

Chris Cagle in concert: *'It's good to be here at Pearl Harbor'*

Nothing beats free quality entertainment like when a well-known artist travels across the Pacific Ocean to perform great music for Sailors, Airmen and their families. The Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) hosted a live concert at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam's Ward Field featuring country music sensation Chris Cagle on Aug. 13.

Known for his chart-topping country music like "What a Beautiful Day," "Miss Me Baby," "Wal-Mart Parking Lot" and his number-one hit single "I Breathe In, I Breathe Out," named Country Music Television's (CMT) 2002 Flameworthy Video Music Awards Breakthrough Video of the Year, Cagle has made a comeback with his

country music after being away from the country scene for a few years.

By popular demand, MWR brought Cagle to Hawaii for the first time.

"A few months back, U.S. Pacific Fleet's (COMPACFLT) Fleet Master Chief John Minyard thought that having other genres such as country music would attract our active duty community, so he made a request through MWR," said Lara Katine, MWR special events and sponsorship coordinator.

"We soon moved forward and searched for a country artist who was patriotic and had enough visibility to really draw in a good crowd, and that is how we felt Chris Cagle was the right one to bring over," Katine explained.

With more than 3,500 fans in attendance, many came dressed in their country western outfits, eagerly waiting for the show to begin. Groups of friends, families, couples and singles laid out blankets and chairs and staked out a good spot on the field. As fans waited for the show to begin,

Brian Gray from KHCM-FM 97.5 Hot Country Radio played country hits to get the audience to have a good ol' time.

Food booths lined the back of the field including Sam Snead's, Schooners, Sea Breeze Restaurant and J.R. Rockers, to name a few. While waiting in line at one of the booths, Machinist's Mate 1st Class Tim Hanley, assigned to Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, said that he has been a Chris Cagle fan for about six years. "I came out tonight with my wife and kids to get out of the house and have some fun, listen to some good music and eat some good food."

Air Force spouse Barb Burhans, wife of Master Sgt. Doug Burhans of the 647th Security Forces Squadron, said she comes to all the free events that MWR brings. "You can't beat the opportunity; the stars are great. We try to attend all the good entertainment we can find," she said. "I have been a Chris Cagle fan for 10 years, and I love country music."

"A lot of the military families are very appreciative and they are happy that we provide this kind of opportunity for them," said Frank Faria, MWR director. "That is why we

hope to do more concerts like this in the future."

Technology Specialist 2nd Class Timothy La Plante, assigned to VPU-2 at Marine Corps Base Hawaii (MCBH), and his wife, Tiffany, have been Cagle fans since the beginning. "I think it's great to have free concerts out here. It's nice for MWR to allow us to enjoy this for free. It says a lot about the artist who gives back and says a lot about MWR. We just love it," said LaPlante. "It brings everyone together," added daughter Fallon.

Prior to the concert, a few lucky fans had the chance to meet and greet Cagle for autographs and photo opportunities.

As the sun set, Cagle took the stage with his song, "It's Good to Be Back," as he squeezed the words, "It's good to be here at Pearl Harbor," into his lyrics. Throughout his performance, Cagle repeatedly thanked the military servicemen and women for their service in protecting our country.

With his easy-going charm, Cagle brought his daughter on stage and introduced her to the audience and shared a story about his farm and freedom. Then the concert continued.

"Chris Cagle was all pumped

up and had a ball and was all about giving back to the military community," Katine said.

One of the highlights of the show was when a letter from a military spouse in the audience reached Cagle on stage, which said that she is down on one knee and is asking her husband to marry her all over again. Cagle kicked it up a notch and performed one of his top singles, "Chicks Dig It."

He kept the audience enthused and hollering for more. From filming a You Tube video on stage with a fan's camera, signing autographs and getting the audience involved, Cagle performed his number-one single "I Breathe In, I Breathe Out" while the audience sang along.

Concluding the concert, Chris Cagle and his band members, Brian Hinchcliffe, Tim Horsley, Brian Lucas, Ryan Joseph, Charlie Crowe and Brandon Henegar, ended with a big mahalo (thank you).

"It was great performing in Pearl Harbor. Everyone was enthusiastic and excited. What an incredible moment to feel welcomed," said Brian Hinchcliffe, bass player, and Tim Horsley, drummer.

"Chris reminds us during every show that performing for the servicemen is the main thing. We're really lucky to perform in a gig like this and be playing for people allowing us to do what we do," said Charlie Crowe, guitarist.

Wotevaz beats surging 6-Pack for three-peat

The Wotevaz volleyball squad defeated 6-Pack in straight sets, 25-7 and 25-17, to capture its third consecutive Women's Volleyball League (WVL) championship at Naval Station Gym, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on Aug. 13.

The WVL is a pay-to-play league that is open to women who are at least 18 years old and are active-duty military, family members or Department of Defense employees.

After easily dispatching 6-Pack in a runaway in the first set, Wotevaz found itself behind by a score of 11-9 in the second set, before the ladies rallied on the service of Master Sgt. Carrie Elders to score five straight points and take a 14-11 advantage.

While 6-Pack managed to keep pace for a short while after losing its lead, Wotevaz, holding the upper hand at 17-14, scored the next six of eight points to take an insurmountable lead at 23-16.

The teams split the next two points before Wotevaz hitter Edna Walker put the game away with a clean kill shot at the net.

Walker said that with 6-Pack putting up a strong fight in the second set, she and her teammates felt a sense of urgency to put their opponents away.



During the season, 6-Pack developed a reputation for coming back. The team started the season with a 1-3 record, but stormed back to win its next three games going into the playoffs.

Then during the postseason, 6-Pack eliminated the No. 2 seeded team Kim in the semifinals to advance to the championship showdown.

"We got relaxed," admitted Walker about falling behind early in the second set. "We had to regroup. We had a change of lineup, and that kind of gave them the lead. When they started coming on, we didn't want to go to the third set, so we picked the momentum up. This team (6-Pack) really peaked at the end. I'm kind of glad that we ended up playing against them."

Active-duty spouse Layla Clark, outside hitter for 6-Pack, said that while the team gave it all it had against the undefeated Wotevaz, she and the rest of the squad just seemed to run out of steam after being stretched to the limit in the semifinals against Kim.

"We had a lot of heart in

that second game," Clark said. "If we had a little more stamina, we could have pushed it out and taken it to three. But the momentum shifted and, I think it just boiled down to fatigue."

Elders, who spearheaded the game-changing rally in the second set, said that with the game on the line, she needed to keep focused and tried her best to make good on her serves.

"I made sure that I served to certain spots," Elders pointed out. "I served away from Clark because she is a good passer, and then I would switch it up from a fastball to a short ball, so that they would have to move their feet."

Although 6-Pack was unable to dethrone the perennial champs, Clark said that she was extremely happy about the way her team performed after its rough start early in the season.

"I couldn't be more proud of this team," Clark stated. "We practiced twice a week and worked so hard this season."

Meanwhile, Elders said that while winning its third title in a row is great, nothing beats the camaraderie that is shared between teammates on Wotevaz.

"It's more about playing together as a team and having fun," she said. "That's what I enjoy. It's awesome because everyone is always laughing on the court. As long as you can laugh at yourself and pick yourself up, that's what it's all about."

Intelligence Squadron stops Medical Group

The 324th Intelligence Squadron (324 IS) Tigers solidified its hold on second place in the Intramural Volleyball League Monday Division by sweeping the 15th Medical Group (15 MDG) "B" squad in straight sets, 25-17 and 25-13, at Hickam Fitness Center gym, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on Aug. 15.

The win kept the 324 IS only one game behind the 647th Logistics Readiness Squadron (647 LRS) with a 5-1 record, while the 15 MDG suffered its fourth loss against two wins.

"Second place is in our hands, so we just have to keep taking care of business," said 324 IS Staff Sgt. Elisha Cole, who was among the big hitters of the game. "Game by game, our goal is to finish it out and see what we can throw down in the playoffs. We still don't know how many teams are going to be in the playoffs, so we are not going to give up second place."

In the first set, the teams traded points in a tight battle, with the 324 holding a 13-12 edge, until the Tigers slowly began to pull away with two runs of three straight points that were sandwiched by a kill from Lt. Col. Mauricio Carota of the 15 MDG.

Then up by a score of 21-

16, Senior Airman Tyler Cerner of the Tigers recorded back-to-back kills to put the 324 IS in the driver's seat at 23-16.

The Tigers seemed to carry the momentum of the first set into the second when Cole served the 324 to five straight points to take a 6-1 lead.

However, the hot hand of Cole cooled down quickly when Carota followed a blocked shot for a point with two service aces to put the 15 MDG right back in the game.

The 15 went on to close the gap down to a single point, but the Tigers scored the next four tallies to extend their lead back up to 14-9.

Staff Sgt. Matt Harvey, who is the head coach of the 324 IS, said while he was happy to see his team turn it back around, the Tigers had no one to blame for allowing the 15 MDG to get close.

"It was us. I told the guys that it wouldn't be Tigers' volleyball if we didn't let teams get close to us," he said. "But we were ready for them. I told my guys not to take them lightly. I made sure that our guys knew that it doesn't matter how big a lead you have. It's important to finish the game, and that's just what I told them."

The pep talk must have worked because the Tigers stepped up the pace for the rest of the way and outsco-

red the 15 MDG 11-4 to close out the set and match.

Besides Cole, the Tigers received outstanding play from its frontline that included Cerner and veteran retirees, Mike Kormos and Darren Cabral.

"I can't even tell you how many guys I got on the team that can hit the ball," said Harvey about the Tigers' potent attack. "They are fantastic hitters that know how to play. It's the most options that I've ever had on any team I've ever coached."

Cole went on to point out the contributions of Cerner, who just might be one of the biggest hitters in the division.

"Cerny is a beast," Cole noted. "He can hang. He goes up and then decides where he wants to hit the ball. You just have to throw it up in the air, and he'll go hit it down."

Although the Tigers experienced their only defeat at the hands of the 647 LRS, Harvey dismissed the setback by saying that the loss came early in the season when the 324 had only six players on the court.

The real challenge, said Harvey, will come later when he hopes to square off against the powerful Hawaii Air National Guard (HIANG).

"We want the HIANG," Harvey acknowledged. "We want to beat them. That's our goal this year."

Experience 'Biggest Little Airshow' Aug. 20-21

Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor

Pacific Aviation Museum will host Pearl Harbor's fourth "Biggest Little Airshow" from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Aug. 20 and 21.

There will be 100 aircraft on the tarmac—both real and remote control models—candy bombings for the keiki, hangar 79 tours to see the new MiG Alley Korean War Exhibit, the Lt. Ted Shealy Restoration Shop, the P-40 Kittyhawk, helicopters and other aircraft in the 85,000-square-

foot battle-scarred hangar, plus free concerts each day.

Admission is free to the public. The public is invited to drive on to Ford Island and park free at the museum, or board free shuttles to the museum at the Arizona Memorial parking area from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The event is saluting the Centennial of Naval Aviation with special flight demonstrations.

For two days, the local RC organization the Birds of Paradise and pilots from the Academy of Model

Aeronautics will pilot their remote-controlled 1-to-5 scale planes for dogfights, candy "bombings," aerobatics and more. The show has been expanded, with more planes and helicopters, dogfights, war bird reenactments, jets, and two days of flying, food, real aircraft to explore and prizes to enter to win.

There will be free tours of hangar 79, which still bears the bullet holes of the Dec. 7, 1941 attack. Inside, guests will see helicopters, fighter planes and the Lt. Ted Shealy restoration

shop — the 1941 machine shop which is busy restoring the museum's aircraft. They can also get up close and personal with an F-14 Tomcat, F-15 Eagle, F-86s, P-40, MiG-15, and the museum's new "MiG Alley" Korean War exhibit.

For the regular admission fee (\$12 adult/\$7 keiki (children), kamaaina and military), visitors can also

explore the museum hangar 37 and "fly for freedom" in the combat flight simulators (\$10 additional-ly). All other airshow activities are free that day.

According to Kenneth DeHoff, museum executive director, "The flight line opens at 10 a.m. with a traditional military color guard, aircraft flyovers, and all aircraft on display. The aerial remote control flight demonstrations are 11 a.m. to 4 p.m."
