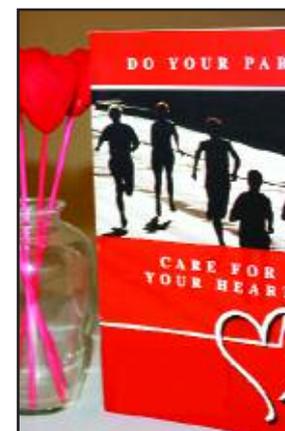

# NUWC's impact at \$1.1B

MIDDLETOWN — The total funded program of the Naval Undersea Warfare Center (NUWC) Division Newport reached an all-time high of more than \$1.1 billion in 2010. Of its total operating budget, more than \$668 million was spent by NUWC Division Newport in payroll, construction, facility support, and local contracts. The command is the largest single federal activity in Rhode Island in terms of personnel and payroll.

NUWC Division Newport increased its employee base to 2,758 government civilian employees and 30 military members in 2010 with a total gross payroll of nearly \$277 million. Of the full-time government civilian staff, 75 percent are classified as scientists or engineers, and 36 percent have graduate degrees.

In addition to the government workforce, NUWC Division Newport contracted for approximately 3,000 work years during 2010 from companies located in Rhode Island, Massachusetts and Connecticut, bringing its combined government and contractor workforce to over 5,700 positions.

Money spent for contracts totaled approximately \$534 million, with contracts obligated to Southern New England companies during the year exceeding \$361 million. The breakdown included \$317 million awarded to Rhode Island-based businesses, and \$30 million issued to Massachusetts-based companies, and \$14 million obligated to Connecticut businesses.

## NAVSTA Security drafts 'active shooter' exercise

Exercise Solid Curtain/Citadel Shield 2011 will be conducted on naval bases and installations throughout the continental United States, Hawaii and Guam from Feb. 21-25.

This annual exercise is designed to enhance the training and readiness of Navy security forces to respond to threats to installations and units.

Naval Station Newport's Main Security exercise will be held Feb. 23. Measures will be taken to minimize disruptions to normal operations, but there may be increased traffic or delays in base access. Area residents may also see increased security activity associated with the exercise.

"This U.S. Fleet Forces Command directed drill is a great opportunity for base commands to review and discuss active shooter responses," said John Bozeman, Installation Training Coordinator.

"The base ATHoc and Giant Voice systems will be used to keep personnel informed of events during

# Speaker says black equality constant effort

Professor Julia Jordan-Zachery, director of the Black Studies Program at Providence College, said living the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Dr. Carter G. Woodson was achievable on a daily basis, but required a sense of standing up to challenges and controversy.

She was the guest speaker last Tuesday for Naval Station Newport's observance of February as African American/Black History Month and Dr. Martin Luther King Day, postponed from last month. About 60 attended her talk in command headquarters building 690.

She described a very different African American people through history who exercised their survival skills within their own framework of reference and

taught each other how to make choices and resist.

The early work of Woodson, considered the father of Negro history, founded the Association for the Study of Negro History in 1915. He began his study of African Americans who were being marginalized and were considered culturally insignificant.

He began to press for the establishment of Negro History Week as a way to bring national attention to the accomplishments of African Americans and hopefully neutralize the apparent distortions in black history.

Jordan-Zachery said Woodson decided that African American history should be celebrated in February because President Abraham Lincoln and abolitionist Frederic Douglass

## Author says WWII Japan rocked by U.S. air raids

*Whirlwind: Bombing Japan 1942-1945* is the latest book by the prolific author Barrett Tillman. Since graduating from the University of Oregon with his journalism degree, Mr. Tillman has written over 32 books and some 500 magazine articles.

The Eight Bells Lecture Series was able to host Mr. Tillman on Jan. 25 as he was in town to be a lecturer at the Naval War College for Professor Doug Smith's elective on "World War Two in the Pacific."

Whirlwind is an examination of the

air war against Japan, from the bold Doolittle raid in 1942 until the end, marked by the atomic bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945. It is a look at the technical aspects of the missions as well as the admirals and generals who commanded the various forces.

As a concept, strategic bombing was seen as a technique to shorten wars, avoiding another Western Front as seen in World War I, reduce enemy's industrial base, and deprive the civilian population of public services. The concept, however, was originally envisioned for the European war and the distances involved were considerably shorter

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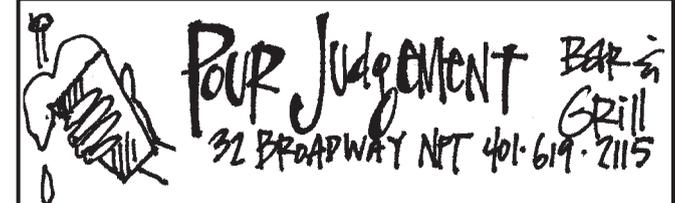
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# CNCS graduates 63 U.S. officers

## Military students get diplomas on Feb. 3 at Naval War College

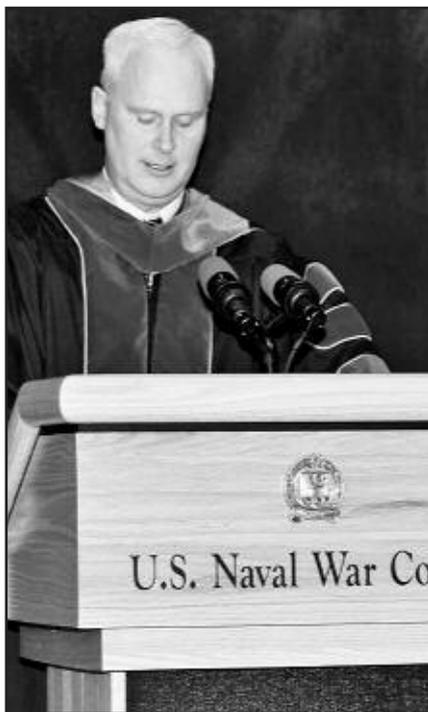
Sixty-three officers received diplomas from the College of Naval Command and Staff (CNCS) during a graduation ceremony at the Naval War College (NWC) on Feb. 3.

Phased in during the academic year's third trimester, the students had joined the college in February of 2010 for a year-long academic program. The intermediate-level students took graduate courses from NWC's three academic departments: Joint Military Operations, Strategy and Policy and National Security Decision-Making.

Their studies were also complemented by an electives program that provided opportunities to explore subjects not included in the core curriculum or to investigate in greater detail specific elements of the core curriculum.

Dr. Marc Genest, was chosen by the class of three Marine Corps, five Army and 55 Navy students as commencement speaker for the second consecutive year.

"I have a tremendous amount of respect for our students and to be selected as graduation speaker again is a tremendous honor," said Genest, professor of Strategy and Policy at NWC. "One of the great things about teaching at the Naval War College is realizing that our students are so extraordinary. Because of their experience and maturity—our professors

really do learn as much from them as they learn from us."

As with last year's graduates, the speaker's address focused on his memorable experience of working in Afghanistan during the summer of 2009. On that occasion, the professor and a colleague were invited by a former NWC graduate to serve as civilian advisors to the 4th Brigade Combat Team in Jalalabad.

Genest's closing remarks mentioned his respect and admiration for the sacrifices that the officers and

their families make each day in serving their country.

Capt. Raymond Keledei, Dean of Students, recognized Lt. Cmdr. Matthew B. Ross as this year's honor graduate. The award is presented to the student who best displays the highest standard of academic performance, extracurricular activities and community service.

"I appreciate the honor—it's surprising and humbling," Ross said. "This year at the Naval War College has allowed me the time to reflect, study, read a lot, introspection, and think about the profession as it is."

The intermediate-level curriculum at the Naval War College examines the operational level of war and operational-level leadership with a solid introduction to the theater-strategic level of war as well as a foundational overview of national strategic requirements and strategies.

The 10-month program is designed to produce broadly educated leaders who possess an operational-level perspective within a strategic context, underpinned by analytical frameworks.

The students earned Joint Professional Military Education phase I credit, a critical milestone in an officer's professional development, in addition to a master of arts degree in National Security and Strategic Studies.

NWC has been educating leaders for 125 years and graduates approximately 600 resident students annually. The college is accredited by the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the New England Association of Colleges and Schools.

## Important information about the \$3.4 billion Indian Trust Settlement

### For current or former IIM account holders, Owners of land held in trust or restricted status, or their heirs

There is a proposed Settlement in *Cobell v. Salazar*, a class action lawsuit about individual Indian land held in trust by the federal government. This notice is just a summary. For details, call the toll-free number or visit the website listed below.

The lawsuit claims that the federal government violated its duties by (a) mismanaging trust funds/assets, (b) improperly accounting for those funds, and (c) mismanaging trust land/assets. The trust funds include money collected from farming and grazing leases, timber sales, mining, and oil and gas production from land owned by American Indians/Alaska Natives.

If you are included in the Settlement, your rights will be affected. To object to the Settlement, to comment on it, or to exclude yourself, you should get a detailed notice at [www.IndianTrust.com](http://www.IndianTrust.com) or by calling 1-800-961-6109.

#### Can I get money?

There are two groups or "Classes" in the Settlement eligible for payment. Each Class includes individual IIM account holders or owners of land held in trust or restricted status who were alive on September 30, 2009.

#### Historical Accounting Class Members

- Had an open individual Indian Money account ("IIM") anytime between October 25, 1994 and September 30, 2009, **and**
- The account had at least one cash transaction.
- Includes estates of account holders who died as of September 30, 2009, if the IIM account was still open on that date.

#### Trust Administration Class Members

- Had an IIM account recorded in currently available data in federal government systems any time from approximately 1985 to September 30, 2009, **or**
- Owned trust land or land in restricted status as of September 30, 2009.
- Includes estates of landowners who died as of September 30, 2009 where the trust interests were in probate as of that date. This means you have asked a court to transfer ownership of the deceased landowner's property.

An individual may be included in one or both Classes.

#### What does the Settlement provide?

- A \$1.5 billion fund to pay those included in the Classes.
- A \$1.9 billion fund to buy small interests in trust or restricted land owned by many people.
- Up to \$60 million to fund scholarships to improve access to higher education for Indian youth.
- A government commitment to reform the Indian trust management and accounting system.

#### How much can I get?

- Historical Accounting Class Members will each get \$1,000.
- Trust Administration Class Members will get at least \$500.
- If you own a small parcel of land with many other people, the federal government may ask you to sell it. You will be offered fair market value. If you sell your land it will be returned to tribal control.

If you believe you are a member of either Class and are not receiving IIM account statements, you will need to call the toll-free number or visit the website to register.

#### What are my other rights?

- If you wish to keep your right to sue the federal government about the claims in this Settlement, you must exclude yourself by **April 20, 2011**.
- If you stay in the Settlement you can object to or comment on it by **April 20, 2011**. The detailed notice explains how to exclude yourself or object/comment.

The U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia will hold a hearing on June 20, 2011, to consider whether to approve the Settlement. It will also consider a request for attorneys' fees, costs, and expenses in the amount of \$99.9 million. However, Class Counsel has fee agreements that would pay them 14.75% of the funds created for the Classes, which could result in an award of \$223 million. The Court may award more or less than these amounts based on controlling law. If approved, these payments and related costs will come out of the Settlement funds available for payment to Class Members.

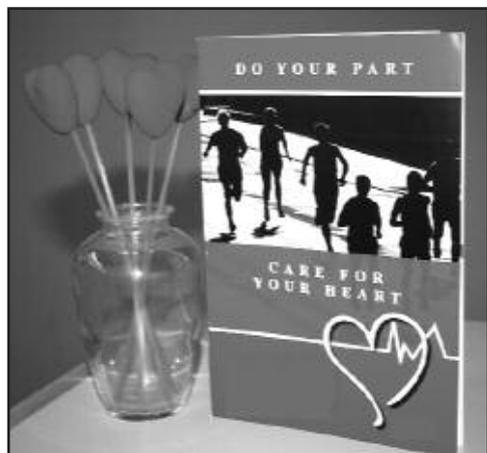

# Let's keep the beat for healthy hearts

Heart disease is the leading killer of men and women in the United States. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), in 2010 heart disease cost the United States \$316.4 billion.



February is American Heart Month.

Health professionals warn that smoking, inactivity, obesity, high cholesterol, high blood pressure, diabetes and high intake of

alcohol all increase a person's chances of developing heart disease. On average, someone in the United States suffers a heart attack every 26 seconds and every minute someone dies of a heart attack.

The National Heart Attack Alert Program notes these major signs of a heart attack:

1) Chest discomfort. Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts for more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back. The discomfort can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

2) Discomfort in other areas of the upper body. Can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

3) Shortness of breath. Often comes along with chest discomfort. But it also can occur before chest discomfort.

4) Other symptoms. May include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea, or lightheadedness.

The good news is that heart disease is preventable through lifestyle modifications!

If you stop smoking, you decrease your risk of developing heart disease. If you increase your physical activity, you strengthen your heart muscle as well as

increase your high-density lipoproteins, the “healthy form of cholesterol.”

If you make appropriate diet modifications, you can decrease your risk of developing heart disease. According to the Mayo Clinic, “limiting certain fats you eat also is important. Of the types of fat — saturated, polyunsaturated, monounsaturated and trans fat — saturated fat and trans

fat increase the risk of coronary artery disease by raising blood cholesterol levels.

Major sources of saturated fat include beef, butter, cheese, milk, and coconut and palm oils.

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# NWC examines military ethics facing officers

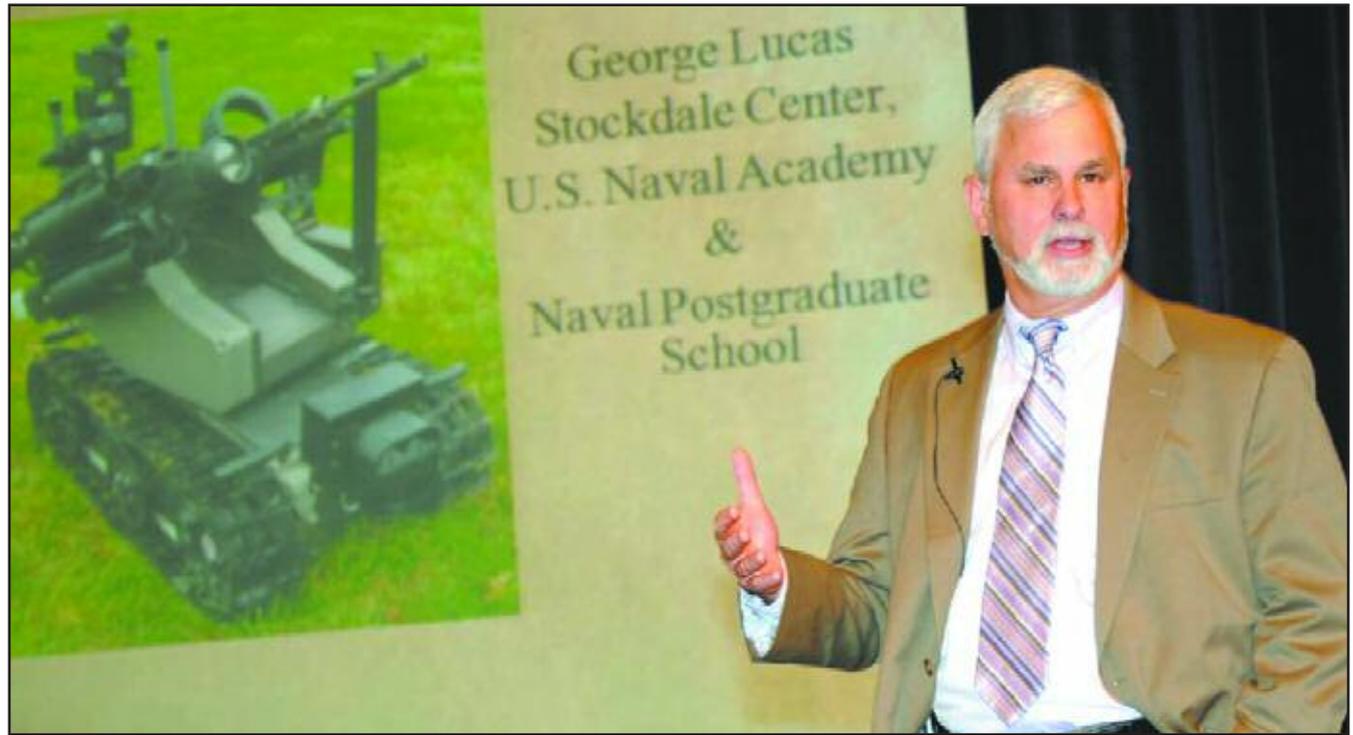
The Naval War College's (NWC) "Enduring Ethical Dilemmas" ethics conference explored the rights and responsibilities of the professional military officer, Feb. 1-3. The event is part of a three-stage ethics program that supports the overall core curriculum at NWC.

"The leadership at the Naval War College has provided us with golden opportunities to deal with military ethics throughout the academic year," said Dr. Martin Cook, Stockdale Professor of Military Ethics with the College of Operational & Strategic Leadership (COSL). "This critical issue is addressed with the entire student body during the Convocation in August and prior to graduation in

late spring. We also schedule this annual three-day event each February for the intermediate class."

Cook emphasized that each occasion is not intended as a stand-alone event, but integral to NWC's broader approach to ethics. He also noted that the ethics of warfare itself — which is a perennial theme for people conducting military operations — is for officers to think clearly about the ramifications of their behavior.

"Our core subjects usually involve civil military relations and the proper understanding of the role of the military officer as well as the ethical and moral challenges he or she faces on a daily basis," Cook added. "The intent is for the faculty to pick up on the themes and topics of these conferences and weave them

through their instruction during the year."

The conference also provides NWC with the opportunity to invite the leading academics on civil military relations to Newport to instruct the students on ethics or related issues-of-

the-day.

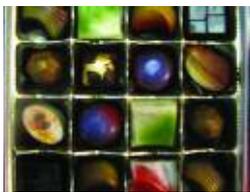
"One of the topics last year focused on 'Don't Ask-Don't Tell' during the time the U.S. government began looking into changing the policy," said Professor John Meyer, assistant dean for leadership at COSL. "We

brought in an expert on the issue to encourage our students to thoroughly debate this controversial issue."

Cook delivered this year's kickoff address, "Framing the Conference: Professional Ethics," which laid the framework for the event's

extensive agenda by examining ethics as a profession and thinking of military service in professional terms. He also provided students with reference materials for important guest presentations and **ETHICS, Page 11**

discussions.

“Breaking Ranks: Dissent and the Military Professional” by Marine Lt. Col. Andrew Milburn was distributed to students prior to a formal dialogue and panel discussion with Milburn, Dr. Richard Kohn from the University of North Carolina, and Cook. Students were also issued the book, “The Morality of War,” written by Dr. Brian Orend, director of International Studies at the University of Waterloo in Canada.

“We asked them to read the chapters which specifically addressed issues of justice after conflict,” Cook said. “His lecture specifically applied those principles directly to the situations in Afghanistan and Iraq.”

Other presentations included “Strategic Leaders: Stewards of the Profession of Arms,” “Ethics and

Emerging Military Technologies” and “Lawfare: Legal and Ethical Constraints in Modern Warfare.” The students also attended afternoon classroom seminars to recap, discuss and debate relevant issues of the day.

“These lectures, seminars and readings help students understand that they have a growing set of responsibilities

as they become senior military leaders,” Meyer said. “These obligations require that they look at ethics through the lens of the profession of arms, and not solely through the lens of a large bureaucracy.”

Meyer and Cook noted that the conference is tackling the immediate concerns of U.S. military leadership.

“Just last month the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Admiral Mullen, in an address at the National Defense University, expressed his concern over the state of the profession after nine years of war,” Meyer noted. “The program of Professional Military Ethics at the Naval War College is directly addressing his concerns and this conference is a great example of how we are taking on that challenge.”

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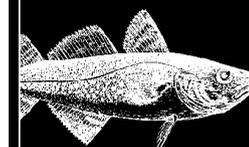

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# Guidance issued on repeal of DADT

WASHINGTON (NNS) — The Navy released *NAVADMIN 041/11* Feb. 4 to provide Sailors with additional information and guidance following the repeal of the Don't Ask, Don't Tell (DADT) policy.

The message, which is the second in what will be a series of NAVADMINS to inform leadership and Sailors on the subject, details a three-tiered approach to how training will be conducted across the U.S. Fleet in order to provide for a smooth transition once the final repeal has been issued.

The Chief of Naval Operations (CNO) has designated Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command as the executive agent for delivery and tracking of the education and training and OPNAV N1 as the executive agent for the development of content.

"The path to repeal of DADT requires informed and proactive leadership at every level. I will ensure you remain fully informed as we progress. I am counting on each of you to ensure that throughout this implementation period we do what we have always done: conduct ourselves with the highest level of professionalism and treat our ship-

mates with respect," said CNO Adm. Gary Roughead.

Command leadership teams will be used to implement training throughout the fleet, ensuring revised policies and standards of conduct are understood.

Sailors are reminded that the current DADT policy remains in effect. The final repeal will not occur until 60 days after the President, Secretary of Defense and the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs certify to Congress that the repeal can be made in a manner consistent with the standards of mili-

tary readiness, military effectiveness, unit cohesion and recruiting and retention of the Armed Forces.

were born on Feb. 12 and Feb 14, respectively. In 1926, Negro History Week was established in the second week of February because of the proximity to their birthdays.

"Woodson recognized that the freedom of a people wasn't really the result of one man," Jordan-Zachery said. Woodson, in part, was celebrating the legacy of those men who fought the good fight, she said.

She said Woodson's efforts to recognize the plight of African Americans in his day was an acknowledgement that African Americans were making conscious choices on a day-to-day basis to achieve freedom.

"Dr. King sought to change society by offering us a new set of knowledge and challenging us to ask questions," she said. The question, 'How do we know what we know?' is the link that brings Dr. King and Dr. Woodson together, she said.

"These were men of action who asked questions, sought out a different set of knowledge," she said.

Jordan-Zachery, who taught at Howard University for five years before arriving at Providence College three years ago, said she has made a distinction in the classroom between slaves and enslaved indi-

viduals.

"I don't use the word 'slaves' in my classroom," she said. It's an issue of agency. By definition, agency implies an active force, action or power.

"Slaves had no agency; they were acted upon," she said. Enslaved individuals have agency and can therefore take action while being acted upon. This is what King and Woodson were trying to impart to us, she said.

Jordan-Zachery offered the example of enslaved African American women who were very active in resisting slavery by refusing to build families born into a life of slavery.

Woodson and King were successful in their efforts, she said.

"So how do we use their teachings in our daily lives? What is left for us to do in our daily reality?" she asked rhetorically.

Jordan-Zachery offered examples of what she does to create opportunities to challenge and resist certain cultural practices and inequalities. "Magazines and television don't represent me," she said. "I don't see anything there that represents me. Feeling disempowered leads to inaction."

the exercise."

These exercises typically incorporate a scenario that provides the emergency management team with a situation in which to react. This year's exercise, like last year's drill held at Leisure Bay, will call for an active shooter to threaten

the installation.

An "active shooter" is an individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area; in most cases, active shooters use firearm (s) and there is no pattern or method to their selection

of victims.

Security and rescue personnel have plans in place to react to such a scenario, but do you know what you should do in this event? Study the Department of Homeland Security active shooter response card (on Page 2) for guidance.

than those experienced in the Pacific. This was an issue that plagued planners throughout the war and was only solved incrementally over time with missions originating from the Aleutians (1943), from China (June 1944), from the Marianas (November 1944), and finally from aircraft carriers in February 1945.

The lack of unity in the Japanese military command structure often fed into the country being ill-prepared to deal with the American onslaught. Mining of vital approaches to Japan cut off needed imports leading to a reduction of imports.

Next came the low-altitude, nighttime fire bombings of 1945, orchestrated by Curtis LeMay, a man considered instrumental and indispensable by the author. Japanese authorities had no answer for these as there were inadequate civil defense mechanisms and the little coordination between the military installations around the country.

Yet, through it all, the government refused to surrender unconditionally. What followed, of course, were the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.
