

## Combined Federal Campaign-Overseas kicks off in Yokosuka

The Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) Overseas kicked off the 2008 season onboard Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) with a cake cutting and a training session for command coordinators at the Fleet Theater Sept. 30.


Kitty Malcom-Orr, the CFC overseas pacific region coordinator, conducted the training. This year the campaign is trying to publicize family support and youth programs, which enables members to donate to local installations or bases. The main focus for every campaign though is to simply get the word out to every member in the area.

"What we ask each campaign representative is that they ensure that we have 100 percent informed opportunity to give," said Malcom-Orr. "That they take the time to make that personal contact, answering contributor's questions, finding out what they need to make a decision."

It is now easier than ever for service members and government employees to contribute to the causes they feel are important. Individuals can get all the information they need on the thousands of charities that are part of the CFC by going to the Web site, www.cfc Overseas.org, or by contacting their local campaign coordinator. Payments are accepted by cash, check, allotment, and as of last year, credit card.

"The credit card submission is a good way to allow people to gain mileage points on their credit cards; that's

something that helps to motivate people to give," said Chief Quarter Master (SW) Henry Harris, CFAY

community area project organizer. "But either way they give, whether by [credit card] or paper form, it all counts towards Yokosuka and showing that people here in Yokosuka care and want to contribute to the community."

The CFC raised \$271 million last year with \$252,904 of that coming directly from Yokosuka. Commands are awarded with bronze, silver, gold or platinum plaques depending on the amount that their personnel donate. Individual donors are also eligible for prizes ranging from \$250 to \$2,500, or even a 2009 Ford Focus, courtesy of Navy Exchange New Car Sales.

However, it's not the prizes that are important; it's the good that can be achieved by everyone pitching in towards the excellent causes CFC represents that really counts.

"The important thing in my opinion is that we're giving money to folks around the world who need it desperately," said Malcom-Orr. "Our goal is to put as much money towards charity as we can. That's our main mission."

CFC promotes and supports philanthropy through a program that is employee focused, cost-efficient and effective in providing all federal employees the opportunity to improve the quality of life for all.

CFC is the world's largest and most successful annual workplace charity campaign, with more than 300 CFC campaigns throughout the country and internationally to help to raise millions of dollars each year. Pledges made by Federal civilian, postal and military donors during the campaign season (Sept. 1 to Dec. 15) support eligible non-profit organizations that provide health and human service benefits throughout the world.

## Yokosuka hosts annual Relay for Life fundraiser in Ikego

Members of the Yokosuka Navy community participated in the annual Relay for Life on the track at the Ikego Naval Housing Complex Sept. 27.

The yearly non-profit donation generating event helps raise money and awareness for cancer research, with all proceeds going to the American Cancer Society in hopes of finding a cure for the deadly disease.

A total of eight teams ran or walked in the fight against cancer. Some were active duty, some family members and several were cancer survivors. A group from Afloat Training Group Western Pacific teamed up with instructors from the Center for Naval Engineering for this worthy event.

"It's a great event and it's a great cause," Chief Damage Controlman (SW) Matt Plato from Yokosuka's Center for Naval Engineering (CNE). "We're doing it on behalf of a former instructor that was part of CNE, who passed away July 7 of cancer."

According to Holly Varner, a stay-at-home mom and the coordinator of this year's relay, the event goes on for 12 hours with families and teams keeping at least one person on the track at all times throughout the night.

"The relay for life is a fundraiser that is done over the whole world to raise money for the American Cancer Society in the interest of research and development for a cure and awareness for everybody," said Varner. "I love the way tonight is going. Of course we always want more people to come out to make it more fun and to get more involved but it looks as if everyone is enjoying themselves and they're all here for the right reasons."

The American Cancer Society Relay for Life began as the City of Destiny Classic 24-hour Run against Cancer, and was started by Dr. Gordy Klatt in Tacoma, Wash., when he ran more than 83 miles in 24 hours and raised \$27,000. The relay has since become a world-wide event that has raised millions of dollars.

My wife and I had planned to celebrate our son's birthday party at the Ikego pool, however the staff informed us of a policy in place to reserve the pool 15 days ahead of schedule. At first, we were given what felt like the run-around until we reached Paul Lopez who helped direct our problem to Kyle Rhodus who in turn had Josh Davis accommodate our request and make this event possible. The kind of special customer service and caliber this team of professionals have demonstrated clearly illustrates why MWR Yokosuka rocks in their business. Please send them our best! Their service made a difference to the birthday memories of our son.

**Q:** It was recently brought to my attention that once bicycles are confiscated on base and left unclaimed for about, "a month or so." CFAY police "throw them away." I recently found this out because I was interested in purchasing a bicycle and asked if there was a time in which they ever sell them. The person I spoke to said there is not a way to purchase the bicycle's that they knew of. I asked, "Why doesn't CFAY donate them to an orphanage? Auction them off for charity? Fix them up and give them to kids on base for Christmas? Or put a bicycle sharing program on base for people who don't drive?" This is a program where all bikes are painted Blue with gold lettering "U.S. NAVY" on the side. People can pick up a bike from various locations on base, then park it in another location on base for others to use when they are done. What a shame that on a base in which we are trying to promote recycling we can not come up with a better way to get rid of these bicycles. Is there something that can be done rather than throw them away?

**A:** Congress and the Department of Defense strictly regulate the disposition of abandoned property onboard military installations. 10 U.S.C. 2575 and DOD 4160.21-M govern such disposition. Due to ethical and fiscal concerns, as a blanket rule abandoned property such as bicycles may not be given away. Currently, Commander Fleet Activities, Yokosuka is working on a program that will lawfully allow Morale, Welfare and Recreation to access these bicycles and use them for the benefit of our base personnel.

**Q:** We know the Navy Exchange (NEX) gas station switched to a system based on the national average for gas. It seems they hike up the price immediately but do not seem to bring it down in a timely manner. According to FuelGaugeReport.com, the U.S. national average has been around

\$3.68 plus or minus a few cents for the last two weeks, yet the NEX gas station has been at the same \$4.06 price during that period. Can someone clarify this policy?

**A:** The Navy Exchange has an agreement with Army and Air Force Exchange Service (AAFES) to match their fuel pricing. AAFES has indicated that they have reached their floor price. Currently, the NEX is selling fuel below the cost charged by the Defense Energy Support Center and is losing money on every gallon pumped.

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

# USS Shiloh friends, family day cruise big success

**U**SS *Shiloh* (CG 67) hosted a one-day cruise on Tokyo Bay for family and friends Sept. 26, providing an opportunity to experience life aboard a Navy ship at sea.

*Shiloh* Sailors welcomed more than 300 guests including family members of Sailors and personnel from Ship Repair Facility (SRF), Tokyo Navy League and students of "Team *Shiloh*" from Yokosuka Middle School.

The guests began by assembling on the ship's flight deck for a welcome by *Shiloh* Commanding Officer Capt. Alan J. Abramson and a safety briefing by Lt. j.g. Dylan Ross. Guided-tours of the ship began shortly after departure and lasted late into the afternoon. The tour included such evolutions as damage control and fire fighting demonstrations, in-depth tours of the combat information center (CIC) and a walk-through of the pilot house with a fully manned navigation team in action.

According to Ross, the purpose of this event was to familiarize the guests with the day-to-day operations of the Ticonderoga-class cruiser when it conducts operations under way. It also offered shore establishment personnel who work at Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka a rare opportunity to experience life at sea and to see how their efforts throughout CFAY can contribute to the mission success of afloat units.

"It's a nice feeling to share what I do with my family," said Yeomen 1st Class (SW) Marvin L. Harris, who watched with his wife and daughter as the deck crew prepared to get *Shiloh* under way during sea and anchor detail. "My daughter asks me almost every day what I do in the Navy and it's a lot better to show her what I do to get a better understanding."

When the tours were complete, the guests were treated to a spectacular guided tour of Tokyo Bay narrated by Ensign's Erich Bergmann and Stephanie Hamilton. The tour included the anchorage site of *USS Missouri* for the signing of the surrender document ending hostilities between Japan and the United States in 1945, the cities of Tokyo, Chiba, Kawasaki and Yokohama, as well as attractions such as Tokyo Disney and Odaiba. In addition, *Shiloh's* culinary specialists provided quite a variety of food for a two hour "steel beach" picnic on the flight deck.

At the end of the day, it was clear that the guests had enjoyed themselves and were thankful for the opportunity to spend a day at sea. Team *Shiloh* World Geography

## John S. McCain displays preparation with "Don't Tread On Me"

On May 31, 2002, Secretary of the Navy (SECNAV) Instruction 10520.6 was issued on the display of the First Navy Jack onboard all U.S. Navy ships during the global war on terror. Aboard *USS John S. McCain* (DDG 56), the First Navy Jack and its meaning have become integral to the operational mindset, daily operations and even ship's décor.

Conceived by Commodore Esek Hopkins in 1775, the First Navy Jack is shown as having 13 alternating red-and-white stripes, an uncoiled rattlesnake, and the "Don't Tread on Me" motto. This very unique flag was first used as a signal to engage the enemy. The



timber rattlesnake on the flag is especially significant and symbolic to the American Revolution, as the rattle has thirteen individual layers for the original thirteen colonies. The snake does not strike until provoked, a quality echoed by the phrase "Don't tread on me."

*McCain's* dedication to the ideals and message presented by the First Navy Jack begin at the ship's jack staff. Not just in the Don't Tread On Me flag, but with the jack staff itself. A snake made of rope, coiled around the red-and-white jack staff, leads the ship to sea. The décor is carried forward to the red-and-white quarterdeck awning posts greet "Big Bad John" visitors with a clear message - one of mission readiness. This is further emphasized by *McCain's* Commanding Officer Cmdr. John S. Banigan's bridge chair, which also displays the "Don't Tread On Me" color scheme and yes, a snake wrapped around the red-and-white foot rest.

While the décor is interesting and appealing, it is nothing more than a reminder that combat readiness is essential to a forward-deployed naval force.

"*USS John S. McCain* is privileged to serve our nation in wartime. As the centerpiece of the Pacific Fleet's forward presence, this privilege extends to waters in harm's way and at the doorstep of countries that threaten our security, access and freedoms, or disregard basic human rights," Banigan published in his command philosophy. "Consequently, we must be brave, vigilant, exacting and professional. When called into action, we collectively will be smarter, faster, tougher, and better prepared than our enemy. Therefore, know your job, perform your best in all that you do and prepare the ship you will take into battle!"

Clearly the *McCain* focus is one of preparedness. To achieve this end, her Sailors prioritize their efforts to accomplish each mission through investment in personal and professional development, operational readiness, material readiness and safety. It is through investment in *McCain* Sailors that the desired end is achieved.

# Navy announces updates to physical readiness program

**A** NAVADMIN released Sept. 29 emphasized the Navy's exceptional progress in attaining a culture of fitness and announces several policy revisions to strengthen the Navy Physical Readiness Program (PRP).

"Navy Physical Fitness Assessment (PFA) failures have decreased more than 50 percent over the past four years," said Manpower, Personnel, Training and Education, Director Rear Adm. Daniel P. Holloway. "We're really seeing a change in culture and change in lifestyle. Better fitness ultimately leads to better quality of life, better performance and better readiness."

In recent years, the Navy has made significant strides in helping Sailors achieve a culture of fitness. The addition of elliptical and stationary bike options for the cardio portion of the PFA was welcomed by many Sailors. A General Military Training (GMT) program on Navy Knowledge Online (NKO) provides Sailors greater insight for physical training and preparing for the PFA. Most recently, an official physical training uniform was adopted around the fleet.

"Since 2005, the Navy has made significant strides to support and encourage physical fitness," said Holloway, citing the addition of new testing options, which include the elliptical and stationary bike. "The majority of Navy personnel performs the PFA semi-annually and can easily meet or exceed the minimum physical fitness standards. I challenge each of you to continue the excellent progress we've made to improve Navy's overall physical fitness for the improved health and readiness of the force."

The new NAVADMIN builds on the Navy's culture of fitness and supports the rigors of shipboard life, global missions and individual augmentees, according to Holloway. The changes announced in NAVADMIN 277/08 include:

- Effective immediately, unless the most recent PFA was passed, Sailors who have failed two PFAs in the past three years shall not be assigned to overseas, pre-commissioning, instructor duty, special programs billets or global war on terror (GWOT) Support Assignments (GSA). Special programs billets include recruit division commander, recruiting duty, joint duty and Washington D.C. staff.


- Additionally, individuals who have not passed the current PFA and have failed three times in four years, will not be allowed a short term extension for the purpose of passing the PFA.

- Software upgrades to the Physical Readiness Information Management System (PRIMS) will allow commands to enter all waivers, including current progress and readiness waivers. Commands are required to enter all PFA waivers into PRIMS. Current waivers must be entered no later than Dec. 15.

This upgrade will allow the Navy to track the progress of Sailors who need administrative separation processing due to multiple PFA failures.

- Effective Oct. 1, 2009, the Navy will discontinue waivers for progress. The present requirement for processing for administrative separations (ADSEP) for three PFA failures within a four-year period remains.

## Developing good study habits for school, college

Starting college or returning to school as an adult can be daunting, but when you're a Sailor, Marine, or military spouse, it can seem overwhelming. The idea of taking statistics or chemistry may make you hesitate, but don't let doubts stand in your way. Opportunities for both military and civilian education are virtually everywhere.

Developing solid study habits will help your personal success as a student. It will also give you ideas to help your children develop lifelong skills that they can begin refining long before they send out college applications.

Having a routine and a regular place to study is a good start in developing strong study skills. Some people study more effectively in the morning, others at night. Discover your best time and develop a schedule that allows for your peak study time.

Whether you're in middle school or graduate school, you'll find that lack of organization is the main cause of low academic performance. With multiple teachers to answer to and different class schedules and assignments to track, unorganized students find themselves quickly falling behind in their grade point average (GPA).

- Keep a separate notebook for each class. The type of notebook will depend on the teacher and the assignments. Color-code classes if necessary.

- Keep good notes. Class notes, assignments, tape recordings (if allowed) and personal reminders help you keep up and not be surprised by that Friday afternoon quiz.

- Pens, pencils, computer ink, and other supplies should be on hand and convenient to your study area.

- Backpacks keep everything together and available. Make sure you routinely check the supplies in your backpack or organizer bag if you're often on the road or in different locations to study.

If you are returning to school and have a family and/or career, setting priorities is the first step toward time management — and that's the first step toward success. Yes, you might have to put favorite activities or social interests on hold for a while, but in the long run you'll find that any sacrifices were well worth the time invested in your education. (You can always go window shopping or tinker with cars later).

Study guides help you find what works best for you or your child. Good study habits can make the difference between just passing and making the dean's list.

## CNFJ honors employee with 45 year career service award

Hubert "Woody" Woods Jr. was recently honored by Commander U.S. Naval Forces Japan (CNFJ) Rear Adm. James D. Kelly with the Career Service Award for 45 years of service to the U.S. government.

For nearly half a century, Woods has served the U.S. government either as an active duty service member or as a civilian. Woods enlisted in the Navy in 1961 at the age of 17 as a gunner's mate (GM) when the race for outer space was in full swing. Throughout his military career, which ended in 2001, he held 19 pay grades including four warrant officer ranks; he retired as a captain.

Less than a year after his enlistment, the Cuban missile crisis was in the headlines, and several years later the eyes of the world were focusing on the events taking place in the Gulf of Tonkin. "Back then, people said 'Where's Vietnam?' The world was a much bigger place," Woods said.

Woods also recalled a much closer Navy back then where shore duty was almost unheard of. The majority of Sailors spent quite a bit of time at sea, according to Wood adding that that as a GM, it was standard to spend eight years at sea before getting any kind of shore duty.

In 1963, he was assigned to his first ship, *USS Tillamook* (ATA 192), forward-deployed to Yokosuka, Japan. Yokosuka was much more picturesque back then,

Woods said. "There were cherry blossom lined along the pier where the fleet cruise ship was and there was much less going on operation-wise. Major base construction began in 1968 which seemed to never stop, even until this day."

Reaching for his Eagles coffee mug, Woods reminisced of his hometown of Philadelphia, Pa. "I remember as a kid going to all those Army-Navy games at Veteran's Stadium. It was funny because there as both Army and Navy fans in my family," he said. "I had relatives who fought with the Army in World War II and Korea, but I was one who pulled for Navy."

Wood's said he is extremely grateful for all the opportunities that the Navy has afforded him. As a lieutenant he was sent to college as a full-time student, where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in business management. He later attended the Navy War College where he got his master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies. "All in all, the Navy has been pretty good to me," he said.

Today, Woods holds a position with CNFJ's business management office as a management analyst where he is able to aid base commanding officers in identifying the needs of their bases and look ahead to their future needs.

When asked what the award means to him, Woods said "It meant that I was closer to achieving my goal of 50 years of service to our country, and it further impressed upon me how lucky I was to have served four decades on active duty."

# Navy announces IA, GSA assignment policies update

The Navy announced updates Sept. 29 to the Individual Augmentee Manpower Management (IAMM) and global war on terror (GWOT) Support Assignment (GSA) programs, the two programs used for manning the Navy's joint manning doctrine requirements for GWOT.

"Our efforts are focused on meeting our operational and GWOT support requirements, while providing our Sailors and their families the support they deserve," said Chief of Naval Personnel Vice Adm. Mark Ferguson, III, in the NAVADMIN.

"Our goal remains to move the majority of GWOT assignments into normal PCS rotation window, increase predictability and stability for our Sailors and their families, and improve manning stability at the unit level," said Ferguson.

The NAVADMIN 276/08 provides updates on follow-on detailing, IA advancement rates, suitability screening, enlisted and junior officer IA/GSA assignments and it also discusses the impact of status of forces agreements (SOFA) on GSA Sailors whose families wish to remain overseas.

Advancement data show that IA/GSA Sailors have a higher overall average advancement rate than Sailors who have not served an IA/GSA. In the most recent chief petty officer selection board, IA/GSA Sailors had a higher than average selection rates to chief. Selection boards are directed to give favorable consideration to those candidates displaying superior performance while serving in direct support of GWOT.

The NAVADMIN lists detailing guarantees for junior officers in pay grades O-1 to O-3 who complete an IA or GSA tour from shore slates. Guarantees include choice of fleet concentration area or homeport upon completion of a GSA/IA tour, and slating credit, which ranks an officer who

has completed an IA/GSA above peers with similar qualifications and fitness reports.

The NAVADMIN discusses options for Sailors who wish for their families to remain overseas while serving on the GSA. In those instances where a Sailor is disadvantaged by GSA, and the overseas commander agrees to host dependents while the Sailor is on the IA, IAMM may be allowed in lieu of GSA orders. Requests for IAMM vice GSA orders from overseas Sailors must be made to detailers during the orders negotiation process, and must be positively endorsed by the command indicating sponsorship for the entire IA tour.

Sailors interested in serving an IA or GSA should review NAVADMIN 276/08 in its entirety. The NAVADMIN can be found under messages at [www.npc.navy.mil](http://www.npc.navy.mil).

Additional guidance is also available in NAVADMINs 002/08 Individual Augmentee Manpower Management Business Rules and 003/08 GSA Detailing Business Rules.

# World War II sub *Grunion* discovered off coast of Aleutian Islands

Commander, Submarine Forces Pacific Fleet (COMSUBPAC), Rear Adm. Douglas McAneny announced Oct. 2 that a sunken vessel off the coast of the Aleutian Islands is in fact the World War II submarine *USS Grunion* (SS 216).

"I am honored to announce that, with records and information provided by the Abele family and assistance from the Naval Historical Center, *USS Grunion* has been located," said McAneny. "We are very grateful to the family of *Grunion's* Commanding Officer Lt. Cmdr. Mannert L. Abele for providing the underwater video footage and pictures that allowed us to make this determination. We also appreciate the efforts of the *USS Cod* Submarine Memorial for their assistance in this matter. We hope this announcement will help to give closure to the families of the 70 crewmen of *Grunion*."

The submarine *Grunion* arrived at Pearl Harbor on June 20, 1942. The vessel completed pre-patrol training before departing on its first war patrol June 30. *Grunion's* commanding officer, Lt. Cmdr. Abele, was ordered to proceed to the Aleutian Islands and patrol westward from Attu on routes between the Aleutians and the Japanese Empire. On July 10, *Grunion* was reassigned to the area north of Kiska. Over the next

20 days, the submarine reported firing on an enemy destroyer, sinking three destroyer-type vessels, and attacking unidentified enemy ships near Kiska.

*Grunion's* last transmission was received on July 30, 1942. The submarine reported heavy antisubmarine activity at the entrance to Kiska, and that it had 10 torpedoes remaining forward. On the same day, *Grunion* was directed to return to Dutch Harbor Naval Operating Base. There was no contact or sighting of the submarine after July 30, and on Aug. 16, *Grunion* was reported lost.

Abele was posthumously awarded the Navy Cross for heroism. A destroyer, *USS Mannert L. Abele* (DD 733), was commissioned in his honor, and was later lost in action off Okinawa in 1945. Japanese anti-submarine attack data recorded no attack in the Aleutian area at the time of *Grunion's* disappearance, so the submarine's fate remained an unsolved mystery for more than 60 years.

After discovering information on the internet in 2002 that helped pinpoint *USS Grunion's* possible location, the sons of *Grunion's* commanding officer, Bruce, Brad and John Abele, began working on a plan to find the submarine. In August 2006, a team of side scan sonar experts hired by the brothers located a target near Kiska almost a mile below the ocean's surface. A second expedition in August 2007 using a high definition camera on a remotely operated vehicle (ROV) yielded video footage and high resolution photos of the wreckage of a U.S. fleet submarine.

"This discovery has come about through a stream of seemingly improbable events; it's like we won the lottery 10 times in a row," said Bruce Abele, eldest son of *Grunion's* commanding officer. "It is so dramatic to see the underwater photo and be certain it was in fact *Grunion*; not only is this announcement important for the families of the crew members, it's also important for the Navy and the country."

The Abele brothers then contacted the *USS Cod* Submarine Memorial for assistance in identifying the wreckage. The vessel is lying at a depth of about 3,200 feet. Very cold water and lack of significant currents has preserved much of the wreckage.

Dr. John Fakan, director of the *USS Cod* Submarine Memorial, remarked about the importance of having an unmodified example in *USS Cod*, a fellow Gato-class submarine, in identifying the wreckage of *USS Grunion*.

"*USS Grunion* and *USS Cod* shared the same blueprints," he said. "It is very gratifying for me and my crew to help with the identification of the submarine."

With the information provided by the Abele family and the *USS Cod* Submarine Memorial, COMSUBPAC and the Naval Historical Center examined the evidence and historical records and determined that the submarine found at the reported position could only be *USS Grunion*.

"The synergy of our group working together with the Navy for the common cause has been a wonderful group effort," Bruce Abele said. "The teamwork combined with everyone's compassion and wisdom has resulted in our success."

According to Bruce's brother John Abele, those responsible for contributing to this discovery included historians and engineers from the United States, Australia, Israel and Japan. Of particular note was the involvement of Japanese naval architect Yutaka Iwasaki, who provided information critical to pinpointing the location of the submarine.

Bruce and John's brother, retired Lt. Brad Abele, who recently passed away, also played a significant role in the find. As his brother John explained, "Brad's experience as a Naval aviator helped a great deal by

helping us to plot the strategy for the discovery."


Unfortunately, the cause of *Grunion's* sinking remains a mystery. No matter what the cause, the end result was the loss of all hands. As the Naval Historical Center noted, "no amount of analysis or speculation will change or alter the fact that families lost fathers, husbands, uncles and brothers... the Navy and the nation will always be grateful for their service and their sacrifice."

Former Commander-in-Chief of the U.S. Pacific Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz once said, "When I assumed command of the Pacific Fleet on December 31, 1941 our submarines were already operating against the enemy, the only units of the Fleet that could come to grips with the Japanese for months to come. It was to the Submarine Force that I looked to carry the load until our great industrial activity could produce the weapons we so sorely needed to carry the war to the enemy. It is to the everlasting honor and glory of our submarine personnel that they never failed us in our days of great peril."

By the end of World War II, submarines had made more than 1,600 war patrols. Pacific Fleet submarines like *Grunion* accounted for more than half of all enemy shipping sunk during the war. The cost of this success was heavy: 52 U.S. Pacific Fleet submarines were lost, and more than 3,500 submariners remain on "eternal patrol."

A representative of the submarine force will speak on behalf of the U.S. Navy at a memorial service in Cleveland, Ohio, Oct. 11. The service, hosted by the *USS Cod* Memorial, will honor the 70 crewmembers killed when *USS Grunion* was sunk near the Aleutian Islands on or about July 30, 1942.

"To provide ourselves and the families this closure, it's icing on the cake," said John Abele. "The memorial service is a symbolic event; we've discovered family we didn't know we had. Not only is this an honor for all of us, it increases the feeling of community we've been able to achieve."

# SRF-JRMC begins new era getting ready for GW

Ship Repair Facility and Japan Regional Maintenance Center (SRF-JRMC) Commanding Officer Capt. Stephanie Douglas was positioned at the top of the huge crane called "Yokozuna" at berth 12, taking many pictures and welcoming her new customer, the aircraft carrier *USS George Washington* (CVN 73) (GW) Sept. 25. With a crew of approximately 3,200 Sailors, GW is the first nuclear-powered ship forward-deployed to Japan.

Douglas mentioned in her weekly newsletter, "I couldn't be more proud of the work that every member of the SRF-JRMC team, both Yokosuka and Sasebo, has done to ensure we were ready. You should all know that you made a significant contribution to history and to the long term peace and stability to the region."

The U.S. Navy made public the name of GW as SRF-JRMC's new customer to replace *USS Kitty Hawk* (CV 63) three years ago. A majority of Japanese employees were not familiar with the nuclear-powered ship and did not have knowledge on how she was built and the stringent requirements for working on board GW.

However, all Japanese employees, U.S. civilians and service members of SRF-JRMC team as a whole have been getting prepared for GW's arrival for three years now with the establishment of five critical tactical goals (TG's) of the SRF-JRMC Strategic Plan (STP) and modified them as needed in close cooperation with the command's leaders.

The five critical tactical goals were built on the SRF-JRMC's strategic goal "Successfully complete all SRF-JRMC preparations including people, processes and infrastructure for the new carrier arrival."

The five tactical goals are: Technical Compliance; to provide products and services that meet U.S. Navy technical and quality requirements, Shaping Our Workforce; ensuring SRF-JRMC has the right workforce with the right skills in the right place at the right time, Navy Enterprise Maintenance Automated information System (NEMAIS); improving critical business processes, New Carrier Support; completing the manning, processes and infrastructure for the 2008 new carrier arrival and Lean Acceleration; making Lean principles a permanent

part of the work culture to continuously reduce waste and improve processes.

The leaders of SRF-JRMC have made great efforts toward accomplishing the tactical goals. To do that, SRF-JRMC has been conducting many events such as the Strategic Plan, all hands meetings as the first step of line of sight (LOS) for all SRF-JRMC members to understand and engage everyone whose purpose was to provide employees with broader awareness of where SRF-JRMC needs to go and to have a command-wide shared vision.

Middle manager forums as the second step of LOS will serve as the link between the top leaders and general employees, and are the key personnel that ensure engagement of employees in accomplishing the goals of the strategic plan.

Top leaders' briefing as the third step of the line of sight was designed to be more specific on how each

department and group relate to strategic plan.

These events provided SRF-JRMC workers with an opportunity to remind themselves of what they are really all about and how each of them has a role in helping the SRF-JRMC achieve its strategic intention and mission.

"I need each and every one of the employees at SRF-JRMC, both in Yokosuka and Sasebo, to be actively engaged and participate in getting ready for the new carrier this summer," said Douglas during her February All Hands meeting remarks.

Now that GW is here, everyone on base and onboard ships will start to closely watch SRF-JRMC's workers and their products in support of GW.

GW's arrival marks the beginning of its role as the Navy's sole forward-deployed aircraft carrier in the region, and offers SRF-JRMC new challenges to conduct its mission of keeping the 7th Fleet operationally ready.

SRF-JRMCを代表し、12番バースで先頃行なわれた歓迎セレモニーでサービス工場の従業員が渡り桟橋を取り付け、空母ジョージ・ワシントンへの最初の作業を終えた。

3年前、米海軍はUSSキティーホークの後継艦としてSRF-JRMCの新しい顧客となるGWの名を公表した。ほとんどの日本従業員は原子力空母になじみがなく、原子力空母がどの様に建造され、艦船上での業務にどのような厳しい条件があるのかといった知識を持ち合わせてなかった。

その後、日本人従業員、軍人軍属は丸となり、経営戦略計画(STP)の中に5つの重要な実務ゴール(TG)を設定し、部隊の上級監督者たちの協力を得てその内容を刷新しながら、3年間GWの配備に向けた準備に追われてきた。

5つの重要なTGは、SRF-JRMCが掲げる戦略ゴール「2008年に新しく配備される空母に備えSRF-JRMCの人員、プロセス、および基本設備を含めた準備を完了させる」に基づいて作成された。

5つのTGは、技術規定の遵守(米海軍の技術および品質規定に従った業務とサービスを提供する)、将来に備える人材育成(必要な時期に、適切な能力を備えた人材を必要な部署に確保する)、NEMAIS(重要な業務プロセスを改善する)、新しく配備される空母への支援(2008年の空母配備に向けて支援要員、業務手順、および施設の整備を完了する)、リーン促進(継続的ムダを減らし、プロセスを改善するために、リーン方式を取り入れたSRF-JRMC業務システムを職場に定着させる)からなる。

SRF-JRMCの上級監督者たちは5つのTGに込められた考えを(従業員に)浸透させようと務めてきた。それを実践する為に、ラインオブサイト(LOS)の第一ステップとしてSTP全体説明会を行ない、全従業員のSTPへの理解と協力を求めた。その目的は、従業員への組織が向かう方向の認識と共通のビジョンを提供することだ。

LOSの第二のステップとしては中間監督者フォーラムが

ある。中間監督者は上級監督者と一般従業員の間の立場にいる従業員であり、STPのTGを達成する為に一般従業員の協力を得るカギを握っている。

上級監督者による各自の部署やグループへの説明会がLOSの第三のステップであり、各部署、グループがどのようにSTPに関与しているかをより具体化するものだ。

これらの説明会はSRF-JRMCが何であり、そして部隊が経営戦略目的を達成するために、個々の従業員が担う役割は何であるかを再確認する場をもたらした。

「横須賀、佐世保のSRF-JRMCの従業員一人一人が今年の新空母の受け入れ準備に積極的に参加することが必要だ」と2月に行なわれたSTP全体説明会でダグラス大佐は述べている。

GWの配備は終わったが、GWへのSRF-JRMC従業員の仕事振りや顧客サービスに横須賀基地、艦船の誰も見守っている。

GWの配備は西太平洋地域において米海軍で唯一前方展開する空母の役割開始を示し、更にSRF-JRMCが掲げる「第7艦隊の艦船を常に機能できる状態に保つ」という使命に新たなチャレンジをもたらす。

## Voting easier with CFAY VAO

With the general election approaching Nov. 4, Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) Voting Assistance Officer (VAO) is assisting service members, DoD civilians and family members with the overseas voting process.

During his tenure as VAO, Chief Culinary Specialist (SW) Randy Clift, has helped quite a few people meet their voting registration needs.

"Since I took this [job] over, about a year and a half ago, to date, we have registered more than 6,000 people through the absentee process," said Clift.

Clift, who has helped a lot of people register during their check-in process and command indoctrinations, said that he gets two to three calls a week from people interested in registering to vote, and he encourages them to come in and fill out an application.

All members of the uniformed services, family members and DoD civilians over the age of 18 and who are U.S. citizens may vote absentee in federal, state and local elections.

According to Clift, the process of registering is not difficult.

"If you have not registered to vote, you need to fill out a federal postcard application, which takes less than five minutes as long as you know your state residency address," said Clift. "If you don't (currently) have a state-side address you can use the last U.S. address that you actually received mail at and then you will be registered in that state."

Due to the election being so soon, you can register and fill out your ballot at the same time, according to Clift.

"With the deadline as it is, depending on the state, you can fill out a federal post card application and a federal overseas absentee ballot at the same time and mail the post card application then wait a couple of days and mail the absentee ballot," he said. "Hopefully, [the state] will receive your registration and then receive your absentee ballot prior to the election."

All Federal Postcard Applications are due at various times depending on each state. For more information on individual state deadlines people can visit the Federal Voting Assistance Program Web site at [www.fvap.org](http://www.fvap.org).

Clift says that voting is a very important process that everyone should take part in.

"It involves the future of our nation. For the military, you're voting for our future boss," he said. "If you're not involved then you're not helping. People need to be part of the solution, not part of the problem."
