsewhere to reduce the occurrence of alcohol related incidents that can end careers and sometimes end lives. This month, the Navy will begin random testing of urine samples for synthetic chemical compounds like Spice.

The initial testing will be conducted by a contracted laboratory, with the Navy Drug Screening Laboratory capable of conducting in-house testing later this year. Every positive result on a urinalysis for synthetic drugs will be sent to NCIS for investigation.

Synthetic chemical compound drug use impacts a Sailor's career and family. Sailors found to have positive urinalysis results and possession of synthetic chemical compounds like Spice will be punished under the UCMJ.

"We will enable and support our Sailors and their families. I am extremely proud of our people," said Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Jonathan Greenert. "We have a professional

and a moral obligation to lead, to train, to equip and to motivate them. Our personnel programs deliver a high return on investment in readiness."

In addition to ensuring the readiness of our Sailors and Marines, the initiative will aim to make the Navy and Marine Corps the safest and most secure force in the department's history. All personnel in the fleet should expect to work in a safe environment, free from harassment or hazards, and when confronted with these, have the resources available to immediately correct the problem.

The Department of the Navy (DoN) continues to work aggressively to prevent sexual assaults, to support sexual assault victims, and to hold offenders accountable. Part of this effort is implementing new training at multiple levels in both the Navy and Marine Corps.

some stories about what some of our young Sailors are going through," he said.

"Some stories were funny, some were heart-breaking," Christenson said.

"I've learned through these stories what the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society does," Christenson said.

Christenson told a story about how the Relief Society provided financial assistance for emergency car repairs to a spouse with children while the husband was deployed.

The NMCRS Newport Office assisted 103 clients with nearly \$60,000 in interest-free loans and grants during 2011. Other assistance ranged from

basic living expenses such as food, clothing, housing and household setup, utilities and phone bills, to emergency transportation and car repairs, to commanding officer-verified pay problems, to funeral expenses and Quick Assist Loans.

Christenson thanked the Society's thrift store volunteers for their work and the commands' key workers in uniform who will be getting the word out about the Fund Drive.

According to statistics for 2011, released by Headquarters, NMCRS, more than 96,000 clients worldwide in need received more than \$48 million in financial assistance.

More than \$92,000 was

donated during the 2011 fund drive in Newport.

"The Relief Society is a 'go to' resource for our Sailors and Marines who truly need help for urgent and personal emergencies," said Capt. Douglas Mikatarian, commanding officer, Naval Station Newport.

NMCRS, Newport, Director Patricia Drislane thanked her staff of volunteers for their work.

# Artistic Sailor captures WWII life

George Eisenberg has just celebrated his 91st birthday, but 70 years ago, as a recent graduate of the Massachusetts College of Art in Boston, he, along with so many others of his generation, joined the Navy to fight in World War II.

Assigned to the destroyer USS La Vallette (DD 448), Eisenberg was a third class radarman (RDM3) whose battle station was on the starboard wing of the bridge. Over the next three years, the "tin can" was in the thick of the fighting, serving first in the Atlantic during the Tunisian Campaign, and then in the Pacific Theater where she saw her greatest amount of action.

While aboard the young Sailor created more than 360 drawings and paintings that documented the daily events of the ship and crew. The collection depicted the quiet moments of relaxation, portraits of his fellow crewmembers, and records of daily activities that captured the emotional highs and lows that existed on a ship at war.

Supplementing the artwork are other artifacts that give a broader impact to the experience.

Of this total collection, the Naval War College Museum, working with the Eisenberg family, has selected 76 pieces for an exhibit entitled, "A Sailor's Diary: The Art of George S. Eisenberg, 1942-1945." The exhibition is located in the west gallery on the second floor of the museum and will continue through July 1.

Last Sunday, NAPS traveled south and dominated Howard County Communi-


ty College in Columbia, Md., 20-4. The Rams' John Connors had 10 saves and Mark Brashears led all scoring with six goals.
