Naval Hospital Naples' Operation Continuing Promise deployers return

U.S. Naval Hospital Naples proudly welcomed home 15 sailors who, since March 2011, had been deployed to the USNS Comfort (T-AH 20) to participate in the Continuing Promise 2011 humanitarian assistance mission.

Continuing Promise 2011 was a collaborative effort among the United States, partner nations and non-governmental organizations who worked together to provide humanitarian assistance and to build strong partnerships throughout the Caribbean Basin and the Central and South American region.

From April through September, sailors onboard the tremendous hospital ship, which measures three football fields long and one wide, were very busy. The crew of USNS Comfort, an 850-person team made up of service members from the Navy, Army and Air Force, plus public health civil servants and volunteers,

delivered medical and dental care to more than 70,000 patients, as well as provided veterinary support and engineering assistance to nine host nations.

The deployed medical treatment facility was there for humanitarian assistance, and also to support U.S. defense strategy in the region. Missions like Continuing Promise are critical to developing and maintaining positive relationships between the United States and its neighbors. USNS Comfort and her sister ship, USNS Mercy (T-AH 19), are powerful American symbols of hope and promise throughout the world. Generations will remember the sight of USNS Comfort in port and the care they or a loved one received during Continuing Promise 2011. And those fortunate enough to have been able to participate in this mission by providing care, support and other services know they've been a part of something larger than themselves and assisted those in need.

Remember 9/11

This Sunday we remember all who lost their lives and their loved ones in the terrorist attacks against the United States that occurred 10 years ago, September 11, 2001. The scars left upon the victims are shared with the entire nation. None can forget where they were that terrible day or what they were doing the moment they heard the dreadful news that the first Trade Tower had

been hit by an airplane. The nation held its breath as we watched precious lives lost before our eyes and also in the days following the attacks as we watched and prayed for rescue and recovery efforts. Though the pain is still very real, it is important that we take time this September 11 to remember the 3,000 men, women and even children whose lives were taken at the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and in Shanksville, Pennsylvania on that day. Let us never forget these attacks on the United States; but even more, let us never forget the many victims and their loved ones. Let us say a prayer for the thousands who lost beloved family, friends, neighbors and co-workers that day: "Lord according to Your love and Your word, comfort those who mourn and give them peace."

City of Pompeii commemorates 10th anniversary of 9/11

Pompeii, the city of the universal peace, will remember the victims of the 9/11 terrorist attacks during a Mass at the city's central cathedral, Sanctuary of the Rosary, Sunday, Sept. 11 at 10 a.m. After the service, a laurel wreath will be laid at the city's 9/11 memorial, which was created with an authentic fragment of steel beam from the World Trade Center that had been inserted into a block of lava stone. The beam was donated by the New York and New Jersey Port Authorities to the municipal administration of Pompeii.

Italian artist Lello Esposito conceived of the original design concept and architect Antonio Bruno translated the design into the powerful monument erected to honor all of the victims of the terrorist attacks.

Honoring fallen Medal of Honor chaplain

Vice Adm. Harry B. Harris Jr., commander, U.S. 6th Fleet, honored fallen Medal of Honor recipient Lt. Vincent Capodanno, a Navy chaplain, at a wreath-laying ceremony in Gaeta, Italy, Sept. 3.

Harris represented U.S. 6th Fleet to honor Capodanno at Piazza Capodanno, a memorial that pays tribute to this fallen hero

"Vincent Capodanno's extraordinary courage under withering fire is a matter of record," said Harris. "I believe he knew that the armor of God would indeed protect him against spiritual bullets, but not from bullets made by man. So his courage was real; the risks he took were tangible. He answered well the call of duty to God. He served beyond the call of duty to man. For this, our Congress, and the

President, honored him for his courage 44 years ago...and we honor him here today."

Harris spoke of the time during which Capodanno served, and how he answered the call of his nation and faith with honor.

"In your mind's eye, travel with me to Vietnam in 1967, to that maelstrom of violence in that cauldron of blood, gore and jungle heat," said Harris. "There, our Marines and Sailors faced a fierce enemy, an enemy who had the advantage of terrain, of homeland, of experience. Into this chaos walked Lt. Vincent Capodanno...a man of God... a U.S. Navy chaplain...a man of the cloth, and a man who wore the cloth of his nation. He used the power of his faith to instill order out of chaos. He brought peace to the dying, hope to the injured, and absolution for all who sought it."

The U.S. ambassador to the Holy See, the Honorable

Miguel Diaz, expressed his gratitude for his service to his country, the Navy and God, as well.

"Capodanno and his legacy embodied the meaning of true public service," said Diaz. "As a Roman Catholic priest, Capodanno served as a spiritual leader and advisor. As a member of the U.S. Navy, he served not only his fellow Sailors as a military chaplain, but also his country. His work combining service to faith with service to country was one of the rarest examples of selflessness."

Capodanno was killed on a battlefield in Vietnam on Sept. 4, 1967, as he gave physical and spiritual assistance to the dying Marines of the 1st Marine Division. Capodanno was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor, and in May 2006 the Catholic Church officially proclaimed him a Servant of God formally initiating his Cause for Sainthood.

During the ceremony, Capt. Jeffrey Ruth was relieved by Capt. Ted Williams.

"Any good ship captain would tell you that the true measure of any command success is not how well he or she performs, but how well his or her ship performs on deployment and on station," said Vice Adm. Harry B. Harris Jr., commander, U.S. 6th Fleet. "This flagship has truly enabled the strengthening of bilateral and multilateral relationships across the U.S. 6th Fleet region."

For his exceptional command of Mount Whitney, Harris awarded Ruth the Legion of Merit.

"I am extremely proud to have been given the opportunity to command this ship and her unique crew," said Ruth. "It was through this crew's hard work that Mount Whitney has shined over the past year, specifically with the execution of Operation Odyssey Dawn."

In March, USS Mount Whitney served as the flag ship for the multinational Joint Task Force Odyssey Dawn and the Joint Force Maritime Component Commander Headquarters in support of United Nations Security Council Resolutions to protect Libyan civilians from attack by Qadhafi regime forces.

Ruth went on to mention that he could think of no better place to say farewell to his friends and crew than in the city of Gaeta, which serves as the ship's home port.

"I can also think of no better officer to relieve me than Capt. Williams," said Ruth. "[Williams] and I have known one another for a while. In fact, we have flown together, and I am extremely confident that he will take this ship and crew to new heights."

Williams commented on his excitement to be assuming command of the U.S. 6th Fleet flagship.

"Ahead we have many challenges, but with this crew we will turn those challenges into opportunities, and we're ready to go," said Williams. "This ship is truly in great hands with the crew of Mount Whitney."

Keep in mind that a résumé is very subjective, and what separates a good résumé from a poor one often is a matter of opinion.

However, there are two concrete rules of résumé writing:

1. Never submit a résumé with errors. Submitting a résumé with any type of misspelling, typographical or grammatical error attacks your professionalism.
2. Never lie. Lying—even bending the truth a little bit—attacks your integrity.


Think of your résumé as your advertisement. You must convince an employer that you are worth hiring.

Thrift store re-opens its doors

The Naples Overseas Spouses' Club's (NOSC) Forgotten Treasures Thrift Store, located next to the veterinary clinic at the Support Site, held a grand re-opening Sept. 6 after volunteers completed an extensive renovation project.

The thrift store's re-opening brought in both new and returning customers and was the highest grossing day in recent memory.

"The response to the renovations has been amazing," said Mercedes Savage, who was the thrift store's manager during the renovation process. "People walk in and think it's a whole new store. It's been a positive experience for shoppers, volunteers and the thrift store as a whole. The revamping allowed for the thrift store to close down, clean out, restructure inside and out, and be able to give back more to the community."

Customers are appreciative of the new amount of space in the store, which makes it easier to navigate.

Youmeeka Turner, a military spouse, visited the thrift store for the first time and really liked what she saw.

"It's clean, well organized, the people are really nice, and the prices are great," said Turner. "I really liked it. I've only been here for two weeks, so my personal goods haven't arrived, but when they do, I know I will be donating to the thrift store. I think I will come back to volunteer, too."

The Forgotten Treasures Thrift Store, run entirely by NOSC volunteers, funnels virtually every dollar spent at the store back into the Naples military community to fund family, community and youth needs. In 2010 alone, NOSC returned more than \$135,000 in the form of \$45,000 in scholarships and \$90,000 in direct financial support to base-recognized organizations.

"I think one of the things that speaks most about the store is that in the four hours we were open in the morning today, we had between 10 and 15 people say they want to sign up to volunteer," said Savage. "Our volunteers have such positive attitudes that they're passing it on to our customers, who in turn are so happy with the store that they want to come back and volunteer. I think that in itself speaks volumes about the impact this store has on the community."

This year, U.S. Youth Soccer (USYS), Italy will field a team of American athletes who will compete across Europe and the United States with the hope of earning a spot on the U.S. National Team. This team is comprised of the children of active-duty service members, Department of State and DOD civilian employees stationed in the Mediterranean region.

USYS, Italy is a non-profit and educational program. Their goal is to provide family members with an opportunity to achieve excellence and enjoy soccer. Student athletes who spend their high school years abroad lack the opportunities for college scouting or state tournaments to attract the attention of college and professional scouts. This select team and the tournament schedule have been developed to offer more competition and soccer opportunities for young American athletes living overseas.

Young players prepared for the fall soccer season during two summer camps offered by USYS. From Aug. 22 through 26, U.S. Youth Soccer, Italy ran its first-ever summer training camp and hosted tryouts for the Italy Select Girls team. Sixteen girls from across Italy traveled to Carney Park to participate in the training and to try out for the Italy Select team. The training was kicked into high gear with a Talent ID camp Sept. 3 through 5, when 13 players from the Italy Select team traveled to Kaiserslautern, Germany to train with the professional players of FC Kaiserslautern (women's team) at the USYS Europe's Olympic Development Program camp. From this pool of 67 players a "state team" will be chosen to represent USYS Europe in stateside com-

Teens everywhere, not only here in Naples, get a “bad rap.” They dress funny, talk funny, disrespect elders, text too much and are addicted to Facebook. (Really? Only teens do this?)

Ultimately, teens want to connect to other teens—to socialize. Technology, in particular telecommunications technologies like Facebook and cell phones, certainly has made the world much more accessible for teens.

Accessibility to things—like alcohol—is often easier here in Naples than in the States. So what can you do as a parent and a community member?

- Know where your teens are going at night, who they are hanging out with, who they are chatting with, texting with and accepting as their friends on Facebook.
- Sign up your teens for trips, teams, activities and clubs.
- Car pool with other parents and get these kids to events.
- Make that drive to Support Site from out in town so your teens can hang out with their friends for a few more hours at the Teen Center.
- Get to know your teen’s friends’ parents and families.
- Know the NSA Child Supervision Chart.

If you are not a parent, but a community member, and see a situation that seems unsafe, talk to those involved and advise them. Don’t be that person who says, “If I had only...”

Teens are not always going to want to answer the questions above and may balk at the suggestion of giving you all of this information. Years from now, they will thank you for your support and love, and if they don’t, what’s the worst that can happen?

All of that being said, extensive programming, organized by Naples High School and MWR’s Child and Youth Programs, provides a lot of opportunities for teens to socialize...face-to-face. Encourage teens to unplug and check out the Teen Center, Naples High School’s arts and athletic programs, extracurricular teams and clubs; get in shape at the fitness center or skate park; learn new skills at the Auto Hobby/Woodworking Shop, bowling alley or Carney Park; find a good book at the library; soul search with a religious group; grab a snack at the food court; or volunteer.

Is there something missing from this list that you would like to see added? Go to the Teen Center and ask. Take that initiative as a community member, teen or parent of a teen to ask the question.

The next time someone next to you forgets what it’s like to be a teen, inform them last year’s senior class pulled in close to \$1 million in scholarship money; the Wildcats softball team won the European championship; Naples-area teens won the Boys and Girls Clubs of America Regional Image Makers Competition, to name just a few.

Benevento: A scenic city of history, heritage and witches

Benevento is a great place to spend a day. It's a scenic town nestled in the rolling foothills of the Sannio Apennine Mountains that boasts several impressive Roman monuments and various other historic sites. About 60 miles northeast of Naples, it's a pedestrian-friendly place that also offers plenty of dining and shopping options.

I found Benevento to be a great place for a long enjoyable walk through medieval byways and Roman ruins, and I strongly recommend a good pair of walking shoes. I parked my car in the parking lot of a cemetery on the outskirts of town and spent the entire day exploring on foot.

Remnants of the ancient Roman city of Beneventum lie scattered among the streets of the modern city center. The first landmark I encountered on my walk was the impressive and ornate Arch of Trajan, probably the best preserved Roman arch in Italy. Built around 114 A.D. to commemorate the Emperor Trajan, the marble arch was erected at the end of the first extension of the Appian Way from Capua. The well-preserved relief sculptures that adorn the arch depict scenes from mythology and the emperor's life.

From the arch, I walked to Corso Garibaldi, a wide pedestrian-only boulevard lined with cafés, restaurants and shops. The boulevard is closed to vehicular traffic from the Duomo (the Cathedral of Santa Maria Assunta) on the western end to the Fortress of the Rectors (Rocca dei Rettori) on the eastern end. The Duomo dates back to the 13th century, but Allied bombing during WWII destroyed most of it except for the bell tower and façade. The fortress, now the headquarters of the Province of Benevento, is located on the highest point of the town. It consists of a Lombard tower built in 871 A.D. and the 14th-century Governors' Palace. It also contains a history and contemporary art museum.

The main attraction along Corso Garibaldi is the Church of Santa Sofia, one of Europe's most important examples of 8th-century Lombard architecture. A UNESCO World Heritage Site, the church contains beautiful 8th-century Byzantine frescoes. In the piazza in front of the church is a

stone obelisk the ancient Romans brought from the Temple of Isis in Egypt.

There are several places to stop for lunch along Corso Garibaldi. The city is famous for its Strega candy and Strega liqueur. Strega is the Italian word for witch, and witches are a big part of Benevento's medieval folklore; so much so that it is known as the City of Witches. I didn't see any real witches during my visit, but I do recommend the Strega candy, a tasty chocolate and nougat treat flavored with liqueur.

From the Duomo, I walked to the well-preserved Roman theater, where the ancient inhabitants of Beneventum enjoyed performances of drama, comedy, poetry, and music. Built around 130 A.D., the theater could seat up to ten thousand spectators. Much of the original structure is still visible, and only the third level has been lost. Today, the theater is still used during the summer months for drama, dance and opera productions.

At the edge of town, along the Via Port'Arsa, I visited the Ponte Leproso (Leprous Bridge), a Roman bridge over the River Sabato on the original Appian Way.



The statue of Pope Benedict XIII towers above a fountain in Piazza Orsini next to the Cathedral of Santa Maria Assunta.


The bridge, which has been restored several times over the centuries, takes its name from a leper colony that was nearby during the Middle Ages.

Benevento is an easy 90-minute drive from the Naples area and is a great place to spend a sunny Saturday or Sunday outside. Find a place to park your car and head out on foot to explore the many historic sites and scenic sights the town has to offer.
