The Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS Paul Hamilton (DDG 60) transformed its passageways and bulkheads from a battle-ready vessel to Pearl Harbor's own version of the 'Black Pearl' during a haunted ship family day Oct. 25 onboard Naval Station Pearl Harbor.

Military personnel, civilians and their children from around the waterfront were invited to partake in the festivities, which included a tour of the haunted ship and a trip to the mess decks to enjoy Halloween-themed games and treats.

Spider webs, fake blood and dark lighting are a Halloween norm, but being on a 'cursed' ship allowed Paul Hamilton Sailors to take ship equipment and convert it into a haunted version. Key additions included hanging flash gear and fire fighting equipment topped off with a skeleton head.

"This year we decided to expand it from a Paul Hamilton thing to open it up at large to the waterfront," said Cmdr. Brent

Smith, commanding officer of Paul Hamilton. "Seeing the final product of what the Sailors put together was amazing and everyone did such a great job."

The crew of Paul Hamilton not only set up the tour, but literally popped out in various places to provide life-like entertainment for visitors looking to be frightened in the Halloween spirit.

"The tour was very scary, my favorite part was the dead firemen," said a child of a Paul Hamilton Sailor.

"To have more than 30 volunteers on a Saturday afternoon was great," said Electronics Technician 1st Class (SW) Edward Drury, coordinator for the event. "Everyone from the captain down got dressed up to get in the spirit and give everyone a great time."

Paul Hamilton tries to hold the haunted ship as an annual event and the crew looks forward to scaring people next year.

"We spent a lot of money this year and plan on spending more next year," said Drury. "We plan to be back here next year to keep scaring people and taking part in the Halloween spirit."

## Beeman Center gets renovated

From the outside, Beeman Center looks like the same old hangout for Single Sailors.

But after a quick walk through the bright yellow lobby, the area opens to a media, gaming and computer facility fit for the king (or queen) of high-end technology.

"We created a fun, relaxing environment for the sailors," said Liberty Program Director, Millie Gomes. "This is now the best place on base to watch a movie or play the latest video games."

The new gaming room includes 16 plasma screen televisions, each mounted to the wall and offers both Wii and Xbox 360 game systems. Comfortable chairs are arranged around the plasma screens, so individuals (or

small groups) have space to get their game on. Also, for the gamers who want to release their inner rock star, there are several rooms specifically used for the music video games "Rock Band" and "Guitar Hero."

"The renovations have made an already nice facility into something bigger and better," said Liberty Representative, Marlyn Chandler. "With all of the additional equipment, we can accommodate more sailors."

In addition to the new gaming stations, Beeman Center is home to a humongous projector screen, which spans 160 inches and shows free movies and sports throughout the day. Sailors can choose from more than 300 movies already on hand, and each month, new releases are added to the existing collection. This large, the-

atre-like setting includes leather recliners and cushy viewing couches for a cozy viewing experience.

"Sometimes, I come here to hang out and watch a flick," said FTSN Daniel Harvey. "It's nice coming here because you don't have to break the bank — everything is free." The free amenities include six pool tables, two ping-pong tables, popcorn, coffee and slush drinks. The facility also serves freshly brewed, on tap draft root beer courtesy of CP Brewery. Although the facility lacks a kitchen or cafeteria, Burger King is conveniently located next-door and accessible via the rear entrance.


"I have been coming here for awhile," said FT2 Chris Williams. "This place is really convenient for the sailors living in the barracks. You can come here and shoot pool

and it's great because there's food next door. I think people are really going to have a good time with the new video games."

Getting on the Web is still available in the large computer room. Internet usage is free and

with 30 computers, there is rarely a wait. In a separate area, a docking station is available for those who want to bring in personal laptops. "Beeman Center is like a living room for the sailors," said Chandler. "They come here to relax when they want to get out of the barracks."

## 'Home of the Brave Quilt Project' returns to Pacific Aviation Museum

The "Home of the Brave Quilt Project" (HOTB) returns to Pacific Aviation Museum Pearl Harbor on Nov. 12 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. to offer Museum visitors a way of expressing gratitude to the families of Hawai'i soldiers who have died in the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

The HOTB project is comprised of quilting volunteers that hand sew and present a homemade quilt to the family of every soldier who has died in the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. Visitors to the Museum are invited to view the quilts, watch the assembly, and sign the quilts for Hawai'i's military families.

During the American Civil War, quilts sewn on the home front served as bedrolls and hospital blankets and offered a measure of comfort to those far away from their loved ones. In that tradition, the "Home of the Brave Quilt Project" designs and sews quilts in the same patterns as those created during the Civil War.

Voters should return their completed ballot immediately upon receiving it. Overseas voters should vote and return their state absentee ballot Or the federal write-in absentee ballot (FWAB) during this period to Make sure that their ballot is received by the local election official In time to be counted. Personnel who receive state absentee ballots After submitting the voting process by Completing and returning

the state ballot as well. For those states that allow late counting, ballots must be voted on or before election Day and must be received by the state late counting deadline. Overseas VAOS should consult their local military post office for the Latest date voters may send their ballot (depending on country mail conditions) and have it received by the local election official in time To be counted.

All VAOS are reminded to log onto the voting infor-

mation management system quarterly to ensure their reporting information is correct and Up to date. Commander, Navy Installations Command navy voting assistance program stands ready to support VAOS at all levels in their efforts. 



## How to submit stories and photos to Hawaii Navy News

The staff of Hawaii Navy News welcomes submissions of stories and photos from the Navy community and commands. Help us to tell the story about our Navy and its Sailors and their families.

Here are some guidelines to help you:

Hawaii Navy News is published every Friday. The deadline for submissions is no later than close of business on Friday, a week prior to publication. Articles/photos should be submitted earlier than deadline when possible. It is also helpful if you let us know that you plan to submit a story and/or photo in advance of submission.

Timeliness is important. Submissions should be sent as soon as possible after the event, but no later than two weeks after the event in order to be considered for publication.

Submissions should be sent to [hnn@honoluluadvertiser.com](mailto:hnn@honoluluadvertiser.com) and also "cc" either the managing editor, Chief David Rush, at [david.rush@navy.mil](mailto:david.rush@navy.mil) or the editor, Karen Spangler, at [karen.spangler@navy.mil](mailto:karen.spangler@navy.mil).

Submissions must contain the following elements:

- Byline of author of article and his/her title and

command.

- Photo credit (who took the photo).

- Cutline information which explains what is happening in the photo.

- Who, what, when, where and why.

- Both first and last names, rates, ranks and warfare designations must be supplied for all of those who are mentioned in the story, quoted, and/or in cutline information. Positions and commands should also be provided for those who are quoted in the story.

Photos should be action photos, not shots of groups "posing" for the camera. If you need some additional guidance, please call us.

Photos should be at least 300 dpi if five by seven inches or slightly larger. This is necessary in order to ensure that the photo resolution is of high enough quality for newspaper printing. However, don't send huge photo files - resize large files before sending.

Ensure that stories/photos have been approved per the guidelines of your command prior to submission.

If any of the above information is missing, it must be supplied no later than 10 a.m. Tuesday (the week of

publication) or the story/photo will not be published.

Adherence to guidelines in meeting deadlines is critical in order for HNN to meet its publication deadlines. Regardless of the situation, our publication deadlines don't change.

Community calendar items should contain the who, what, where, when and why, be as concise as possible, and include a phone number that can be published with the item. Sending a flyer, power point, etc. with the information is not acceptable. The basic information should be compiled and provided in a Word document. Please refer to page B5 of Hawaii Navy News for format for community calendar items. The same deadlines apply.

Make sure that you provide your contact information - phone number as well as email - with your submission. We need to be able to reach you quickly if we have questions.


