

## MEMORIAL CEREMONY HONORS *Pearl Harbor Survivor*

A memorial ceremony was held for a Pearl Harbor survivor and World War II veteran at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam (JBPHH) on July 14.

Chief Aviation Electrician's Mate Francis M. Burke, who served aboard the tugboat Nokomis, passed away at the age of 90 on June 5.

The private ceremony last week was conducted aboard a USS Arizona Memorial white boat near the USS Nevada Memorial at Hospital Point. The ceremony included a religious service followed by the scattering of ashes into the waters of Pearl Harbor. The Navy Region Hawaii ceremonial guard provided a three-volley rifle salute, and a U.S. Navy bugler sounded "Taps."

Capt. Lawrence Scruggs, chief staff officer for

JBPHH, and Cmdr. Colin Caswell, operations officer for JBPHH, presented the American flag to Burke's family.

Burke enlisted in the Navy in 1940 and was stationed aboard the ammunition ship USS Pyro prior to being assigned to the Nokomis. On the morning of Dec. 7, 1941, Burke was asleep in his bunk when he was awakened by loud noises.

"The chief in charge of the tug, Chief Boatswain's Mate Bill Fielder screamed down below decks, 'Hey Burke, come on get that lefty line off the tug. We're going out.' I rushed outside, disconnected the power, threw the cable on the tug, threw the mooring lines off and out we went," Burke said in an interview with Daniel Martinez, chief historian for the National Park Service, on Oct. 5, 2010.

"As we headed out towards the ships, the torpedo planes were flying right overhead. You could see the pilots," said Burke. "There was fire, smoke and oil all over the water. We pulled alongside the Arizona before it blew up and we started picking people out of the water. When we got a load of people aboard the tug, we'd head back to the 1010 dock where

all the medical people were waiting. They would offload all the people and we'd head back out again."

When asked what he saw among the casualties, Burke responded by saying, "You would grab people by the arms and their skin would come right off. You try to pull them out of the water and grab their arms and you would end up with hands full of flesh, so you would have to grab them some place clothing was and pull them aboard," Burke explained during the interview.

As he grew older, Burke said every once in a while he would be at home lying in bed thinking about the attack.

"I think about what happened and I think about all the guys that left us. So I made up my mind, got a hold of my daughter and said, 'When I leave this world of ours, I want you to get me cremated and sprinkle my ashes at Pearl Harbor,'" according to the interview.

Burke left the Navy after World War II and moved to New York with his wife and three daughters. After going on reserve duty for a few years, he decided to return to active duty and eventually retired with 22 years of service.

# HIANG earns decisive win over 735th AMS

The Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG) scored three goals in the first half and two more in the second to overpower the 735th Air Mobility Squadron (735 AMS) in a Soccer Intramural League Gold Division game at Ward Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on July 16.

The HIANG, which improved its overall divisional record to 9-1-1, took advantage of the short-handed 735th early in the game, and then coasted to the easy win.

Although the 735th added two more players by intermission to reach a full squad of nine, the damage was done as the HIANG got goals from Tech. Sgt. Jonathan Lum, Staff Sgt. Chad Sills and Staff Sgt. Bronson Ledward to go into halftime with a commanding 3-0 advantage.

Capt. Glen Hayase, forward and team captain for the HIANG, said that once the 735th got into trouble, he and his teammates decided to pull back just a little bit in order to keep the game from turning into a rout.

"I actually think we didn't go as hard, seeing that they started out with only seven (players)," Hayase said. "After the first couple of minutes, you could tell that we were controlling the ball, so we didn't want to go too hard. We kind of wanted to conserve energy. I didn't think it was big deal."

With the HIANG clearly holding the upper hand in the first

half, the team went to work and dominated the action – out kicking the 735th by a margin of 10-1 on shots on goal.

Both Lum and Sills converted shots from the top of the box, while Ledward took a bounce from

an inbound pass, before booting it in for the team's third goal.

Hayase said that being able to control the ball was the main key in establishing the team's big lead.

"Since we had the ball most of the time, they were on their side

of the field so they didn't have much of an offense," Hayase explained. "It was pretty easy to control the ball on defense."

While the number of players balanced out in the second half, things didn't improve much for the

735th, as the HIANG continued to play keep away from its opponent.

Immediately following the break, Hayase completed a breakaway down the right side of the field by kicking in a goal to extend the HIANG's lead.

Later, with time running out, 1st Lt. Skip Saito added the team's final tally with a shot from the top of the box.

In the second half, the HIANG kicked 11 shots on goal, while the 735th was held to only one attempt.

Staff Sgt. Fabricio Toscano of the 735th said that although the shortage of players in the first half did factor into the team's defeat, he believed that a lack of familiarity among fellow teammates was the main reason for the setback.

"It does help to have subs, but we tried our best," he stated. "Regardless that they play really well, we're still getting together as a team. This is the first season for me and a few other people, so probably we'll be better next year."

With only one week remaining in the regular season, the HIANG, which is currently in third place, should finish as one of the top seeds going into the playoffs.

Hayase said that while it's hard to predict how things will turn out in the postseason, he stated that the team would enter the playoffs with the same philosophy that it has held throughout the year.

"We're just out here to have fun and play our hardest," he said. "We have a pretty deep team. It doesn't matter who comes, we're just having fun. Of course it's more fun if you win."

# Strong second half leads Kunia over SEALS

Cryptologic Technician (Interpretive) 3rd Class Winston Jackson of the Kunia Gallos scored on a breakaway early in the second half to snap a 0-0 tie at halftime, as the team went on to defeat SEAL Delivery Vehicle Team-One (SDVT-1), 3-0, in a Soccer Intramural League Gold Division matchup at Ward Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on July 16.

The win improved the Gallos' record to 10-0-3 and placed the team back into first place with a one-point lead over the Pearl Harbor Futbol Club.

Meanwhile, SDVT-1, which lost to Pearl Harbor FC the week before, dropped its second game in a row and is now in fifth place with a record of 7-4-1.

While the teams battled to a standstill in the first half, the Gallos' speed and quickness eventually took its toll on the SEALS.

Minutes into the second half, Jackson got the ball on the left wing and exploded past two defenders, before squaring off one-on-one with SDVT-1 goalkeeper retired Chief Eric Gordon.

Jackson faked Gordon out of position with a single move and tapped in a shot for the first goal of the game.

"Everyone knows that I got my speed, and I relied on that heavily today," said Jackson about his breakaway goal. "I baited them into playing me close, made them think that they could get to the ball, and I just used my speed to beat them

twice – once to push it by the last defender and again to push it into the net."

Gordon credited Jackson for making a good move to get him going away from the ball.

"I went the wrong direction," Gordon admitted. "I saw the way his feet were going and thought he

was going to the outside. So I went to the outside, but he went to the inside."

Jackson added that because the game was close, he felt the need to put the ball away once he got the open shot.

"We have our offense set to keep our playmakers really open, so I've

been open, but there were too many defenders to get through," Jackson pointed out. "When I got up there, I felt the urgency that I've got a chance with less defenders, so don't waste the opportunity."

Then midway through the second half, Army Spc. Jerel Qualls took a pass near midfield and boot-

ed in a perfect shot past the outstretched arms of Gordon and into the net.

"The goalkeeper was off his line, so I thought I could catch him off-guard by shooting to the far post," Qualls said.

Although the first goal broke the ice, Jackson said that Qualls' shot was the one that broke the SEALS' back.

"That was huge and it was pretty," Jackson said. "They (SEALS) were attacking all game, they never gave up and played hard on offense and defense. We needed some insurance and we needed to take the wind out of their sails, and that's just what his (Qualls) ball did."

Finally, with time winding down, Kunia got its final goal of the game, when Senior Airman Akira Hose booted in a shot from the top of box.

"The second one was on a beautiful shot, but the third one was my fault," Gordon acknowledged. "I should have saved it. I had my hand on it. I put my hand up and then at the last second tried to hit it. I should have just grabbed it."

Regardless of how Kunia got its scores, the game was a decisive victory for the Gallos over a quality team.

With the playoffs just around the corner, the win should bode well for Kunia as it aims for the first joint base intramural soccer championship.

"We're a very confident team. We believe in ourselves," Jackson said. "We're going to go out there and play our best. No one is going to steamroll us and we're going to have fun."

# 647th LRS serves up win over 15th MDG

The strong play of hitters Logistics Specialist 2nd Class Irvin Toliver and Tech. Sgt. Chris Gilmore, along with the serving of Tech. Sgt. Carrie Elder helped carry the 647th Logistics Readiness Squadron (647 LRS) to victory this week. The team netted a straight set, 25-18 and 25-15, win over the 15th Medical Group (15 MDG) "B" team in a Hickam Volleyball Monday League game at Hickam Fitness Center gym, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on July 18.

Toliver and Gilmore were especially tough in the first set, as the twin towers' thunderous thumps accounted for four kills apiece, with Toliver adding two more points via service aces. Toliver's fourth kill of the set opened up a double-digit lead at 20-10.

The duo's steady slew of slams seemed to keep the 15 MDG off-balance, as the 647th allowed only four back-to-back points during the entire first set.

Still, Toliver said he felt that he could have done more to disrupt the 15 MDG's attack.

"I'm more of a competition player," he stated. "The better the competition gets, the better I play."

While the frontcourt play of Toliver and Gilmore stole the show in the first set, Elder's skill at serving led the way for the 647th in

the second set.

Behind the fluttering serves of Elder, the 647th rallied for nine straight points to grab a 9-0 lead at the start of the second set.

During the outstanding run, Elder, who tallied four service aces, and said that

she picked her spots and used the good movement of the ball to keep the 15 MDG on its heels.

"I was spot serving, not aiming at individuals," said Elder about her success at serving. "When he was deep, I would serve

short, and when he scooted up, I would serve deep. It (ball) moves, when I serve it hard. When I serve it soft, it's flat."

Toliver acknowledged that Elder's strong start gave the team a big boost and set the tempo for the

rest of the game.

"That was good – especially when you find out who the weakest player is," Toliver explained. "Once you find out who the weakest link is, then that is who you go for."

Later, another service ace by Elder raised the 647th lead to 20-11. And although the 15 MDG scored the next four points to draw to within five at 20-15, the 647th closed out the game by scoring the last five points.

While the 647th appeared to dominate play from start to the finish, both Elder and Toliver explained that the team should get even better as the season draws on.

"I think the longer we play together the better we'll get," Toliver said. "I think as long as we get our passing really well, we'll be awesome."

Against the 15 MDG, Elder said that experience played a huge role in getting the win, but added that the 647th could have played better if it had all of its players.

"There is like four or five of us that have played together before, so we've known each other for awhile," Elder pointed out. "We played good and we didn't have all of our starters."


