

U.S., Bahrain discuss regional security issues

MANAMA, Bahrain — Regional security issues and strengthening the U.S.-Bahraini alliance were on the table during a meeting between Bahrain's King Hamad bin Isa al Khalifa and the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Dec. 17.

Navy Adm. Mike Mullen said the two men discussed the problems caused by Iran's pursuit of nuclear weapons.

"We have publicly stated the concerns we have with the Iranian nuclear program," the admiral said during a news conference at U.S. Naval Forces Central Command headquarters, Dec. 18. "From my perspective, I see Iran continuing down the path to developing nuclear weapons, and achieving that goal would be very destabilizing to the region."

Mullen said a military strike on Iran's nuclear facility would be destabilizing, and restated the U.S. position to focus on dialogue and let the United Nations sanctions take effect. The sanctions, "have had a very significant effect on Iran, and more rapidly than many of us expected," the admiral said. "All options have been on the table and remain on the table."

The Iranian nuclear issue dominates, but the

United States continues to be concerned that leaders in Teheran are funding terror groups throughout the Middle East, Mullen said. Iran could be a productive and valued partner in the region, if the leaders behaved responsibly, the chairman said.

Mullen praised the growth of military cooperation among the nations of the Gulf Cooperative Council. "The GCC has grown more and more important," he said. "That kind of regional approach ... is needed. None of us can do this alone. We need partners now and in the future."

The cooperation has evolved over the past decade, the chairman said. "A regional approach is very powerful in deterring a country like Iran," he said. The United States has been emphasizing a regional air defense system to the Gulf nations to defend against short-range ballistic missiles that Iran already has, and longer-range missiles the country is trying to develop.

The friendship between Bahrain and the United States is warm, Mullen said, and has remained close since it was established 60 years ago. He thanked Bahrain for its support to the international effort in Afghanistan. For the third iteration, the nation is deploying a police special security force command in the coming days.

Art class enriches holidays at NSA Bahrain

MANAMA, Bahrain — Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) held an art enrichment class for service members and their families at the Bahrain School, Dec. 6-13.

The class, which was instructed by artist and art educator James Myers focused on studio art projects in decorative candle making and handmade holiday card designs. Myers said students would be able to design handmade cards and make their own candles by the end of the three-day class.

“My classes are usually longer, but since it’s the holidays I have to make it brief,” he said. “The cards and candles they make here can be gifts for Christmas.”

Myers said when the program started it was geared toward active duty military members but

when the families came back, it became open to anyone who are interested in art.

“We now have a mix of students ranging from family members to contractors,” he said.

Myers is grateful for the cooperation of Bahrain School and NSA to make it possible to have a place for him to teach. He said the classroom he uses right now has all the facilities he needs to run an arts and crafts place.

“This classroom has a sink and a big space plus it is walking distance from the base,” he said.

Myers said that he started teaching the class after the previous NSA commanding officer approached him and asked if he could start a program for the Sailors who deploy in the area. He has been teaching art classes for a year now and hopes to continue teaching and expanding the class to a wider audience in the future.

“I hope to see more students take advantage of what this program has to offer,” he said.

BUPERS Online 'OMPF - My Record' gives Sailors real-time access

MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS) — The "Official Military Personnel File (OMPF) – My Record" was added to the Sailor Career Toolbox, an online collection of career management tools accessible through the BUPERS Online portal, Nov. 29.

Formerly called Web-Enabled Record Review, OMPF – My Record is one of the many career tools used to confirm personnel information featured in the Sailor Career Toolbox. This change aligns the Navy with the naming convention used by the National Archives.

"By selecting 'OMPF-My Record,' Sailors can view documents in their OMPF, previously known as the 'microfiche record,'" said Chief Personnel Specialist Carol T. Fister, Navy Personnel Command (NPC) Records Management Policy Branch senior enlisted advisor. "These are the same documents viewed by selection boards when considering candidates for advancement and special programs. Using OMPF - My Record is much easier and quicker than the old process of requesting to have a CD be mailed to you."

The Sailor Career Toolbox is posted on the NPC website at <http://www.npc.navy.mil/CareerInfo/CareerToolbox/>.

There service members find information on the career management tools needed to enhance professional growth, verify personnel information and explore career opportunities. Some of the tools included in the Sailor Career Toolbox are the

Electronic Service Record, Career Management System/Interactive Detailing, Navy Knowledge Online and Navy Credentialing Online.

"With OMPF- My Record, Sailors can securely view, download and print documents, but they should be cautioned against downloading and saving these documents to a PC at work or at the library that others also use," Fister warned. "All of these documents contain personally identifiable information that could be used by others to steal a Sailor's identity. We do not want anyone to become a victim."

In the Sailor Career Toolbox service members will also find another important resource, the Command Career Counselor Toolbox.

"The Command Career Counselor Toolbox is a 'must have' for counselors and leaders," said Senior Chief Mass Communications Specialist Maria R. Escamilla, assigned to the Sea Warrior Program. "The Command Career Counselor Toolbox provides eight online tools and the actions required to support Sailors, covering the areas of career information, retention and professional development programs. Some of the tools included are Career Information Management System, Perform to Serve/FleetRIDE and Navy Retention Monitoring System."

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The chairman also discussed Korea in response to a question. The United States stands by its treaty commitments with South Korea, he said. South Korea is planning to resume the artillery exercise that was interrupted when North Korean artillery hit Yeongpyeong Island. The North Korean fire killed four Koreans, including two civilians.

"We are working very carefully and very comprehensively with South Korea to ensure that stability is sustained there; steps

need to be taken to deter the North," he said. "I think it is important that China step forward and influence actions in Pyongyang. We need to make sure that nothing happens there that escalates. At the same time, South Korea certainly has every right -- as any sovereign country does -- to defend its people, to conduct and exercise like this."

But North Korea is unpredictable, and will continue to be even more so as Kim Jong-un succeeds his father, current dictator Kim Jong-il. Mullen called the leader a "belligerent, dangerous individual."

The NEX operates on Navy installations and provides services to customers in ten countries and more than 100 locations around the world.

Originally servicing the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain community as a ship's store, Cougevan said Navy Exchange Service Command (NEXCOM) moved into a new facility at NSA in 2005.

"A ship's store is a smaller division of the NEX whose specialty is to offer a limited number of items to a relatively small community," Cougevan said. "To support a community as large as NSA was becoming, a full-fledged Exchange was needed that had the infrastructure to handle the growing sales volume and customer base."

NEX Bahrain opened in June 2006 and provides services to seven locations in Bahrain. The store offers special promotions such as its two Customer Appreciation Sales and Black Friday Sale. It hosts road shows with vendors such as Apple, Bose and Nikon; and has multiple unadvertised specials throughout the year.

NEX Bahrain hosts two special order programs for its customers. Customers wanting specialty food items can seek assistance from customer service to have those items ordered through the Defense Commissary Agency Europe. A similar process is used with the NEX special order program that enables customers searching for particular items to be able to locate them through any NEX in the world. In addition to these services, online and catalog shoppers purchasing items ineligible for FPO/APO ship can have items sent via a transshipment program by having them placed on a NEX container ship and sent to Bahrain free of charge.

Cougevan said that locally, merchandise pricing comes from NEXCOM in Norfolk directly and isn't decided by NEX Bahrain. He added that even though the store doesn't always advertise specials, his more astute customers come in daily to take advantage of item savings.

"They come in and see a lot of items on

sale, even though there may not be a specific flyer out for them," he said. "And that's what we tell our customers, 'Come visit us often. Even though we may not have many flyers going out, price changes are automatically downloaded to our store from Norfolk, and you'll notice a lot unadvertised specials by the signs posted on top of the merchandise.'"

Not limiting its special promotions solely to the NSA community, Cougevan said that the store works really hard to make visiting carrier groups feel welcome by maintaining longer operating hours and providing staff with special shirts with the carrier names embroidered on them.

"We derive great satisfaction from knowing that people who have been out to sea for a long time feel very wanted and welcome when they come to Bahrain," he said. "In fact, we receive a lot of positive comments from those folks that they're very surprised that we go all out for them."

In spite of its positive reviews, Cougevan acknowledges that the facility still faces a few challenges. The store is almost a quarter of the size of Exchanges with similar sales volume and there isn't enough warehouse space.

"The store is packed with items and the aisles aren't as wide as we'd like them to be, but our customers are asking for, and they deserve, a wide assortment of merchandise availability," he said. "They're willing to sacrifice some spacing to make sure they get the things they want and need."

To meet the spacing challenge, NEX Bahrain has several expansion programs on the horizon. It has plans to develop a terrace adjacent to the facility into a children's department store, while also expanding its entranceway to house several kiosks in the area. It also recently acquired a nearby self-service coin laundry from NSA's Morale, Welfare and Recreation department that will be refurbished with new appliances.

Cougevan said customers can expect to see the expansion projects come to fruition in early 2012.

According to NAVSUPACT BAHRAIN INSTRUCTION 4067.1E, effective January 7, 2011, only authorized shoppers will be allowed entry into the Navy Exchange.

This includes:

- Active Duty U.S. Military Personnel
- Reservists with a valid military ID card
- U.S. Department of State civilian employees
- U.S. military retirees
- U.S. Department of Defense employees
- U.S. teachers at Bahrain School
- U.S. DoD Contractors
- Eligible dependents of above personnel
- Military members of foreign nations when on duty orders with the U.S. Armed Services and their family members
- United Nations Special Commission Staff
- All other categories listed in DoDINST 1330.21, "Armed Services Exchange Regulations"

Any other authorized patron requires permission of the Installation Commanding Officer.

AT/FP dives are a protective measure against explosive devices that could be attached to U.S. Navy, Military Sealift Command or commercial ships. MDSU 2 conducts dives on barges, tugs, or piers that come into close contact with any U.S. vessel or property.

“Whenever we go out on a regular AT/FP dive, we have a coxswain who’s normally the dive supervisor,” said Navy Diver 1st Class Jon Neal. “We also have one diver, one stand-by diver, and one line tender, so the whole team consists of four people.”

Neal said that in the event of rough weather, they bring a fifth person to be the dive supervisor so the coxswain can focus on navigation.

“Any time you dive there’s risk involved, a lot things can happen,” said Neal. “In an emergency situation the dive supervisor can act as a line tender so two divers can be in the water.”

MDSU 2 has completed more than 60 AT/FP dives since arriving in Bahrain in September. Responsible for all of U.S. 5th Fleet, MDSU 2 is highly deployable and ready to move at a moment’s notice.

Since the Oct. 12, 2000 attack on USS Cole (DDG 67), U.S. authorities are more aware of the dangers associated with high-volume ship traffic. Cole was attacked by suicide bombers, who detonated an explosive-laden boat against her port side, tearing a hole in the Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers engineering compartment. The attack took the lives of 17 Sailors while the ship was anchored in Aden, Yemen, for a routine refueling stop.

If Navy Divers from MDSU 2 discovered an explosive, they would work hand in hand with Explosive Ordnance Disposal Mobile Unit (EODMU) 1 to neutralize the threat. Both MDSU 2 and EODMU 1 bring resources, expertise and experience to ensure the protection of U.S. assets.

MDSU 2 is deployed as part of Combined Task Group (CTG) 56.1 to support maritime security operations and theater security cooperation efforts in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility.

NSA family partakes in Hajj

MANAMA, Bahrain — During this holiday season, the diverse community of Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain will celebrate and observe both religious and non-religious holidays.

Hajj, one of the five pillars of Islam, took place in November and is one of the largest pilgrimages in the world. Hajj is a demonstration of solidarity when Muslims show their submission to Allah.

Felix Luccioni, a contractor at Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station Bahrain from Ponce, Puerto Rico, and his wife, Dalal Spaw, the NSA Bahrain Housing Director from Cairo, Egypt, went on this important journey. Luccioni made his first trip to Hajj in 1993 after reverting from Catholicism and Spaw, who was born Muslim, made her first trip this year.

This year alone anywhere from 4 to 6.5 million people traveled from all around the world to Saudi Arabia to carry out this religious duty that must be carried out at least once in the lifetime of every able-bodied Muslim who can afford to do so.

“It’s mandatory, but you have to be able to afford it, not just financially but physically and mentally also,” said Spaw.

Spaw said the process to completely fulfill the pilgrimage takes three days.

“First you have to go thru Ihram, which is preparing and cleansing your body for the pilgrimage,” she said. “You have to make sure you are in the proper attire and cut your nails and body hair for hygienic reasons.”

“Next you will state your intention to do Hajj,” Spaw said. “Intention is very important in Islam. Before you pray, before you fast, before you do anything, you have to state your intention toward whatever it is you’re wanting to do.”

The pilgrimage of Hajj consists of different rituals that a participant must take place in for Allah to accept their pilgrimage. The rituals are traveling around the Kaaba, or Cube, the most sacred site in Islam; running between the hills of Safa and Marwah, a re-enactment of the frantic search for water by Abraham’s wife Hajar for their son Ishmael; visiting Mt. Arafat for prayer, Qur’an reading and making Duaa (asking Allah for forgiveness) between noon and dusk. This is the time when Allah comes down with his Angels from Heaven to Earth and listen to prayers to forgive.

The couple discussed the common misconceptions about people of their faith.

“Islam is a very peaceful religion and is a way of life,” Spaw said. “Some people corrupt it by doing the wrong things and sending out the wrong message. Some people use religion for their personal benefit to gain power. For that reason now, a lot of people have a stigma about Muslim people.”

Luccioni and Spaw talked about the life changing experience.

“It really was beautiful to see so many people from around the world. We saw people from America, Europe, Asia, everywhere. Everyone was there peacefully for the same reason,” said Luccioni.

“I never used to wear the hijab (traditional Muslim head covering for women) but after I came back, I didn’t want to be the same person I was before,” Spaw said. “If Allah accepts your Hajj, all of your sins will be forgiven. I’m happy that I was able to complete my fifth pillar of Islam before I die and hope Allah will accept my Hajj and reward me with forgiving my sins,” said Spaw.

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

There are 68,000 Wi-Fi "hot spots" in the United States at airports, coffee shops, hotels, bookstores, schools and other locations where hundreds or thousands of people pass through every day. While many of these hot spots have secure networks, some do not, according to Supervisory Special Agent Donna Peterson of the FBI's Cyber Division. And connecting to an unsecure network can leave you vulnerable.

How do hackers grab your personal data out of thin air? One of the most common types of attack is this, according to Agent Peterson: A bogus but legitimate looking Wi-Fi network with a strong signal is strategically set up in a known hot spot with a hacker waiting nearby as users connect their laptops to it. At that point, your computer - and all your sensitive information, including user ID, passwords and credit card numbers - belongs to the hacker. The intruder can mine your computer for valuable data, direct you to phony web pages that look like the ones you frequent and record your every keystroke.

"Another thing to remember," according to Agent Peterson, "is that the connection between your laptop and the attacker's laptop runs both ways. While he's taking information from you, you may be unknowingly downloading viruses, worms and other malware from him."

What can you do to protect yourself? Agent Peterson's best advice is: Don't connect to an unknown Wi-Fi network. But if you must, there are some precautions you should take to reduce the threat:

Ensure your laptop security is up to date, with current versions of your operating system, web browser, firewalls and antivirus and anti-spyware software.

Do not conduct financial transactions or use applications like e-mail and instant messaging.

Change the default setting on your laptop so you have to manually select the Wi-Fi network you're connecting to.

Turn off your laptop's Wi-Fi capabilities when you're not using them.
