

## Heroes of PEARL HARBOR ATTACK

### Arthur Herriford

Fire Controlman 3rd Class aboard Detroit (CL-8), moored at Ford Island during the Pearl Harbor attacks

*"Once the attacks were over, we went to sea looking for the enemy with orders to 'seek and engage.' We had no air cover at that time because the Japanese had destroyed most of our planes at Hickam. A fellow fire fighter and myself took \$20 bills out of our wallet and lighted them with our lighters and then lit our cigarettes from the burning bills. We didn't care about burning up our money. We figured it was a one-way trip."*



### Durrell Connor

Yeoman 2nd Class, USS California

*"After we got hit a few times, the captain ordered us to abandon ship. Then later he changed his mind and asked everyone to come back. At that time, I noticed the flag wasn't up so I went over and raised the flag to signal to others to come back to the ship and fight. That was one of my finest moments."*



### Louis "Lou" Conter

Quartermaster 3rd Class, USS Arizona

*"There are a lot of myths out there surrounding the USS Arizona band that are not true. I was the quartermaster on watch that morning and half of the band was with me, playing colors when the planes started coming. When I gave general's orders, they went to their battle stations to fight. Then came the big blast (from the ammunition magazine between turrets one and two) and that is what got all of them."*



### Edward Borucki

Yeoman 3rd Class aboard USS Helena

*"I was one of four Boruckis to serve the Navy in WWII and I am the only one left. When I come back to Pearl Harbor, it is a sentimental journey that brings back old feelings. Memories like the day before when I was on the ship, there was one fellow who got me a sandwich. The next day he was dead."*



### Sterling Cale

Pharmacist Mate 2nd Class at Pearl Harbor Shipyard

*"When I first went aboard the USS Arizona, there was ashes blowing off of the deck. I said, 'Geez, ashes like that somebody's burned right down to the deck.' But I didn't have any way to stop them from blowing through my hands. So I just sort of sank down on one knee and shed a few tears. Then I realized that there still was work that needed to be done and bodies that needed to be claimed. I collected myself and went back to work."*



### Robert Irwin

Aviation Radio 3rd Class for USS Enterprise, at the receiving barracks waiting for his ship the day of the Pearl Harbor attacks.

*"I went to the dry dock where we had to flood the dock in order to fire some of the surface guns aboard the ships there. From where I was, I watched the bombs hit the Arizona and her go up in flames. It is nothing like you could ever imagine."*



### Everett Hyland

Seaman aboard USS Pennsylvania

*"It is pretty nice to be here 68 years after this incident because it means I am still above ground. When people ask me, 'What does my Navy experience mean to me?' I say, 'Forget the bad times, you should only remember the fun you had.'"*



### Herbert Weatherwax

Army private, Schofield

*"I really feel that people should continue to remember this day and never forget. I am 92 years old, and I must say this is something that stays with you. When I visit the USS Arizona Memorial, it takes my mind to that morning where I saw total destruction. That is something that will never leave me."*



### Alexander Dyga

Technician 5, Hawaii i Division Pack Train, Schofield

*"I was the only one (in my unit) who had a radio in my room and when I went in there to turn it on, the guys who were still sleeping threw a shoe at me. They said 'Get the hell out of here, today's Sunday and we want to sleep.' I said, 'Hey there is something going on outside.' And all at once a bomb hit, and the guys came flying out of the barracks with only their shorts on to see what had happened."*



# Falcons lasso Colts in OT for Termite title

Only 10 yards separated the Falcons from the Colts, but it was just enough as the birds beat the ponies in overtime to win the Hawai'i Military Youth Athletic Association (HMYAA) Termite Division (ages 9-10) flag football championship at Quick Field, Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Dec. 5.

The HMYAA is an inter-base youth organization that includes teams from Pearl Harbor, Hickam Air Force Base and Marine Corps Base Hawai'i.

The title contest ended in a 14-14 deadlock at the end of regulation, which forced the extra overtime period to decide the overall champions.

In overtime, teams take turns from the five-yard line. The squad that gains the most yards from the line of scrimmage is declared the winner.

The Colts won the coin toss and got possession first, but were stopped without advancing the ball after three downs.

Meanwhile, the Falcons were able to move the pigskin out to the 15-yard line in their time of possession to claim the title.

"This was a team effort, defensively and offensively," said Air Force Master Sgt. Thomas Bruni, who along with Tech. Sgt. Rodney Cathcart, served as co-head coach of the Falcons. "It's always about the team and that's what we did all year."

In order to make it to the title game, both teams had to overcome three other opponents in the day-long tourna-

ment that started at 8 a.m. and ended with the championship contest at 2 p.m.

The Colts made their way to the finals by beating Kaneohe, 23-13, Pearl Harbor, 34-12, and the Jets, 25-19, while the Falcons defeated Kaneohe Bay, 36-0, Pearl Harbor Saints, 13-0, and the Bears, 13-7.

Against the Falcons, the Colts threatened first, when, on first down from their own five-yard line, running back D.J. Hutchins got the handoff and scampered to the Falcons six.

However, with their backs up against a wall, Falcons defender J.P. Leshikar made an

outstanding play when he stepped in front of a Colts receiver and knocked away the pass on third down at the three to force a change of possession.

The Colts defense got the ball back immediately when defensive back Will Rizer intercepted a pass at the 23 and returned the ball to the Fal-

cons three.

Three plays later, the Colts got on the scoreboard first when quarterback Mac Smith found Carter Golovach on the right side of the end zone. The team's point after touchdown (PAT) failed - giving the Colts a 6-0 lead.

On their next possession, the

Falcons responded quickly as they needed only two plays to move the ball 45 yards and a touchdown.

From the team's own seven-yard line, Falcons player Sam Mielke took the pitch and scored on a 43-yard jaunt to tie the score. The Falcons went up, 7-6, after they converted a PAT.

Then, with time running down in the first half, the Falcons added another touchdown when quarterback Braden Cain hooked up with Xavier Cathcart, the coach's son, for a catch-and-run toss that covered 26 yards. The Falcons made good on their PAT to go into the break with a 14-6 lead.

With both teams engaged in a defensive battle in the second half, the Colts made one last comeback attempt when Hutchins broke out on a 45-yard run to pay dirt. The Colts converted on a two-point PAT to tie the score and force the game into overtime.

After coming up short in OT, Army Spc. Dougan Dietz, who is a co-head coach with Air Force Lt. Col. Mike Smith of the Colts, said that even in defeat, he was extremely proud of the effort from his team.

"It was just one of those things," said Dietz. "The Falcons are a great team and they deserve it. We beat them in the regular season, but their defense was outstanding. They were disciplined and where they were supposed to be on every play."

Cathcart said that with both teams giving it their all to win the title, he knew that it would all come down to which squad wanted it the most.

"We always tell our kids to play from the heart and play with determination," said Cathcart.

Awards, the Hawaiian music industries' equivalent of the Grammy.

Just in time for the holiday season, Raiatea teamed up with local chocolate company Hawaiian Host for their second annual music promotion. For a limited time, fans can purchase the special edition Christmas Medley chocolates and receive a free CD with Raiatea's new single and three previously-released tracks.

The relationship between Raiatea and Hawaiian Host began in 2008 when the company signed on as a sponsor for the Hawaiian Blossom Tour. The teamup was so well received that the two continue to work together to spread Hawaiian music and chocolate around the world. So far, boxes of the limited edition promotion have been tracked across the U.S., Asia and even to military members serving

in the Middle East.

Previous to the recent holiday event, Raiatea has maintained a busy schedule throughout the year. She began 2009 by performing for President Barack Obama in Washington, D.C. on behalf of the Hawai'i State Society's inaugural ball. Since then, she has been touring along the east coast, San Francisco, Japan, Tahiti and most recently, China.

On Aug. 8, Raiatea celebrated her 25th birthday with a sold-out concert at the Hawai'i Theater. The performance was filmed and recently released on DVD.

Since first breaking into the Hawaiian music scene at the age of 18, Raiatea has released three albums to her credit, which include "Hawaiian Blossom," "Sweet and Lovely," and her debut album, "Far Away Heaven."

Robert Rice, commanding officer of MCB Hawai'i, recently provided his approval to operate a test to determine if there is a need for such services. The NEX currently has plans to operate the service for two months before conducting a full evaluation to de-

termine its success.

"Based on participation and feedback from our customers, we have the flexibility to make changes and look forward to offering this option to the Sailors, Marines and families at MCB Hawai'i," said Ilderton.

The NEX shuttle currently provides transportation to the Sailors of Pearl Harbor and makes stops at various key locations around base. First initiated in 1998, the shuttle transports more than 113,000 Sailors and family members annually.

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





### Amelia (PG)

After becoming the first woman to fly across the Atlantic, Amelia was thrust into a new role as America's sweetheart - the legendary "goddess of light," known for her bold, larger-than-life charisma. Yet, even with her global fame solidified, her belief in flirting with danger and standing up as her own, outspoken woman never changed. She was an inspiration to people everywhere, from First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt to the men closest to her heart: her husband, promoter and publishing magnate George P. Putnam, and her long time friend and lover, pilot Gene Vidal.
