

VQ wins industry's highest award

Naval Support Activity Panama City, Fla. - The Seashore Inn Visitors Quarters and Bachelor Housing at NSA PC received the lodging industry's highest award for training in a ceremony at the International Hotel and Restaurant Show in New York City November 12, 2005.

The Seashore Inn received the prestigious Meritorious Award for maintaining an aggressive and comprehensive

professional training program since 1996. This is only the second award to the Navy and only the third within the Department of Defense.

"The entire team has worked diligently to constantly improve their customer service and problem solving skills," said Mark Sokoloski, the Housing Installation Program Manager for NSA PC.

"They have committed to ensuring they are the best at what they do," Sokoloski said, upon receiving the award.

In order to win the Meritorious Award, the VQ had to be a previous winner of the Gold Pineapple Award which has utilized Performance Plus for a minimum of six years and has continued to measure and evaluate attainment of performance standards, while conducting a variety of other training activities.

Naval Support Activity Panama City, Fla. - A contract company for Public Works has contracted a trapper to catch a coyote that has been seen on base. Lewis Pest Control, a subcontractor for Trusted Hands, has hired Johnny Harris, and his son Michael Harris, trappers licensed through the

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission to capture the coyote in a live, or non-lethal, trap.

Harris warns that if you should happen upon the trap to avoid it. While the trap is not dangerous, the scent left by the curious could ward off the coyote.

"We won't kill the animal," said the younger Harris, "we'll

Naval Air Station, Jacksonville Fla. - Rear Adm. Mark Boensel assumed command of Navy Region Southeast during a change of command ceremony Dec. 9 in Hangar 116. He relieved Rear Adm. Annette Brown, who had been the region's commander since October 2002. Adm. John Nathman, commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command, was the guest speaker.

"Rear Adm. Brown did a great job supporting the 24/7 operation of fighting the war on terrorism and I know Rear Adm. Boensel will continue to set high standards for this region," Nathman said.

During her speech, Brown praised the commitment and

A native of Cambridge, Mass., Boensel grew up in Southern California and graduated from the United States Naval Academy in 1978. He underwent flight training and was designated a naval flight officer in 1979. He has accumulated more than 3,200 flight hours and more than 600 carrier arrested landings.

From June 1999 until January 2001, he served on the staff of Commander, Naval Air Force, and United States Pacific Fleet as the executive assistant to the commander. Boensel as-

sumed command of NAS Jacksonville in April 2001. During that tour, he was selected for promotion to the rank of rear admiral. In July 2004, Boensel returned to Washington, D.C., becoming the director of the Chief of Naval Operations Environmental Readiness Division (N45).

Brown, who calls home wherever her husband Pete is, plans to spend her retirement sailing around the world with him.



In particular, Horton described how the system deploys the AN/AQS-20A – an underwater towed body – from CSTRS. The AN/AQS-20A is a high-speed, helicopter-towed minehunting system equipped with electro-optic identification sensors.

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Honorable Dr. Winter takes office as 74th SECNAV

the position and serve as our SECNAV.

The 74th Secretary of the Navy was sworn into office on Jan. 3, 2006. Dr. Donald Winter is the new SECNAV and will lead America's Navy and Marine Corps Team. He is now responsible for an annual budget in excess of \$125 billion and almost 900,000 people.

In his first message to the fleet, Winter mentioned his five priorities, focusing on the first.

"People are our most valuable asset," he said, "Nothing can play so decisive a role as well-trained, highly motivated Sailors and Marines who believe in their mission."

He went on to say that he is honored to take on

Prior to joining the administration of President George W. Bush, Winter served as a corporate vice president and president of Northrop Grumman's Mission Systems sector. In that position, he oversaw operation of the business and its 18,000 employees. Winter also served on the company's corporate policy council.

Previously, Winter served as president and CEO of TRW Systems; vice president and deputy general manager for group development of TRW's Space & Electronics business; and vice president and general manager of the defense systems division of TRW. From 1980 to 1982, he was with the

Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency as program manager.

The SECNAV is responsible for all the affairs of the Department of the

Navy, including recruiting, organizing, supplying, equipping, training, mobilizing, and demobilizing. The Secretary also oversees the construction, outfitting, and repair of naval ships, equipment and facilities. The office is also responsible for the formulation and implementation of naval policies and programs that are consistent with the national security policies and objectives established by the President and the Secretary of Defense. The Department of the Navy consists of two uniformed Services: the United States Navy and the United States Marine Corps.

Winter said he plans to address his other four priorities; the global war on terrorism, shipbuilding, the

2005 QDR implementation, and BRAC implementation in the months ahead.

Winter earned a bachelor's degree (with highest distinction) in physics from the University of Rochester in 1969. He received a master's degree and a doctorate in physics from the University of Michigan in 1970 and 1972, respectively. He is a 1979 graduate of the USC Management Policy Institute, a 1987 graduate of the UCLA Executive Program, and a 1991 graduate of the Harvard University Program for Senior Executives in National and International Security. In 2002, he was elected a member of the National Academy of Engineering.

Participation in Professional Certification and Distance Learning programs must also be continual.

The training program at NSAPC includes Distance Learning, a professional certification program, and regular training sessions that focus on topics ranging from customer service to emergency operations.

“Every eligible member of our staff has attained a professional certification,” said Barbara Lucas, the training coordinator and front desk manager.

“I believe that is one reason our staff continues to be one of the most highly trained and certified staffs in the Navy,” said Lucas

catch it and then turn him loose north of West Bay.”

“We will check and rebait the trap every day or two, and make sure no other animals have been caught in the trap,” said Johnny Harris.

Harris urges residents of the base to keep their dogs in-heat indoors, because coyotes can breed with domesticated animals.

He also warns residents to not go near the animal; even if it is wounded, it could be dangerous.

Trashcan lids should be secured to prevent the coyote, or other animals, from being attracted to contents, said Kevin Hall, security director of NSA PC.

The bear that was sighted on Vernon Ave. in front of the Navy Exchange has not been seen

since Dec. 22, said Hall.

“We believe the bear has moved on,” said Hall.

After the sighting, security increased police presence in the housing area, but were instructed to only report on any further sightings of the bear and not interact.

Again, security strongly urges that no one should attempt to interact with the bear, or leave food where the bear could get at it, should it return. Security has also been instructed to not interact with

the bear unless there is imminent threat to themselves or housing residents, said Hall.

Any sightings of the wild animals should be reported to security immediately, said Hall.

Make sure your children know that they should not go up to strange dogs or other animals. Dogs should be kept on a leash. The base does have a leash law.

There are no plans to place a bear trap.

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NSWC engineer jumps at chance to help Marines

Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City Diving Systems Branch is developing a helmet-mounted, GPS-based navigation system for the US Marine Corps. Force Recon personnel will use this system during High-Altitude/High-Opening (HAHO) clandestine parachute insertion missions. The system outputs real time navigation data to a graphics micro-display embedded inside the jumper's goggles. The graphics are simple—a compass rosette indicates the direction to the selected landing zone—and altitude, speed, distance to target, and other critical navigation data is also displayed. It's a challenging task—the Marines need a lightweight rugged system that is reliable, accurate, easy

to use, and fully compatible with military jump operations... and they would understandably like to interface with someone who knows something about parachute flight, night jumps, and high altitude parachute operations.

They got the right guy for the job.

Meet Kirk VanZandt, an NSWC PC systems engineer with a master parachuting license, 15 years of experience including over 1500 jumps, five world records, and three national competition medals. He's also the Systems Engineer on the project.

"I can vouch for his ability to fly", says Pat Lindner, a local jumper and teammate who has seen Kirk's progress over the years. "Kirk began skydiving in the early 90s at a military parachute club at Fort Rucker, Alabama. In the spring of 1993 he

began training in Canopy Relative Work, also known as CRW or "canopy stacking". CRW is a type of skydiving where the jumpers attach themselves to one another by wrapping their feet around the lines of the

canopy below them. He immediately became hooked, and in the years since has attended and instructed at dozens of CRW camps in the United States, Brazil, and Puerto Rico. Earlier this year Kirk was selected for the Canopy Formation World Team, a group of 91 handpicked jumpers from 10 countries. Over the Thanksgiving holidays they met for a week in Lake Wales Florida, and after a series of 18 jumps finally built an 81-person formation just seconds before a gorgeous sunset. The very next morning they added four more and built an 85-way; two remarkable achievements to be included in the next

Guinness Book of World Records."

"The Marines have a lot of respect for Kirk's experience and expertise", states Dennis Gallagher, the USMC HAHO-PNS Project Engineer. "During one of the field tests of the prototype systems (at an undisclosed desert training facility), some of the Marines testing the system were having difficulty with their freefall formation flying techniques. Although Kirk was not able to actually jump with the Marines, he listened to them describe the flying problems they were having, and was able to offer suggestions on how to improve. The Marines implemented his instructions with tremendous success in subsequent jumps during the test. Kirk's stock with the Marines rose a lot that day."

The USMC HAHO-PNS Project will complete final design and development this fiscal year, with tentative plans for FY 2007 procurement and fielding. USMC HAHO-PNS Project Team at NSWC: Rich Manley (software engineer), Bill Hughes (electronics engineer), Dennis Gallagher (project engineer), Kirk VanZandt (systems engineer), Gram Holmes (mechanical engineer).



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In Memoriam HAROLD M. 'MACK' LACEY



Harold M. "Mack" Lacey of Panama City, Fla., died surrounded by many loving family members and friends. Mack was born in Montezuma, Ga., on Aug. 25, 1937. He is survived by his wife, Ann Maloy Lacey; his children, Paige Riddle, Leigh Ann Queirolo, Hal Lacey. Lacey came to Panama City in 1961 at which time he

was employed as a physicist by the Navy's Mine Defense Laboratory. Over a career spanning 32 years, he participated in research, development, test and evaluation efforts focused on the development of naval warfare systems. He went on a one-year term assignment to the University of Florida where he earned a master's degree in engineering. In June 1974, he moved into technical management when he became head of the Mine Countermeasures Department. In 1982 he became a member of the Senior Executive Service Corps with his selection as head of the Systems Department. He served as head of the Undersea Countermeasures Department and the Coastal Warfare Systems Department. At the time of his retirement from civil service in 1994, he was head of the Coastal Engineering Test and Operations Department. Under his technical and managerial leadership, numerous major Navy mine countermeasures, torpedo countermeasures, amphibious warfare and special warfare systems were either developed and fielded, or significantly upgraded. Lacey was well known throughout the Navy for his superior technical leadership and professionalism, his expertise as a systems engineering manager and for his unique organizational skills. Funeral services were held Dec. 23, 2005 at the Wilson Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. Bruce Raley officiating. Interment followed in the Forest Lawn Cemetery.
