## Sailors, family members pitch in for Ewa

Sailors and their family members from Navy Munitions Command Detachment Pearl Harbor worked under dark, ominous clouds, but the threat of bad weather didn't dampen spirits of the volunteers at the Ewa Beach cleanup on Oct. 14.

North Road in Ewa Beach experiences its share of litter and dumping so Sailors have been supporting Campbell High School by helping clean up the trash and educating neighbors about pollution under the city's adopt-a-block program. This was the third time in the past several months that the command, known formerly as Naval Magazine Pearl Harbor, partnered with the students to clean up the road that runs parallel to the school and continues to the command located near Iroquois Point. Although a recurring event, this was the first time that Navy family members joined in the morning cleanup effort, which resulted in a positive family workday.

Accompanying Torpedoman's Mate 1st Class Mark Robinson was his wife and their nine-year old son, who uncovered an old sneaker and even a cow's jaw bone mixed in the roadside trash.

"This is one way we can help out the Ewa community as a family, and at the same time, teach our son about being a responsible citizen by setting the example," said Robinson.

Sharing the desire to provide a valuable learning opportunity to train their son right and help develop good habits was TM1 Erik Calderon and his wife.

"We wanted to teach our son why it's important not to litter, beginning at an early age," said Calderon, whose four-year old son was the youngest volunteer.

The Navy-student team worked hard in the hot, humid

weather, but dehydration was not a threat as TM1 Eddie Aldana's spouse delivered bottled water to hydrate the volunteers.

"I've lived in Ewa Beach since 1993 and this is our way of giving back to the community," said Aldana, whose two sons stuffed oversized garbage bags with discarded fast food containers, plastic wrappers, cigarette butts, and other trash that was carelessly tossed to the roadside. The filled bags were then placed into awaiting city refuse trucks to be hauled away for proper disposal.

The city's program coordinator applauded the Navy's enforcement of a litter-free environment and thanked Senior Chief Danilo Boyles for gathering the volunteers for the Ewa Beach cleanup.

"North Road has multiple landowners and it takes everyone's cooperation to keep it clean," said Iwalani Sato of the city's department of environmental services. "The section of the road owned by the Navy is well taken care of and we appreciate your [Navy volunteers] coming out to help us clean up other areas of the road," added Sato.

Taking care of the surrounding community is engrained in the culture of the Navy Munitions Command.

"We can't let our community run down," said TM1 Gregory Tindle. "We need to step forward for the kids and the future of our community."

The litter on North Road was not only an eyesore, but the same junk that littered the road could have easily made its way to our streams and ocean through the storm drain system, explained Peter Nakamura, who manages the stormwater program for Navy Region Hawai'i. The hard working volunteers helped put a stop to this pollution cycle.

# Battleship Missouri Memorial honors the Navy's birthday with free admission

## USS Missouri Memorial Association

The Battleship Missouri Memorial is offering special discounts to all Navy personnel and their families through Sunday. This special offer is the memorial's way of honoring the Navy on its 231st birthday. There will be free admission for all active duty, reserve and retired Navy personnel and half-price admission for their family members.

"We welcome all of Hawai'i's Navy personnel to come out and visit the 'Mighty Mo' and help us celebrate the establishment of the United States Navy," said Paul Dyson, vice-president of marketing and sales for the USS Missouri Memorial Association.

On Oct. 13, 1775, meeting in Philadelphia, the Continental Congress voted to fit out two sailing vessels, armed with 10 carriage guns, as well as swivel guns. They would man the vessels with crews of 80 and send

them out on a cruise of three months to intercept transports carrying munitions and stores to the British army in America. This was the original legislation from which the Continental Navy grew and constitutes the birth certificate of the Navy.

The USS Missouri Memorial Association is a private Hawai'i-based 501(c) (3) non-profit organization designated by the U.S. Navy as caretaker of the Battleship Missouri Memorial. The association operates the Battleship Missouri Memorial. President George Herbert Walker Bush is the memorial's honorary chairman of the board. The memorial is supported by admissions, retail and concession sales, donations, grants, and the work of volunteers. It is not supported with government funding. The association was formed in 1994 and includes a cross-section of leaders from Hawai'i's business, civic, political, and retired military communities.


