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13 receive Wings of Gold at December Winging

Thirteen student pilots received their Wings of Gold and were designated as Naval Aviators during Training Air Wing TWO's December winging ceremony at the Captain's Club Dec. 19. The ceremony marked the end of nearly 13 months of advanced jet/strike training for the aviators at NAS Kingsville in the T-45 Goshawk. Training Air Wing TWO commander CAPT Bill Davis presided over the ceremony along with squadron skip-pers CDR Bill Bulis (VT-21) and CDR Chris Kirby (VT-22). Just over 150 family members, friends and shipmates attended the ceremony.

Guest speaker for the ceremony retired VADM John Lockard, current IDS chief operating officer for the Boeing Corporation. A seasoned aviator himself, Lockard entered the Navy as a Naval Aviation Cadet in 1964 and went through flight training at NAS Kingsville. He completed 332 combat missions during the Vietnam War and made 750 carrier landings. His command tours included "First of the Fleet" VA-25 and, VFA-125, the F/A-18 Fleet Replacement Squadron

and home of the "Rough Riders."

In his current position with Boeing, Lockard serves as the chief operating officer for Integrated Defense Systems, a \$32.1 billion, 71,000-person business unit which includes all of Boeing's defense, government, intelligence, space, and communications capabilities.

"It's a pleasure to have VADM Lockard with us today," Davis said to an audience of about 125 squadron personnel, family members and special guests. "It's a special day for him

also as he gets to assist his wife Peggy in pinning Wings of Gold on their son John who is one of the 13 aviators that will be pinned today."

During his remarks, VADM Lockard spoke about the history of aviation, overcoming shortcomings, the role of special people, the will to win, and flying in the fleet.

"The environment Naval Aviators operate in is very demanding," Lockard said, "and the equipment we use has to be able to perform to that environment. But we're fortunate to have special people who are very demanding of them-

selves and willing to do the tough jobs. Each of them must have the will to win, and the desire to perform at the very highest level."

Turning his remarks to the students, Lockard reminded them that they are part of a team. "You are all about to embark on an exciting and challenging career as Naval Aviators. Look out for each other, and know that [your crew] is counting on you getting on board the ship the very first time."

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CNO bids farewell to Campa, welcomes West

WASHINGTON (NNS) -- Chief of Naval Operations (CNO), ADM Gary Roughead, bid farewell to Master Chief Petty Officer of Navy (MCPON) Joe R. Campa Jr. and welcomed MCPON (SS/SW) Rick D. West as the Navy's 12th MCPON in a change-of-office ceremony Dec. 12.

Campa retired after 28 years of service and more than two years as the senior enlisted member of the Navy. Roughead said Campa has displayed extraordinary leadership, keen insight and sound judgment during his career.

"Master Chief Petty Officer Campa's accomplishments as a leader however, are matched by his stature as a warfighter. As a Fleet Marine Force Corpsman, he served alongside Sailors and Marines in peace and war," Roughead said.

CNO said Campa should be proud of his many contributions and accomplishments while he served as the 11th MCPON, from deckplate leadership to empowering the Navy's senior enlisted community.

"With a singular drive he infused in our chief petty officers' mess a renewed spirit of heritage, service, and high standards. He formed the MCPON's Leadership Mess to coalesce fleetwide chiefs around those renewed standards and expectations. He created and enforced The Chief Petty Officer Mission, Vision and Guiding Principles," Roughead said.

CNO said Campa was also his trusted advisor and helped him transition into his position as the Chief of Naval Operations. He talked of traveling with Campa to the Persian Gulf, Iraq and Afghanistan.

Student aviators conduct first carrier landings aboard USS Abraham Lincoln

USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN, at sea (NNS) -- For the first time since 2004, USS Abraham Lincoln's (CVN 72) flight deck served as a training ground for student pilots flying the Navy's advanced jet training aircraft, the T-45 Goshawk, Dec. 10-13.

Student aviators assigned to Training Air Wing TWO (TW-2) training squadrons VT-21 and VT-22, and Training Air Wing One (TW-1) squadrons VT-7 and VT-9 based in Meridian, Miss., flew aboard Dec. 10 for four days of initial carrier qualifications off the coast of southern California. For these new pilots, the arrested landings and catapult launches they completed aboard Lincoln are the culmination of 11-13 months of intense flight training.

"This is the first jet they've flown, and it's their first time on a carrier," said LCDR Mark Schadt, Chief of Naval Air Training's (CNATRA) senior landing signal officer (LSO). "They've spent the last 11 months learning to fly the T-45 and before that they flew T-34s (a propeller driven trainer) for up to 10 months. This is one of the last things they'll have to do before they go to a Fleet Replacement Squadron (FRS) and learn to fly their assigned fleet aircraft."

After the training wing's arrival and early qualification flights Thursday, students gathered in Lincoln's ready room to critique their landings with LSOs like Schadt. Many were still visibly excited from their first "traps" and conversations were animated as student pilots reenacted their final seconds before hitting the deck.

"It's a totally surreal experience," said 1st Lt. David Fickle, a prior-enlisted Marine assigned to "Eagles" of VT-7, who completed his first arrested landing aboard Lincoln Dec. 10. "I had seen all the videos and documentaries on the military channel, but when you actually get here, it's not like anything you perceived. Coming in, everything on the deck -- the planes, the people -- looks so much smaller, and then you definitely know it when you catch the wire. It's a huge adrenaline rush."

Fickle said that despite all the practice and instruction students receive flying carrier landing patterns and approaches at their home fields, nothing can fully prepare a pilot for the task of catching a wire on the comparatively tiny deck of a carrier while it's in motion. In the ultra-competitive environment of naval aviation, students who had distinguished themselves flying over land found themselves, quite literally, in the same boat with everyone else.

"You develop a certain pride in competition, and I was in the upper echelon flying 'the ball' at the field," said Fickle. "But for me and a lot of others, this was a big punch in the guts. Today I was boltering like crazy, and I don't know if it was from the lens being a lot farther in front of me or seeing all the

people and planes parked out there, but it was a very humbling experience."

Despite the sweat-drenched, white-knuckle landings, Shadt and Fickle both described launching from a steam-powered catapult for the first time as a more memorable experience.

"Most of the students are so focused flying the approach and getting their numbers right that they barely remember the landings, but for the launch they're just kind of along for the ride," said Schadt. "If you've ever been to Magic Mountain at Six Flags in California, they have a Superman ride there. It's a lot like the Superman ride."

The Boeing T-45 Goshawk is the U.S. Navy's version of the British Aerospace Hawk. Using the same airframe, it incorporates aspects of the F/A-18's avionics suite and the ability to land on an aircraft carrier to better prepare pilots to fly the Navy's premier fighter aircraft. One pilot who trained aboard Lincoln has experience in both the Hawk and the Goshawk.

LT Stephen Collins is an exchange pilot who has flown the Hawk for the British Royal Navy and is now training in the Goshawk with the "Tigers" of VT-9. Collins and four student pilots from India flew aboard Lincoln to train, as they have for the entire curriculum, alongside their U.S. counterparts. His goal is to qualify to the same standard as U.S. pilots so that he can fly U.S. F/A-18E/F Super Hornets as part of his exchange program.

"The U.S. and the Royal Navy have worked together very closely on the Joint Strike Fighter program," said Collins. "The ultimate aim is for us to get some experience flying a jet with very similar capabilities to that one. It's a good trade, the U.S. gets a pilot out of it and the Royal Navy gets the experience."

While student pilots of Training Air Wings 1 and 2 worked to overcome their inexperience, for Lincoln's flight deck and air traffic control personnel, the challenge was putting their own experience to work and avoiding complacency.

"For most of the people up there right now, having just completed a 7-month deployment, it's almost business as usual," said LT Cory Pope, a

catapult and arresting gear officer and Lincoln's V-5 division officer. "We just had to be a little extra cautious and remember that these folks had never done this before. We wanted to keep them safe too."

Naval Safety Center launches joint service winter safety campaign

NORFOLK (NNS) -- The Naval Safety Center, in conjunction with the Army Combat Readiness Center and the Air Force Safety Center, launched a joint winter safety campaign Dec. 1.

Last year, six Sailors and Marines did not live to see the end of the holiday season because they were killed on the highway. While motor vehicle mishaps continue to be the biggest killer of Sailors and Marines, there are other risks associated with the winter months.

Each service's safety Web site will contain resources such as videos, presentations, articles and posters that can be used in command safety standdowns. The Navy's information is located at www.safetycenter.navy.mil/seasonal/winter08/index.asp.

The campaign contains information on drunk, fatigued, and winter driving, as well as winter recreation safety and holiday risk management. The information is designed to be shared with family and



friends as well as service members.

"The holidays are a time to celebrate with loved ones, but they are also a time of increased risk," said Col. Mark Vanous, deputy commander of the Naval Safety Center. "More of our Sailors and Marines are on the highways during this time and many are driving long hours to get to their destinations, which increases the odds that tragedy may strike. Risk management can make the difference between coming back to work safely after the New Year or winding up as a statistic."

The Joint Service Winter Safety Campaign runs through the end of the winter season.

The campaign material is intended to provide leaders with the tools they need to educate their young Sailors and Marines, as well as Soldiers and Airmen, about risks that affect us all. These tools will be updated throughout the holiday season, so NSC recommends checking the Web site often, along with the links to the resources provided by the other services.

2009 Naval Leader Development Guide now available

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (NNS) -- The Center for Personal and Professional Development (CPPD) completed the 2009 edition of the Naval Leader Development Guide (NLDG) and posted it to Navy Knowledge Online (NKO) Dec. 4.

"In this year's edition of the guide, you will find not only the annual calendar with important dates every naval leader should know but a host of other resources that will help in your day-to-day activities," said CAPT Jonathan Picker, CPPD commanding officer. "From course listings that Sailors can use to further their development to planning worksheets Sailors can use to organize professional growth. I hope everyone will find this guide a useful tool."

NLDG brings together myriad information. This year's edition includes a 15-month calendar (January 2009-March 2010); a complete list of CPPD courses and services; Navy and Marine Corps selection board and fitness report and evaluation schedules; and the Navy and Marine Corps Professional Reading Program lists. Also returning is the personal and professional development section, which includes planning steps; goal development assistance and worksheets; and the mentoring compass.

"It is a unique privilege to work on a project like the NLDG each year, knowing that the information we're providing is being used by Sailors every day," said Master Chief (SW) Gretchen Boals, CPPD command master chief. "Every time we visit our learning site or Navy college office host commands and bases and see the guide in use, I know we're making an impact in the lives of our Sailors."
