Obama, Mullen send Thanksgiving Day messages

President Barack Obama and Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, released Thanksgiving messages Monday.

Obama recalled that President George Washington proclaimed the first public thanksgiving, and President Abraham Lincoln established the annual Thanksgiving Day holiday to mend the nation during the Civil War.

It is Thanksgiving as a unique American tradition that "binds us together as one people, each of us thankful for our common blessings," the president said.

Obama added, "As we gather once again among loved ones, let us also reach out to our neighbors and fellow citizens in need of a helping hand. This is a time for us to renew our bonds with one another, and we can fulfill that commitment by serving our communities and our nation throughout the year.

"In doing so, we pay tribute to

our country's men and women in uniform who set an example of service that inspires us all. Let us be guided by the legacy of those who have fought for the freedoms for which we give thanks, and be worthy heirs to the noble tradition of goodwill shown on this day."

Mullen's Thanksgiving Day message follows in its entirety.

"On behalf of the Mullen family, I wish all of you serving in uniform today – as well as your families – a very safe and happy Thanksgiving holiday.

"We certainly have much for which to be grateful. Today, due in no small measure to your dedication, our nation – indeed the world – is a safer place to live. All around the globe and in all manner of ways, you stand a vigilant watch. From Afghanistan to Iraq and a thousand places in between, you help ensure peace and stability in places that have historically known neither. Giving hope to those in need and pause

to those who threaten us, you make sure the fight remains on the enemy's doorstep and that lives torn asunder by war and natural disaster are restored and renewed.

"The people you have helped are grateful ... Americans everywhere are grateful ... and I am grateful for your service.

"That service, of course, can and does demand the highest of

sacrifices. We should be especially mindful this year of those families who will have one less chair at the table, as well as those who have no chair at all, much less a home in which to keep it. Theirs will be a particularly poignant holiday, and I ask you to keep them in your thoughts and prayers.

"We live in a country that doesn't force its young men and women to

pick up arms. You do it willingly, even eagerly -- not because you enjoy danger or killing or sacrifice, but rather in spite of those things. You and your families serve and work so hard so that someday perhaps your children and grandchildren might not have to. That is the greatest gift you can give a grateful nation.

"Again, from my family to yours, thank you for all you do."

Navy seeks 100 percent participation in electronic service record

As the Navy moves forward with plans to eliminate the enlisted field service record more than 130,000 Sailors need to establish a self-service account that will allow them to access to their new digital record.

"The elimination of the enlisted field service record will begin in January 2010," said Art Tate, NSIPS/ESR/CIMS implementation manager. "Once the paper record disappears, they will have to create an ESR (electronic service record) account if they wish to see what is in their record."

This move follows the action already taken for officers. The Navy eliminated the officer field service record in 2000 and has already closed-out some enlisted field service records for Sailors in Millington, Tenn. and other test locations.

"I don't miss the paper record. It is easier to access it on-line, right from my desk. I don't even have to go anywhere," said Chief Navy Counselor (AW) Kelly Strickland, command career counselor at Navy Personnel Command. Strickland has logged on to her ESR to verify her dependent's data and confirm classes she has completed have been entered in her record.

Chief of Naval Personnel announced the requirement for all active-duty and Reserve

personnel to establish and maintain a self-service ESR early this year. These accounts will allow Sailors to review all personnel, training, and awards data by choosing in the view section of the ESR. Sailors also have limited self-service update capability.

The Navy first announced the implementation of the ESR in 2006 with NAVADMIN 292/06.

Self-service accounts can be created at <https://nsips.nmci.navy.mil> or on the Navy Standard Integrated Personnel System (NSIPS)/ESR server on board ships.

NAVADMIN 043/09 directs all commands to use NSIPS/ESR as the single field level data entry point for all Sailors.

Commanding officers, executive officers and command master chiefs can obtain command-level view only access by completing the NSIPS/ESR system authorization request and contacting their local NSIPS area manager. This access provides the user view only capability for all ESR accounts within their UIC(s).

All commands responsible for service record entries are required to initiate updates in NSIPS/ESR; however official military personnel file requirements remain unchanged.

Sailors are ultimately responsible for the accuracy of their ESR and must contact the servicing personnel office if any information is incorrect.

Italian News Briefs

Counterfeit clothes seized

In Naples, more than 160,000 clothes with "Made in Italy" label were seized by police Monday. Police said the items were worth more than one million Euros. They were stored in Chinese wholesalers boxes with Chinese writing. Merchants were unable to demonstrate where the clothes were made. The Italian parliament approved new severe regulations and penalties for people caught trading in fake items and using the 'Made in Italy' label.

Hospital for injured stuffed animals at Naples Zoo

On Monday, a 'new hospital' opened in Naples zoo which takes care for fluffy toys. Kids can bring their injured friends for a 'medical treatment' into the zoo's emergency room where doctors throughout the day, by appointment take care for toys suffering from missing ears, broken arms or lost stuffing. The emergency room's personnel come from the Ospedale delle Bambole (doll hospital) which is located in downtown Naples. Children can take their toys where the problem is resolved immediately and if not, the toy stays overnight and can be picked up the following day in perfect health. The aim of this hospital will make children to understand the importance of loving and caring for animals. Also, this hospital's emergency room will teach children that a broken toy can be fixed and not be thrown away, said Francesco Emilio Borrelli, president of Watchdog, an association founded to ensure the physical and emotional well-being of the zoo's real animals. Francesco Emilio Borrelli added the emergency room also seeks to combat attitudes underlying today's disposable consumer culture.

C-130 crashes outside Pisa

On Monday, a C-130 military transport plane crashed outside Pisa airport immediately after taking off. Five people aboard the plane died. Two of them were from Campania, one from Naples and one from Sorrento. The aircraft was from the 46th Air Force Brigade and it was involved in a training

exercise. Eyewitnesses said they saw the plane spin out of control before crashing and bursting into flames. Part of the aircraft fell on rail tracks of the local Pisa-Livorno rail service which was closed for several hours. All Italian high authorities expressed their condolence to the families of the five victims. The Italian Air Force opened an official investigation into the crash.

Italian Rolling Stone magazine chooses "Rock Star of the Year"

The Italian edition of the American music magazine Rolling Stone chose Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi as 'Rock Star of the Year.' Berlusconi was chosen for his lifestyle, who like no other is capable of distinguishing himself, according to a statement released by the magazine. The December magazine cover will be dedicated to Berlusconi. The decision to choose Berlusconi was unanimous said Carlo Antonelli, editor of the magazine, who added that the prime minister behavior and lifestyle made him an incredible and internationally-renowned celebrity.

Suspicion of match-fixing and illegal betting in Italian Soccer

Nine people were taken into custody by police on suspicion of possible Europe match-fixing and illegal betting. Among those arrested there was the president of Italian soccer third-division Potenza SC club who is suspected of fraud, illegal betting and connections with crime organizations. According to authorities, the president of the Potenza club was involved in the manipulation of a match in Italy's second division between Ravenna and Lecce in 2008, from which he earned 86,000 Euros after betting on the outcome. Several Italian third-division matches were suspected of having been fixed, according to authorities. The arrests are among an ongoing investigation by German police and the UEFA, European soccer's governing body, into match-fixing on the European soccer circuit that has also brought 15 arrests in Germany and two in Switzerland.

Family care plan revisions include deployment deferment option

Navy officials announced revisions to its Family Care Plan policy Monday which includes a new deployment deferment option for eligible Sailors.

"Under the new policy, Sailors who are required to complete a family care plan and may be deployed to an area authorized imminent danger pay are allowed to request a deferment of deployment due to unforeseen circumstances," said Kathy Wells, Navy Family Care Plan policy coordinator.

The change is a result of guidance from the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2008, section 586, Family Care Plans and Deferment of Deployment of Single Parent or Dual Military Couples with Minor Dependents.

"Service members on active-duty make requests for deferment to their commanding officer. Commanding officers can grant deferments for up to four months," said Wells.

According to Wells, the NDAA provides broad guidance and does not specifically define unforeseen circumstances.

"It is going to be up to the commanding officer," said Wells.

More information can be found in the Family Care Plan instruction, OPNAVINST 1740.4D.

The updated policy also incorporates Navy Guidelines Concerning Pregnancy and Parenthood which allows a female Sailor a 12-month deferment from travel away from the home station after childbirth.

A Family Care Plan is a group of documents, including a Family Care Plan certificate NAVPERS 1740/6, which identifies and outlines who will provide care for a Sailor's minor children in the event the Sailor is deployed.

"Ensuring proper care for a Sailor's minor children or adult family member/dependents reduces stress on the Sailor and strengthens a deployable asset for the command," said Wells.

Formal documentation of a Family Care Plan is required under any of the following conditions:

- A Sailor with primary or shared physical custody of a minor child or children who is not married to the other natural or adoptive parent of the minor child or children.
- Both members of a married dual-military couple where one or both have primary or shared physical custody of a minor child or children.
- Sailors who are legally responsible for an adult family member who is incapable of providing for themselves in the absence of the Sailor.

Support for caregivers designated in Family Care Plans is available Navy-wide through Fleet and Family Service Centers, Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society, Military One Source, base Child Development Centers, Navy Operational Support Centers and community and family support groups.

Controlling Machine Hazards

Machines make our jobs easier and are responsible for our quality of life. As beneficial as they are, machines are potentially hazardous for a number of reasons. They almost always include moving parts that may accidentally come into contact with a worker's body. Many incorporate other hazards, such as hydraulic and pneumatic systems, electrical circuits, hot exhausts or surfaces and toxic chemicals. When workers come into contact with moving, or otherwise hazardous machine parts, the results can be tragic. It takes only a second for a worker to be killed or maimed.

Controls prevent access to moving parts while they are in motion, prevent parts from moving while the worker is in a danger zone, or contain fragments of particles thrown off by the process or pieces of broken machinery should the machine itself break.

Controls, whether factory-installed or custom, must meet the following criteria:

- **Protection for everyone in the workplace:** Not only the operator, but all those who pass through the work area must be protected.
- **Security:** Machine guards should be designed so as to make it difficult for anyone to tamper with them.
- **No new hazard:** Any guard that presents a new hazard of its own, or interferes with the machine operator, may be counterproductive.

Guards that interfere with the operation of a machine are likely to be altered, bypassed or removed.

- **Training: Workers must be trained to use guards properly.** They must understand the hazard being guarded and know how the guard functions.
- **Preventive maintenance:** Regular lubrication, repair, and adjustment of both the machine and the safeguarding systems are essential.
- **Temporary removal:** When a guard is removed for maintenance or adjustment, temporary controls must be used to protect workers from machine hazards. These controls often include lockouts.

Machine guarding and controls are vital to every workplace using machinery. It is an essential for leaders to know when these controls are not in place.

Report any problems

- Report any problems around machines and guards, like broken or missing parts and guards.
- Loose parts, unusual noise, leaks, or vibration.
- Strange odors, heat, smoke, dust, fumes.
- Messy work area and floor, not enough light.
- Damaged or dirty PPE or PPE that fits badly.
- Unhealthy reactions, skin rashes, dizziness, hearing problems.

GUARDING is one of the best ways to manage the health and safety risks of a machine. Make sure yours are in place and your workforce knows how to use them.



NSA Naples energy conservation

Use ENERGY STAR compact fluorescent light bulbs. ENERGY STAR compact. Fluorescent light bulbs last longer and use up to 75 percent less energy than standard light bulbs. You can cut your electric bill by \$60 per year if you replace the standard bulbs in your five most frequently used light fixtures. Properly dispose of compact fluorescent light bulbs at your local household hazardous waste collection site.

Use natural lighting. Open curtains and shades during the day instead of using lighting. Consider skylights and solar tubes during remodeling or new construction design. This allows the maximum use of natural daylight.

Plan your lighting. Not every room needs the same amount of general light. Plan within a room to provide general background lighting and supplementary task lighting. A good lighting plan can reduce lighting costs and still provide all the light you need. Use a single, high-watt bulb. Using one high-watt bulb instead of several low-watt bulbs saves energy. Do not exceed the manufacturer's recommended wattage for the fixture.

Control outdoor lighting. To assure only dusk-to-dawn operation of your outdoor lights, control your fixtures with a photocell or a timer.

Turn off lights. Turn off lights when not in use, even for short periods of time. Turning lights off and on uses less energy than if they are left on all the time. Install a timer on indoor lights. Use timers to turn lights on and off to help regulate use.

Avoid long-life incandescent light bulbs. Long-life incandescent light bulbs are the least efficient of the incandescent bulbs. Consider LED (Light Emitting Diode) lighting. LEDs are becoming more common for can, track, under-cabinet and holiday lighting. Initial cost is more, but the lights use 10 times less energy and last 50 times longer than incandescent lights. They use one-third the energy and last 5 times longer than compact fluorescent lights.

Position lights properly. Try to illuminate the entire activity area without creating distracting glares or shadows. To do this, position your light source closer to the area you want lit. This saves energy by not over-lighting an unused area.

Adjust light level. Higher light settings use more energy, so save energy by using dimmer controls, high/low switches or three-way bulbs to adjust the level of light to exactly what you need.

Holiday driving safety tips

Over the next six weeks, our employees and their families will travel to various destinations in both our local area and around the country to share this joyful season with family and friends. Thanksgiving weekend is statistically the most highly traveled of the year. The crowded roads and potential for adverse weather have made this long weekend one of the most dangerous in terms of potential traffic accidents. During this time, it is especially important to ensure service members and their families are aware of these potential dangers. Here are a few tips to help keep holiday travel safe and healthy:

- Take your car in, have it checked over, make sure it's ready for travel.
- As you get out in the car, be sure and wear your seatbelt.
- Make sure you're plenty rested when you drive and take frequent rest stops.
- Check the local radio stations for the latest traffic updates.
- Never drink and drive
- Always pay attention to the road, don't get distracted with cell phones, maps, GPS, etc.

Holiday cooking safety tips

It's that time of year where kitchen and food safety need emphasis. Home fires and other tragedies occur every year during the holidays. No matter what your meal there are a few tips to help keep holiday meals safe and healthy:

- Avoid loose-fitting clothing while cooking
- Never leave the kitchen unattended when cooking
- Follow all thawing and cooking instructions
- Make sure hot food is served hot and cold food is served cold
- Always turn pot handles inward
- Don't store items on the stove top - they could catch fire
- Keep kitchen appliances clean and in good condition - turn off after use
- Don't overload electrical outlets or use electrical appliances near water
- Equip the kitchen area with smoke detectors and an all purpose fire extinguisher.



NSA Naples also plans to install a water vending machine on the Support Site in the near future. It will be similar to those typically found outside grocery stores and mini-marts in the United States. These machines dispense safe drinking water in varying amounts at a competitive price. Because the containers are reusable, the system is considered more ecologically friendly than throw-away plastic bottles. The vending machines use a combination of filtration methods to provide safe drinking water, including reverse osmosis and ultra violet light treatment. The machine will be placed near the Commissary and managed by NEX. It is expected to be in place by early 2010.

Capo Water Dispenser Update

The potable Water Distribution Point at Capodichino is once again open for use by U.S. government personnel living in private off-base rental housing. The machine was recently disconnected, relocated and fitted with new piping and backflow preventers. Earlier this week, the machine was super-chlorinated and tested for safety.

The Water Distribution Point is now located on the south wall of the Water Treatment Plant (Bldg. 459), adjacent to the East Parking Garage, located at the southeast corner of the base, directly across from the gasoline pump.

The Capo water dispenser is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The system is simple to operate: once the container is securely in place, press the operating button until the container is

Washing and sanitizing reusable water bottles

Below are some easy steps to follow if you reuse a water bottle:

1. Use only bottles intended for re-use. Clear plastic bottles that are filled with water or juice are not designed to be reused. These bottles do not stand up to the wear and tear of repeated use. A recent study suggested that washing this type of bottle to clean the inside and remove germs may accelerate the breakdown of the plastic making it harder to sanitize.
2. Wash a water bottle intended for re-use with soap and warm water. Rinse with clear water, and drain thoroughly.
3. Allow the water bottle to dry thoroughly overnight.
4. Sanitizing* is performed with regular unscented 5.25% household bleach. Rinse the inside of the bottle with the bleach solution. Use 1 teaspoon (19.6mL) bleach per quart (960mL) of water. Cover the container and shake it so the solution touches all inside surfaces.
5. Cover and let stand for 30 minutes.
6. Rinse thoroughly with clean water.

Remember, when working with bleach, read and follow the safety instructions on the bleach container's label. Never mix bleach with ammonia or any other cleaner. Wear rubber boots, rubber gloves, and eye protection. Try not to breathe bleach fumes. Open windows and doors to get fresh air.

NSC Offers Holiday Driving Tips

Naval Safety Center traffic safety experts offer advice for staying safe on the roads over the holiday weekend.

The American Automobile Association is reporting that nearly 40 million Americans will pile into the family car and travel 50 or more miles from home to celebrate Thanksgiving 2009.

Some of those travelers will be Sailors and their families, taking advantage of the long weekend to spend time with loved ones.

Unfortunately, higher traffic volumes, combined with fatigue that's often a fact of life during a busy holiday weekend, increase the potential for highway mishaps, said Dan Dray, a traffic safety specialist at the Naval Safety Center. He and colleague Mike Borkowski say proper planning is the best way to manage highway risk.

"Check your route in advance, be aware of weather conditions and prepare your vehicle," said Borkowski.

Getting the vehicle ready includes ensuring proper preventive maintenance and checking the tires' air pressure and tread depth, said Borkowski.

Dray, a native of Wisconsin, said drivers who are heading up north on their travels should also prepare for winter weather.

"You should always have emergency equipment in your trunk, including flares, a blanket, a shovel and some bottled water and non-perishable food," said Dray.

Even if weather isn't a factor, nearly everyone hitting the roads for Thanksgiving will experience heavy traffic and long delays. This can be an unwelcome strain on already frazzled nerves, but the experts say staying calm is important behind the wheel. One way to preempt the effect of stressful road conditions is to figure delays into the trip.

"Just expect them and have patience. Know what your buttons are and don't let other drivers push them," said Borkowski. "And if you're able to travel before or after the rush hour, that helps too."

Fatigue is another factor that leads to a large number of traffic accidents.

"The minute you experience effects of fatigue such as yawning or feeling tired, you should immediately pull over and get some rest. A 30 minute nap will do wonders," said Dray.

The Naval Safety Center recommends driving during daylight hours as much as possible and planning 10 to 15 minute stops every two hours of the drive to rest and break up the monotony of the road.

Another risk to be aware of while driving during the weekend is animal strikes.

"Deer strikes are up all across the country," said Borkowski. "People panic, but it's best not to swerve. You and the animal are moving, so by the time you get to it, it will most likely have moved out of the path of your vehicle."

Wherever holiday plans take Sailors this weekend, Dray recommends using the Travel Risk Planning System (TRiPS) to recognize and manage the risks. The web-based assessment analyzes the hazards associated with a planned road trip and offers suggestions for making the journey safer.

TRiPS really pays off for users, said Dray.

"I strongly urge all travelers to complete a TRiPS risk assessment. Of the more than 150,000 assessments completed, there have been zero fatalities," during those trips, said Dray.
