Addressing the issue of sexual assault

In April Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples recognizes Sexual Assault Awareness Month, a time when the community can commit to raising public awareness and promote the prevention of sexual violence through education and special events.

Throughout the month, the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) program at NSA Naples is sponsoring information booths and presentations to raise awareness of sexual assault.

One way service members and civilians can show their support is by wearing jeans on Denim Day, which NSA Naples will observe April 18. Denim Day is an opportunity to take a stand against common attitudes about sexual assault and rape.

"In 1992, an Italian court overturned a rape conviction due to the judge not believing that the victim had not consented to sexual contact since, in his opinion, her jeans were so tight the perpetrator could not have gotten them off without her assistance," according to a flier by the Wisconsin Coalition Against Sexual Assault. "Sounds outrageous, yet in Italy, and all over the world, women and men who are victims of sexual assault continue to be disbelieved and accused of causing the assault due to their behavior or fashion sense."

For military and family members who are victims of sexual assault, there are two different ways to report sexual assault: restricted or unrestricted.

According to Department of Defense directive 6495.01, military members and their dependents who are the victims of sexual assault have the option to use confidential or restricted reporting, which allows the victim of a sexual assault to report the incident to a health care provider, a Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC), or the Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) program.

Base celebrates World Autism Awareness Day

Brian Enoch knows what it's like to see his son judged harshly for being different.

Enoch, a fourth-grade teacher at Naples Elementary School, has a 9-year-old son with Asperger's syndrome, a type of autism spectrum disorder. When out in public, Enoch said he has often received ugly comments or strange looks regarding his son's behavior from people who have no idea that his son suffers from Asperger's.

That's why Enoch, who co-leads a group for parents of children with special needs at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples, has been so involved in pushing autism awareness events during the month of April, which is Autism Awareness Month.

"For me it is about raising awareness, but more than that it is about compassion," Enoch said. "It's common for my little fella to not get invited to birthday parties and to overhear in school the next day about all the fun they had. He seldom gets invited to play dates. And I see not just my son, but other children with autism spectrum disorders sitting by themselves at recess not playing with anyone, and it hurts my heart."

The group Enoch co-leads, Parents Educating and Advocating for Children with Exceptionalities (PEACE), sponsored a World Autism Awareness Day event at NSA Naples April 2.

Let's ensure the schools get everything they deserve by doing our part to get the kids registered early. Additionally, there are specific requirements on re-registering your kids. Each year DoDDS requires all necessary paperwork to be resubmitted, including a copy of your orders, etc. While this is inconvenient, it is a requirement for the schools, so please give them your full cooperation.

Italian News Briefs

European Commission allocates €105 million to restore Pompeii

The European Commission approved new restoration funds for Pompeii last week. The archeological site suffered damage in February when a yard-long piece of plaster fell off the Temple of Jupiter and also in December when a pillar collapsed in the garden of the House of Tiburtinus. The commission allocated a total of €105 million to preserve, maintain and improve the site. Funding the restoration is not only in the interest of Italy, but in the interest of the entire heritage of Europe, said Johannes Hahn, EU commissioner for regional policy.

Fake gladiators outlawed from Colosseum area

No more costumed gladiators and centurions will be allowed near the Colosseum in Rome, where they often ask money from tourists in exchange for posing for pictures. But they are still allowed to work along the road leading up to the Colosseum, the Trevi Fountain or in Piazza Navona. Police said they can take home as much as €200 per day, for which they never pay taxes. The city of Rome has gone back and forth on enforcing its policy against the fake warriors. Some of the costumed workers protested in 2003 when the city hall refused to authorize work permits in the area, ending the strike only when the city council decided they could return to the site.

Fiat sales spike in United States, sink in Italy

Sales of Fiat vehicles in the United States last month were up 643 percent last month over sales in March 2011. This sales record in the United States came the same month as Fiat presented the new 500L model at the Geneva International Automobile Show. The 500L model will be sold in America next year, followed by the sporty Fiat 500 Abarth model and an electric version of the popular city car. Meanwhile in Italy, sales and new registrations of Fiat cars plunged dramatically last month, making the month of March the worst in 32 years, according to a statement released by Fiat.

Fiat and Chrysler announced that they will publish full sales figures month by month, model by model

and region by region, in a move observers see as an attempt to convince investors that Fiat, which will merge with Chrysler by 2015, is a global producer and not limited to Italy.

Tax police target luxury boat owners

Tax police officers uncovered owners of costly boats who were declaring little or no income in the southern Italian port of Bari. They monitored 963 private boats, including 755 yachts that measured more than 10 meters long, and discovered that the owner of a yacht valued at €310,000 declared no income at all, and a company that reported earning €1,326 annually was in fact the owner of a €700,000 yacht. The internal revenue agency in Italy is putting pressure on tax dodgers by introducing a new system to uncover evaders.

Northern Italy full of castles to visit

If you are looking for an alternative the typical Italian city trip, try spending your vacation in an Italian castle. Between Parma and Piacenza in northern Italy, there are 22 forts and castles located in a territory that was once called the Ducato di Parma and Piacenza. Noble families, feudal lords and chieftains lived within the walls of these castles, which tell stories of courage and tales of patrons who called upon great artists to bring glory to their residences. The Ducato Castles combine great culinary tradition with culture, art and environment. Among the most famous castles in the Parma area are the Fortezza di Bardi, The Reggia di Colorno (where there are numerous cultural events) and the Castello di Montechiarugolo. In the hills of the Piacenza area there is the beautiful Castello di Rivalta, where you can stay overnight, and the Castello di Grazzano Visconti, which has a wonderful garden.

To visit the castles of the Ducato it is worthwhile to buy the Card of the Ducato, which offers discounts and special offers. The card, which can be purchased at the castles' ticket booths, is valid for one year from the date of purchase and costs €2. Naples hops with Easter events, America's Cup World Series races, Culture Week and more

The eggs-travaganza of events in town means spring has sprung and it's time to be out and about town. Though it may be difficult navigating along Naples' waterfront these days due to the flurry of activities for the upcoming America's Cup sailing races, it's still fun to think we're in a city that is making headlines in international sports news these days. For a real adrenaline rush, consider viewing the post-Easter sailing competitions on the Bay of Naples. And for some cultural eggs-pansion, take in a trove of monuments in Campania and Campi Flegrei during Italy's Culture Week.

America's Cup World Series races

Naples hosts sporting event Apr. 11-15

Founded in 2011, the America's Cup World Series (ACWS) is a gathering of race regattas leading up to the America's Cup in San Francisco in 2013. At this event, teams and their sailors prepare for the Louis Vuitton Cup, the America's Cup Challenger Series and the America's Cup Finals. The current list of participating countries in ACWS includes China, France, Italy, South Korea, New Zealand, Spain, Sweden, the United Kingdom and United States.

In Naples, the ACWS event features both fleet and match racing along with the exciting AC500 Speed Trials. The main races, scheduled for April 11 to April 15, will be close enough to view from the shore along the Mergellina waterfront near the U.S. Consulate.

Subsequently, the races move to Venice from May 17 to 20 and Newport, R.I. from June 23 to July 1. For more information on the scheduled events in Naples, see <http://www.americascup.com/en/Events/2011-2012-world-series/>

The America's Cup

The race series, named after the first winner, the schooner "America," began in 1851. The crew of the "America" deeded the 100-pound cup to the city of New York with the provision that it be awarded to the international winner of the friendly yachting competition. The cup remained in American hands for 132 years as the rules and types of boats evolved. Finally, in 1983 the Australians won the cup with a radical 12-meter design. Since then the boats have continued to evolve into today's extreme-sport racing multi-hulls.

The AC45 catamaran — 44 feet of pure excitement — will compete in Naples. Only four nations have taken the cup home during its history and once again this year, the American team, sponsored by Oracle Software, is the one to beat. The challengers come from China, France, Italy, South Korea, New Zealand, Spain Sweden and the United Kingdom.

Dressed in white robes, the Santa Monica Arch Brotherhood organizes a "White Procession" at dawn while the Servi di Maria Arch Brotherhood in black robes puts on a two-hour "Black Procession" from Via degli Aranci to Corso Italia at 8:30 p.m. Objects carried during the procession alternate in the sombre light of torches and lamps to recall Christ's suffering and death. Among them are crosses, a hammer and nails, spears, a crown of thorns, bloodstained whips, a sponge soaked in vinegar and Veronica's veil. Underscoring the poignant scene is a chorus singing the "Miserere," along with a band playing the famous funeral march from Chopin's Opus 35. The Easter season

This year, there are TWO Easter observances. As you read this, Western Christians all over the world are observing what is called "Holy Week." After a 40-day period of fasting and prayer called Lent, Holy Week is the final week of preparation and remembrance of the sufferings of Christ prior to the celebration of the highest holy day of the year for Christians, known as "Easter," or "Pascha," which in Greek means "Passover." I say "Western" Christians, because "Eastern Orthodox" Christians, of which I am one, observe Holy Week and Easter one week later this year. The reason for that is because for this holiday in particular, all Orthodox Archdioceses follow the Julian calendar instead of the Gregorian calendar, which is the standard for everyone else.

For 2000 years, Christians of all denominations have observed this holiday and its accompanying seasons, both before and after and in various ways and forms, to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus Christ, whom they believe is the Son of God and the Savior of the world. The Christian holiday is closely connected with "the Passover," when Jews all over the world commemorate their deliverance from slavery in Egypt, during which a lamb was killed and its blood was placed over their doorways to protect them from "the

death angel" on the last night before the Exodus. At Easter, Christians commemorate their deliverance from the slavery of death through the blood of their "Paschal lamb" Jesus Christ. This is what makes the day and the season so special for Christians and Jews, and why it has had such a tremendous impact on many Western and Eastern civilizations, both in a religious and secular sense.

It's not my intention to attempt to convert anyone, but I do think it's appropriate to reflect for a moment on the meaning and significance of this holiday, and of the "seasons" surrounding it. As I previously mentioned, Western civilization and American civilization in particular has been very much influenced by Christian and Jewish observances and holidays, but in some ways has lost touch with the fact that these holidays are more than just single, individual days, but seasons to be reflected upon, and which include lengthy periods of preparation and even times of "afterglow." Whether or not one believes in the Christian or Jewish significance of this particular season, there is no denying that whatever occurred in history pertaining to this and other seasons of the year, it has had a tremendous impact and influence on our culture and on us as individuals.

Like Christmas, however, because of the commercialization and alleged pagan origins of some

of these holidays, some have suggested that they should not be observed at all. But from my personal experience with such groups, eliminating these observances often makes their yearly cycle sort of "flat," kind of like a soda that's been left open too long. But these observances mark and continually re-mark the significance of the events they're supposed to represent. They also serve to perpetuate what I call "cultural memory;" the cumulative tidbits of information that make up the corporate fabric of civilizations and cultures. And with the increase of globalization, where elements of many cultures previously not known in the West, like Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, etc., are being added to our culture, it's more important than ever to continue to clearly observe those things that originally formed (or at least heavily influenced) our American cultural development.

In my family's tradition, that of Eastern Orthodox Christianity, the afterglow season of Pascha is called Bright Week. It's a season of feasting and celebrating, as we recall what we've learned through our time of fasting and prayer in Lent and Holy Week before the Easter holiday. So please join with me as I continue to say Happy Easter Season, everyone — or as the Italians say, "Buona Pasqua!" Even though the day will pass this weekend, we still reflect on its significance in the afterglow of its celebration.

Losing to win

The 70th anniversary of the Battle of the Coral Sea (May 4 to May 8, 1942) reminds us of one of the most important battles of World War II. It was a battle of firsts: the first major naval battle after the surprise attack at Pearl Harbor, the first in which aircraft carriers engaged each other, and the first in which the battling ships never sighted or fired directly on one another. It was not the first loss of the American Navy, but it was the first in which the tide of the Japanese advance was stemmed.

Coral Sea began with the surprise attack of the USS Yorktown against several

Japanese warships supporting the invasion of Tulagi. After the Yorktown sank these ships with its aircraft, the Japanese fleet carriers entered the Coral Sea to seek and destroy the U.S. fleet. For two days (May 7 and May 8) the Japanese and Americans tested their carriers against one another with airstrikes. At the end of the battle, the Japanese rightly claimed a tactical victory by sinking the USS Lexington (an aircraft carrier), the USS Sims (a destroyer), and the Neosho (an oiler). They had also greatly damaged the USS Yorktown. The U.S. fleet sank a Japanese light carrier, a destroyer and several smaller ships. Most importantly, however was the bomb damage done to the Shoaku and the depletion of the Zuikaku air group. The removal of these two Japanese aircraft carriers and quick repair of the USS Yorktown prior to the Battle of Midway led to the decisive defeat of the Japanese Navy at Midway. The Battle of the Coral Sea also stemmed the advance of the Japanese empire in the Pacific and denied a strategic air base at Port Moresby, New Guinea, capable of striking Australia. These victories were bought in large part through the losses at Coral Sea. Sometimes it takes losing to win.

Today is Good Friday, the day Jesus Christ was crucified. What makes such a gruesome and violent execution good? From all earthly angles, the crucifixion of Christ was a terrible loss. Surely all that Jesus did and taught, all the hope that His followers had in Him, all the love that He had for the outcast, the poor, and the oft forgotten children was lost that day.

Or was it? Though the world may count the crucifixion as the ultimate loss of Christ, Christians see it as the ultimate purpose and work of Christ. Jesus came to give Himself as the sacrifice for the sins of the world out of the Father's great love for all. Christians shed tears in remembrance and reflection of the cross, but not in grief. They are tears of gratitude for His willing sacrifice. Sometimes it takes losing to win.

Jesus died on the cross and was laid in the tomb on Friday, but Easter Sunday morning the stone was rolled away and Jesus was resurrected. Though He was dead, He now lives. In losing to death on the cross, Jesus had won over sin, over hell and over the grave. Christians celebrate Good Friday for Christ's sacrifice by which we are forgiven, and we celebrate Easter for Christ's resurrection through which we now have eternal life. Sometimes it takes losing to win.

Individual Force Protection Plans (IFPPs)

All Department of Defense personnel and their adult family members on official or unofficial travel outside of Italy must complete an Individual Force Protection Plan (IFPP). IFPPs are mandatory if one of the following criteria is met:

- If the destination country or region has a State Department Public Announcement or Travel Warning in effect.
- A U.S. Mission (Embassy/Consulate) is not present and the State Department or responsible Chief of Mission cannot extend normal consular protection services to U.S. Citizens.
- Travel includes any of the following countries: Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Belarus, Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Israel, Lebanon, Albania, Kosovo, Serbia, and all Africa Nations.
- Travel is out of Area of Responsibility (AOR) as required by AOR Commander. (CONUS, Alaska, Hawaii, and U.S. Territories are exempt).

Using confidential or restricted reporting, a victim can seek medical attention and preserve evidence without immediately choosing whether or not to initiate an investigation.

Unrestricted Reporting allows an eligible person who is sexually assaulted to access medical treatment and counseling and request an official investigation of the allegation using existing reporting channels.

Sex offenders, whether they are military or civilian, are punished by law pending an investigation.

"If found guilty, the consequence for military offenders can range from Captain's Mast or administrative separation, all the way up to imprisonment," said special agent Justin Boyd, a member of the Naval Criminal Investigative Service's Family & Sexual Violence Unit. "The punishment will vary, depending on the specific facts of the case and the findings of the command or the court martial."

Boyd also says civilians are judged just as harshly and could potentially face a Civilian Misconduct Review Board or trial in the U.S. Federal Court System pursuant to the Military Extraterritorial Jurisdiction Act (MEJA) of 2000.

Sindy Copeland, the NSA Naples sexual assault response coordinator, said that people can help prevent themselves from becoming victims by being aware of their surroundings and trusting their instincts.

"If a situation makes you feel uncomfortable, it's often a good sign that something is not right," said Copeland. "Don't be afraid to ask for help and get to a safe place if needed."

What you need to know about sexual assault restricted and unrestricted reporting

Sexual assault is the most underreported crime in the military. While the Department of Defense (DOD) prefers complete reporting of sexual assaults to both victim's services and law enforcement, it also recognizes that some victims desire only medical and support services and do not want command involvement.

Under the DOD's Confidential Policy, military victims of sexual assault have two reporting options: restricted and unrestricted reporting. Victim advocates and sexual assault response coordinators (SARCs) are available to provide information on these reporting options.

What is restricted reporting?

A service member and their dependents who are 18 years of age or older may disclose a sexual assault to certain individuals without command or law enforcement notification to access information, support, advocacy and medical care.

As of Jan. 23, 2012 service member's dependents who are 18 years of age or older have the option to make a restricted report.

To whom may I disclose the sexual assault?

To guarantee a RESTRICTED report, you may only disclose the sexual assault to

- SARCs (sexual assault response coordinators);
- A Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) victim advocate;
- Health care personnel;
- Chaplain.

What is unrestricted reporting?

Unrestricted reporting is available to all victims of sexual assault who want an official investigation of the crime. Unrestricted reporting follows standard chain of command and NCIS notification.

Victims can report to:

- SARCs (sexual assault response coordinators);
- Victim advocates;
- Health care personnel/ Fleet and Family Support Center counselors;
- Chaplains;
- Supervisor/chain of command;
- Law enforcement/ Naval Criminal Investigative Service;
- Naval Legal Service Office.

Who may make an Unrestricted Report?

All victims of sexual assault are eligible to make an unrestricted report.

Victims' services include:

- Victim advocacy;
- Medical attention/ forensic exam;
- Counseling;
- Investigation by law enforcement
- Legal services;
- Military protective order/ civilian restraining order;
- Chaplain support.

What are the exceptions?

- Victims cannot change from unrestricted to restricted reporting.
- If individuals other than victim advocates or sexual assault coordinators are told about sexual assault, the restricted reporting option cannot be guaranteed.

De-energize lights for 100 percent savings

The Navy's Utilities and Energy Cost Savings Tiger Team has traveled the world looking for low cost energy savings opportunities on Navy bases. One recurring opportunity involves de-energizing light fixtures that just aren't needed.

Where will you find these fixtures? Sometimes they are a by-product of a renovation that installed new walls, or buildings inside of buildings, leaving a few stray lights that nobody needs. Often the excess fixtures are in hallways. Light levels in hallways can be considerably lower than light levels in work areas. When hallways are bright and fixtures are closely spaced, every other fixture can often be de-energized for energy savings.

If you see lights that don't seem to serve a purpose, or bright hallways, tell your supervisor or building energy monitor about the potential energy savings. Public works can evaluate the lighting requirements and de-energize unnecessary fixtures, helping your building and your base to be just a little greener. Many small contributions can add up to big savings.

At the event, Capt. Scott Gray, commanding officer of NSA Naples, signed a proclamation recognizing World Autism Awareness Day, and a panel of experts discussed local resources for parents of children with special needs. Afterward, dozens of attendees — some personally affected by autism, others not — enjoyed cake, pizza and bowling at Strikers Bowling Alley at the Support Site.

Members of the discussion panel said that autism spectrum disorders are much more

common than most people realize. Just a few days ago, the Centers for Disease Control announced that the incidence rate of autism has risen to 1 in 88, with the rate of autism on military installations being even higher.

"The rates aren't declining, they're increasing," Capt. Gray said. "The key has always been early intervention, which has always been successful."

According to the Autism Society website, www.autism-society.org, autism is a "spectrum disorder" that affects individuals in different ways and to varying degrees. Autism spectrum disorders are characterized "by difficulties in social interaction, ver-

bal and nonverbal communication and repetitive behaviors," according to the organization Autism Speaks, but "each individual with autism is unique."

For instance, people with Asperger's syndrome, a type of autism spectrum disorder, don't have trouble with speech or language delays, while those with autistic disorder may have difficulty speaking. Some people on the autism spectrum may have average or above average intellectual abilities, while others are unable to live independently.

Panel members at the April 2 event urged parents who have concerns about their child's development to get their son or daughter evaluated as soon as possible. Some behaviors

that indicate a child is at risk for an autism spectrum disorder and is in need of an immediate evaluation include the following:

- Lack of warm, joyful expressions;
- Lack of sharing interest or enjoyment;
- Lack of response to name;
- Loss of language;
- Repetitive movement with objects such as spinning or lining up toys;
- Repetitive body movements such as flapping or rocking;
- Lack of speech or repetitive speech (echoing);
- Inability to play with other children or lack of interest in playing with others;
- Resistance to being touched.

Chris Kasperek, director of Child and Youth Programs at NSA Naples, said that the base

childcare centers can make accommodations for children once they are identified as having special needs, but it is difficult if the problem goes unidentified.

"The important thing for us is that we serve all children, and that includes children with special needs," Kasperek said. "We are here to serve you, but we can't if we don't know what's going on."

Parents with children under the age of 3 who have concerns about their child's development should call Educational & Development Intervention Services (EDIS) at 081-811-4037 to request a child find appointment. Those with children 3 or older should call Naples Elementary School at 081-811-4037.
