Each year, Security at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples invites Italian law enforcement and the entire Naples-area DOD community to come together in support of crime and drug prevention during National Night Out.

This year's event, scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 2, promises to be even more exciting than last year's. The 28th annual National Night Out will begin with a parade that steps off from the Support Site Fire Station at 5:30 p.m. and leads the way to the soccer fields on the north side of the base, where safety techniques will be demonstrated, crime-fighting vehicles exhibited, games played and food served up. All community members are encouraged to attend the event, meet their neighbors and learn about crime awareness.

"We are hoping [National Night Out] will strengthen our neighborhood spirit and help with our community partnerships," said Chief Yeoman (SW) Ryan Massa, attached to NSA Naples Security, coordinator for National Night Out. "Hopefully this will send a mes-

sage to criminals that our neighborhoods are organized and fighting back."

Local commands and community organizations are joining forces with NSA Naples Security to make the event fun and educational for everyone.

"The USO will be present with our outreach tent, where we'll have games and Disney give-aways for the little ones," said Teresa Fisher-Galvez, information specialist with USO Naples. We hope everyone will come

out and participate in this important crime and drug prevention program."

Groups, such as Security, Fire and Safety and the Fleet and Family Support Center, in addition to the USO, will set up booths and pass out information on how to be safe at home and while traveling. Some groups are even planning demonstrations—the Military Working Dog demo is always a crowd favorite!

"National Night Out is an important event for this community," said Capt. Scott Gray, commanding officer of NSA Naples. "It's a great opportunity for us to learn about the tools available to prevent crime, as well as to meet the professionals, both Italian and U.S., who work to prevent crime and drug abuse."

National Night Out was introduced by the National Association of Town Watch in 1984 as a means to heighten awareness and strengthen participation in local anti-crime efforts. Due to the initial success of the program, a national program was created. Today, this program is coordinated by local crime prevention agencies and organizations—and involves entire communities.

Italian News Briefs

Trace the 'Path of Light' at the Caserta Royal Palace

"Apertis Verbis-Stories" (Visions and Paths of Light) takes place every Friday and Saturday until Sept. 24 at the Royal Palace in Caserta. Enjoy illuminated gardens, sparkling fountains and live music aboard a 78-seat double-decker bus that leaves at 8 p.m. and takes tourists on a 70-minute ride around the park. Tickets cost €18 for adults and €12 for people under 14 and over 65.

Police seize famous Rome café in mafia sting

For the second time in two years, Italian police seized Rome's famous Café de Paris during an anti-mafia operation. In total, police seized 200 million euros worth of assets. The Café de Paris became a legend after it was featured in the 1960 film "La Dolce Vita." Stars, like Frank Sinatra, Ava Gardner and Sophia Loren, frequented the Italian bar.

Italian football scandal continues

Nineteen professional soccer players, including coaches and managers, were accused of taking part in a scheme to fix matches. Two Serie A clubs, Atalanta and Chievo, three Serie B clubs, Ascoli, Verona, Sassuolo, and former Italian internationals, Giuseppe Signori and Cristiano Doni, were also cited by the Italian soccer federation. Atalanta could be demoted from Serie A, and Doni, its long-time captain, faces a three-year ban if charges of match-fixing are proven, officials said. It is the second match-fixing scandal facing Italian football in five years.

Giuseppe Signori, a former Lazio striker who struck 188 Serie A goals in a glittering playing career, was among 19 players suspected of "conspiring to commit illicit actions," July 26. Signori had been among 16 people arrested following a police swoop on June 1 after a six-month investigation. On his release from jail June 14, Signori denied all knowledge of any scam. Police said they had produced evidence of an organized system among former and current footballers, sports-betting operators and others to manipulate the results of a number of soccer matches. Bets worth tens of thousands of euros, and in some cases hundreds of thousands, had been placed on matches. In at least one case, police suspect players may even have been given sedatives to affect their performances as part of the efforts to fix results. The investigation was opened after

players for third-tier Cremonese fell ill last year after their former goalkeeper Marco Paoloni allegedly spiked their drinks before a game. Paoloni was among those cited. Last month, the Italian government set up a match-fixing task force made up of ministry politicians, finance police and administrators from various sporting governing bodies to counter corruption in the wake of the allegations. The first hearing in the case will likely take place Aug. 3.

Archaeologists unearth Etruscan sacred site

Near Viterbo at Soriano nel Cimino, located 80 km north of Rome, archaeologists discovered a sacred mountain where ancient Etruscans worshipped gods and burned sacred objects as religious offerings during the Bronze Age 3,000 years ago. It is one of the most important discoveries in the history of Lazio region. The team of archaeologists, directed by Professor Andrea Cardarelli, carried out excavations for three years on the summit of the 1,000-meter high mountain. Excavations are also revealing remnants of an ancient wall that once encircled the mountain.

Tourists queue separately for Venice's 'vaporetti'

To manage hordes of tourists on its famous "vaporetti" (public transportation ferries), the city of Venice announced visitors and residents will have to queue separately until the end of the high season. The measure was taken to make life easier for residents and to allow them to respect those who go to Venice just to admire it, said an official from Venice's tourist board. The first "vaporetto" stop where tourists will have to queue separately is Rialto, close to the famous bridge.

Fukushima families invited to summer in Italy

Fifty mothers and children from Fukushima Prefecture, Japan's nuclear disaster area, will spend summer vacation in Rome and Milan thanks to the Italian Friends for Japan initiative, which provides free transportation from Japan to Italy, as well as accommodation and meals for 10 days to a month for mothers and children who were displaced from their homes close to the Fukushima plant. On July 1, the first two families arrived in Italy. Others will follow through early September. This project is funded by contributions from the Italian private and public sectors.

When I sat at my desk this morning, another "shmily" caught my attention, a constant reminder of someone very special, my best friend. It's my turn. She'll be surprised....

Let me explain. Laura Jeanne Allen shared a story about her grandparents who had been married for more than over a half a century. Her grandparents played their very own game. The goal of their game was to write the word "shmily" in a surprise place for the other to find. As soon as one would find it, it became his or her turn to hide it once more.

Navy seeks applicants for LDO/CWO

The Navy is seeking applications from highly qualified sailors in pay grades E-6 through E-9 for the Fiscal Year 2013 Active Limited Duty Officer (LDO) and Chief Warrant Officer (CWO) programs.

"Limited duty officers and chief warrant officers bring a variety of experience and perspective into the wardroom from their enlisted service," said Chief Warrant Officer 4 Mitch Allen, assistant LDO/CWO community manager, Bureau of Naval Personnel. "The LDO/CWO career paths provide additional leadership opportunities and enhance a sailor's ability

to contribute to the Navy."

The LDO and CWO communities have designators in the surface, submarine, aviation, general series and staff corps communities and serve in a variety of leadership billets within their technical fields, ranging from division officer to commanding officer ashore.

Eligibility requirements for LDO include U.S. citizenship, serving in pay grade E-7 through E-9 or an E-6 who has passed the exam for E-7. Active-duty applicants for LDO must have at least eight but not more than 16 years of active-duty service.

Eligibility requirements for CWO include U.S. citizenship, serving in pay grade E-7

through E-9. Active-duty applicants for CWO must have at least 12 but not more than 22 years of active-duty service.

These programs do not require applicants to have a college degree. Applications must be postmarked no later than Oct. 1, 2011.

Eligible sailors should apply for the designator for which they are most qualified, regardless of their current rating. Upon commissioning, sailors selected for LDO/CWO will attend the four-week Officer Development School in Newport, R.I.

'Live to play, play to live'

Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples is participating in the Live to Play, Play to Live 2011 summer safety campaign, with the ultimate goal of teaching sailors to take care of each other, especially during the 101 Critical Days of Summer.

Both the Naval Safety Center and NSA Naples Safety Officer Lt. Cmdr. Ray Brown stressed that it is incumbent upon each service member to ensure that subordinates and peers take steps to mitigate summertime risks.

"We all have a responsibility to educate and provide mentorship in this prime PCS [permanent change of station] season, when many new members to the community may not be familiar with local laws and instructions," explained Brown. "By reminding our sailors of the risks associated with this period, we help to preserve our most valuable asset: our human resources."

According to the Naval Safety Center, the period between Memorial Day and Labor Day, known as the 101 Critical Days of Summer, poses more potential risks to sailors and marines because it's the time of year when many service members go on vacation and participate in off-duty activities.

Statistics compiled by the Naval Safety Center over the last decade indicate that, in some years, one-half of the total Navy and Marine Corps traffic-related deaths occurred during the warm weather months. The primary factors were driving under the influence, fatigue, excessive speed, and not wearing a seat belt or using personal protective equipment.

The NSA Naples Safety Office encourages everyone to beware of summertime risks and incorporate risk management, including safe operation of vehicles and notifying their chain of command of upcoming travel, into their plans.

"Here at NSA Naples, the use of TRiPS (Travel Risk Planning System) is mandatory for all military personnel traveling 250 miles or more," said Brown.

For those staying closer to home, it's often easy to overlook the potential for accidents and injuries while relaxing at the beach, cooking out or taking in some local sites.

"I know there's a lot to see out there, but don't feel bad about taking a rest in the middle of the day while touring, to cool down and let your body recover. The museum or monument will still be there tomorrow, and with some good decision-making, you will be as well," said Capt. Scott Gray, NSA Naples commanding officer.

"There are risks involved in everything you do," said Brown. "Use common sense and prior planning to help manage the risks."

'Feds Feed Families' fights against hunger

Budapest is one of the most interesting and popular cities to visit in Europe. The capital of Hungary, it is a center of education, art and culture; and it features many historic and scenic attractions in its old town center. Divided into two parts—the former medieval towns of Buda and Pest—by the wide blue Danube River, Budapest is a city of Old World charm and its history invites exploration.

Pest, on the left bank of the Danube, is almost completely flat. This is where most of the business, shopping and government sections of the city are located. Here, like in most European capitals, you will find trendy cafes, designer boutiques and department stores. The main street is pedestrian only and is a fashionable and popular shopping district. This area also contains a beautiful opera house, several fine museums and the city's theater district. In Heroes' Square, Budapest's grandest square, there is an impressive monument to Hungarian history. But the most impressive and dominant sight

along the Pest river bank is the Hungarian Parliament building. Completed in 1902, it is a picturesque and decorative structure that serves as the main symbol of the city and the Danube panorama.

The district of Buda is located on a ridge of high rolling hills that rise above the right bank of the river. This is where most of the historic attractions and residential areas are found. The area is dominated by the Castle District, which is mostly a pedestrian area that incorporates the Royal Palace complex and other historical landmarks.

There are nine bridges spanning the Danube that connect the two sides of the city. The Chain Bridge, a suspension bridge built in 1849, was the city's first permanent bridge. Considered an engineering marvel when it was built, it stands today as a symbol of the city's unity and pride.

At the highest point in the Castle District is Holy Trinity Square, with its famous centerpiece, the Saint Matthias Church. Named after a 15th-century Hungarian king, the church has been the site of numerous corona-


tions and royal weddings. Behind the church is the Fisherman's Bastion, which provides a great panoramic view over the river and Pest. There are several coffee houses and restaurants located on and around the square.

One of my favorite areas of the city is Gellért Hill, a mostly wooded knoll about 430 feet high that overlooks the river and is a great place for a long walk. At the top of the hill stands Hungary's statue of liberty erected after WWII to commemorate Hungary's liberation from the Nazis. The hill offers the best panoramic views over the river and entire city.

Budapest also has a nice botanical garden and a number of impressive thermal bath complexes for those who are interested in the Roman or Greek bathing culture. It also features a nice zoopark, circus and amusement park for the kids. For those who enjoy sampling local cuisine, Hungarian goulash is hard to beat. Be aware that Hungarian food can be pretty spicy due to hot paprika; but mild paprika is also used.

You don't need a car here, but bring a good pair of walking shoes. You can easily get around the historic center on foot, and there are plenty of things to see and do along the way. To travel further around town, there is a convenient network of trams and an underground Metro train system with three lines.

So if you're looking for a popular destination with a lot to offer in the way of history, culture, dining, shopping and entertainment, Budapest is a great place to consider. An easy 90-minute direct flight from Naples, it's a convenient place to pop in for a few days visit.
