

On Saturday, June 4, U.S. Vice President Joe Biden and Dr. Jill Biden will visit the U.S. Naval Support Activity Naples, Italy, to visit with service members and their families. U.S. and NATO forces and their families are invited to the Capodichino Piazza at 1:15 p.m. to hear the Vice President and Dr. Biden deliver remarks.

Expect delays entering the base. The east (back) gate will be open



Three buses will depart the TLA bus stop on Support Site at 11 a.m. and two buses will depart Carney Park at 11 a.m. to allow for offsite parking. Bus riders from Carney Park are advised to park in the satellite parking lot behind the pool. The only entrance to the Capo Spine will be through the security checkpoint near the NEX Mini Mart and Café. Personal cameras and cell phones will be allowed. All attendees are advised to allow plenty of time for multiple security screenings. Patience and flexibility are appreciated during the preparation and execution of this event.

Italian News Briefs

Newly elected mayor of Naples promises big change

Luigi De Magistris, a former magistrate, is the new mayor of Naples after receiving 65 percent of the votes. He was elected on Monday during a runoff with Gianni Lettieri, who was representing the center-right coalition supported by Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi. Lettieri received 35 percent of votes. Luigi De Magistris, 44, was born in Naples. He became a public prosecutor in 1995 and in 2009, he entered the European Parliament. During his career as public prosecutor, his investigations frequently ran into political roadblocks. One of his investigations caused serious controversy leading to the resignation of the Italian Minister of Justice in 2008, and consequently the fall of the center-left government. De Magistris will count on a very solid majority in City Hall with 32 out of 48 council members who will support his program. His proposals were to re-launch Naples as a major European capital, get rid of garbage by implementing modern waste collection and disposal systems in line with high environmental standards and creating opportunities for major investments.

Tourist killed in Naples

Naples' police identified two men suspected of trying to mug an American tourist who had arrived in Naples aboard a cruise ship and was walking with his wife near the port when he was knocked to the ground May 18. He died nine days after being hospitalized with severe head injuries. Police arrested two suspects, who were from Naples and had been previously convicted of burglary and robbery. One of the identified arrested people confessed and reconstructed the incident. Police identified the criminals through the first number on the license's plate of the

motorcycle used in the mugging and through identification made by the victim's wife. They have been charged with attempted robbery and manslaughter. Neapolitan businessmen in downtown Naples shuttered their shops on Monday as a result of a protest for the spread of crime and a day of mourning for the innocent American victim.

Mona Lisa's skeleton found?

Italian archaeologists searching for the remains of Leonardo's Mona Lisa in a former convent in Florence found a skeleton that may belong to a woman. They are searching for the remains of Lisa Gherardini Del Giocondo, who died in Florence in 1542 and is believed to be the subject Leonardo's famous portrait. Only scientific tests will prove whether or not the skeleton belonged to that woman. These tests include a carbon-14 test to determine the skeleton's historical period, a histological exam to determine its age and a test to compare its DNA with that of two of Mona Lisa's children, who are buried in Florence's Santissima Annunziata church.

Police arrest alleged 'match-fixers'

Italian police arrested 16 people for alleged involvement in match-fixing in Serie B and C and other minor soccer leagues Wednesday. Among those arrested is former international Lazio striker Giuseppe Signori, who was captain in the mid-1990s and led Serie A in scoring for three seasons. He was placed under house arrest. Active and former soccer players and owners of betting agencies were also arrested, including former Sampdoria defender Stefano Bettarini. Police started to investigate six months ago in Cremona after a player of the local lower-division team appeared to have been offered a drink containing a sedative during a league game. The investigation spread to a dozen other towns.

Wildcat ball games

The Wildcat teams were top seeded in Division II play before the DoDDS Europe Championships. They waded into pool play against teams they had defeated in league play and against teams they had never competed. So last weekend's tournament promised to be interesting.

Sophomore Shannon Walsh had two in-the-park home runs. Fourth seeded Bitburg Baronesses were blanked by the Lady Wildcats in the second game that day. Sophomore pitcher Cindy Olivo pitched a no-hitter—the first in her career. Walsh led the way at the plate with another home run and a single.

The Lady Wildcats entered the

Melody Fears, who had three hits and five RBIs. By the second inning, they had five runs and they doubled that amount by the fourth inning (and only allowed two runs from the opponents).

Naples not only has the longest winning streak in championship games, but the longest current winning streak in Europe at 37 games over three seasons. In the first three years DoDDS has allowed softball in Italy schools, Naples has gone 46-1, losing only to Wiesbaden in 2009; 30-0 during the Southern Division regular season over three years. That's just the start as more than a dozen players return next year.

Wildcats take third

The Wildcats were only able to score once leading to a 14-12 defeat. The Wildcats defeated the Aviano Saints and brought home a respectable third place.

Lady Wildcats make it a three-peat



A daytrip to Capua

Only 25 miles north of Naples and just a 30-minute drive from Gricignano, the small city of Capua was once one of the most prosperous and thriving cities in the Roman Empire. Originally an Etruscan settlement, settled in 600 B.C., it fell to the Romans in 338 B.C.

Today, the primary historical attraction in Capua is the amphitheater, built in the time of Augustus (around 50 B.C.). It was the pinnacle for the city, and today it stands as the second largest amphitheater in Italy, behind Rome's famous Coliseum. Most notably, this was the arena the legendary Spartacus fought other gladiators, its notoriety reignited in 2010 with the release of Starz's popular TV series "Spartacus. Sitting next to the amphitheater is a fantastic gladiator museum with life size models, weapons and an interesting gladiator "experience."

Other sightseeing opportunities in the city of Capua include the remains of the public baths, numerous Etruscan ruins, and the Arco di Adriano, which was erected as a triumphant arch to an unknown emperor. A Mithraeum (place of worship for

the followers of the mystery religion of Mithraism) is also present.

Located just off the A1 via the Santa Maria Capua Vetere exit, Capua is a wonderful city to spend some time exploring. GPS coordinates for the city are 41°06' N 14°12' E / 41.1°N 14.2° E. Members of Le Piume Nere running and leisure club joined over 1,500 runners from all over the world to compete in the 39th annual 100-Kilometer Passatore Ultra Marathon May 27.

The running course spanned a 100-kilometer trek beginning in Piazza della Signoria in Florence and ending at Piazza del Popolo in the small town of Faenza. The trek started at 52 meters above sea level and peaked at 913 meters near the half-way point.

Le Piume Nere members consist of an international group of athletes from Naval Support Activity Naples, Allied Joint Force Command Naples and the Naples area. "This is a diverse team and a great team," said Senior Chief Information Systems Technician (EXW/FPJ) Anthony Trigg, race participant and the team member with the fastest time. "These guys came together from all different types of backgrounds and decided to push themselves to another level."

The athletes started preparing mentally for the race about a week before the event.

"We started sending each other messages during the week to prepare and get our spirits high," said military spouse and professional artist Natonya Pacchiarotti. "Some people made team T-shirts, some made snacks for the

road trip and the race and others helped organize transportation. Everyone spent time really planning out what needed to be packed and ready to go."

The race's 20-hour time limit meant runners would be running from 3 p.m. in the afternoon, through the night, into the early and late morning hours.

"We knew we would need a change of clothes due to temperature changes and possible weather

er changes," said Pacchiarotti. "We packed a cooler full of water, energy drinks, health bars, fruit, peanut butter sandwiches, and more, all to help keep our energy up throughout the race."

Despite all the preparations the team still faced intense challenges. "At around the 40th kilometer, we started to lose sunlight," said Flowers. "I think we continued in the pitch black until about the 80 kilometer marker, which we hit at about 5 a.m. Until that point we had been running solely by the light of the moon."

The race was challenging for Trigg, too, who was the club's fastest runner in the 100K. "It was definitely the most difficult thing I've ever done," said Trigg. "It was every bit as mentally challenging as it was physical, and I know I would not have been able to make it without the great Le Piume Nere team spirit." He completed the course in 13 hours, 16 minutes and 47 seconds.

The club's legacy of success is one of constant placements and completions in various running events throughout Italy. The club is highly regarded in the most prestigious in the Italian running circles and is frequently invited to major running events. "In a few words I can say that I have founded the most prestigious club because it's unique to aggregate so many foreigners from different nations," said Interbartolo. "It was a revolutionary change in the Italian running concept, where the entire family would run pushing a stroller. It has always been my greatest goal to promote this sport to families, and not focus so much on just the competition."

Document translation services

Do you have any documents that you need translated? The usual method is to contact your local U.S. Consulate or Embassy for a list of translators. The U.S. Consulate in Naples has such a list on their website at <http://italy.usembassy.gov/acs/professionals/translators/translators-naples.html>.

There is also another choice. Military OneSource (www.militaryonesource.com), through its document translation services, provides for the translation of legal documents such as leases, marriage licenses and school transcripts for service members and their families. Upon the user's request, translations will be certified, notarized as necessary, and accompanied by a certificate of authenticity.

In order to use the Military OneSource document translation services, you must first be eligible for basic Military OneSource access. Those eligible are active-duty service members in the Army, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force and their immediate family members; National Guard and Reserve members—regardless of activation status—and their immediate family members (includes members of the Individual Ready Reserve); separating service members and their immediate family members for up to six months following their separation;

DoD civilians on the staff of installation support services/offering support services to service members and their family (Airman and Family Readiness Centers, Army Community Service, Family Assistance Centers, etc.); and employees of Defense Dependents Elementary and Secondary Schools. However, family members of civilian employees are not eligible, and civilian service eligibility does not include face-to-face consultation, or telephonic or online short-term solution-focused consultation.

In order to get started, submit a qualifying document via the preferred method (e-mail), and if the document has less than 5,000 words, you will receive your translation within a few business days. Documents that are nonstandard in nature, are not in good condition, or are longer than 5,000 words generally require more time. There is a 20-page limit per qualifying document. Be sure to have the document you want to have translated with you when you make this call.

Naples Public Health Evaluation

Meetings for tenants whose homes were sampled as part of Naples PHE, Phase II

Beginning May 28, environmental sampling reports for homes sampled as part of Phase II of the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE) will be available to residents who participated in Phase II sampling. The Phase II environmental sampling occurred between November 2008 and October 2009. These individualized reports contain the laboratory testing results and health risk assessment specific to the home sampled. The Navy will distribute these Phase II reports to the participating residents via a new website distribution system. Participating residents should expect an e-mail message containing a link to the Phase II reports website, where they can then view, download and print the sampling report for their home.

For residents who have questions about their report, the PHE team will be hosting small-group meetings for Phase II residents. At these meetings, technical experts will provide an overview of the PHE and sampling report and will be available to speak one-on-one with residents about their report. The meeting dates are listed below.



Mailing MPS? Think twice when PCSing

Use of Intratheater Delivery Service (IDS), commonly referred to as MPS, for transportation of personal property in connection with permanent change of station (PSC) or temporary duty moves, is prohibited, with the exception of uniforms and personal gear required to perform official duties at your next duty station.

For example, if you are PCSing from NSA Naples to NSA Yokosuka, you are authorized to send MPS uniforms and personal gear (publications, equipment/materials required to perform official duties) to your next duty station.

All other boxes will have to be paid for and reimbursed as household goods, depending on your entitlements. You can pay to send leftover household goods, blankets and souvenirs by Standard Parcel Post. We recommend insuring any boxes valued at over \$100.

Customers should check with the Personal Property Services Office to verify their mailing weight allowance authorized to be reimbursed prior to mailing goods.

Energy conservation

Setting boundaries: Close the door on energy waste

Doors let us in and out of a building, and in and out of spaces within a building. Most doors within a building are inside the air conditioning boundary, and can be left open unless they are designated as fire doors. But one way to save on heating and air conditioning is to close doors to spaces that aren't used much, like storage areas. If they have their own source of heat or air conditioning, set the thermostat to the most energy-saving position (down in winter, up in summer), or off, if there's no chance of water freezing in pipes in the space.

Obviously, doors to the outside need to be closed when the heat or air conditioning is on. If you notice a door that's frequently left open, report it to your supervisor or building energy and water monitor. The mechanical door closer may be in need of repair. Or maybe the building pressure needs to be adjusted. Typically, the volume of fresh air being brought into the building should be slightly more than the volume of air being exhausted to keep a slightly positive pressure in the building. It's especially important that large loading doors be closed when not actively in use if the heat or air conditioning is on. Report large loading doors to conditioned spaces that are frequently left open. It might be cost effective to install automated high speed doors that save energy and improve comfort and productivity.

Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active-duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy. This is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application.

NATIONALS OF ANY STATE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COMING TO ITALY DO NOT REQUIRE ANY VISA OR SOJOURNER PERMIT.

As part of the Area Orientation process, the U.S. Region Legal Service Office (RLSO EURAFSWA) assists in the preparation and oversees the acquisition of the Sojourner Permit for all personnel attached to U.S. Navy commands in the Naples area. Army and Air Force personnel stationed at JFC must apply through the Carabinieri at the JFC Provost Marshall's Office, Building L.

Taming the Lao

Three hours south of Naples lay the Lucanian Mountains of the southern Apennines and amid them growls the rapids of the Lao River. For the past three years, Boy Scout Troop 007 has waited patiently for the month of May when the river rages at its highest and fastest.

On May 20, the troop once again headed south to the small town of Papisidero to meet the guides of the Rafting Adventure Lao Company and attempt to tame this unrelenting beast. It was a trip filled with fun, exercise and team building, both on the river and off.

The trip began Friday afternoon at the Fit Forum where 21 scouts and six adult scouters rallied with rental vans and as much food and camping gear as they could safely stuff in them. Arriving at the campsite that night, the troop pitched their tents in the dark and quickly settled in for a good night of sleep in anticipation of the challenges the river would offer the next morning. The theme of the trip was "team-work," as everyone knew it was the only way to perform well enough on the lower river course to earn enough of the guides' confidences to be allowed to raft the harder course on the upper river.

Team building began Saturday

morning with the four scout patrols working together to create an energy-filled breakfast of egg and sausage burritos, and plenty of fruit and juice before donning wet suits, rubber boots, vests and helmets. After a safety class and a rehearsal of the rafting commands with their guides, the teams headed down the river to conduct some quick rafting synchronization exercises and to have some initial fun soaking each other with their oars, while taking their rafting skills test.

Reaching the halfway point in about an hour, the boys enjoyed

diving and doing flips from the fifteen-foot high cliff side of a rock in the middle of the river, while the guides assured the adults that the boys were very much ready for the harder course the following day.

Finishing the lower course by 2 p.m. with no incidents of falling out or capsizing, several older scouts spent the afternoon working on advancement requirements for their next scout rank. A few of the younger scouts conducted the safety and skills training to earn their Totem' Chip, which allows them to use pocket

foil in the fire, and Dutch-oven peach cobbler for dessert.

The upper river course was everything the troop had hoped for with more rapids, large rocks to bump into and slide over or around, several narrow canyon gorges causing much faster water and more beautiful scenery with high waterfalls dumping into the river from every direction. With the required cooperation and energy, the troop handled most of it with ease.

When approaching the part of the gorge where the river narrows to a point where only one

raft barely fits and the water gushes at hundreds of gallons per second, quickly changes direction, and drops off several feet to create a 3.5 to 4 grade rapid, the guides offered the troop the option to portage around on foot rather than negotiate the treacherous choke point. In the words of the chief guide, "Each raft has a 50-50 chance that it will capsize." With confidence in both their rafting skills and swimming abilities if it went poorly, it was a no-brainer for the scouts; we raft! Of the five rafts, none capsized and only one dump-trucked hard enough to throw a few passengers into the ice cold, fast-moving water.

The ride home was quiet with everyone exhausted and content. Troop 007 had tamed the River Lao. With the success of this trip, the adult scouters think it might be time to consider an alternate course, maybe the Noce River in northern Italy. For now, the troop will begin its preparation for High Adventure summer camps filled with camping, hiking, rappelling, water skiing and countless other activities in Nottingham, England; Kandersteg, Switzerland; and Garmisch, Germany beginning late June and running through July.

knives, axes and saws on scout outings, and the Fireman Chit, which allows them to build campfires and operate stoves when camping. For additional exercise (as if it was necessary), the late afternoon included an intense game of Frisbee football on the nearby community soccer field. One and a half hours later, the boys were now completely exhausted; many with skinned knees and elbows and all the adults were limping and groaning, but everyone was content. Dinner included patrol cooking of chili con carne with cheese over Fritos, baked potatoes cooked in
