

NSWC PC supports GOMEX with expertise

PANAMA CITY, Fla. - The Navy's Mine Warfare community organized air, surface, and underwater mine countermeasures assets to conduct the Gulf of Mexico Exercise May 1-9 in the coastal waters of Panama City, Fla.

GOMEX trains and assesses MCM mission readiness and operational capabilities and is a regular part of the Navy's advanced-phase MIW pre-deployment preparations.

"I have to commend Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City for outstanding support," said Capt. Jonathan Tobias, commander of Mine Countermeasures Squadron 3. "Not only are the waters

here ideal for testing airborne, surface and sub-surface forces, but we also have most of our technical mine warfare experts resident in a centralized geographical area."

NSWC PC Branch Head for Airborne Fleet Readiness Allen Hawkins, who also serves as in-service engineering agent for Airborne MCM systems, described NSWC PC's wealth of expertise as one-stop-shopping for this type of naval preparation.

"Collectively speaking, my personnel have approximately 319 years of Airborne MCM experience. So, our community of scientists and technical experts are serving as a dependable and constant knowledge base for the Navy's sailors who will be MCM trained; but, may likely rotate out of

Distracted drivers, seat belt usage a big concern

The Security Department has increased their efforts to heighten safety awareness aboard Naval Support Activity Panama City.

There is renewed emphasis on not wearing seat belts, improper use of cell phones, illegal parking (especially on

the grass), citing drivers for failure to stop at intersections, and not following designated speed limits. The Security Department is tasked with these as key areas for enforcement.

Members of the Security Department have kept base employees apprised of the regulations upon entering the Thomas Drive gate or through traffic stops for

the last several weeks.

There is one new twist on cell phone usage, issued in an interim policy on distracted driving from the Commander, Naval Installations Command.

According to this policy, it is not permitted for the driver to use any portable, personal listening device that is worn in the aural canal, around or covering the ear while

operating a motor vehicle.

Listening devices include wired or wireless earphones and headphones (including Blue Tooth or similar technology).

This does not include hearing aides or devices designed and required for hearing protection.

With the exception of cell phone usage,

none of the above areas are new to NSA PC traffic enforcement. A large majority of employees on NSA PC are seasoned drivers and know what is legally allowed while driving.

However, there appears to be a mind set that once entering NSA PC things are somewhat relaxed and there is no



“Critical Days of Summer” have arrived

When the whistle blows this afternoon, Memorial Day Weekend officially begins, kicking off the “unofficial” start of summer. This begins a season of backyard barbecues, pool parties and boat trips, but unfortunately, summer often sees a surge of accidents as well.

Because of this, NSA PC will promote the “Critical Days of Summer” campaign and its message to all military and civilians: Take care of each other by encouraging co-workers, families and friends to make the summer season fun, make it safe, and most importantly, make it *home!*

The goal of the campaign is threefold: to raise awareness, teach skills and behavior that reduces mishaps, and provide alternatives to high-risk behaviors. It is important that you are vigilant this sea-

son in preventing senseless deaths and injuries.

One of the greatest challenges facing the military is the large number of deaths and injuries caused by preventable automobile and recreation accidents. Last summer, 43 Sailors and Marines died in off-duty mishaps, ranging from drowning to motor vehicle, motorcycle and off-road accidents. This is obviously a

great loss to the military, but more so to the family members left behind.

These high-risk “Critical Days of Summer” span from Memorial Day weekend to Labor Day. This time frame poses a greater number of risks for several reasons. More families are on the road because school is out and many servicemembers are transferring. They also visit

family and loved ones during the summer and may drive longer periods than they should without a break.

Summer beach parties, cookouts and trips might turn into deadly situations when combined with alcohol. It is important that we become each other’s watchful eye.

If a shipmate or family member is about to drive when he or she is not in the condition to do so, you need to be the one to say, “I’ll take you home,” or “Rest before you go.”

Taking an active stance will help you rest easier knowing you may have prevented a severe injury or even a tragic loss. Your shipmate and family will appreciate you for it.

Members of the Armed Services have the responsibility to prepare themselves for combat. However, at home

our mission is more personal but just as imperative. We need to consider our responsibility to help our friends and other members of our community prevent tragedies that

the community after a period of two to three years," Hawkins said.

While monitoring and coordinating GOMEX operations from NSWC PC's Expeditionary Warfare Integration Facility (EWIF), Tobias said the facility and personnel provided a command and control capability that included readily-available technical support in case of any unforeseen equipment failures.

"We provided access to the Secret Internet Protocol Router Network, Non-Classified Internet Protocol Router Network, Tactical Satellite Communications, laptop computers, overhead projectors, and office space, all in a secure environment, including technical support if any problems arose," said EWIF Electrical Engineer David Silnutzer.

"I think having all this available in our facility makes

Panama City an economically efficient place to conduct fleet exercises like GOMEX."

MIW and MCM expertise has long resided within this small and specialized community, according to Matt Prager, a specialist from Commander, Mine Warfare Command's Concept Development and Experimentation Division.

Prager added that this particular GOMEX incorporated off-board testing of some unmanned underwater vehicle (UUV) mine hunting technology, which would ultimately be mainstreamed into the fleet at large.

"Mainstreaming mine warfare into the Navy's fleet as part of Expeditionary Strike Groups and Carrier Strike Groups is, in part, the Navy's way of reducing mine hunting and neutralization timelines," Prager said.

"Building platforms such



Area Sea Cadets board NSA PC for tenant tours

While the minimum age to enlist in the U.S. Navy is 18, many set their sights on serving their country from a much younger age. The U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps (NSCC) introduces teenagers to military life in a mixed environment of classroom, practical, and hands-on training.

Jim Fath, a civil servant at Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City, is one of six adults who contribute their spare time to the cadets in the Seawolf Division, Panama City. This division encompasses Bay, Holmes, and Washington counties and has 25 Cadets ages 13 to 18, with an additional four children from the League Cadet Corps, a similar program open to children ages 11 to 14.

According to Fath, an instructor with the Corps, NSCC is a nationwide program that was started by the

Navy League in 1958, and now involves 9,000 cadets.

"The Cadets are organized along military lines and their main purpose is to foster good citizenship as well as an interest and appreciation of our nation's sea services: the Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, and Merchant Marines," Fath said.

All Sea Cadet Divisions

attend monthly drills and the Seawolf Division is hosted each month by sailors from the Naval Diving and Salvage Training Center (NDSTC). Fath said the Cadets eat at the Seashore General Mess and stay in the Visitor Quarters during their weekend stay and they also take advantage of the gym and Liberty Locker during their spare time.

When the Cadets first arrive on base, EM1 Scott Wolfe, Work Center Supervisor at the dive school's hyperbaric chamber, and HT2 Robert Johnson, Work Center Supervisor at the dive school's wood shop, lead the cadets through physical training at the dive school before the cadets tour different tenants of the base.

Wolfe said in comparison to other children their age, "The Cadets tend to have more drive and are more dedicated to what they're doing. I think the Sea Cadet program pushes them to a higher standard of excellence in their personal life, their school work, in everything in general."

While military-based training is certainly a main focus of NSCC, according to Fath, regular academics are also of high concern. Fath said the Cadets must maintain a 2.5 grade point average in school and the leaders not only emphasize the importance of academics to the Cadets, they monitor their grades as well.

A Sailor at Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City is deploying to the Horn of Africa. Aircraft Electrician 2nd Class Todd Lease, an aircraft electrician at NSWC PC, answered the call to fill a billet in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

Lease is one of a growing number of Sailors who is contributing to the ongoing Global War on Terror as an "Individual Augmentee" to the ground forces across the globe. Lease is unsure what he'll be doing when he gets to his destination, "I guess I'll find out when I get there," he said. But one

thing is sure, Lease's reason for volunteering, "I just want to do my part," he said.

The skills Sailors possess are in high demand. As non-combat operations increase, more opportunities arise for naval personnel to serve ashore. By using traditional skill sets, Sailors are able to fill joint requirements that are put onto the military as a whole.

Secretary of the Navy Dr. Donald Winter said, "We are a nation at war. Support for our Sailors and Marines in the Iraqi theater of operations is our most urgent task, and I am focused daily on what the Navy and Marine Corps can do to help achieve victory in Iraq and against terrorists elsewhere

around the globe."

Lease will be heading out this week for Ft. Jackson, where he'll undergo approximately two weeks of training before deploying to the Horn of Africa. Lease's wife and three daughters will be anxiously awaiting his return, which will be in approximately six months.

NSWC PC Executive Officer Cdr. Jeff Prater thanked Lease adding, "It's Sailors like you that make our Navy the best in the World."

Lease is one of three Sailors from around the Activity waiting to leave as an IA and four others are already supporting Operation Enduring Freedom as Individual Augmentees.

Child abuse, protecting children from neglect

We often hear that a particular month is set-aside for us to become aware of a special social issue. Child abuse should be a minute-by-minute, hour-by-hour and day-by-day 24/7 awareness issue.

There are five categories of child abuse:

1. Physical abuse is committing an act that harms a child physically. It is usually when a parent or some other person does something to the child.

2. Physical neglect is failing to provide the food, shelter, clothing, medical

care, education, and/or supervision that a child needs. This is a hard one to judge, but close investigation can usually substantiate the offense.

3. Emotional abuse is providing a child with physical necessities of life, but verbally damaging his/her mental and emotional health. It is usually in the form of constant put downs, threats, or constantly threatening the child's welfare or that of their loved ones.

4. Emotional neglect is providing the physical necessities, but ignoring the child

and failing to nurture the child. Without positive strokes a child can emotionally shrivel up and die a psychological death.

5. Sexual abuse is sexually mistreating a child in any way. It can be by physical molestation, verbal molestation, or exposing yourself or sexual explicit material to a child.

Child abuse is against the law in all 50 states and each branch of the military has regulations against it.

Doctors, dentist, nurses, teachers, social workers, foster parents, police, probation

officers, family counselors, and any individuals who work directly with children are required to report child abuse to the legal authorities.

In the military, anyone in a leadership position can be held accountable for not reporting known child abuse, but it is everyone's responsibility to protect our children.
