

Now through 11:30 p.m. July 4:

- The black top located across from Bravo Piers 24-26, the parking



lot adjacent to the black top areas, and the parking lot at Bravo Piers 24 and 25.

4 p.m. today-11:30 p.m. July 4:

- The parking lot on the north side of Navy Legal Service Office (NLSO).

5 p.m. July 2-11:30 p.m. July 4:

- The parking lot across from Bravo Piers 24-26 and in front of The Banyans will be open to vendors only and closed to the public.

8 a.m.-11:30 p.m. July 4:

- Pearl Harbor Boulevard west of Popeye's fast food restaurant to the west side of The Banyans parking lot, Willamette Street south of the Navy Legal Services Office (NLSO).

On July 4, parking will be available in the Paul Hamilton Avenue parking lot "d" for event guests and visitors.

Military-affiliated personnel (includ-

ing family members and civil service employees), with appropriate Department of Defense (DoD) decals or temporary stickers, may enter through Makalapa Gate and park at Mike Pier or Club Pearl parking lot or enter through Nimitz Gate and park at Paul Hamilton Avenue parking lot or Bloch Arena parking lot on July 4.

Personnel who require access to Scott Pool, The Banyans and the Willamette Street parking lot during the period of road closures should utilize Nimitz Gate, turn left onto South Avenue, right onto Paul Hamilton Avenue, right onto Safeguard Street and then right onto Pearl Harbor Boulevard.

All vendors and contractors will utilize Halawa Gate on July 4.

No pets, glass containers, barbecues or personal tents are allowed anywhere in the event area.

Commissary buyers bring Hawai'i products to military community

More than 140 new products from Hawai'i will soon be available on commissary shelves for military patrons. Key military commissary buyers from the mainland met with more than 60 Hawai'i business owners at the Ninth Annual American Logistics Association (ALA) Food Show held June 23 at the J.W. Marriott Ihilani Resort and Spa at Ko Olina.

The products were selected from a parade of more than 800 new items that were featured at the event. Although many of the products selected were presented by companies that are currently doing business with the Defense Commissary Agency (DeCA), headquartered at Fort Lee, Va., eight new companies were added to the lineup.

Some of the new items which will now be featured in Hawai'i military commissaries will include frozen prepared meat, ginger syrup, island style lollipops, European breads (from Fritz Bakery) and organic guacamole.

The eight new companies include Fritz European Bakery, Deb's Ribs & Soul Food, Akamai Pacific (Big Island Delights), Wong's Meat Market, Sugarmill Cookies, Hawaiian Fudge, Pacific Kool and Poppie Company.

In 2005, DeCA purchased \$97 million of consumable and household necessities from businesses in Hawai'i. More than \$13 million of these products were Hawai'i-unique items like coffee, chocolates and nuts. Nearly \$7 million was locally procured produce.

"Thirty-nine percent of the produce sold in commis-

saries in Hawai'i comes from local sources," said Patrick Nixon, DeCA chief executive officer and acting director. "There are about 90 produce items that we routinely stock that we purchase from businesses on the islands."

Nixon said that the show is a win-win for DeCA and members of the food industry. Since the second ALA food show in 1999, DeCA has added 100 or more items to their stock assortment each year from local manufacturers and vendors.

According to Nixon, "The show gives our buyers an opportunity to taste and compare products side by side. It has benefited military shoppers by expanding the variety of products we sell in commissaries."

Alan Esperas, Pearl Harbor Commissary store director, explained some of the criteria used in choosing new commissary products. "We are looking for products that will appeal to our customer and a company that has a distribution system to

keep the product on the shelves," he said.

"Part of the fun of an assignment in Hawai'i is experiencing the culture - and food is a big part of the Hawaiian culture. When we bring into the commissary sauces and candies and other products made in Hawai'i with unique flavors and offer them at savings of 50 percent over commercial grocery stores, that goes a long way toward satisfying our customers," offered Esperas.

Many of the products that were picked up will be available on commissary shelves within 30-45 days.

The Hawai'i chapter of the ALA produces the show each year. The first show was held with merely a dozen companies. This year, companies had to be turned away because of lack of space, said Sharon Zambo-Fan, vice president of sales for Hawai'i Coffee Company and one of the event organizers. Next year's plans include moving the show to a larger venue in Waikiki.

Fireworks illegal on Navy installations and in Navy family housing areas

Happy Fourth of July! It's time to celebrate the independence of America. Observances of the Fourth of July holiday are synonymous with patriotism as Americans proudly display the American flag and celebrate their freedoms. It is a time for family get togethers, picnics and luaus, parades and many other events. For many people, the July 4 holiday also includes the use of fireworks.

Navy leadership wants Navy families to enjoy the Fourth of July holiday, but does not want it to be marred by accidents or tragedies. Fireworks, even in the hands of responsible persons, can be dangerous and unpredictable. The possession and/or use of any type of fireworks on any Navy property, especially in Navy housing areas, is illegal and forbidden. Violators may face eviction from housing and disciplinary action.

The ban on fireworks is a serious safety issue. Fireworks can cause serious injury and sometimes death. More than one victim has been "surprised" by fireworks that have exploded at an unexpected time due to mishandling or faulty materials.

According to statistics from the National Center for Injury Prevention and Control (NCIPC), emergency rooms treated 9,600 people for fireworks-related injuries in the United States in 2004 and eight people died from their injuries. About 40 percent of these injuries occurred among children ages 14 years and younger. Children ages five to nine years old have the highest injury rate for fireworks-related injuries. Males sustained about 76 percent of all injuries. Hands and fingers (33 percent), eyes (21 percent), and head and face (21 per-

cent) were the parts of the body most frequently injured. More than half of the injuries involved burns (62 percent).

The NCIPC points out that fireworks can also cause life-threatening residential fires. The danger of accidentally igniting property fires is another serious concern. Fireworks can ignite the roof of a house, a car, a tree, etc. and cause extensive damage for which residents will be held personally liable.

Brush fires are also a major concern since fireworks can ignite fires that could burn acres of land and place people in danger, destroy homes, and cause extensive damage.

Statistics provided by the National Fire Protection Association show that fireworks-related fires have caused at least \$15 to \$20 million in property loss each year in the past decade.


