I hope everyone is taking full advantage of this weekend with two MWR trips to Roccaraso (snow conditions dependent) or some of the great USO and ITT vacations around Europe. If not, we have a few things going on in Naples to keep you busy, so check out what's happening in this edition of "Panorama." Remember to have a plan if your activities involve alcohol.

The annual OHA survey started this week, so you should have received an e-mail with the survey if you're eligible. Please take the time to fill out that survey completely and accurately, as it can have a huge impact on OHA rates down the line.

We've seen an uptick in traffic violations on base in recent weeks. Like I tell all the incoming personnel at AO, you'll learn what it takes to drive out in town through experience, but when it comes to driving inside my wire, all the rules apply. Please, slow down and pay attention to the traffic laws. Violations on base could result in loss of driving privileges and ability to purchase gas coupons, but more importantly, we don't want anyone in the community injured. Please slow down.

If you are using the buses from the Support Site as a commuter, please park in the lot across the street from the bus stop. EU helps Italy cope with Tunisian immigrants

The EU will help Italy cope with thousands of Tunisian immigrants who recently arrived on the island of Lampedusa, Sicily. Italy requested €100 million to deal with the emergency. Interior Minister Maroni said he feared the risk of terrorists among the asylum seekers. Lampedusa Island has an 800-bed reception center. It was closed after Italy's 'push-back' policy with Libya and was reopened after the arrival of more than 2,000 immigrants from Tunisia.

Town forbids profanity

Brignano Gera d'Adda, a small town of 6,000 inhabitants in the Lombardy region, approved a measure that bans the use of blasphemous words from public and business places. The measure forbids curses including "God," "Jesus," and "Mary." The council is run by the conservative Northern League party. The council received a complaint from a local priest who continuously overheard local young people take the name of God in vain, and since Italy is a Catholic country, the mayor said that all places of worship and recreation should be maintained with a certain respect and decorum. There will be no punishment for violators since this rule is only symbolic.

Police confiscate woman's SIM card

A woman from Sant'Arpino, in the Caserta province, was denounced for interruption of public service. She phoned the police dedicated phone number 155 times in a three-hour period, apparently with no special reason. On Wednesday morning, she made 75 phone calls,

and by night she reached 155 calls. The next morning, at 6 a.m. after charging her mobile phone, she started calling again. Police intervened by going to her house and confiscating her mobile phone SIM card.

16 more solar plants near completion in Italy

TerniEnergia, an Italian renewable energy company, will finish building 16 photovoltaic solar energy plants by the end of March. The solar plants are located in Umbria, Marche, Lazio, Piedmont, Molise and Puglia regions. The total solar plants capacity is 18.3 MWp.

88-year-old woman finds freedom behind the wheel

An 88-year-old woman from a seaside resort near Pisa passed her driving test last week. She was tired of asking around for a ride when needed. So she bought a computer and started studying for the oral exam. She failed the first time, but did not give up. She tried again, passed the oral test and then the driving test successfully.

Naples' traffic wards learn self-defense

Naples has 170 more traffic wardens who won a municipal competition. The municipal agents will attend a self-defense jujitsu course in a gym located in the Scampia district. The son of the gym's owner won an Olympic gold medal in Sydney. The agents will be divided into groups of 50 for the twice a week two-month long training. The city police will be introduced to the people and they will run for the district, giving more security to the local citizens.

MCPON message to the Fleet: No second chances for drug abuse

Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON)(SS/SW) Rick D. West, released the following message on drug abuse, which focuses on "Spice," herbal products and other designer drugs, to the fleet, Feb. 11:

"Shipmates,

There has been an alarming rise in the number of Sailors who are choosing to use 'Spice,' herbal products and other so-called designer drugs; and this must come to an immediate stop.

More than 150 Sailors are currently being processed for 'Spice' use, possession or distribution, and this is UNSAT.

Overall, the Navy has separated 1,374 Sailors in FY09; 1,308 Sailors in FY10; and 302 Sailors during the first quarter of FY11, for drug abuse. These unexpected losses negatively affect our commands' manning levels, which in turn affects the commands' operational and warfighter readiness. The Navy's policy on drug abuse is simple and clear – zero tolerance, and there are no second chances.

NAVADMIN 108/10 states the following on drug abuse:

'Drug abuse includes the wrongful use, possession, manufacture, or distribution of a controlled substance. Drug abuse also includes the unlawful use of controlled substance analogues (designer drugs), natural substances (e.g., fungi, excretions), chemicals (e.g., chemicals wrongfully used as inhalants), propellants and/or prescribed or over-the-counter drugs or pharmaceutical compounds with the intent to induce intoxication, excitement, or stupefaction of the central nervous system, and will subject the violator to punitive action under the UCMJ and/or adverse administrative action.'

Some examples of substances mentioned above where the wrongful use constitutes drug abuse includes, but is not limited to the following:

- Products that contain synthetic cannabinoid compounds, such as "Spice," genie, blaze, dream, exses, spark, fusion, dark knight, yukatan fire, and K2.

- Natural substances such as salvia divinorum and mushrooms.
- Common items abused by inhaling or huffing, such as Dust Off, glue, paint thinner and gasoline.
- Over-the-counter products such as Robitussin and Coricidin HBP.
- Prescription medications such as Oxycodone, Vicodin, Adderall, and Valium.

If you didn't know, 'Spice' is a mixture of natural herbs and synthetic cannabinoids, that when smoked, produce a marijuana-like 'high' that decreases motor skills, impairs coordination and concentration, and effects short-term memory and senses. The effects of these substance is unpredictable when combined with alcohol, and since the chemical blends are continuously manipulated and the strength of the synthetic chemical used is unknown, there is no way to know what you are getting in the drugs nor what the long-term health risks are if used.

Some of the side effects from these drugs included uncontrolled vomiting, excessive sweating, flushed skin, increased heart rate and high blood pressure, and loss of consciousness. If this sounds like a good time to you, then go ahead and hand over your rank and paycheck, and possibly your life.

Bottom line: The use and even just the possession of 'Spice,' herbal products, designer drugs, chemicals used for huffing, salvia divinorum, or products containing synthetic cannabinoid compounds are prohibited. Leadership, along with Naval Criminal Investigative Service, is aggressively working to catch personnel who are possessing, using, or distributing drugs; and when you get caught, your career will be over.

Drug abuse goes against our Navy's core values and ethos, and it is a threat to lives, unit and mission readiness and morale. It is every Sailor's responsibility to deter drug abuse. If you do the crime, you will do the time ... remember zero tolerance and no second chances.

HOOYAH!"

Naples commander accompanies designated deputy SACEUR to Kosovo

Adm. Samuel Locklear, III, commander Allied Joint Force Command Naples, accompanied Lt. Gen. Sir Richard Shirreff (GBR), deputy supreme allied commander Europe (SACEUR) to Kosovo Feb. 10. While in Pristina, the Naples-based commander reviewed with Shirreff the current overarching situation and main areas of the NATO-led Kosovo Force (KFOR) activities.

Upon their arrival, Maj. Gen. Erhard Buhler, commander KFOR, welcomed the delegation by reviewing the situation in Kosovo and KFOR's contribution and progress regarding the stability and safety in Kosovo. "The overall situation is calm and stable," Buhler said. "The border demarcation with the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia is complete, and the monitoring task of the first part of this border was handed over to the KP [Kosovo Police]."

Buhler continued to say the demarcation process along the border with Montenegro could be completed by summer and that KFOR is and will still be responsible for the administrative boundary. Buhler outlined that due to the improved situation in Kosovo and the enhanced capabilities of KP, it became possible to reorganize KFOR and to reduce the number of soldiers. At the same time flexibility, mobility and readiness of KFOR will be increased in order to further accomplish the mission.

During the visit, Locklear reminded the designated deputy SACEUR that, with the further readjustment of KFOR troops, there is no doubt that KFOR will remain able to deploy forces quickly and effectively whenever and wherever necessary.

"We have had some productive talks with the UN and EU representatives during this visit, and I want to encourage and continue a healthy dialog with all invested entities here in Kosovo," said Locklear. "We encourage the people of Kosovo to continue to establish a firm commitment to the rule of law, and free, fair, transparent elections."

While in Kosovo, Locklear took a few minutes to conduct a radio address with the people of Kosovo. During the radio address, he described his view of Kosovo following the first election process completion. "I want to congrat-

ulate Kosovo on the peaceful election process that took place last month," he said. "There were discrepancies noted and addressed during the process and it took awhile; but, the people of Kosovo worked through the process. I was pleased that KP was able to deal with the issues that occurred and that our assistance was not required."

Regarding looking ahead at KFOR's new structure, Locklear said that the downsizing in troop numbers and restructuring is a natural process that reflects the growing capability of local institutions to assume responsibilities for security tasks.

Locklear went on to say that the step-by-step transition during the phase of deterrent presence is taking place in full consultation and transparency with the international organizations operating in Kosovo and with the local institutions and that KFOR will continue to have available a capable reserve of quickly deployable, over-the-horizon forces.

"We will continue to provide for a safe and secure environment and freedom of movement Kosovo-wide, regardless of structural adaption of KFOR and regardless of political developments," said Locklear.

In accordance with COMNAVREGEURNOTE 3500, IFPP's are mandatory for all traveling Department of Defense personnel and their adult family members if one of the following criteria is met:

- If the destination country or region has a State Department Public Announcement or Travel Warning in effect.
- A U.S. Mission (Embassy/Consulate) is not present and the State Department or responsible Chief of Mission is not in a position to accord normal consular protection services to the U.S. citizens.
- Travel to any of the following locations; Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Belarus, Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Israel, Lebanon, Albania, Kosovo, Serbia and **all African nations**.
- Travel out of the EUCOM AOR, as required by AOR Commander. (CONUS, Alaska, Hawaii and U.S. territories are exempt.)



Safety tip

Speak up for safety

When you get a good idea at work, share it. Your suggestion could be the one improving the quality of your product, speeding up the process or preventing an injury.

As the person actually doing the job, you are uniquely positioned to see problems and find solutions. Since you are the one doing the job on a daily basis, you may see things your bosses and or product/process designers overlooked. Your input before a decision is made to alter a work process or invest in major equipment purchases could save significant money and more importantly, save lives.

How you present your suggestion makes a difference in whether it is considered. These tips may help you to get your point across:

- Talk to the right person. Your supervisor is a good place to start, and he or she may send you to expand on your idea with someone else. Your safety committee also looks for ideas to solve problems.

- Bring up your ideas at your weekly safety talk or your pre-job briefing. Other workers may be able to add to your suggestions.
- Be positive. Instead of complaining about what is wrong, talk about how the problem can be solved.
- Be courteous. It's difficult to get anything useful out of an angry, rude speech as the message will be shut out with the messenger.
- Timing is everything when it comes to approaching your boss with a suggestion. If it's one of those days when there are more pressing issues, your idea might not get the best reception. Wait for a time when your boss can give your idea the attention it deserves.
- Many supervisors encourage their subordinates to speak up. Some may even hold brainstorming sessions to come up with possible solutions to problems. If you are part of an idea meeting, contribute as much as possible and encourage your coworkers to take part. Even the suggestions which are not chosen can lead to answers that work out. These meetings can be energetic and fun. Keep your comments on the topic.
- Some workplaces use suggestion boxes, allowing you to make a suggestion without being identified. Use the suggestion box the way it is intended to be used, to get ideas for improvements.
- You can do some research to back up your idea. Talk to your supervisor or your safety officer to get articles or suppliers' information. The Internet has an infinite amount of information on industry and safety.

Whether your suggestion is to remove a hazard or make a process more efficient, it is important for you to communicate it. Your inspiration could save everyone some stress. It may save someone much, much more!

The director of the Department of Defense Dependents Schools-Europe (DoDDS-Europe) stopped by the Naples schools during her visit with command leadership this week. After that, Bresell spoke with representatives from the school, discussing various topics of interest to the students. Bresell said the students focused on important issues, "More Advanced Placement classes and more rigorous classes at the middle school level to help prepare them for the future, rather than small problems." She added that the group, made up of students from 7th through 12th grades, was very open and worked well together during the discussion.

One aspect of student life at Naples impressed Bresell. She mentioned several students who spoke of the ease of transition to the student body membership with "no cliques, no gangs, and everyone can have a friend here." Bresell also reminded the teachers that students know they are there for the students, providing tutoring before and after school, during seminar and whenever needed.

After all the visits were over, Bresell summed up the visit talking about the students, "What a fantastic group of kids!" She departed Naples Wednesday morning for her return to the DoDDS-E headquarters, located in Germany.

Lady Wildcats claw their way to victory

The Naples Wildcats girls' basketball team has been a work in progress this season with only two seniors and a lot of freshmen and sophomores. Friday night opened up as expected with the Sigonella Lady Jaguars cruising to a 16-9 first quarter lead and 24-18 halftime lead. The power drives by Naples senior Melody Fears, who finished the night with 13 points, 11 rebounds, and five steals, kept Naples in the game. However, Naples came alive in the third quarter, which was a very savage defensive struggle. Outscoring Sigonella 8-4, Sigonella barely hung on to a 28-26 lead at the end of the third quarter. Sensing victory, adrenalin and momentum pumped Naples up in the fourth quarter. Fears continued her aggressive post play and Montana Reider came alive in the second half, scoring 10 points. Maria Beard assisted (five points, three rebounds) defensive ace Shelby Kimbro (five points, three rebounds and 10 steals) and Ryan Murphy (five rebounds). Naples outscored Sigonella 10-1 in the fourth quarter and finished with a well-earned 36-29 victory.

If Friday's Lady Wildcats' game was one of the best of the season, Saturday's was one for the ages. In a grueling physical match that lasted for almost three hours due to overtime play and a 25-minute injury break, Naples came out strong and led 12-8 after the first quarter. The gap narrowed and seesawed back and forth until Sigonella tied the score 43-43 at the end of regulation play. Finally Naples won in overtime 50-49.

Melody Fears again led the way for Naples with her second double-double of the weekend, scoring 19 points and pulling down 13 rebounds. Maria Beard added 10

points, Sydney Harris was strong under the board pulling down eight rebounds, and Shelby Kimbro scored nine points and stole the ball five times. Montana Bieder added five steals and five rebounds to help a powerful Naples defense contain a hot Sigonella team.

With this hard-fought victory, Naples enters the DoDDS tournament with victories in four out of their past six games, and is markedly superior to the team who first took to the court in December.

Wildcats shred Jaguars in ASIL championship

The Wildcats boys' basketball team was in a fight for the ASIL championship. Play was intense from the beginning of Friday's game. Naples barely clung to a 10-8 first quarter lead, but gradually increased their margin of victory as the game went on. Naples led 27-22 at halftime, 50-30 at the end of three, and finished with a decisive 72-39 victory to claim the ASIL boys' championship.

Naples was led on offense by team captain Jun Jun Gallardo, who popped in 3-pointers as if they were mere layups and finished the game with 28 points. With Gallardo unstoppable from

beyond the 3-point line, Nigel Alexander's teammates often found him open under the basket and he finished the night with a double-double with 11 points and 12 rebounds. Ryheam Trahan caught fire in the second half, finishing with 11 points and five rebounds. Kyle Smigelski used power and Eddy Allen used speed to play aggressive defense. Scoring eight points, Smigelski disrupted the rhythm of Larry Stevenson, Sigonella's best player, and Allen scored four points, stole the ball five times, and pulled down six rebounds. The Naples bench also played well, with Darnell Dothard scoring six points and getting five rebounds.

Sigonella came out mad Saturday after the whipping Naples gave them the previous night, and were determined to prove that they are indeed the best DoDDS Division III Team, even though they had lost the ASIL title to Naples. At the end of the first quarter, it was Sigonella 16, Naples 13, and it didn't get better for the Wildcats, with Sigonella widening the lead to 11 points at halftime and 12 points by the end of the third quarter. Naples managed to close to within five points at one point, but lost the momentum they had gained. In the fourth quarter, desperate to gain the lead for the first time and conclude a perfect regular season, Naples ran into foul trouble and Sigonella capitalized on most of their foul shots. Gallardo scored 26 points and stole the ball four times, Ryheam Trahan added 19 points and five rebounds, Nigel Alexander added six points and a team high five steals, and Kyle Smigelski scored seven points and had two steals.

Even with this loss, Naples finished the regular season with a 13-1 record and the ASIL championship title, and will go into the DoDDS tournament. Though not invincible, they are very, very good, and with further hard work under coaches Craig Lord and David Nichols and the right mental attitude, they could win it all.
