From rookie, to seasoned fire-fighting veteran, Neville Stewart, Viscon Francis and George Rookwood have climbed the ranks, and survived four decades of service to the Guantanamo Bay (GTMO) community together.

These men were the stand-outs of the rookie Firefighter class of 1968. Eager, young, intense and fearless. Over the next four decades they fought fires on this base shoulder to shoulder. With their combined 120 years of experience, they worked hard to pass down their legacy of experience and expertise to the younger men who aspire to follow in their footsteps.

NKO users beware of 'scam artists'

The Naval Education and Training Command (NETC) at Naval Air Station (NAS) Pensacola, is warning users of the Navy Knowledge Online (NKO) Web portal to be alert for an Internet phishing scam.

Network Warfare Command (NETWARCOM) issued an alert June 21 to inform network managers and NKO users of their potential vulnerability to this scheme.

The current phishing scheme claims to be from the NKO administration department and advises users of a non-existent server outage. The phony e-mail directs NKO users to a false mirror site in order to obtain users' legitimate log-on information. NKO users should not reply to the phishing e-mail or click on any associated links or buttons in the e-mail/false NAVADMIN.

"Phishing is a scheme usually generated through e-mails or pop-up ads that attempts to deceive users into divulging personally identifiable information (PII), passwords or allow access to password-protected Web portals," said Peg David, NKO program manager.

"These scam artists target individuals through their e-mail

address or using online pop-up ads and forward e-mails that appear to be from legitimate businesses or sites such as NKO," said David. "Company logos and letterheads may appear to be genuine at first glance, and this is how unsuspecting users are usually lured into helping the phishers accomplish their goals."

NKO e-mail scams were first identified in early December 2005, in an attempt to exploit vulnerabilities in Microsoft's Internet Explorer Web browser.

According to David, phishing scams are different than benign spam schemes that try to sell the user something or get them to open a link to an undesirable site.

"Phishing e-mails don't normally contain virus payloads, but spyware such as keystroke loggers and password traps may be downloaded when e-mail attachments from the phishing perpetrators are opened."

David said phishing schemes use a number of techniques to get the user to "bite." Two of the most common are spoofing, where e-mail addresses and page content ap-

pear to be from a valid source, and social engineering, when e-mails play upon human curiosity and trick the user into revealing personal data by convincing or scaring them into the desired action.

"Occasionally," David added, "the spammers will get lucky and send the user an e-mail that appears to be from an organization that they actually do business with. That's when users are most vulnerable to their schemes."

"Military and civilian computer users should know that

NKO, the Navy and most reputable businesses do not contact their customers and request them to divulge personal information or passwords in this manner," said David. "Users should react cautiously to all e-mails that attempt to get them to reveal this information and report any suspicious correspondence to the command information assurance officer immediately."

More Sea Duty Incentive Pay

Navy Personnel Command announced expansion of the Sea Duty Incentive Pay (SDIP) program June 25 in NAVADMIN 162/07, making more Sailors eligible for the extra pay. The Navy originally introduced SDIP in March, which pays up to \$750 per month extra, to give Sailors an incentive to extend their sea duty or shorten their shore tours and return to sea early.

"SDIP is a pilot program that incentivizes extensions and early return to sea, targeting certain grades and rates. We have received good results thus far," said Capt. Jim Romano, director of Enlisted Distribution Division, Navy Personnel Command. "In the process to improve this incentive, an SDIP NAVADMIN update will include additional rates and grades. Bottom line, we see it as a great tool."

The program originally included only six rates, among which, only Sailors with certain Navy Enlisted Classifications (NECs) were eligible. NAVADMIN 162/07 adds four more rates. The initial response from qualifying Sailors is good.

"I received the message while on recruiting duty," said Fire Controlman 1st Class (SW) Reginald J. Chambers, the first Sailor to receive SDIP who is now serving at sea aboard USS Ross (DDG 71). "When I saw how undermanned my NEC was at sea, I thought it would be a good chance for me to do my part for the Navy and help ease the burden for my fellow shipmates who were in need."

As the first SDIP recipient, Chambers' shipmates bring their SDIP questions to him.

"Most of them are amazed. It's like getting another enlistment bonus for a very short amount of time," he said. "Jump on it. It's a great incentive program."

"Aminah is the epitome of a dynamic trainer and a role-model."

Abdullah remained characteristically humble when nominated by her MWR and CYP team members for her contributions.

All applicants were required to demonstrate a record of outstanding accomplishment in mentorship, childhood education and development, and use of innovative methods to increase delivery of an accredited CYP system.

"She (Abdullah) has helped our program achieve NAA accreditation, NAEYC accreditation and she has worked with the teen program to provide training not only for the staff,

but also for the children," added Wicks. "She often stays late and volunteers her time to support staff working on professional development opportunities. She also works diligently with parents providing quarterly classes on information that educate them about their children and the child's development."

With 22 combined years of military service in children's programs, a master's degree in family life education, and all affirmations combined, Abdullah still looks forward to her next professional horizon.

"I would like to spend more time with families sharing what I have learned," smiled, Abdullah. "We are task with so many things, therefore it is hard sometime to figure out how implement certain programs. This award has inspired me to be humble and to continue to make myself available as much as possible to our programs and the GTMO community."



Moves an integral part of military life

Moves are not only uprooting but can also be very expensive. Take advantage of Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard resources available to you and your family, and you will have fewer out-of-pocket expenses.

A properly planned move will help prevent your budget from reflecting 'severe catch-up symptoms' during your first year in your new home.

Plan ahead. You can cut your costs!

When military duties necessitate moving, the first item you need is information about your new duty station, contact a Family Service Center for information packs and classes. Also contact your local housing re-

ferral office for information about placing your name on the waiting list for military quarters.

Inquire about the Sponsor Program through your new command. A sponsor is an invaluable information source who has already experienced the move and is settled in your new area.

In addition inquire through the Office of the Commanding Officer to obtain the name of the Command Ombudsman or key volunteer who can provide assistance in obtaining needed information.

Many people find it is less expensive to stay in the current location until plans

are firm than to live in temporary accommodations at the new location.

Use Navy Lodges (1-800-628-9466) and other military temporary lodging facilities during travel between duty stations. Plan travel to take advantage of available facilities and make your reservations as early as possible. Current lodging guides are sold in most exchanges. Information on temporary military lodging is available, free of charge, from the Naval Services FamilyLine Association.

Many motels and hotels offer military discounts. Always ask when making reservations or when checking in.


