As the saying goes, "freedom is never free." These words have never been more true or poignant than when a nation pauses on Nov. 11 to pay homage to fallen heroes in commemoration of Veterans Day.

Veterans Day is a special time of year where many Americans honor living veterans who have served in the armed forces as well as those who have made the ultimate sacrifice.

In the immortal words of well-known author Elmer Davis, who was also the director of the U.S. Office of War Information during WWII: "This nation will remain the land of the free only so long as it is the home of the brave."

So, as we celebrate Veterans Day this year, let us pause from our busy lives to pay tribute to those who have made the supreme sacrifice and let us thank those who serve our country.

Lake Erie ends season with win over Greenville

As USS Lake Erie (CG 70) gets ready to deploy, the shipmates delivered a strong final statement to the remaining teams in the Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) Afloat Intramural Flag Football League by beating USS Greenville (SSN 772), 27-6, at Ward Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Oct. 31.

Decked out in home-white uniforms, with Halloween-trimmed accents of orange and black, Lake Erie showed everyone just how scary it could be after scoring 27 unanswered points on All Hallow's Eve to send Greenville to its fourth consecutive loss without a win.

If Lake Erie, which won the league's overall championship last season, isn't able to make it back in time for the playoffs, the team will end the year with a record of 5-1. Its only loss came at the hands of USS La Jolla (SSN 701).

"We played like champs and everybody knows it," said Information Systems Technician 1st Class Gennarro Hawkins, quarterback of Lake Erie. "When the 70 rolls out of harbor, everybody will be happy to see it – including Naval Station (ashore favorites)."

"This was probably our last game, be we want them (MWR) to give us a rematch with La Jolla so we can show them what's up. That loss was a fluke," said Hawkins.

While Hawkins' bold words seemed to have been backed up by the team's solid play this season, Lake Erie's sense of superiority may have contributed to Greenville's only score of the game.

On Lake Erie's first offensive series, the team found itself deep in its own territory and faced a fourth-and-19

situation back on its 21-yard line.

Instead of punting the ball away, Lake Erie put Greenville in good field position when Hawkins went for it and failed to complete his pass.

"We haven't punted all year and I had no intention of punting," stated Hawkins.

Four plays later, Fire Control Technician Seaman Mickey Correll ran a quarterback sneak into the end zone from three yards out to give Greenville a 6-0 lead.

Down by a touchdown, Lake Erie responded immediately by using only six plays to travel 65 yards and tie the score at 6-6.

During the drive, Hawkins ran the ball twice and completed three of four passes, with the last toss connecting with Operations Specialist 2nd Class Zachary Hayden for 31 yards and a touchdown.

Lake Erie converted its point after touchdown to go

up by a score of 7-6 at half-time.

In the second half, Lake Erie opened the final 20 minutes of the game by going on a 20-play drive that ate up 17 minutes off the clock.

The time-consuming drive culminated on a 30-yard flea-flicker that went from Operations Specialist 1st Class Lateef Day to Hawkins, who then threw the ball downfield to a wide-open Seaman Erieck Ausbey for a touchdown.

Moments later, Ausbey put the game away for good when he stepped in front of a Correll pass at the 16-yard line and took it all the way to the house – giving Lake Erie a 21-6 advantage.

"Up until then, the game was a little shaky," admitted Ausbey. "But it (interception) brought a lot of momentum our way."

Correll agreed that the interception was the final straw that broke the camel's back.

"We were in it until I threw that interception," he acknowledged. "I wasn't too happy about that."

Lake Erie added its final touchdown, with less than two minutes remaining in the game, when Hawkins hooked up with Fire Controlman 2nd Class Chris Robinson on a four-yard strike to pay dirt.

The team's final drive was set up by Sonar Technician (Surface) 1st Class Karreem Lisbon, who recorded Lake Erie's third interception off Correll.

Lisbon, who will be leaving Lake Erie for another command, bid a fond farewell to his shipmates immediately after the game.

"I leave the ship in two weeks," said Lisbon, who has been playing football for Lake Erie for four years. "I've been playing flag football for 10 years, but the last four have been the best."

Recycling is here for Forest City residents

plastic containers (throw away containers that held automotive or other hazardous fluids).

- Newspaper (remove glossy inserts).
- Cardboard (no single-layer chipboard like cereal, detergent or tissue boxes).

Forest City housing residents asked for it and Forest City worked hard to get it. All Forest City's off-base communities will be involved in the City and County of Honolulu's recycling program starting in November.

Blue recycling bins will be delivered shortly if they haven't been already. Residents in Pearl City Peninsula, Halawa and McGrew are already participating in this program.

From now on, residents will have two carts: a blue one for recycling and a green or gray bin for trash. As always, if residents have HI five (five cent) recyclables, they can redeem those as usual at any recycling center for five cents each and further reduce household and recycling waste.

Here are the guidelines for the blue recycling bins:

- Aluminum cans.
- Glass bottles and jars (discard lids and tops).
- Numbers one and two

Always make sure recyclables are free of food or liquids. All other trash goes into the green or gray refuse bins. If residents are recycling correctly, they should be able to reduce trash by up to 40 percent. All residents are required to participate in the program.

Residents should also be aware that there will be a change in the trash pick-up schedule. Starting the week of Dec. 4, refuse will only be picked up on Friday. Starting the first week of November, recyclables will be collected on alternating Tuesdays.

Eagles flying high with triple-threat combination

The Pearl Harbor Eagles continued to soar above the competition by shutting out the Texans from Marine Corps Base Hawai'i, 52-0, in a Hawai'i Military Youth Athletic Association (HMYAA) Midget Division (ages 13-15) flag football game at Quick Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Oct. 31.

The HMYAA is an inter-base youth organization that includes teams from Pearl Harbor, Hickam Air Force Base and Marine Corps Base Hawai'i.

The Texans were the latest victims in the Eagles' race to the top of the HMYAA. With the win, the Eagles raised their record to an eye-popping 6-0 record.

"We want to go undefeated and then win the tournament," said Yeoman 1st Class Maurice Evans, who is stationed at Navy Information Operations Command (NIOC) Hawai'i and is the head coach of the Eagles. "That's been our goal from week one," he said.

While the Eagles seem to be deep in talent throughout their lineup of seven players, the team's success is mainly fueled by a set of triplets and a towering 15-year-old, who stands head and shoulders above players from around the league.

With HMYAA using a five-on-five format to play its games, it's hard not to notice the Chang brothers (Kylan, Randen and Jalen) – especially when they comprise three-fifths of the Eagles' starting team.

And when you add the skills of 6-foot-2-inch returning player DeMarcus Roberts to the talents of the identical triplets, you have the makings of a potentially dominating squad.

"I had a real good feeling at the start of the season," said Evans after seeing his team for the first time.

Against the Texans, the Changs were at their typical best, as the trio had their hands in all of the Eagles' 52 points.

Kylen, the team's starting

quarterback, threw four touchdowns – three coming in the second half – in leading the Eagles to the lopsided victory.

Meanwhile, Randen and Jalen were doing their best to keep the Texans offense off the scoreboard.

The tandem accounted for five interceptions, with Randen pulling down three and returning all of his picks for touchdowns.

"I knew some of his (Texans quarterback) plays because he ran them before," said Randen.

"I usually just watch the quarterback and when he throws, I just make a break for it."

Although the brothers make it seem like they have been

playing together for their entire lives, their mother Sandy said that this is the boys' first season in the HMYAA.

Previously, the trio played

three years together in an outside league, but since that organization only accepts players until the age of 14, she felt that the HMYAA presented a good opportunity for her sons to keep playing football.

"I didn't know what to do with them. They were just sitting in the house playing video games," said the boys' mom. "When I saw the sign (announcing the HMYAA's new season), I said, 'That's it. You guys are playing.'"

Evans said that it didn't take long before he knew that the brothers would be a solid addition to the Eagles.

"All three of them are great," noted Evans. "From week two, I knew what their strengths were. Their ability to work together is awesome. I never had three players like that."

While the brothers were busy doing their thing on the field against the Texans, Roberts was shuffled in and out of the game to keep the Eagles from running up the score even further.

However, Evans stated that when the team needs Roberts, he knows that the man-sized youth will be ready to go.

"He's one of my leaders on the team," said Evans. "He was on my fall and spring teams, so he brings a good understanding to this team."
