Security shines during the '2009 National Night Out'

Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples held the 2009 National Night Out Tuesday at the Support Site where hundreds of volunteers staffed more than 12 booths and displays promoting safety and reminding the community that crime prevention starts with them.

The goal of National Night Out is to get the community involved and aware and to help them become more knowledgeable of what emergency services are available to them. It is a chance for people to get out and meet their neighbors, become friends and start to look out for each other.

NSA Naples Command Master Chief Jeff Murphy said, "We have been doing this for a lot of years. It is very important to build a relationship with our host country and the military community, just in case something happens."

One of the booths at this year's event was the Ident-A-Kid. The Ident-A-Kid card is an identification card that contains a child's photograph, fingerprints and physical description. Parents keep the card with them at all times and in an emergency can provide law enforcement with crucial information for immediate response.



AFN Corner

I have been asked a lot lately, "what's going on with AFN Radio?" I appreciate our partners at *Panorama* giving me an opportunity to let everyone know.

About three months ago, the old radio transmitter and tower on Mt. Camaldoli had to be taken down. The antenna was designed to serve the old base site at Agnano, conditions on the mountain had become very crowded, and the property lease on the monastery there was not going to be renewed. It served everyone's best interests to leave that location. We feel we are improving the situation by moving to a much better existing antenna owned and operated by RAI, Italy's public broadcaster, located about half a mile away.

Unfortunately, although all of the new equipment was in place and fully tested, we have run into difficulty getting local permission to broadcast at the new site. Our request has gone through several levels of government and the U.S. Consulate has been helping us to push it through. I expect we will get this permission soon.

When this new transmitter is up, listeners should hear a marked improvement in our signal quality at all the installations, housing areas and areas in between. Our power output at 5,000 watts has not changed, but the transmitter is much newer, has backups and will be monitored, and also the antenna is much taller and will have longer "reach."

Until then, we offer over-the-air transmission on parts of the Support Site and on decoder channels 182 and 183. Also, in Support Site housing, you can hear 106 FM on the program guide TV channel.

When you tune in to 106 FM "The Eagle" during work days, you'll hear live radio shows with local news and information and the best American music of the '80's, '90's, and today.

MC2 Jason Behnke is a fleet veteran holding down the 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. show with a big mug of coffee. He has just the mix for PT and to kick start your day.

MC3 Aaron Roe has the afternoons from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. What he lacks in sea time, he makes up for in "snarkiness." He has what you need to stay motivated and entertained all the way home.

The DJ's can be reached during their shows at 081-811-6925. Between their shows, we air programs offered for this region from headquarters in Europe.

If you haven't listened before, I invite you to check us out. And if you have listened but can't get us on your radio lately, I hope to welcome you soon to a much improved American Forces Network Naples radio station!

Korean tourist attacks robber

A group of South Korean tourists who were touring the Roman Theater of Marcellus in Rome on Sunday was approached by an unidentified man with a knife who snatched a handbag. Before he could get away, one of the Koreans stopped him and beat him to the floor. The man thanked Carabinieri police for rescuing him before they took him to the Regina Coeli prison in Rome. According to the police, the man was very relieved to see them and grateful to go to jail.

Skeletal remains found on beach near Rome

The skeleton of a man, which dates back about 4,500 years ago, was discovered on a beach south of Rome during an Italian police flyover. The police division for cultural heritage thought the remains were of a Roman soldier, but experts identified the well-preserved skeleton, which was named "Nello," as belonging to the third millennium B.C. The skeleton was found without its feet and with six small vases buried alongside. Archaeologists plan to carry on more excavations in the area.

Soldiers help Venice crack down on illegal street vendors

St. Mark's Square and surrounding streets in Venice were patrolled by 90 soldiers to combat hundreds of illegal street vendors who ply tourists with counterfeit designer handbags and other goods. Italy's Defense Minister Ignazio La Russa authorized the deployment. The province of Venice's newly elected president said that she took action in response to many complaints about the street vendors who, according to local people, had become aggressive, angry and menacing.

Police raids against these illegal peddlers are frequent in many Italian cities popular with tourists. During the raids, the peddlers gather up their merchandise and run from police. In Venice, a police officer required medical treatment after being knocked to the ground by vendors running away from police.

Lights, music guide tourists through Caserta Royal Palace English Garden

Nightly through Aug. 16, Caserta Royal Palace tourists can admire its treasures through the "Paths of lights." The Paths of lights will lead visitors through the secret English Garden with a spectacular play of lights along the park and its famous fountains. The gardens were made for Maria Carolina d'Austria, wife of King Ferdinand IV. Experts and art historians will welcome groups of participants during a mix of lights and music. The event is sponsored by the Tourism Office of Caserta and will also run weekends through Oct.

Archeological treasures auctioned on eBay recovered

More than 13,000 archeological treasures worth millions of Euros were auctioned on eBay by a man living in the Calabria region who has been under investigation by police since Nov. 2008. The artifacts were recovered during the investigation and included antique gold and silver coins, columns and friezes dating between the 4th-5th century B.C. and the 7th-8th century A.D. Five metal detectors, which were used to locate the artifacts, were also seized. The investigators are trying to find out if people who purchased the artifacts through eBay knew of their origin.

Local Seabees renovate NSA Naples school

Local Seabees from Naval Support Activity (NSA), Naples Public Works Department (PWD) took part in a project to renovate the NSA, Naples Elementary School during the week of July 27 at the Support Site.

The summer renovations included two main building projects and various other minor routine maintenance work on the school.

"The Seabees are involved with two projects right now," said Construction Mechanic Petty Officer 1st Class (EXW) Philip Benedicto. "We are dividing a large room into two smaller classrooms, and also are modifying a storage facility into a teacher conference room."

All of these renovations are being completed by the local Seabees and the Italian nationals who also work for the Naples PWD. "Public works and the Seabees used to be separate but are now fully intergraded, which makes a diverse and productive working environment," said Benedicto.

The current projects are anticipated to be finished before the start of the new school year.

"These jobs will be completed on time and on budget, which is our goal for any project," said Benedicto.

These projects were essential to ensure that the school facilities are in the best possible condition.

"This is going to be beneficial for everyone, for example the school needed another classroom so we were able to divide a large room into two classrooms," said Benedicto.

This construction not only means that the school will be at its peak performance, but also allows the Seabees to get out and make sure they are proficient in all of their skills and show the public what they are capable of doing.

"This kind of work is nice because we not only get to master our trades as Seabees, but it also lets everyone know that we are here and doing productive jobs," said Equipment Operator Petty Officer 2nd Class (SCW) Jonathan Champion

By installing some drywall and laying down tiles to make a new structure, the Seabees were able to improve the quality of life for the children and teachers alike.

"Its great making the lives for the kids better. We have to take care of them now because some day they'll be taking care of us," said Champion.

Bone marrow drive coming to NSA Naples

Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples will host a bone marrow drive August 11-14. The drive is intended to determine qualified candidates for bone marrow donation and is open to all active duty and their family members and Department of Defense (DoD) civilian employees and contractors age 18-60. Local nationals can also donate but will be registered on the Italian registry.

Instead of a traditional drive, which is generally conducted in a single location, NSA's bone marrow drive will bring the drive to the service member. Command representatives can contact Chief William Struck via e-mail to William.struck@eu.navy.mil to get donation kits. Once the kits arrive, the representative distributes them within the command. The potential donor then swabs each side of their mouth twice, seals the swabs in the provided container, fills out the paperwork and gives it back to their command representative.

"Anyone interested in being a point of contact please e-mail me and give me a rough number of how many kits they will need at each prospective command," said Struck. "This will all be culminated by a last day drive at Support Site exchange on Aug. 14. We will have several tables set up with volunteers to assist in the paperwork and handing out of packages."

There is also another innovation to the process. In previous years, donating bone marrow was considered to be a painful process; a needle would be inserted into the lower back/hip area where the bone marrow would be extracted. The new procedure is similar to the way platelets are extracted. A week prior to donation, the donor takes a medicine that pulls bone marrow out into the blood stream. Once that has happened, the donor is hooked up to a machine that pulls the blood out, extracts the bone marrow and returns the blood into the donor.

Potential candidates can qualify to donate bone marrow even if they have been denied to donate blood. Registrants can qualify even if they have: lived in the UK, Africa or Iraq; recently gotten a tattoo; taken anti-malaria medication; or received the anthrax vaccination.

Once a participant is called to be a donor, they and their command will be notified to begin the process of donation. While the donation process only takes a few hours DoD will pay for all the expenses for the procedure including covering the cost for a spouse or friend to accompany the donor to Washington D.C. for five days.

"What if you had leukemia and there was no one on the registry that matched you? Would you want the person sitting next to you to help you out," asked Lt. Cmdr. Cindy Campbell, DoD Bone Marrow Donor Drive coordinator. "How would you feel if you knew there was someone out there that could save your life but had failed to register?"

"My shipmate died of leukemia many years ago; he could have lived if only there had been a match. He was 33 years old and left a wife and two small children," Campbell said.

TRICARE aims to improve quality of health care for beneficiaries

TRICARE has introduced the medical home concept – a key initiative to enhance contact between the health care provider and the patient.

"The Medical home concept is an exciting way of looking at an individual's relationship with their primary care provider," U.S. Navy Rear Adm. Christine Hunter, deputy director of TRICARE Management Activity, told DotMilDocs listeners July 30 on BlogTalkRadio.com.

The medical home concept emphasizes four health care pillars: accessibility, continuity, coordination and comprehensiveness. According to Hunter, it takes the doctor-

patient relationship to a new level.

"It creates an enhanced relationship with that health care provider to ensure access, continuity and trust," said Hunter. "We need to offer care that is coordinated and comprehensive. In order to do that we will emphasize preventive care and wellness, ensuring that people are in a partnership with their provider that allows them to get the preventive care that they need and manage any chronic medical conditions that they have."

Hunter also addressed TRICARE programs and how beneficiaries can make the best use of their benefits by highlighting four main goals of the TRICARE health plan. They include providing beneficiaries

and their families with access to the best health care; satisfaction with their health care, managing health care costs responsibly, and lastly, but most important, maintaining military readiness, she said.

Part of military readiness, Hunter said, is maintaining family readiness.

"We see family readiness as an important part of overall readiness. Secretary of the Navy [Ray] Mabus recently said 'they who wait also serve' and we have a strong commitment to them," said Hunter.

Another benefit TRICARE is providing to its beneficiaries is access to a Web-based TRICARE Assistance Program that will provide online counseling.



Offices hide many hazards

From the NSA Naples Safety Office

Most people may think of an office as a safe place to work. However, the average office harbors a surprising number of hazards which can cause serious accidents.

Everyone should take a tour of their work area, do a safety audit, and keep these pointers in mind:

Tripping hazards are common in offices. Look for loose carpeting, cords and cables running across traffic lanes, open drawers of desks and cabinets, and boxes of files and papers.

Slipping hazards are also a common

cause of falls. Watch out for spills of water and coffee, as well as mud or snow tracked in from outdoors. Mop these up promptly, or barricade the area until it can be cleaned.

Keep stairways free of office clutter. A box of files or a pair of shoes left on a stairway can cause a fall. Even a pencil or a piece of paper left on the stairs can result in someone slipping and falling.

Make sure materials are stacked or piled safely to prevent landslides.

Watch for electrical hazards. A common one is plugging too many pieces of equipment into one electrical outlet. Do not

exceed the recommended limit for an outlet or power bar.

Suspended floors covering electronic cords and cables are a structural feature in some offices. Floor openings should be guarded or covered to prevent falls.

Moisture and electricity are a dangerous combination. Keep beverages such as coffee away from electrical equipment such as computers. A spill could result in damage to the equipment or, worse yet, electrical shock to a person.

Office furniture is the cause of many serious injuries. Furniture should be in good repair. Bolts, screws, hinges and handles for doors and drawers should be secure. Drawers should open and close smoothly.

Any wheeled chair should have five legs. Remove any unsafe or damaged chairs from service so they can be repaired or disposed of properly. Be wary of wheeled chairs which can roll over someone's toes.

The office equipment that is used should be comfortable and ergonomically designed. Arrange work stations to avoid excessive bending, twisting and repetitive motions.

Ensure the office is adequately ventilated for the health and well-being of workers.

Adequate lighting is important to prevent eyestrain and injuries. Burned out lights should be replaced promptly.

Take a look around break areas also. Fire hazards, electrical dangers, and slippery floors are common problems. Smoke only in designated areas. Don't forget about the washrooms either.

If an office is part of an industrial plant, workers may be exposed to even more hazards. Be aware of the safety precautions required if visiting industrial work sites. For example, wearing eye protection may be required.

An office safety audit is a good idea to uncover hazards and point out the need for safe procedures. Everyone should take a look around their office today.

NSA NAPLES EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS

Your home is a great shelter either on base or off.

In the event of many emergencies, your home can serve as your primary shelter. A power outage, earthquake, work disruption, etc. may require reduced base access. Be prepared to care for your family for a minimum of three days (seven is better) with at least these five basics:

1. **Water:** Minimum one gallon (four Liters) per person per day
 2. **Food:** and a means to cook it (BBQ is one possibility). Don't forget a can-opener.
 3. **Heat:** Warm clothing, blankets, sleeping bags, non-electric heaters, etc. Check your camping equipment as one resource.
 4. **Money:** ATM's may be down, but stores may be open.
 5. **Radio:** Battery, solar or hand crank powered for news, updates and emergency directions.

"We are launching a Web-based program as of Aug. 1 called the TRICARE Assistance Program," said Hunter. "It's available 24-hours a day within the United States." The program is for our active duty service members and their families, as well as those in the Transitional Assistance Management Program, and selected reserve members who purchase TRICARE Reserve Select and their eligible family members. Children must be 18 years of age or older.

"The TRICARE Assistance Program provides Web-based supportive counseling; you can dial in on your home Webcam to talk to a counselor and get the assistance you need in the privacy and comfort of your own home," said Hunter.

One of the benefits of this program is the ability to have an unlimited number of sessions with the same counselor.

"We think this will go a long way to making folks feel more comfortable and reducing stigma," said Hunter.

Hunter also discussed electronic health records as a priority. One of the advantages of TRICARE is the ability to keep track of the quality of health care beneficiaries receive through the use of electronic medical health records. She added that TRICARE is fully supportive of the President's initiative to help manage health care in the country by utilizing electronic health records. These records provide long-term health information that can be used to predict trends.

"We think this really improves the quality of care because you don't have to waste valuable time during personal interactions repeating your past medical or family history," Hunter said.

US Coast Guard, Moroccan Royal Navy conduct first joint mission


Tranoris also added that U.S. Sailors will have the opportunity to experience the rich culture of this Indian Ocean island nation.

Carabinieri officers attend training at JFC Naples


