If you feel that your home is a not so gentle reminder to submit an application to TLC's "Clean Sweep" television show, Morale, Welfare and Recreation's (MWR) Super Garage Sale and Craft Fair is here to help you clear the clutter. Do trinkets and treasures linger around your home, in your closet, under the bed or in the garage? Are you a craft enthusiast with creative masterpieces to sell? Perhaps your command or group is looking to raise funds for your next big event? Gather your goods and prepare your wares for the quarterly Super Garage Sale and Craft Fair at Richardson Field on May 15 from 8 a.m. to noon.

At the MWR Super Garage Sale and Craft Fair, sellers load up goodies in the back of a vehicle, drive up to Richardson Field and spend the morning selling their stuff. With over 1,000 shoppers, sellers are likely to make a quick buck.

Lt. Carmel Tomlinson, from COMNAVREG Hawai'i, participates at least twice each year "in an effort to de-clutter and simplify". Tomlinson said, "I really like the super garage sale because it expands your potential customers since it's right across the street from the swap meet on the weekend. I don't have to spend time putting up or taking down garage sale signs, pay to ad-

vertise the sale in the newspaper and don't have to have a bunch of strangers at my house."

She also commented, "The super garage sale is an enormous benefit for military personnel and their families, especially in Hawai'i. Homes in this

state are smaller than they are on the mainland. Families tend to bring lots of big furniture items that won't fit into their new living arrangements. The garage sale promotes families to sell any "extra" items they may have brought to help them fit more com-

fortably into their new homes."

The Super Garage Sale Craft Fair is an opportunity to make some extra cash, find a bargain, socialize and meet new people. All active duty, reservists, family members and DoD personnel are invited to participate solo or round up friends, neighbors and co-workers to sell items at the event together.

Aileen Hershey, Navy spouse, has been selling household goods at the Super Garage Sale and Craft Fair for over three years. Hershey said the best part of the event is, "meeting a lot of people and getting rid of things I don't need." She typically reserves three to five stalls. She commented, "Lately, my friends just meet me out there. It works out good."

In the past, various commands have used the Super Garage Sale and Craft Fair as an opportunity to raise money for their MWR fund.

According to Lara Askerooth, MWR special events coordinator, "Some commands participate on a regular basis. It's a great way for them to raise funds for command events." One command gathered everyone's goods beforehand, loaded up a van and went to sell the wares. Other commands have reserved three to four spaces for vehicles and parked next to each other on Richardson Field while unloading their sale items.

This is the place for shoppers who are new to the island and searching for household items or just looking for a good deal. A variety of goods such as

furniture, books, clothing and exercise equipment will be for sale.

Talk about scoring a deal, Tomlinson agreed, "It's also a benefit if you're looking to buy something. I wanted a fake Christmas tree and found one that was in excellent shape at the sale for \$5."

In addition to the garage sale goods, crafters sell jewelry, wreaths, candles and a variety of other original works. Individual product consultants for companies such as Pampered Chef, Mary Kay or Tupperware, schedule shows and offer items for sale. MWR has a spot for everyone on Richardson Field.

After years of experience with the Super Garage Sale and Craft Fair, Hershey knows what to expect the morning of the sale. She said, "People are excited to go, they are lined up waiting for the gates to open."

Treasure seekers and bargain hunters are encouraged to come early, as anxious shoppers traditionally swarm the gate well before the 8 a.m. opening. Parking is available at Rainbow Bay Marina. To accommodate special needs, alternative parking arrangements are available at Richardson Field.

Super Garage Sale tips for buyers

Note: These tips are not all inclusive and are not intended to give anyone any false advantage. They are intended to assist and encourage interested buyers to visit the Super Garage Sale and see it for themselves.

- **Come early:** Sometimes the best deals go to those who arrive as the gate opens. If you do show up early, be prepared to stand with a few dozen folks who are also in search of the quick buy. There is usually a crowd waiting for the gates to open.
- **Park correctly:** If you decide to park in spots where parking is not allowed, you may end up blocking paths people need for driving or for walking. This could be a safety hazard if people end up walking in the street or could be an annoyance if you block someone else in. Be patient and drive around until

you find a proper parking spot. It may take longer, but it will help more people in the end.

- **Be polite:** Like you, no one likes it when people are rude to them. Be nice to other buyers as you cruise the deals. No pushing, shoving or hair pulling.
- **Be bold:** With a lot of vendors, the price they quote you is a suggested price. You don't have to necessarily take it for their final price. Negotiate a better deal. You never know what you can get unless you ask.
- **Stay late:** Sometimes sellers will significantly discount their wares close to closing time. If they think no one will buy their stuff and they don't want to take it home, they could drop their prices. You could get some great deals half an hour or less before the Super Garage Sale closes.
- **Have fun:** Even more than the deals and above all else, enjoy the day.

Plus, since we all realize how difficult it is to get reservations on restaurant business's busiest day of the year, most of these options are also available before and after the holiday, so you can treat her to something special anytime.

My first suggestion on how to spoil 'mom' involves a key ingredient held dear by moms globally ... chocolate.

Executive pastry chef Fenton Lee from Sam Choy's Diamond Head captures the essence of the ingredient with Hawai'i's first and only chocolate fountain and chocolate bar.

For those who have never experienced a chocolate fountain, it resembles a tiered wedding cake, except it is encompassed with flowing, melted chocolate, which overflows down the tiers. Diners use fondue style skewers and stud them with fresh fruit, marshmallows, cake (or whatever) and immerse them through the cascading stream of pure sweetness.

In addition to the fun and fabulous fountain, the dessert bar includes dozens of delicious and decadent desserts, including items like a chocolate tiramisu, chocolate cheesecake and, my favorite, chocolate tulip shells filled with a Grand Marnier sabayon.

Sam Choy's normally only offers the chocolate fountain and bar on Friday and Saturday nights, but they will have a special version set up for Mother's Day. The chocolate fountain and bar is priced \$9.95 if purchased with your meal, but for those searching for a unique late night treat for that special someone, it can also be purchased à la carte for \$14.95.

If anything says, "pamper yourself" (or mom, in this case), it is enjoying a proper "afternoon tea." From the time 'mom' was a little girl, she probably had a toy teapot she treasured. Re-pour and refresh her memories at Tea at 1024 in downtown Honolulu, where she can sip once again from porcelain cups and nibble small pastries, sandwiches and delicate desserts.

Owner Michelle Henry says when she created the tearoom she wanted to encourage folks to just get away from everything and relax for a while.

Originally opened as a clothing boutique to sell Henry's own designs, she eventually added the tearoom for her customers. The popularity of an afternoon tea grew and now the tearoom stays overflowing with both walk-in customers and large parties (it is popular for bridal and baby showers).

With prices ranging from around \$5 to \$15 (for a complete tea 'meal'), the menu includes various types of tea sandwiches, like chicken curry, tomatoes and cheddar, crab and black olive and old-fashioned egg salad, as well as bowls of fresh-cut fruit, varieties of soups and salads and assortments of pastries and scones, presented on tiered trays.

The tearoom, open Monday- Saturday, as well as Mother's Day, also offers the use of items like feather boas and hats for patrons to wear during tea time, if they would like to fully experience a true afternoon tea for Mother's Day.

Navy honors distinguished local public servant

Hawaiian Veterans Cemetery Chapel held a funeral service for retired Cmdr. Thomas J. McAuliffe in Kaneohe April 23.

McAuliffe, who was born in 1943, passed away April 3 in the presence of his family.

"He had an amazing way of discussing something with you and teaching you things at the same time without your even realizing it," said Cmdr. Christopher Henson, executive officer, Naval Magazine Pearl Harbor.

McAuliffe served a 30-year distinguished career in the Navy. He enlisted at the age of 20 in 1963, said Henson. His first year included boot camp at Great Lakes, Ill., Torpedoman A School in Key West, Fla. and Naval Submarine School in New London, Conn.

From March 1964 to July of 1969, he served aboard three diesel submarines before being stationed in the weapons department at the submarine base in Pearl Harbor.

In August of 1972, he was stationed at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Wash., said Henson. He then went on to do two tours aboard the submarine tenders, U.S.S. Canopus and U.S.S. Proteus.

In 1985, he was stationed in Pearl Harbor again as the squadron weapons officer for Submarine Squadron Seven. He received his first Meritorious Service Medal for outstanding improvements to squadron ordnance readiness during this tour, said Henson.

McAuliffe's last tour was from May 1989 to

May 1993 on the staff of Commander, Submarine Force Pacific Fleet, where he served as the force ordnance officer and force nuclear safety officer. He received his second Meritorious Service Medal for this tour of duty, said Henson.

From April 1987 to January 1992, McAuliffe also served as the Pacific Submarine Force strategic weapons officer. He received the Legion of Merit signed by the Secretary of the Navy for his involvement in classified operations.

According to the citation, "His voluntary assignment to a very critical counterintelligence operation greatly supported the United States Navy and national security efforts. Demonstrating exceptional competence, professionalism and courage, he constantly performed beyond expectations under extremely stressful conditions."

In 1998, McAuliffe became the Navy Region Hawai'i explosive safety manager where he served the region and Naval Magazine Pearl Harbor until his passing April 3.

"He was steady and to the point, always taking care of business," said Henson. "[He] never wanted to burden anyone [and] always wanted to take care of things for others."

McAuliffe received full military honors at his funeral.

"I can't tell you how much I admired his strength, grit and determination, especially these past few months," said Henson. "We are all blessed for his having been a part of our lives."

SDV team to hold blood drive

Seal Delivery Team One (SDVT-1) Ohana Support Network (OSN), in cooperation with Tripler AMC Blood Donor Center, will hold a blood drive from 9 a.m.-1 p.m. May 8 at the Catlin-Halsey-Radford-Miller Community Center.

Blood donated through the Armed Services Blood Program (ASBP) is used to care for sick and injured military personnel and their family members.

Dana Felderman, coordinator of the SDTV-1 Ohana Support Network, explained that the main purpose of the SDV Team One Ohana Support Network is to provide support for spouses and families of command members. "The OSN also shows support for our military family as a whole through events such as the upcoming blood drive," she said.

"Our goal is to provide support for our military members and their

families, especially in time of need. Giving blood is one of the easiest and most valuable ways we can show our support," she continued, noting that one trauma patient can require up to 40 units of blood. "If everyone that is eligible donates regularly, we can always be prepared to care for our military family," Felderman said.

Felderman discussed her experiences as a blood donor. "I personally have been giving blood for years. It makes me feel great knowing that I may have saved three lives in the 10 minutes it took me to donate a pint of blood," she offered.

The ASBP flyer lists the top 10 reasons to give blood:

- (10) I can lay down for 10 minutes in the middle of the day.
- (9) It's good to share the health.
- (8) One pint of blood for three lives...not a bad trade.
- (7) I may need it back some day.
- (6) It hurts less than a paper cut.
- (5) My friends could need it.
- (4) I'll make more.
- (3) It takes doctors years of medical school to save a life; it takes me 10 minutes.
- (2) Did I mention saving three lives with just one pint of blood?
- (1) Cookies!

Felderman encouraged people to give blood. "For those apprehensive about giving blood, it hurts less than a paper cut and you get cookies and juice afterward," she advised.

For an appointment to give blood at the blood drive, call Felderman at 486-2789 or email danafelderman@yahoo.com. Appointments are not required to donate, but volunteers with appointments will receive "head of the line" service.

Dirty Dancing: Havana Nights: 18-year-old Katey moves with her father to Havana. Instead of joining the crowd of wealthy Americans in her new neighborhood, Katey befriends Javier, a poor waiter who also happens to be a great dancer.

Hidalgo: A 3,000-mile survival race across the Arabian Desert is restricted to the finest Arabian horses ever bred, the purest and noblest lines, owned by the greatest royal families. In 1890, a wealthy sheik invited an American, Frank T. Hopkins and his horse, Hidalgo to enter the race which pits him against Bedouin riders determined to prevent a foreigner from finishing.

The Ladykillers: A gentleman organizes a gang of thieves to rob a riverboat casino. They set up shop by renting a room in the house of an unsuspecting, church-going little old lady. When she figures out what they're up to, the robbers decide she must be eliminated.

Never Die Alone: Half preacher, half Satan, and all street smarts, King David recorded the story of his exploits on audiotape, leaving behind sermons on villainy and its consequences.

Scooby Doo 2: Monsters Unleashed: A masked villain wreaks mayhem on the city of Coolsville with a monster machine that re-creates classic Mystery Inc. foes. Under pressure, the gang launches an investigation into the mysterious monster outbreak that leaves Shaggy and Scooby questioning their roles in Mysery Inc.

Secret Window: Though he knows he should be at his computer writing another book at his dingy cabin, successful author Mort Rainey is sleeping on his favorite sofa for up to 16 hours a day. He is in the midst of a painful divorce. Then, when it seems as if things can't possibly get worse, a psychotic stranger shows up, accusing Rainey of plagiarizing his story.

Spartan: Special ops officer, Robert Scott, and his protégé, Curtis, are assigned to find the missing daughter of a high-ranking government official. But then their mission seems to come to an abrupt halt when the girl's death is reported in the media.

Starsky & Hutch: Based on the popular 1970s cop show of the same name. Ken "Hutch" Hutchinson and Dave Starsky are a tough pair of plain-clothes cops who drive a Ford Torino and solve cases.

Taking Lives: FBI Agent Scott doesn't rely on traditional crime-solving techniques to unravel the mysteries of a murderous mind. When Montreal detectives ask for help to get inside the head of a cunning serial killer, she joins the case. She suddenly finds herself on a twisted and terrifying journey.

Dawn of the Dead

From its Seven-esque beginning to the final (and I mean final) frame, "Dawn of the Dead" proves to be an enjoyably gruesome remake of George Romero's 1979 original.

The story follows the original almost exactly, with a group of survivors taking refuge in a mall after the undead take over the city of Milwaukee. What makes this film different and better than the original is the way technology and acting has grown over the years.

Indie-favorite Sarah Polley leads a mostly engaging cast as Ana, a kick butt nurse with smarts and emotion. Audience members sometimes find themselves yelling at characters in a horror film because of the obvious-to-us mistakes they make trying to get away from those wretched creatures. Ana doesn't make those mistakes. She thinks ahead and grabs the shotgun when it's time to take charge.

Ving Rhames provides the most expressive character as Kenneth, a cop with a gritty bad attitude who develops an understanding for each person stuck in the terrible situation. At one point, Mekhi Phifer's character explains his necessity for survival and the audience and Ving Rhames are left speechless.

First-time director Zach Snyder interjects moments of sympathy between the blood and mayhem that work well because of the acting ability. Making a scene believable goes a long way, as opposed to the original, which is more humor than fright. As usual though, it could not be a horror movie without the obligatory creature creeping up from behind, blood splatter and thousands of special effects and make-up designs that lend a more frightening and real aspect to the otherwise undaunting original.

"Dawn of the Dead" is a guilty pleasure. It's the kind of movie that leaves no lasting impression other than the momentary enjoyment of watching people get eaten by some pretty cool, undead creatures.
