## RONEX ends and sails right into GOMEX

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY PANAMA CITY, Fla. – As two NSA PC pusher boats gently guide the USS Chief (MCM-14) into a position to dock in the Alligator Bayou on April 30, the Squadron Exercise came to an end. Monday they'd be back out for the next exercise, Gulf of Mexico Exercise '06.

"It's always a pleasure to come here and run our exercises", said Cmdr. Vernon Neuenschwander, chief staff officer of Mine Countermeasures Three (COMCMRONTHREE).

The support and personal attention is top notch, he said.

With so many other ships in Ingleside to take care of, it's hard to get the sort of undivided attention you get when you come to Panama City, said Neuenschwander.

"You can't beat the technical expertise they provide here, either," he said, noting that much of the equipment they use is built and tested here.

With the conclusion of RONEX, the GOMEX began Monday as the

advanced training phase for everyone involved with mine countermeasures, said Neuenschwander.

The exercise involves the triad of mine hunting to work in conjunction to hunt mines out at sea, using ships

on the surface, helicopters in the air, and vessels undersea. The GOMEX concludes Tuesday.



# HURREX log provides “future shock” for upcoming season

The countdown to Hurricane Season is less than one month!

Naval Support Activity Panama City and its tenants got a jump on the season even earlier this year than in '05, conducting a successful Hurricane Exercise April 24 through today. This HURREX gave everyone on the activity an opportunity to review their Standard Operating Procedures for tropical storms, making sure each person knows his or her responsibilities in the various conditions of readiness as a storm approaches. The recent base-wide cleanup helped us prepare for the season by getting rid of a lot of the excess material around the base that could turn into missile hazards in high winds. We're much farther ahead now that we were this time last year.

Katrina helped us all realize that our preparedness levels were inadequate for what could really happen if a serious storm hit us directly.

Emergency Manager and Meteorologist Lt. Charlie Cutshaw added a graphic sense of realism to his reports to the base during this exercise. For those of you who did not monitor the course of events here are a few excerpts from his

running commentary:

“If this were a real storm, the base would be evacuated and you would not be getting this email. I want to impress on everyone how important planning ahead and preparation are. We are currently seeing effects from the outer rain bands. Winds are on the order of 20-30 knots with heavy downpours and lightning. If you planned on

evacuating, you should have left last night. The roads out are backed up. Gas stations are out of gas. Stores are out of batteries and water. It is now too late to make hotel reservations anywhere within 100 miles of here especially to the east.”

“(The first hurricane of the exercise) is still a CAT 4 hurricane. The forecast has it weakening but it is still unpredictable... This is a very dangerous storm. We could see 15-18 feet of surge with 8-10 foot wind waves on top of that. (For reference, we saw 6.5-foot surge and 3-foot waves with Dennis last year) The forecast track takes it just south of us but only by a few miles... this is still a direct hit. We are also on the worst side of the storm. I would not be surprised to see 110 knots (127mph)

sustained winds. Onset of 50-knot (55mph) winds is expected at 1700 (5PM) local today. This is when the bridges will close.”

“I would recommend that the Emergency Operations Center be evacuated, the base gate locked and

EOC personnel evacuate to higher ground. This storm is too strong and unpredictable for anyone to remain on base. We would return after the storm passed to begin recovery efforts. This storm would significantly change our daily routine here.”

Lt. Cutshaw said that this exercise actually turned out to be a small storm, but because of its track and the length of time we saw destructive winds, we realized

many impacts from storm surge. High tide occurred during the peak winds. We saw about 12 hours of 50-knot winds pushing water in St Andrew Bay northwestward toward NSA and North Lagoon. He made some educated guesses on impacts but this scenario is entirely possible. Do not assume that because a storm is small we will be OK. Most deaths in hurricanes occur from storm surge. Assumptions can get

you killed. In summary, his main point was, “If you have not been planning already, you are in deep trouble.” Lt. Cutshaw encouraged us to please take these thoughts home with us this weekend and begin planning for your evacuation. In the past we may have taken the attitude of what to do “if” a major hurricane hits. I think last year proved to all of us that we have to have a mindset of “when.”

# Political activities of military personnel

The April 21 *From the Bridge* provided guidance for government personnel getting involved in political activities. Here is the specific guidance on permitted and prohibited political activities for military personnel.

1. Political Activities of Military Members. Generally, the Hatch Act, 5 U.S.C. §§ 7321-7326, outlines the scope of permissible political activities for Government employees. Military members, however, are not covered by the Hatch Act but instead are governed by DODD 1344.10. This directive outlines permissible, as well as prohibited conduct and offers numerous examples.

a. Applicability. DODD 1344.10 applies to members on "active duty," defined as "[f]ull-time duty in the active Military Service of the United States without regard to duration or purpose" and includes duty such as full-time and annual training duty, attendance at a service school, and title 10 National Guard duty.

**b. Permissible Activities.**

(1) Register, vote, and express personal opinions on political candidates and issues.

(2) Offer monetary contributions to a political organization.

(3) Attend partisan and nonpartisan political meetings or rallies as a spectator and **not in uniform**.

**c. Prohibited Activities.**

(1) Wrongful Influence. Members on active duty may not use official authority or influence to interfere with an election, affect the course or outcome of an election, solicit votes for a particular candidate or issue, or require/solicit political contributions from others.

(2) Civil Office. Section 973 of title 10, U.S. Code, restricts officers on active duty from holding or exercising the functions of civil office. This statute applies to regular officers on the active-duty list as well as retirees and reservists serving on active duty for more than 270 days. Restrictions for this later group are effective on the first day of executing orders in excess of 270 days.

(3) Participation in Partisan Political Activity. Active duty members may not participate in partisan political management, campaigns, or conventions. DODD 1344.10 defines "partisan political activity" as "[a]ctivity supporting or relating to candidates representing, or issues specifically identified with, national or State political parties and associated or ancillary organizations." This definition does not include

activity related to candidates or issues not associated with national or state political parties, constitutional amendments, referenda, municipal ordinances, and other issues of a similar character. Furthermore, this restriction does not prohibit personal participation in local nonpartisan political activities. Specific types of partisan political activity are further discussed below.

(a) Writing. Active duty members may not publish, or allow to be published, partisan political articles written or signed by the member and soliciting votes for or against a partisan politi-

cal party or candidate. They may write letters to the editor expressing personal views on public issues or political candidates as long as these letters are not part of an organized letter-writing campaign or concerted solicitation of votes for or against a partisan political party, cause, or candidate. So long as it is done as a private citizen and without further obligations to engage in partisan political activity, members may sign petitions for specific legislative action or to place a candidate's name on an official election ballot.

(b) Political Clubs, Meetings, and Parades.

While in their private capacity active duty members may join partisan political clubs and attend their meetings (not in uniform). They may not serve in an official capacity or be listed as a sponsor. Additionally, members may not march or ride in partisan political parades.

(c) Speaking. Active duty members may not speak before partisan political gatherings to promote a partisan political party or candidate. Likewise, active duty members may not participate in radio, television, or other programs



# The value, meaning of courage: physical vs. moral

This week's character trait for discussion is courage. This is one of the Navy's three core values – honor, courage, and commitment. Courage conjures up pictures in our minds of brave men and women facing life-threatening situations, no matter what the cost.

Perhaps it is the bravery of the men at the battle of the Alamo, who fought for what they believed in even though facing almost certain death. Perhaps scenes from *Saving Private Ryan*, or other similar movies come to mind, when soldiers bravely faced bullets and shrapnel for their comrades and their country.

More recently, we have the example of those passengers aboard United Flight 93 who willingly gave their lives to keep an airplane from being used to bomb a Washington D.C. site on September 11, 2001. This

type of courage is physical courage – being willing to put your physical well-being at risk to accomplish a mission.

There is another type of courage, however, that is just as much, if not more important. That courage is moral courage. Without moral courage, the physical courage will probably not be there, either. Moral courage is having the character to do the right thing even when it is not popular. Hugh Thompson was one of those people.

On March 16, 1968, Thompson, a helicopter pilot, stopped the My Lai massacre by putting his helicopter down between the Vietnamese villagers and the U.S. Army soldiers. He confronted the leader of the Army platoon and coaxed civilians out of hiding to be flown to safety. He successfully stopped any further killing.



You might think that this should not have taken any courage to stop unlawful killing of civilians, but as a result of his actions, Thompson was hated by many in the Army. For many years, his actions were not applauded, but scorned. It was not until the late 1980's

that attitudes towards him began to change, and the Service Academies started having him come in and speak about military ethics. It was not until 1998 that he and his crew mates were awarded the prestigious Soldier's Medal by the U.S. Army.

Army Major General Michael Ackerman put it best when he said, "It was the ability to do the right thing even at the risk of their personal safety that guided these soldiers to do what they did... [the three] set the standard for all soldiers to follow." Moral courage is more than putting your life on the line; it is doing the right thing without worrying about the consequences.

So the question is, how do we build courage? Physical courage, in my opinion cannot be taught. It proceeds from moral courage, therefore, it is simply the actions demonstrating

who you are on the inside. Moral courage comes from knowing what you believe and holding unwaveringly to those beliefs. We live in an age where that is not popular.

Postmodern philosophy would tell us that there is no truth, no right or wrong, and that you can believe anything that you want to. The problem is that there is right and wrong, and it takes courage to stand up for what is right.

Through our religious traditions, our upbringing, our education, we may come to slightly different beliefs about what is right or wrong; but ultimately there will be beliefs that are truly right and truly wrong. Developing moral courage is developing that belief system to the point that your integrity is so high that when confronted with a situation where it is easier to do the wrong thing, you will still do what is right.

or group discussions as an advocate of a partisan political party or candidate. They may, however, promote and encourage others to exercise their right to vote.

(d) Conducting Surveys/Distributing Literature. Active duty members may not conduct political opinion surveys for a partisan political group.

(e) Using Contemptuous Words. Under Article 88, UCMJ, it is a crime for a commissioned officer to use contemptuous words against the President, Vice President, Congress, SECDEF, service secretaries, Secretary of Transportation, or Governor or legislature of any state, territory, commonwealth, or possession in which the officer is on duty or present. While this provision applies only to commissioned officers, DODD

1344.10 extends this rule to enlisted personnel as well.

(f) Providing Clerical Assistance. Active duty members may not perform clerical or other duties for partisan political committees during a campaign or on Election Day. For example, members may not distribute partisan political literature or stuff envelopes in support of a political campaign.

(g) Fundraising. While on Federal property, active duty members may not solicit or engage in fundraising for partisan political causes or candidates. Additionally, they may not sell tickets for, or actively promote, political dinners and similar fundraising events.

(h) Signs and Bumper Stickers on Private Vehicles. While active duty members may not display large

political signs, banners, or posters on their private vehicles, **they may place a political bumper sticker on the same.**

(i) Transporting Voters to Polls. Active duty members may not participate in organized efforts by partisan political parties or candidates to transport voters to the polls.

d. Additional Requirements. While engaged in permissible partisan political activity, active duty members must avoid wearing their uniform, participating in activities likely to bring discredit on the armed forces, using Government resources to further political activities, or acting in any manner suggesting Government involvement.
