

## DEFENSE helps Lake Erie down Charlotte

Information Systems Technician 1st Class Gennaro Hawkins, quarterback for USS Lake Erie (CG 70), threw for two touchdowns and ran in for another, while the team's defense forced four interceptions, as Lake Erie vanquished USS Charlotte (SSN 766) Panthers, 24-0, in a Morale, Welfare and Recreation Intramural Afloat Flag Football League game at Ward Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Oct. 17.

The win raised Lake Erie, last season's overall champs, to a record of 3-1 while Charlotte, which started off the year with two straight victories, fell to 2-2 in league play.

In beating Charlotte, Lake Erie appeared to have restored its reputation as this season's team to beat, which was in doubt after it stumbled to a 13-6 loss at the hands of USS La Jolla (SSN 701) in its last outing.

"Our last game was a fluke," said Hawkins. "We definitely had to come back strong to show everybody what we got."

Sonar Technician (Surface) 1st Class Tony Spence, who came up with a second-half interception that set up Lake Erie's final touchdown, pointed out that redemption was heavy on the team's mind as it prepared to do battle with Charlotte.

"We were very disappointed by our last game," admitted Spence. "So we wanted to make

sure we came out and show everybody why we are the defending champs."

On Charlotte's first possession, the inspired Lake Erie defense immediately asserted itself by pinning the Panthers on their own 10-yard line to force a punt on fourth down.

Shortly after, Lake Erie's offense got on the scoreboard as Operation Specialist 1st Class Lateef Day, who started the afternoon at QB for Lake Erie, guided the team to a touchdown in its opening drive of the game.

On fourth down, Day heaved a spiral from his own 30-yard line and connected with Operations Specialist 1st Class Jeff Pastwick, who caught the ball in stride and took it to the house for six.

Day gave way to Hawkins on the team's third offensive series and on his first play from scrimmage, Hawkins stepped in and promptly threw a 41-yard touchdown pass to Electronics Technician 2nd Class Corey Piggee.

"We did some free-lancing because I knew we could get them deep," said Hawkins. "I had him (Piggee) go over the top and just tried to get the ball down there."

Just before the end of the first half, Charlotte, deep in its own territory, took a gamble and attempted to pick up a first on fourth down.

However, Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Daniel Drury of Lake Erie made Charlotte pay for its high-risk decision when he sacked the Panthers quarterback, Electrician's Mate 2nd Class Nick Shellenberger, back at the 10.

One play later, Hawkins scampered into the end zone to give Lake Erie an 18-0 lead at the break.

In the opening minutes of the second half, Lake Erie's defense struck again when Spence corraled the team's third pick of the day and returned the ball to the Charlotte 20.

In just three

plays, Hawkins had the team knocking on the door again as he moved Lake Erie to the Charlotte two-yard line.

Then on third down, Hawkins lofted a pass to Fire Controlman 2nd Class Chris Robinson in the back of the end zone for the score - giving Lake Erie its final margin of victory.

Charlotte managed to march deep into Lake Erie territory on its final drive of the game, but that also ended on an interception.

"If we could run up the middle it would have been good, but it was tough," said Shellenberger, who was one of two Charlotte QBs that braved Lake Erie's strong pass rush. "We had a nice drive at the end, but the interception killed us."

Spence said while it was good to bounce back with a win after it lost to La Jolla, getting the shutout was like adding icing to a cake.

The game ended two minutes early due to the league's mercy rule, which states that a game must be called at the two-minute warning if one team is up by 19 points.

"Our goal is to mercy-rule everybody," said Spence. "After we come out of a huddle, we chant 'mercy rule.' That's our objective."

# Streak alive as Naval Station beats USS Ronald Reagan

Naval Station Pearl Harbor (NAVSTA), the reigning Morale, Welfare and Recreation intramural hoops champ, increased its winning streak against Navy teams to 23 games by beating the visiting USS Ronald Reagan (CVN 76), 55-48, at Naval Station Gym at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Oct. 14.

Chief Mass Communications Specialist Troy McCloud and Lt. Jason Jones paced the winning team with 15 and 14 points respectively, as NAVSTA got out to a 16-point lead and held off a strong rally by Reagan to extend its run of perfection by one more game.

"We had to shake the rust off, but we wanted to keep that streak going," admitted McCloud. "We knew that they were going to bring a lot of talent, but we were able to step up and get that win."

Jones added that while it was good to come out on top, he wasn't satisfied at the overall performance of the team. He professed that the final margin of victory should have been much larger.

Against Reagan, NAVSTA had a difficult time unleashing its vaunted running game, and also experienced some woes at the charity stripe – making only 10 of 23 shots from the line.

"Once we heard that Hickam beat them (Reagan) by 30 last night, I wasn't going to be satisfied with anything less than that – especially since Hickam is our arch rival," said Jones. "But we got what we needed. We kicked the dust off and got



some room in the first half."

Early in the contest, Reagan, behind the powerful inside game of Interior Communications Electrician 3rd Class Rickie Darden, matched NAVSTA point-for-point.

However, once NAVSTA was able to push the ball up court, the team began to slowly creep away from the visitors.

Back-to-back break-away baskets by Master-at-Arms 2nd Class Chance Scott gave NAVSTA an 18-10 advantage. And when McCloud scored his fourth basket with 2:25 remaining in the first half, NAVSTA got its first double-digit lead at 25-14.

After going into the break with a 30-18 lead, NAVSTA kept the pressure on in the second half and produced its biggest margin of 16 points at 39-23, when Personnel Specialist 3rd Class Aaron Jackson scored on a lay-up.

But instead of packing it up, Reagan fought back and pumped in seven straight points to cut the lead back under 10.

A basket by Jones stalled the rally, but after holding on to a 49-36 lead, Darden went on a tear and ripped off eight of the next 10 points as Reagan closed to within 51-44.

For the game, Darden was high-point man for Reagan – tallying 22 points.

Seven points would be as close as Reagan would get as, with time running out, Personnel Specialist 2nd Class Josh Kelly and McCloud scored the next

two baskets to put the game away for NAVSTA.

While Darden finished off the game strong, even slamming down a dunk at the buzzer for the final basket, he stated that fatigue from playing the night before and spending five months at sea may have prevented Reagan from completing the comeback.

"We had a hard game yesterday against Hickam and tonight we didn't have a full roster so that took a toll on us," said Darden. "We just couldn't get into this as a team. Everybody was on a different page."

Still, McCloud said that he was impressed with the skill level of the Reagan squad – especially with the team's strong inside game.

"I got all of my points on garbage points," noted McCloud. "I had to scrape for everything I could get. But when you play against good players like that, you just got to find the little crevices and get in there the best you can."

While the final score may have been closer than NAVSTA would have wanted it to be, McCloud said that with the intramural season just around the corner, playing in a tough game would go a long way toward preparing the team for its battles ahead.

"Tonight, we all know that we came up short," acknowledged McCloud. "But with the season coming up, this gets us back into the routine and will help us iron out the little wrinkles so we can repeat as champs."

# Paul Hamilton hands Allen's first defeat

The USS Paul Hamilton (DDG 60) "A" team used a tight defense and timely hitting to end Allen's winning streak at four games with a 9-3 victory in a Winter Softball League (WSL) game at Millican Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Oct. 17.

The WSL is a pay-to-play league that is open to active duty, family members and Department of Defense (DoD) employees 18 years and older.

Hamilton's record in the WSL stands at 3-0, while Allen's, a team that is mostly comprised of Naval Supply Corps Officers, saw its mark fall to 4-1.

"We were missing a couple of guys in the beginning and that had us off-track," said DoD employee Mike Brown, who played shortstop for Allen's. "We were too worried about bodies instead of hitting."

Despite walking seven batters, including Allen's leadoff hitter Brown three times, Chief Boatswain's Mate Terrance Mayweather of Paul Hamilton was able to consistently pitch out of a jam with the help of some stellar defense by the team's infield, led by shortstop, Fire Controlman 2nd Class Brandon Saul.

Mayweather held Allen's scoreless for the first five innings before allowing two runs in the top of the fifth and another tally in the seventh and final inning.

Hamilton's defense was

particularly impressive in the fourth as the team turned a six-four-three inning-ending double play to hold Allen's scoreless.

"I threw a lot of balls, but I was just trying to throw the ball over the plate," said Mayweather about throwing five innings of shutout ball. "They (defense) helped me out a whole lot. After I

walked a couple of guys, they got me out of the inning."

Saul added that playing tough defense is one of the keys for Paul Hamilton to be successful this season. "We were pretty solid on defense today," noted Saul. "That's what we try to be."

Although Paul Hamilton's gloves were

making the plays, the same could not be said of Allen's fielders, who made several key errors in the outfield that turned into runs for their opponents.

Misplayed balls in the outfield helped Paul Hamilton score three runs in the first, two runs in the fourth and another deuce in the fifth. Paul Hamilton also scored two

runs in the second inning. "That was so uncharacteristic of us," said Brown. "It was just one of those days. I think it kind of snowballed on us. We had a couple (of errors) early and it just got contagious."

Meanwhile, Paul Hamilton batters were also having a good day at the plate as the team was able to come up with the big hits when it needed it.

Paul Hamilton scored its two runs in the fourth after two outs and a runner on first.


"Everybody can drive the ball. We don't have anybody that isn't hitting," said Saul. "We just need to stay down on the ball and not pop it up."

While Paul Hamilton looked solid on defense and at the plate against Allen's, Mayweather said that he believes the team should get even better as the season progresses.

"We just got together, while we were out on deployment. But a lot of these guys played ball so that kind of works out for us," pointed out Mayweather. "We're still searching. Hopefully, by midseason we'll gel and everything will come together."

Allen's will try to bounce back from its defeat with a game versus USS Port Royal (CG 73) at Millican Field on Oct. 24, starting at 9 a.m., while Paul Hamilton has the weekend off.

Choy will be available to meet with patrons and sign autographs from 11 a.m. to noon.


The new book will hit the shelves in November. His previous works include "Aloha Cuisine," "Sam Choy's Sampler," and "The Choy of Seafood."




