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# NAS Whiting Field helps “Feds Feed Families”

The Department of Defense has been called upon to team up with Federal agencies around the country to fill a Federal-wide goal of donating two million pounds of non-perishable food items. The DOD’s goal is to collect 733,800 pounds.

This campaign, known as “Feds Feed Families”, is coordinated by the U.S. Office of Personnel Management and the Chief Human Capital Council. It is set up so that families can bring in food items to their local Federal agencies where they are then distributed to local community food banks. The initiative is a direct response to the “United We Serve Act” signed by the President in April 2009, calling all Americans to contribute to the nation’s economic recovery by serving in their communities. This is the first time the federal agencies have come together as one team to support the food drive.

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# Information, Cyber Security – A Continuous Battle

By definition, information security is the on-going process of exercising due care and due diligence to protect information and information systems from unauthorized access, use, destruction, modification or disruption.

Since the early days of writing, heads of state and military commanders understood that it was necessary to provide some mechanism to protect the confidentiality of written correspondence and to have some means of detecting tampering.

Julius Caesar is credited with the invention of the “Caesar Cipher” in 50 B.C., which was created to prevent his secret messages from being read by the enemy. Today that battle continues, particularly in cyberspace.

Recently, websites masquerading as Department of Defense (DoD) and other government websites have been created with the intent to harvest login credentials or exploit hosts visiting the site. Army Knowledge Online (AKO) is one example of a legitimate portal that was targeted. Search engines, such as Google, displayed the illicit web site often before the real website, according to the South Carolina State Law Enforcement Division’s Information and Intelligence Center.

In 2006, the personal data of over 26 million military veterans and spouses was stolen from the Veterans Administration computers and just last March, 24,000 files containing Pentagon data were stolen from a defense industry computer network.

On July 14, Deputy Defense Secretary William J. Lynn III laid out the new DoD Cyber Strategy to protect the nation from potentially devastating network attacks.

“All the advanced capabilities we have, whether it’s targeting or navigation or communication, have a backbone that’s run through information technology,” Lynn said. “So if you’re a smart adversary and you’re seeking an asymmetric way to come at the United States, cyber will appear to you very quickly.”

Lynn noted that DoD’s approach is to harden defenses and reduce incentives for cyberspace attacks, which are hard to trace to the source. The strategy rests on five pillars, he said: treat cyber as a domain; employ more active defenses; support the Department of Homeland security in protecting critical infrastructure networks; practice collective defense with allies and international partners; and reduce the advantages attackers have on the internet.

A little closer to home, at the Navy Marine Corps Intranet (NMCI), security continues to be a key priority for protecting the computers at Navy Region Southeast and over 700,000 active military and civilian users at more than 600 locations in the continental U.S., Hawaii and Japan.

# Feds Feed Families

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The summer months are especially hard for families in need of food. With school being out many students aren't getting the meals they normally would through the school programs. Since 2006, the demand on food banks has increased by 25 percent but the level of giving hasn't changed.

Spearheaded by the chaplains' office, Naval Air Station Whiting Field is doing their part. Drop boxes for donations are scattered throughout the base, including: the chaplains' office; commissary; Training Air Wing FIVE building; Fleet and Family Support Center; public works building; Officer Christian Fellowship; NAS Whiting Field command building; Whiting Pines housing office; Training Squadrons TWO, THREE and SIX; and Helicopter Training Squadrons EIGHT, EIGHTEEN, and TWENTY-EIGHT.

Volunteers have already picked up and transferred the food products to the local food banks July 19 and Aug. 2. The last two box pick-ups will be Aug. 16 and 30. More than 900 pounds of food products have been donated so far during the drive.

"The turnout is bigger and better than we had hoped for. Everyone seems to be coming on board. Milton and Whiting Field go hand and hand, we help each other out," Ensign Laura Faulk, an assistant in the chaplains' office, said.

Items that are most needed for donation include the following:

- Canned vegetables: low sodium, no salt
- Canned fruits: in light syrup or their own juices
- Canned proteins: tuna, salmon, chicken, peanut butter and beans
- Soups: beef stew, chili, chicken noodle, turkey or rice
- Condiments: tomato-based sauces, light soy sauce, ketch-

up, mustard, salad dressing or oils

-- Snacks: individually packed snacks, crackers, trail mix, dried fruit, granola, cereal bars, pretzels and crackers

-- Multigrain cereal

-- 100-percent juice: all sizes, including juice boxes

-- Grains: brown and white rice, oatmeal, bulgur, quinoa, couscous, pasta and macaroni and cheese

-- Paper products and household items: paper towels, napkins, and cleaning supplies

-- Hygiene items: diapers, deodorants for men and women, feminine products, toilet paper, tissues, soap, toothpaste and shampoo

NAS Whiting Field hasn't taken part in a local area food drive in several years and already in the past three weeks they have collected over 300 pounds of food. The food collected is being distributed to the Bay Area Food Bank and the Manna Food Bank in the local Milton community.

"I think this will have a positive impact on our relationship with the community. Bay Area Food Bank is amazed and grateful for what we are bringing them," Religious Programs Specialist Second Class Yolanda Jordan said.

This food drive is not the only charitable campaign that the Chaplain's office is a part of.

"Every Sunday 75% of the chapel's religious offering fund goes out to a variety of local charities. On average we donate over a \$1,000 a year to the local food banks," said NASWF Command Chaplain, Lt. Cmdr. Raymond Summerlin.

# Cyber Security

According to the NMCI Homeport, the network prevents more than 9 million network connection attempts per month; detects an average of 60 new viruses per month; blocks 9 million spam messages and investigates 1,200 unclassified intrusion attempts per month.

Adding the human layer of defense in cyber security practices is also a key to victory in the battle. According to Lynn Herbert, Navy Region Southeast Information Assurance Manager, training and awareness is our greatest asset. "We have several systems in place to coordinate cyber security efforts, but it starts with the individual at the key-

board," said Herbert.

Something as simple as a "phishing" attack is an example of how one person can protect or compromise an entire network. Phishing is defined as using email to get the recipient to click on a corrupt link or attachment.

Herbert provided 5 tips to help identify phony messages and avoid getting "hooked": be skeptical of all emails, if it doesn't make sense, delete it; be wary of attachments; ignore requests for action on your part; check out the link if it is suspicious; make a phone call to verify or contact the sender.

"Just remember to always be aware, make sure you know the sender and

that the email is valid," said Herbert.

The old expression from World War II, "loose lips sink ships" was a cry for information security and it makes even more sense today. Just ask the new Secretary of Defense Leon Panetta. At his Senate confirmation hearing last month Panetta cited "a strong likelihood that the next Pearl Harbor" could well be a cyber attack that cripples the U.S. power grid and financial and government systems. He also stated that cyber security will be one of the main focuses of his tenure at the Pentagon.

It should also be one of ours.

## ERB deadline drawing near

**MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS)** -- Navy officials reminded Sailors Aug. 2 the deadline to submit conversion applications prior to the first Enlisted Retention Board (ERB) is quickly approaching.

"We have received approximately 1,000 conversion applications so far," said Master Chief Navy Counselor David Duncan, who is responsible for the review of ERB conversion applications at Navy Personnel Command (NPC).

To increase options for ERB-eligible Sailors, conversion waivers were introduced in NAVADMIN 160/11. The Chief of Naval Personnel message clarifies the process for ERB-eligible Sailors to apply for conversion before going before the board. Applications for conversion are due Aug. 15.

The board will look at only the most overmanned ratings and will examine the performance of approximately 16,000 Sailors, according to NAVADMIN 129/11. Approximately 3,000 Sailors will not be retained on active duty, but are encouraged to apply for Selected Reserve, if not accepted for conversion.

Conversion applications will be held until the board has completed its deliberations. Only those Sailors not selected for retention in-rate by the ERB will be considered for conversion. Those Sailors subsequently selected for conversion will be retained in their new rating.

"Sailors should understand a conversion package is a second opportunity to stay Navy," said Duncan.

Sailors interested in conversion can submit an application for a maximum of three ratings. The following ratings will accept applications for conversions: CS (SUB), CTI, CTM, CTN, CTR, CTT, ET-NAV, ET-RADIO, FT, HM, ITS, LS (SUB), MM-WEPS, NC (COUNSELOR), and YN (SUB).

Service members must satisfy eligibility requirements. Conversion waivers will be granted based on the needs of the Navy.
