

## Read retires from Navy; career included two Panama City tours

**PANAMA CITY, FL** - Lt. David A. "Tony" Read retired from the United States Navy on Sept. 23 after more than 21 years of service. Read was the Assistant Officer in Charge at the Naval Support Activity Panama City.

Lt. Read took charge of the Port Operations Dept. when NSA PC was first established in October 2003, where he oversaw the third busiest port in Navy's Southeast region, with 180 ship movements during its first year.

"When we stood up NSA PC, it was an incredibly challenging time for those of us who took the task. It took a big-time team effort to stand up a brand new activity and provide base operating support for this in-

stallation," Read said, crediting the dedicated and professional personnel who worked along side of him.

"The jewel of being stationed here," continued the Lieutenant, "is that no community in the country treats the military better than the citizens of Bay County. They treat the military with respect and dignity and make you feel welcome and appreciated." Read learned this first-hand, representing the activity on numerous military, governmental, and civic committees including the State of Florida's Military Family Transition Group. He utilized his Navy experience and surface warfare knowledge in playing an integral role in the commissioning of the *USS*

As the Assistant Officer in Charge of NSA PC, as well as the head of Command Administration, he was responsible for managing the day-to-day operations of more than 300 mili-

tary and civilian employees and a budget of more than \$1.2 million.

Read enlisted in the Navy in 1984, and served as an Electrician's Mate until his commissioning as an ensign in 1995. He had been stationed in Panama City Florida's then-named Naval Coastal Systems Center from 1990-1992, where he was selected as the Naval Sea Systems Command Sailor of the Year in 1991.

Read's other assignments included the *USS Preble* (DDG 46), *USS John Rodgers* (DD 983), *USS John F. Kennedy* (CV 67) and the Military Entrance Processing Station in Charlotte, NC. His



## Navy SAVI program protects victims of sexual assault

According to Department of Defense statistics on sexual assaults involving members of the Armed Forces, criminal investigators received 1,700 allegations of sexual assault worldwide in 2004. These allegations included 1,275 incidents involving a service member as a victim and 1,305 incidents involving a service member as an alleged offender.

The Navy was the first service to have a dedicated, funded program for sexual assault. The Navy Sexual Assault Victim Intervention (SAVI) Program offers a standardized, consistent, victim sensitive system to prevent and respond to sexual assault, promoting awareness, prevention education, victim advocacy, and data collection.

Victims of sexual assault have two basic alternatives in reporting incidents of sexual assault. **Restricted** reporting to designated personnel, such



as the Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC), a victim advocate, healthcare personnel, or Chaplain, will not be disclosed to the command or to law enforcement, with specified exceptions. Access to medical care, advocacy, intervention, infor-

mation and support will be provided. This option is recommended for victims of sexual assault who wish to confidentially disclose the crime to specifically identified individuals and receive medical treatment and counseling without triggering the official investigative process.

**Unrestricted** reports of allegations can be made to your chain of command, NCIS, health care personnel, or SARC and will be investigated. This option is recommended for victims of sexual assault who desire medical treatment, counseling and an

# Recognizing POW-MIA remembrance day

As you dined at the Seashore General Mess recently, you may have noticed a small table in a place of honor. This is the story behind that table.

It is set for one. This table is our way of symbolizing the fact that members of our profession of arms are missing from our midst. They are commonly called POWs or MIAs. They are unable to be with us now and so we remember them.

This table set for one is small, symbolizing the frailty of one prisoner alone against his oppressors.

The tablecloth is white, symbolizing the purity of their intentions to respond to their country's call to arms.

The single red rose displayed in a vase reminds us of the families and loved ones of our comrades-in-arms who keep the faith awaiting their return.

The red ribbon tied so prominently on the vase is reminiscent of the red ribbon worn upon the lapel and breasts of thousands who bear witness to their unyielding determination to demand a proper accounting of our missing.

The candle is lit, symbolizing the upward reach of their unconquerable spirit.

A slice of lemon is on the bread plate to remind us of their bitter fate.

There is salt upon the bread plate, symbolic of the families' tears as they wait.

The glass is inverted — they cannot toast with us today.

The chair is empty. They are not here.

All of you who served with them and called them comrades, who depended upon their might and aid, and relied upon them, for surely, they have not forsaken you... Remember! Until the day they come home, Remember!

official investigation of the crime, but details regarding the incident will be limited to only those personnel who have a legitimate need to know.

SH1(SW) Duane White is the SARC for the Naval Support Activity Panama City. His job is to help the victim. If you know someone who is a victim of sexual abuse and does not understand 'restricted' and 'unrestricted' reporting, have them contact SH1 White at the Bachelor Enlisted Quarters at 234-4268. He will assign a trained Victim Advocate to assist

the victim.

Each tenant command will have a SAVI Command Liaison and a point of contact, with SH1 White coordinating the activities for the entire installation, including all Victims Advocates. SH1 White provided leadership training to NSA PC and all tenant commands, as well as and first-responders in Security, NCIS, Medical, Chaplain's office, and Fire Department/EMS personnel. SH1 White has also trained the first group of Volunteer Victim Advocates in August, with a second group

scheduled to receive training in October.

The Navy does not tolerate sexual assault and has implemented a comprehensive policy that reinforces a culture of prevention, response and accountability to ensure the safety, dignity and well being of all members of the Armed Forces. Our men and women serving throughout the world and here at NSA PC deserve nothing less, and I am committed to maintaining a workplace environment that rejects sexual assault and attitudes that promote such behaviors.
