

CNIC begins Region-wide trip at NSA Naples

Commander, Naval Installations Command Vice Adm. Michael Vitale arrived at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples, Italy, Sept. 16 to meet with Commander Navy Region Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia Rear Adm. David Mercer and his staff, signifying the start of Vitale's two-week tour of the Navy's most diverse Region.

Vitale will visit Camp Lemonnier, Djibouti; Naval Air Station Sigonella, Sicily; NSA Bahrain; NSA Naples, Italy; NSA Souda Bay, Crete; and Naval Station Rota, Spain from Sept. 17-28 in order to better understand the unique challenges and missions of each installation.

Although the Region has changed dramatically in the last 18 months, adding installations in Africa and Southwest Asia and disestablishing the Navy's last installation in the United Kingdom, Vitale feels the Region is continuing to make advancements in stability, efficiency and readiness.

Sailors stop the show during 'Sex Signals'

Sailors and civilians from Naval Support Activity Naples filed into the Capodichino theater for Sexual Assault Prevention and Response training Monday expecting the same old power point training. But what they got was a new and improved way to teach Sailors about this serious subject.

"Sex Signals" is a 90-minute two-person program that consists of skits that deal with subjects including dating, rape, consent and other associated topics such as body language, alcohol and intervention.

This program was created in 2000 by Gail Stern and Christian Murphy, who brought the show to colleges across the United States. After seeing the positive

effects the performances had at various military installations, Army leaders contracted Catharsis Productions for 400 performances to educate personnel.

The program was first offered at Fort Hood, Texas, in November and now Sex Signals actors are providing the training at installations across the services.

Through improvisation and audience interaction, the play explores how social pressures, unrealistic fantasies, power inequality, and false preconceptions of the other sex all contribute to the tensions often found in dating. These misunderstandings, such as assuming something about someone based on how they dress, can be key contributors in sexual assaults, according to the program.

Vicki Shepherd, NSA Naples, Sexual Assault Response coordi-

nator said, "This issue is important because as a society, we have not iratitacated rape or sexual assault; however, with each day we are one step closer to creating a safer environment for both men and women by teaching individuals to clearly and openly communicate about what they want and do not want sexually."

The actors, Fawzia Mirza and Brian Golden, performed skits about dating and rape, but service members got to dictate the scene, and they also had the opportunity to stop the scene when a character crossed the line to disrespect or assault.

"One thing that people should take away from this show is that it challenges the mainstream beliefs and myths, enabling individuals to challenge their positions of power and privilege,

question the cultural values they take for granted, and to hold themselves accountable for their actions" said Shepherd. "I would hope that views and behaviors can be changed once audiences become attuned to their moral

responsibilities within intimate relationships, and that the seeds of long-term change may be planted as a result of the efforts [of] Sex Signals and Sexual Assault Response coordinators (SARC) around the world."

Fundamental Planner Elements

- 1 Students record assignments and class activities in the planner during the first five minutes of every class.

- 4 Gradespeed and planner comparisons can be used as cross checks of progress.

Teacher Procedures

- List assignments and class activities both long and short term on the board for students to list in their planners.

- Record all assignments, class activities, projects, and due dates every day in every class in the planner during the first five minutes of class.

- Share and discuss information in the planner every evening with parents.

Parent Participation

- Consistently inspect and review the planner and then initial it.
- Use the planner as a communication tool to convey information to the teacher.

As all three circle members (students, parents, and teachers) consistently apply the fundamental elements of effective planner use, grades will improve, frustration and friction will be reduced, and positive communication will increase.

Discover Irish Literature in Dublin, Expatriate Writers in Venice

University of Maryland University College Europe (UMUC Europe) announces two 3-credit undergraduate field study courses, Dublin, Ireland: A Brief Literary History and Expatriate Writers in Venice: 1800 to present, offered this October in Dublin, Ireland, and Venice, Italy. The registration deadline for both courses is Oct. 2.

In Dublin, Ireland: A Brief Literary History (Oct. 17-24), students will be introduced to the literary history of Ireland, emphasizing poets, dramatists, and fiction writers of the 20th century, such as James Joyce, Lady Gregory, and W.B. Yeats, who helped forge one of the greatest bodies of modern literature written in English. Students will attend several evening theater performances in Dublin and also visit various sites, to include the James Joyce Museum and Tower, the Old Parliament, Trinity College, and St. Patrick's Cathedral.

In Expatriate Writers in Venice: 1800 to Present (Oct. 18-25), students will explore romantic Venice and the influence it had on world-renowned writers like Ernest Hemingway and Henry James, and on major poets such as George Gordon Byron and Robert Browning. Students will combine the visual influences of Venice – architecture, art works, and picturesque landscapes – with the study of the great literature produced there. Additionally, students will also participate in literary walks with on-site readings of significant passages, which provide a living sense of the writers' purposes and an appreciation of their powers of description.

Italy mourns soldiers killed in Afghanistan

Italy held a state funeral Monday for six soldiers killed in Afghanistan last week. The bodies of the Italians were returned on Sunday. Thousands of people paid their respects as the bodies lay in the chapel of a military hospital in Rome. Government officials and thousands of citizens attended the mass at St. Paul's Basilica in Rome. The Italian government called a national day of mourning, with flags at half staff and a minute of silence at schools and public offices. The air force's flying team "Frecce Tricolori" flew over Rome with red, white and green smoke representing the Italian flag. Crowds applauded as the six coffins were carried inside the basilica and an honor guard saluted the coffins. The funeral was broadcast live on state national TV and other national broadcasters. The roadside bombing in Kabul killed 10 Afghans and wounded four Italian soldiers who attended the funeral. Italy has 2,800 troops in Afghanistan and added 500 more after the Afghan elections.

Vatican museums open Friday nights through October

This summer, the Vatican opened its museums at nighttime on Fridays as an experiment due to the mass of tourists during the daytime. The initiative was so successful that it will continue in September and October from 7-11 p.m., with last admission at 9:30 p.m. Visit the Vatican's Web site at <http://www.vatican.va> to make reservation.

H1N1 flu claims third victim in Italy

Italy's third victim of the Influenza A (H1N1), a woman, died Tuesday of lung failure in northern Italy. The woman had serious congenital illness and recurring bronchitis which made her vulnerable to the virus. Another woman died in Sicily and according to doctors, she was in good health. Officials ordered an autopsy to confirm that she died of the flu and not from any other infection. On Sept. 3, a man died from the H1N1 flu in Naples. He had diabetes and severe

heart problems. Three patients are still battling life-threatening cases of the new flu in Monza, Florence and Rome. According to the health ministry, Italy has 2,384 confirmed cases of the new flu and an estimated 8,133 cases. The vaccine will become available Oct. 15.

Man on the run arrested by anti-terrorism police

The anti-terrorism police in Rome arrested an Algerian man who had been on the run since 2003. The man is also wanted by Algerian authorities for forming and participating in an Islamic organization. The man had obtained Irish citizenship after he provided different data which enabled him to evade capture.

Speaker's corner open in Rome

A speaker's corner has been set up in Rome, like Hyde Park in London. People can stand on a podium and give their speeches on politics, religion, or anything else they want. The corner is in Rome's north-east suburbs, off the Via Nomentana in Montesacro suburb.

Police seize earrings of former Naples football player

Diego Armando Maradona, former football player in Naples, arrived in Italy to spend time at a health clinic in northern Italy. Italian police seized earrings worth 4,000 euros as an effort to recover his unpaid taxes of 37 million euros from his playing days in Naples between 1984 and 1991. Three years ago, police seized two Rolex watches worth 10,000 euros during Maradona's visit to Naples.

Chariots will come to the rescue in Rome

The city of Rome will have electric chariots starting in November. Sixty young people were recruited to be "tourist angels" who will speed to visitors' rescue when they are in trouble or want to ask for information. According to the Tourism Chief Mauro Cutrufo, tourists won't have to go to tourism information centers, and the chariots can be reached anywhere in the city.

Naples Health Awareness Update

NSA Naples Hospital offers risk communication workshop

The medium is the message.

Or, another way of stating Marshall McLuhan's famous phrase, how you say something is as important as what you say.

Professionals who deal with risk have known this for a long time. An entire field of training has grown up around this special need: risk communication. On Sept. 28, three days of crisis risk communication training will take place at the U.S. Naval Hospital Naples at the Support Site.

Navy and Marine Corps Public Health Center, working with the Army Center for Health Promotion and Preventive Medicine and the Air Force, have developed this course specifically to help personnel prepare and respond to a possible pandemic of influenza.

Cmdr. Tim Halenkamp, M.D., said the instruction is invaluable for anyone who deals with the general public.


"The workshop provides 'hands-on' communication skills training," Halenkamp said, "with a focus on communicating with different stakeholders such as other health care workers, family members, the sick,

communities, other agencies and the media during a pandemic influenza crisis."

The workshop will include discussions on quarantine, isolation, lack of services and other issues. It will offer ways of responding to emotions such as fear and anger; the perception of risk; and various agendas such as personal, economic, cultural and political.

- Additional communications skills covered in this course include:
- How and when to deliver "bad news"
- How to communicate what you do know versus what you don't know in a crisis
- How to improve your non verbal observation and awareness skills, including listening
- By the end of the course, attendees will be able to recognize and demonstrate which risk communication skills to apply that will result in effective communication with stakeholders prior to, during and after a pandemic of influenza. Although this particular training session will focus on influenza, the strategies offered will help anyone deal with other high risk scenarios and demonstrate how to address peoples' concerns.

TRICARE benefits overseas

It's often assumed that everyone knows what benefits TRICARE Prime or other TRICARE plans offer, but it's especially important everyone understands their TRICARE benefits while overseas.

What is TRICARE?

TRICARE is a Department of Defense (DoD) healthcare system geared to provide military and their family member's key healthcare benefits. Dissected into categories, Continental U.S. (CONUS) and Outside Continental U.S. (OCONUS), TRICARE provides eligible beneficiaries stationed or living overseas either TRICARE Overseas Prime, Standard or Global Remote.

What are benefits of TRICARE Prime?

A TRICARE Prime beneficiary will not incur any enrollment fees, deductibles, cost-shares or co-pays for authorized medical care. Enrollees are assigned a Primary Care Manager (PCM) who will help manage their health care needs. The Preferred Provider Network (PPN) allows beneficiaries to get authorized care from select providers in their host-nation country without filing claims or paying out-of-pocket. Established access-to-care standards ensure they receive timely, quality care: Acute illness — 24 hours; Routine visits — seven days; Well visits or specialty care — 30 days.

Who is eligible?

TRICARE Overseas Prime is mandatory for active duty service members and is an option for eligible, command-sponsored active duty family members. Certain reservists activated for more than 30 consecutive days and their family members are also eligible. Family members eligible for Prime who choose not to enroll are covered by TRICARE Standard.

TRICARE Overseas Standard enrollees are not assigned a PCM and may self-refer themselves for specialty-care to any TRICARE-authorized provider. However, some procedures may require pre-authorization.

Meanwhile, lifelong bully Brent (voice of Andy Samberg) relishes in tormenting Flint like he did when they were kids, and Mayor Shelbourne (voice of Bruce Campbell) schemes to use Flint's latest invention -- a device designed to improve everyone's lives -- for his own personal gain. Mr. T voices by-the-books cop Earl Devereaux, and James Caan voices Flint's technophobe father, Tim.

G.I. JOE: RISE OF COBRA, PG-13, for crude and sexual content throughout, brief strong language and comic violence, Action/Adventure and War, 118 min. Cast: Dennis Quaid, Channing Tatum, Sienna Miller, Ray Park and Rachel Nichols. From the Egyptian desert to deep below the polar ice caps, the elite G.I. JOE team uses the latest in next-generation spy and military equipment to fight the corrupt arms dealer Destro and the growing threat of the mysterious Cobra organization to prevent them from plunging the world into chaos.

ALIENS IN THE ATTIC, PG, for action violence, some suggestive humor and language, Action/Adventure, Kids/Family and Science Fiction/Fantasy 86 min. Cast: Carter Jenkins, Ashley Tisdale, Austin Butler, Doris Roberts and Robert Hoffman. Kids on a family vacation must fight off an attack by knee-high alien invaders with world-destroying ambitions -- while the youngsters' parents remain clueless about the battle.

THE HURT LOCKER, R, for war violence and language, Action/Adventure, Drama, Thriller and War, 125 min. Cast: Ralph Fiennes, Anthony Mackie, Brian Geraghty, Guy Pearce and Christian Camargo. In the summer of 2004, Sergeant J.T. Sanborn and Specialist Owen Eldridge of Bravo Company are at the volatile center of the war, part of a small counterforce specifically trained to

handle the homemade bombs, or Improvised Explosive Devices (IEDs), that account for more than half of American hostile deaths and have killed thousands of Iraqis. A high-pressure, high-stakes assignment, the job leaves no room for mistakes, as they learn when they lose their team leader on a mission. When Staff Sergeant William James takes over the team, Sanborn and Eldridge are shocked by what seems like his reckless disregard for military protocol and basic safety measures. And yet, in the fog of war, appearances are never reliable for long. Cast: Kate Beckinsale, Gabriel Macht, Tom Skerritt and Columbus Short, Alex O'Loughlin. Synopsis: For U.S. Marshal Carrie Stetko, things are about to get even more dangerous. The only law enforcement in this unforgiving territory, she has just been sent to investigate a body on the ice. Antarctica's first homicide: A shocking discovery in itself, it will plunge her into an even more bizarre mystery and the revelation of secrets long-buried under the endless ice--secrets that someone believes are still worth killing for. As Stetko races to find the killer before he finds her, winter is already closing in. In the deadly Antarctic whiteout, she won't see him till he's a breath away.

CNO approves uniform changes

The Chief of Naval Operations (CNO) approved several uniform policy changes proposed by the Navy Uniform Board in NAVADMIN 271-09.

The changes include authorizing Sailors to wear the aviation flight deck boots (non-spark safety boots) with the Navy Working Uniform (NWU) while outside the flight deck or flight line working environment.

Sailors must conform to official NWU manner of wear and the boots must present a well-maintained and professional appearance when worn with the NWU.

Sailors issued aviation flight deck boots are still required to purchase and maintain the black nine-inch NWU boot.

"The Uniform Board considers many suggestions and changes to uniforms and wear regulation," said Capt. Vince Drouillard, branch head within the Navy's personnel, plans and policy division. "These approved changes are the result of fleet feedback and research to ensure uniforms meet mission requirements and uphold Navy traditions."

Beginning Nov. 1, women are authorized cosmetic permanent makeup for eyebrows, eyeliner, lipstick and lip liner. The permanent makeup must be in good taste and blend naturally with the skin tone. Lipstick colors will be conservative and complement the Sailor. Still prohibited are exaggerated or faddish cosmetic styles.

The NAVADMIN states permanent makeup is an elective medical procedure accomplished by qualified medical professionals to enhance Sailors' natural features. Sailors should carefully consider the risks and liabilities involved with the procedures and ensure they plan and research their options thoroughly.

"Sailors should be very familiar with the extent of the procedure, the possibilities of side affects, the potential need for time off for recovery and having a reputable organization and facility conduct any procedures," said Drouillard.

Guidelines for requesting the procedures and administrative guidance for Sailors will be published in an upcoming NAVADMIN before the Nov. 1 implementation date.

In another change, Sailors assigned to the staff of United States Africa Command (U.S. AFRICOM) are now authorized to wear the optional AFRICOM staff identification badge during their assignment to the command. The badge may be worn on all uniforms, with the exception of working uniforms.

Women will wear the badge centered one-quarter inch above the left pocket or one-quarter inch above authorized ribbons, medals and breast insignia. Men will wear the badge centered on the left breast pocket. Beginning immediately, the badge will be available for purchase through Navy Exchange Uniform Support Center by calling 800-368-4088 or 757-502-7450.

The NAVADMIN re-designates the Naval Air Crewman Qualification insignia as the Naval Aircrew Warfare Specialist (NAC) insignia. The insignia description and composition remains the same and will be worn in the primary or secondary position as described in Uniform Regulations. Sailors will use NAC following their rate as their warfare designation (e.g. AW1 (NAC) Williams).

Qualified Sailors can now wear a maximum of two warfare and qualification devices within a single category such as Enlisted Aviation Warfare Specialist (EAWS), and NAC Warfare Specialist. Warfare insignia will continue to take precedence over qualification insignia as prescribed in uniform regulations. Sailors should review all uniform changes outlined in NAVADMIN 271-09 at <http://www.npc.navy.mil>.

Representatives from 11 countries arrive for EPC 09

The Eurasia Partnership Capstone 2009 (EPC 09) kicked off on Naval Support Activity Souda Bay, Greece Sept. 19, with the arrival of 70 military personnel from 11 countries.

During EPC 09, Azerbaijan, Bulgaria, Georgia, Greece, Kazakhstan, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway, Poland, Ukraine and the United States will work together in non-formal environments such as seminars and workshops aimed at increasing maritime safety and security in the Eurasian littorals.

This is the third EPC event sponsored by Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Europe-Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Africa/Commander, U.S. 6th Fleet, formerly known as Black Sea Partnership Cruise (BSPC).

"With EPC 09 we are broadening our efforts to increase the cooperation, capability and capacities in the Eurasian littoral regions," said Cmdr. Lawrence Ollice, lead planning officer for EPC 09. "We have two new countries participating this year, Kazakhstan and Norway. Norway, with Latvia and Lithuania, are taking on instructor roles making this the most robust conference to date."

The majority of workshops and seminars will be held at the NATO Maritime Interdiction Operations Training Center (NMIOTC), located at Marathi Pier.

"We were forced to find a new location for the EPC 09 since the Mount Whitney [USS Mount Whitney (LCC/JCC 20)] was not available," said Ollice. "Last year we had Greek instructors from the NMIOTC participate in BSPC and they indicated that NMIOTC would be interested in hosting next year's event. NMIOTC was very excited about the idea, and many of the topics they teach are inline with regional interests."

Workshops and seminars will include noncommissioned officer

While the most flexible, one should know this plan is a Fee-for-Service plan. Note: TRICARE Standard beneficiaries can still be seen at military treatment facilities (MTF) on a space-available (Space-A) basis.

TRICARE Global Remote Overseas (TGRO) beneficiaries eligible for Prime are stationed more than 50 miles from a MTF and are covered under the TGRO program. Beneficiaries should contact their local TRICARE Service Center (TSC) for more info.

How does one enroll?

Eligible beneficiaries, including active duty service members, must complete an enrollment form at their local TSC (U.S. Naval Hospital Naples). This is typically done during in-processing at Area-Orientation (base theater). If not, they should contact their TSC at 081-811-6330/6331 or by e-mail to tricare.naples@med.navy.mil.

Naples Cross Country Team rules in first meet


The Naples Wildcats hosted teams from Sigonella, American Overseas School of

Logistic specialist rating prepares for launch

The CNO approved rating merger of postal clerks (PCs) and storekeepers (SKs) to logistics specialist (LS) will take place Oct. 1. There will instantly be thousands of LS in the Navy; however, the merger will simply be a name change for most of them. Naples area PCs and SKs have been preparing for the merger over the past several months with the expert coordination and professionalism that distinguishes these supply ratings.

Master Chief Postal Clerk Edgardo Rodriquez explained: "The senior enlisted leaders for the PCs and SKs and senior Supply Corps officer leadership put together a great plan for all the right reasons and with a clear and well thought out execution timeline. But in between each milestone along the way, everyone has known that the difference between a successfully implemented merger and a superbly successful merger would be orchestrated at the chief and leading petty officer level. In the Naples area, we determined early-on to make the rating realignment to logistics specialist the best it could be. We owed it to our junior Sailors who will be the next generation to maintain our commitment to keep the Navy armed with world-class logistics."

One of the greatest challenges facing the chiefs was training.

Chief Storekeeper Miguel Moranparra said, "It's not as easy as it appears to an outsider. The supply team has always been one face to the customer, and we worked out whose area of expertise it was behind the scenes to solve difficult problems. But realistically expecting seasoned petty officers and chiefs to know the intricacies of both the postal clerk and storekeeper ratings is a monumental task. I have studied for hundreds of hours and trained in the class and on the job for hundreds more. This isn't a flip-of-a-

switch change when you try and fathom just how much expertise we have to teach each other."

Naples has taken a three-prong approach in preparing its Sailors for the big change. Groups of Sailors have been carving out time slots in their busy schedules to meet and cover various topics.

"The small groups of just petty officers have given us the chance to ask lots of questions and gain an introductory understanding of each other's ratings," explained Storekeeper Second Class Dirk Smart who works in the Warehouse Receiving Section.

Fleet and Industrial Supply Center Sigonella (FISCSI) Site Naples has gone even farther by placing postal clerks in storekeepers' jobs and by giving postal jobs to storekeepers.

Chief Postal Clerk Virgilio Gallardo hailed the success of this approach in the case of Storekeeper Second Class Wayne Lewis. "He holds a Military Post Office Flexible Credit Account, is fully doing the job of a postal clerk, and has been praised by customers for his excellent service," Gallardo said.

With the professional knowledge section on the new LS rating exams requiring more storekeeper than postal expertise, the Navy has also provided formal five-day Face-to-Face SK Difference Training for PCs. PCs from various local commands attended Naples area classes. Storekeeper Chief Stephanie Lerette of NSA Naples and Storekeeper Chief Miguel Moranparra of FISCSI Site Naples also qualified as area trainers.

Lerette, who is working with other chiefs to ensure more classes are offered before the first LS exam emphasized that, "This course is intense, very intense."

A former aviation storekeeper and now Naples Regional Supply Officer, Cmdr. Tony Barger provided his insight on where he sees the rating merger taking the supply community.

"Supply ratings are unquestionably some of the proudest in the Navy. Postal clerk rate training

manuals identify the first Postmaster General Benjamin Franklin as the founding father, even though the official rating wasn't established until around World War II. The even older storekeeper rating was established in 1916. When I consider what these two groups of professionals bring to the fight in capability, heritage, and pride, commanders will have an even stronger logistics powerhouse of expertise at their disposal, and a new LS rating will undoubtedly lead the way in providing 21st century logistics to a 21st century Navy," stated Barger.

Naples area postal clerks and storekeepers will be hosting a rating merger ceremony to celebrate this momentous event in Navy history. They invite the community to join them Oct. 1 at the central piazza in front of the Admin I building just before morning colors.
