

U.S. service members assist AWA in Bahrain's largest charity sporting event

SAKHIR, Bahrain — More than 200 U.S. service members serving in Bahrain volunteered at the Cherry Tree Trot, at the Bahrain International Circuit, Dec. 4.

Sponsored by the American Women's Association of Bahrain (AWA), the Cherry Tree Trot featured a two-kilometer race for more than 400 disabled participants, and raised more than \$125,000 for local charities. It is Bahrain's largest charity sporting event.

U.S. Naval Forces Central Command's (NAVCENT) chaplain, Cmdr. Brent Scott, began organizing U.S. military participation in the community relations program in early October.

"Part of our responsibility at NAVCENT is to orchestrate service member-to-community engagement around the U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility," he said. "Service members have always been there when there's a need. They heard the call, there was need for meaningful support and help and they came forward."

AWA, which was formed 36 years ago and now boasts more than 250 members, hosted the first Cherry Tree Trot in 1980.

"This is a semi-annual event and this is how we raise money to support our community service efforts for the next two years," explained AWA President Jamie Abbott.

Those community service efforts include supporting more than 35 homes for handicapped residents, all of which provided racers for this year's

Cherry Tree Trot.

"I have always wanted the Bahrain population to feel the warmth of Americans living here, and if nothing else, today make them one step closer to feeling

America's love and compassion for the disabled as well as the entire Bahrain community," Abbott said.

"Volunteers played a big role in this — if it wasn't for them, we couldn't pull off the Cherry Tree Trot. We really needed everyone's efforts; our group can organize it, but we really rely on the volunteers," she continued.

Intelligence Specialist 1st Class Genaro Stewart, president of the NAVCENT First Class Petty Officers Association, brought 15 members of his group to volunteer at the Cherry Tree Trot.

"When you are in the military, you have an opportunity to provide a service, not only to our country, but to humankind as well," Stewart said. "A lot of times we get caught up in our jobs and our own lives, and I think we should take a step back every once in a while and help out those who don't have the same abilities that we have."

NAVCENT's Yeoman 2nd Class Hugo Mancera was among the hundreds of volunteers who pushed wheelchairs or guided participants in the run.

"It was a great feeling to be able to help here today," Mancera reflected.

"I enjoy volunteering and spending my free time helping people. I'll continue to do it as long as I'm able."

Buxton said that coordinating the event required several weeks of preparation as costumes for the nativity were located and rehearsals were conducted for the performers and choir.

"A lot of work went into this by volunteers from the chaplain's office and you can just tell by looking at people that they are very satisfied," he said.

Buxton added that the efforts from the two organizations helped provide a strong family atmosphere, even to service members who are away from their families during the holiday season.

"Many people are separated from families during this time of year, so hosting these types of events help bring people closer together to give them a sense of home," he said.

MANAMA, Bahrain — Morale, Welfare, and Recreation's Child Youth Programs (CYP) offered families an opportunity to understand the value of recycling and energy conservation during its "Family Fun Night" at Naval Support Activity Bahrain, Nov. 23.

Working in conjunction with the Boys and Girls Club of America, CYP recently received an Energy Star grant from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) making the event possible.

As part of its "Change the World, Start with Energy Star" campaign, EPA has partnered with multiple youth organizations to teach and encourage people to take small individual steps toward recycling and reducing greenhouse gas emissions that affect climate change.

CYP Teen Coordinator Amanda Thornton said the grant enabled CYP to purchase craft supplies and provided ideas for eco-friendly projects and games geared toward families with young children.

"The activities were mainly focused on

our younger school-age and preschool students to help them understand that the issues are not only important, but that it's also easy to be more conscious about recycling and energy conservation," Thornton said.

Parents and children worked together to decorate recycling bins and played games like charades and "Trash or What?" a flash card-based activity that taught kids how to identify items as trash, compost or recyclable.

Keven Ricks, a parent who attended the event, said it was not only an educational opportunity for children, it instilled in them strong habits as well.

"I think a lot of people take for granted the concept of recycling, but if we can teach our children its importance, they can then reinforce those positive habits back to us and that helps everybody," he said.

Thornton echoed his sentiments adding that parents were enabled to spend quality time with their children while allowing kids to see their parents having fun.

"If they see that it's important enough for their parents spend time teaching them about the issue, they'll understand its significance, which will help them learn and grow," she said.

Called to be God's witnesses

A mugging victim had his watch taken, then his wallet. Finally, his assailants beat him quite fiercely. When he got home his wife asked him, "Why did you just stand there and let them do you that way? Why didn't you do something?" The man replied meekly, "Oh, I didn't want to get involved."

The Golden Rule, "Love your neighbor as yourself," is not just a Christian ideal. Every conceivable religion and culture in the world has the Golden Rule in one form or another.

Judaism - "What is hateful to you, do not to your fellow man. That is the law; all the rest is commentary."

Islam - "No one of you is a believer until he desires for his brother that which he desires for himself."

Hinduism - "This is the sum of duty: do naught unto others which would cause you pain if done to you."

Buddhism - "Hurt not others in ways that you yourself would find hurtful."

Confucianism - "Do not unto others what you would not have them do unto you."

Reading the news story here from news.com.au on July 4, 2007, we might wonder what are these people's "Golden Rule?"

Shoppers walk over woman dying from stab wounds... "Shoppers in a U.S. convenience store stepped over a woman dying from stab wounds with one stopping only to take a picture on a mobile phone. The incident, captured on surveillance video in a Kansas convenience store on June 23, 2007, shows 27-year-old LaShanda Calloway lying bleeding after being stabbed in a robbery that she was innocently caught up in, AP reports.

It took about two minutes for someone to call police to report the crime while five shoppers stepped over the prone woman, police said. After finally being attended to, Calloway died at a hospital from her injuries. Police at this stage have refused to release the video, saying it is part of their investigation.

"It was tragic to watch," police spokesman Gordon Bassham said. "The fact that people were more interested in taking a picture with a cell phone and shopping for snacks rather than helping this innocent young woman is, frankly, revolting."

"The lack of concern for humanity over this young woman's life is deeply troubling," Bassham said. Bassham said the district attorney's office would have to decide whether any of the shoppers could be charged but it was uncertain what law, if any, would be applicable. A state statute for failure to render aid specifically refers only to victims of a car accident. Wichita Police Chief Norman Williams told US paper, The Wichita Eagle, which highlighted the incident after it had gained little media coverage that the callousness on display from the shoppers was 'appalling.'

"I could continue shopping and not render aid and then take time out to take a picture? That's crazy," said Williams. "What happened to our respect for life?"

Love speaks to our generosity. It is called forth by the other's distress, and the deeds of love are a gift. Our fellow human beings, no matter how depressed, depraved, or deprived, are deserving of our gifts. When we hear a cry for help, we should not pass by. We should be the good Samaritans that today's society desperately needs.

According to organizer James Shipp of MWR Headquarters, the event has been going on for seven years. He said Commander, Naval Installations Command used to provide donations from various sponsors each year but this year they didn't get any corporate sponsorship.

"MWR continued the program and modified it by buying the items ourselves because it is more cost effective and we found out that Sailors didn't always use the candies, goodies or sodas but really liked the shirts and hats," said Shipp. "So this year we decided to send those hats and t-shirt combos with a phone card."

Shipp, who has been organizing the holiday gift pack event in Bahrain for four years, said the Navy-themed gifts will allow Sailors to show their Navy pride while serving with other services.

MANAMA, Bahrain — Six Royal Australian Navy service members, assigned to Commander Task Force 150, showed off elaborate mustache designs in celebration of Movember at Naval Support Activity Bahrain's officer club, Dec. 2.

Movember, an international event that originated in Australia, has each participant (commonly referred to as a mo bro) grow a mustache for the month of November to promote men's health issues.

Royal Australian Navy Lt. Cmdr. Paul Kirk, said that in order to bring needed attention to these issues, men around Australia grow mustaches for charity.

"It's a really good opportunity once a year to put a strong focus on men's health and each November, mo bros attempt to change the face of men's health by changing their faces," Kirk said.

Kirk added that by "changing their faces," he and his fellow mo bros were able raise more than \$2,200.00 Australian dollars in donations that will be given to organizations such as Beyondblue: The National Depression Initiative, an Australian agency that promotes mental health well-being, and the Prostate Cancer Foundation of Australia.

According to its website, Movember states that since a mo bro starts November clean-shaven, as he continues through month he essentially becomes a walking billboard for the cause as his new look opens the door for him to talk about health issues affecting men-making the mustache a symbol, much like the pink ribbon is for breast cancer.

"Highlighting these issues is exceptionally important because a lot of men die each year from prostate cancer and mental health-related issues, so we need to raise awareness and funds, especially with prostate cancer, to continue with research," Kirk said.

PII: Keeping it safe

A successful command privacy program must include an aggressive records review and disposal component. While hard copy files cannot be ignored, the volume of electronic data files is a much larger issue and must be aggressively addressed by local commands/units.

Personally Identifiable Information (PII) is inextricably linked to records management. PII is stored on virtually every DON-owned or leased computer and includes both classified and unclassified files. Careful management of this sensitive data will prevent potential data breaches in the future. A key reference in managing records review and disposal is the Department of the Navy Records Management Manual (SECNAV M-5210.1). This Privacy Tip highlights the need for commands to develop clear guidance for the collection and retention of PII as an integral part of their records management program.

Some valuable tips when managing your PII records disposal program are:

- PII and records management are an all-hands responsibility.
- For non-federal records, always apply the "golden rule." "If you don't store it, you can't lose or compromise it." If it is a federal record, you must maintain it.
- Proper electronic and paper file disposal enhances network security, minimizes physical storage costs, and frees up valuable network storage space.
- Use the SECNAV Records Management Manual (SECNAV M-5210.1) to identify when documents, including email, are considered official records and retain these records until destruction/deletion is authorized IAW the SECNAV M-5210.1.

- PII and records disposal programs must include procedures for all personnel who permanently detach from their respective command/units.

- The user/owner of files is responsible for screening both electronic and hard copy files for unnecessary PII collection and does so on a routine and ongoing basis.

- All personal email, personal correspondence and personal electronic files that do not qualify as federal records shall be clearly designated as such and shall at all times be maintained separately from the office's records.

- Delete or destroy when the documents are no longer needed or the member is permanently leaving the command.

- Local procedures will include an annual record's review, disposition of content and electronic files/account delegation.

- Command records managers in consultation with privacy coordinators should ensure that federal records are not inadvertently deleted. When questions arise, they should work with their local counsel or Staff Judge Advocate to resolve.

- When there is any question regarding whether or not to retain a specific document, email or file, users should err on the side of retention.

- Commands/units should inform new employees of their responsibility to maintain data/records, how to properly store, file and dispose of records, as well as their PII handling responsibilities.

Web-based training for PII handling is available for Navy personnel on Navy Knowledge Online and for Marine Corps personnel on the Marine Corps website. Web-based training for records management and electronic records management are on Navy Knowledge Online and as a PDF on the DON CIO website.

"By training the local security force, we are also learning from them," said Sarmiento. "We now have a bigger understanding on how to deal with the local community when it comes to security."

Sarmiento said this training is just the start of ongoing training between the U.S. and the Bahrain. He hopes this will evolve into something from which both countries can benefit.

"I am very proud of my Sailors who made this happen," said Sarmiento. "I am looking forward to see more students graduate from this academy in the near future."
