

Sailors hit the slopes with MWR

During winter in Naples, the days are short, the nights are long and the chill in the air often seems to make people feel run down. What better way to combat the seasonal doldrums than with an exhilarating, heart-pounding, ride down the side of a mountain with the howl of the cold wind echoing in frigid ears.

Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Moral, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) took a group to enjoy winter downhill sports Feb. 13 on a trip to the Roccaraso ski resort in Abruzzo, Italy.

The Navy outdoor recreation center (NOR), located in Carney Park, organizes and offers the popular trip throughout the winter sports season.

"The ski/snowboard trips stand for getting away from crazy traffic and weird weather," said Mandie Smeeton, a recreation aid at the NOR center. "It's an amazing time on the mountain whether you're a beginner or have been snowboarding or skiing for years, everyone ends up enjoying their time on the snow."

The European sport of skiing dates back to pre-historic Nordic people in what is modern day Scandinavia and was used in hunting, military campaigns and as a practical means of personal transportation. Snowboarding, in contrast, is a

relatively new sport developed in the United States in the 60's and 70's and has become popular among younger winter sports enthusiast and the Naples military community.

"I came out here to catch some big air," said Christopher Carpenter, a patron of a recent trip who tried snowboarding for the first time. "I found out very quickly that I'm not so good at snowboarding, but I had a blast making it down from the top of the mountain anyway."

The Roccaraso trip provides Naples military community members an opportunity to try something different.

"This trip is definitely worth a repeat," said Scott Fulford, another first time snowboarder who along with friends, took a Gondola ride to the top of the mountain and snowboarded back down. "I ended up taking a tumble and damaging the binding on my board. I had to borrow a screwdriver to fix it and had a blast boarding the rest of the day."

NOR center recreation aids take pride in helping Naples military community members find entertaining activities available while they are stationed overseas.

"We're here to provide a service and guide the military members so they can have a good time without having to travel out on their own," said Smeeton. "Roccaraso is special because it gives us snow and an adventure to challenge ourselves."

XO's Corner

I would like to take a moment and talk about personal safety. We are very fortunate here in Italy to know when and where groups will be striking. It's their right to strike, and those of us who have been here for a while have seen many. But do you know what to do if the front gate is closed due to a strike? Don't wait to figure this out should this occur; all hands are recommended to review alternate routes to and from Capodichino, the Support Site, and their home on the economy. Each of us should take some time to make sure all driving family members know the route, exit, or directions of how to get to Capo and the Support Site using both gates. Supervisors are reminded to review and update essential personnel lists to minimize traffic to and from the bases. You can tune to AFN TV and Radio (106.0 or 107.0 FM) for updates related to gate closures. In addition, NSA Naples will also put the word out through PAO Notes, Facebook, and all the other means available. Be prepared! Should NSA Naples direct the use of the "back gate," it shouldn't be your first time getting there. Of course, everyone is reminded to refrain from any interaction with demonstration participants. The last thing we need is for one of our service members to be so zealous to get to work that he or she drives through a protest and injures or gets into a confrontation with a participant. Safety is something the Skipper and I hold very dear, and it starts with each and every one of us being prepared.

Another topic I hold dear is the Navy Sponsorship program. I want to remind supervisors to choose sponsors wisely. Make sure the individual you select represents your Command/Department well and that they match up with the gaining service member as closely as possible. In other words, don't have a single service member who resides in the BEQ sponsor a Sailor bringing his or her family intent on living on the economy. Additionally, remember to have sponsors sign up the newly arriving individual for ICR. This is mandatory for all new personnel to NSA Naples. **THIS IS A Command's responsibility.** One important thing a sponsor can do is to gather information on things to do here in the area as well as outside Naples. There are plenty of opportunities on base and off-base! MWR, ITT and the USO work hard so we have many choices, and I recommend you take full advantage of your tour in Italy. Some options might be a free movie, a bowling party, a trip into downtown Naples or as grand as a trip to hundreds of amazing destinations throughout Europe and Africa! I always encourage people to get out and about; you'll be surprised at what you can see and how affordable it can be!

Remember, ALL U.S. military members with dependents that have been permanently stationed in Italy for more than three months are eligible to participate in the Living Pattern Survey for Military Cost of Living Allowance survey, which can be found at <https://www.defensetravel.dod.mil/oscola/lps/italy/>. **PLEASE, I URGE YOU AND YOUR SPOUSE TO COMPLETE THIS VERY IMPORTANT SURVEY!** We will be getting some feedback next week on eligible member's participation here in the Naples area...OUR GOAL is 100 percent!

Downpours cause landslides in Calabria

Heavy rain caused more than 200 mudflows and landslides in the Calabria region. Authorities forced all 2,300 residents of Maierato, a small town in Calabria, to leave their homes Tuesday after a large section of hillside broke off burying most of the town under rubble and debris. Many towns around Cosenza and Catanzaro were evacuated due to floods and landslides, and according to the Italian environmental protection group Legambiente, there are areas at high risk for flooding in every town in the region due to widespread illegal building and inadequate drainage systems. Most of the towns have emergency plans in place but more than half of them need to be updated, according to Legambiente.

Italian civil servants face new workplace rules

Government employees working with the public began wearing name tags Monday due to a policy which introduced Civil Service Minister Renato Brunetta's campaign against civil servants slacking and being rude. Public employees will be accountable for their behavior on the job and supervisors who fail to wear name tags will be fined. This policy is unpopular with public employees who went on strike against it in December.

'Disney on Ice' comes to Naples

Naples will host the mega-production of "Disney on Ice" for the first time. The show will lead the audience to four destinations with the company of many Disney friends. Mickey and Minnie will be two guides who will take children and adults to four famous Disney enchanting worlds from "The Little Mermaid" to "Peter Pan." The show will be March 10 and 14 at Teatro Palapartenope.

Italian police seize dangerous waste

In the port of Taranto, in the Puglia region, Italian police seized more than 600 tons of untreated dangerous waste concealed inside 24 containers. They believed the materials were destined for China. In the past 12 months, tax police and custom officials seized 61 containers destined for export which contained 1,400 tons of dangerous waste materials. Authorities are still investigating 41 people including bank managers involved in the illegal management and transport of waste.

Rome tomb auctioned

In Rome's monumental Verano cemetery, a neoclassical tomb was auctioned online. The tomb, which can house ten, reached a winning bid of €940,000 (about \$1.3 million). The bidder was not identified. Due to the successful sale of the graveyard, 20 Verano tombs and ten others will be sold in the next six months. Most Italian graves have a short sell-by date; the new tombs have a 75-year lease.

T-Line Sailors keep Naples flying

The critical work of Sailors in the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Transient aircraft line division (T-Line) supports the needs of the Naples area military community at all hours of the day and night. Few service members and their dependents traveling to and from NSA Naples on a government passenger aircraft would get the opportunity to notice them or see the hard work they do. Yet, despite the long hours and a sometimes unpredictable flight schedule, Sailors of the T-Line, understand that their jobs are critical to successful air operations.

"We bring them in and we park them," said ABHAA Constance Ford, assigned to NSA Naples Air Operations Division. "I love my job because I get to see different aircraft everyday and meet new people."

T-Line Sailors leap into their various jobs the moment the aircraft completes its taxi roll-out. Some of the less than glamorous tasks include: moving massive pallets of cargo, loading and unloading baggage, aircraft movement, maintenance and upkeep of the runway, and ensuring passengers and very important people (VIPs) receive a proper welcome to NSA Naples.

"We have been tasked on short notice to support incoming flights for Africa Command, U.S. Naval Forces Europe, and the secretary of the Navy," said Aviation Boatswain's Mate Second Class Maungwai Soe, an aircraft handler attached to NSA Naples Air Operations Division. "We may have to support a VIP flight arriving with only a few hours notice."

NSA Naples T-Line Sailors also utilize an innovative method for managing the limited parking space on a flight line shared with the Italian international airport.

"We use a Powerpoint template to help determine where we'll stage the planes" said Ford. "We discuss it as a shop and then submit it up our chain of command."

Another T-Line area of responsibility is the ability to respond to an aircraft incident.

"Although we're a much smaller facility, we also serve as an alternate destination for Naval Air Station (NAS) Sigonella in Sicily," said Soe. "We support NAS Sigonella as a diversionary airfield when their runway is closed for maintenance or if an aircraft en route there has to declare an emergency."

Responding to a flight line casualty also means maintaining a limited ability to assist in fighting fires. A number of division personnel have attended the Louise F. Garland Department of Defense Fire Academy at Goodfellow Air Force base in Texas.

"Folks that returned from the fire fighting school pass what they've learned on to the rest of the people in the division" said Soe.

With an average of two launch and recoveries per day, NSA Naples T-Line division personnel average more than 300 separate aircraft movements and support missions per year. Aircraft that have recently transited through NSA Naples have been transporting American and coalition troops deploying and redeploying for both Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom.

"I think T-Line division personnel make a significant contribution to the overall accomplishment of the mission of NSA Naples" said Soe.

Divers, EOD assist in salvage operation

U.S. Navy Sailors and civilian mariners attached to USNS Grapple (T-ARS 53) aided in the recovery of Ethiopian Airlines Flight 409.

Grapple received the call to assist in the salvage of the crashed aircraft Jan. 25 off the coast of Lebanon. The ship immediately got underway from Tunis, Tunisia and traveled to Augusta Bay, Sicily to pick up 15 U.S. Navy Divers and Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technicians (EOD), before making the trip to Lebanon.

The 15 member team, comprised of Mobile Diving Salvage Unit 2 (MDSU-2) and Explosive Ordnance Disposal Mobile Unit 8 (EOD MU8) Sailors, worked together in recovery efforts.

"It's not out of the ordinary to bring EOD units alongside MDSU units," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 William Turner, the officer in charge of the embarked MDSU detachment. "They bring additional equipment to the table that allows us to work more efficiently in an operation like this."

The EOD detachment brought along equipment

such as the MK-16 breathing apparatus, hand-held sonar equipment and additional medical personnel to assist with the mission, said Turner.

"We're here to support the government of Lebanon in any way," said Senior Chief Navy Diver Sam Mataa, the EOD detachment's "Master Diver," who is the senior diver responsible for overseeing the efficiency and safety of the mission. "This is their operation; we're here to bring additional technical experience and diving and salvage equipment in case they need it."

After arriving off the coast of Lebanon, the divers and EOD personnel teamed up with members of the Lebanese Armed Forces to conduct a search of the area. As a result of teamwork, the coalition of U.S. and Lebanese forces were able to locate and recover some of the wreckage.

"I'm proud of the work that our team accomplished," said Turner. "It was great to work alongside the EOD team and the Lebanese Armed Forces, and our team accomplished a lot in a short time frame."

Mobile Diving Salvage Unit 2 is home ported in Little Creek, Virginia, and EOD Mobile Unit 8 is home ported out of Augusta Bay, Sicily. Grapple is home ported out of Norfolk.

Naples Public Health Evaluation

Laboratory analysis

With the completion of the Phase II (regional) sampling for the nine study areas of the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE), the primary focus has now shifted to lab analysis, validation, report writing and review. But what does that consist of? What do scientists look for? And, how long does it take?

In the two main phases of the PHE, Navy technicians took samples of tap water, air, soil and soil gas at most residences. In addition, ambient air (outdoor air) samples were collected from nearby air monitoring stations located in each of the nine study areas in the Campania region from June 2008 to July 2009.

Each sample was then sent to a laboratory in Germany for analysis using United States Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) methods. Researchers looked for approximately 200 chemicals and microorganisms in six main categories:

- Volatile organic compounds (VOCs)
- Semi-volatile organic compounds (SVOCs)
- Pesticides/polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs)
- Dioxins and furans
- Metals
- Microorganisms

Additionally, tap water samples were also sent to a specialized laboratory in the U.S. where the samples were analyzed for radiological components.

The type of work performed in this stage of the PHE is known as analytical chemistry. Analytical chemistry is most concerned with the questions, "what chemicals are present in the sample and in what quantities are they present?" To find the answers, researchers use sophisticated instruments. In fact, many analytical chemists specialize on a single type of instrument. Standard USEPA analytical methods were selected to specifically identify and quantify various categories of target chemicals so that comparability and consistency can be maintained over time. This is especially true in environmental applications, like the Naples PHE.

Because researchers look for so many chemicals in each sample, thousands of data points are generated and all of that data goes through a very detailed and formalized process. The first part of this process is called data validation. In

this phase, an analytical chemist or scientist ensures that the result reported from the lab is reliable and can be used for decision making purposes. Some examples of what is included in this process include reviewing all of the calculations made by the lab and reviewing the "chain of custody" paper trail showing that the sample was properly controlled and secured from the time the sample was collected until it was received and processed by the lab.


After this is completed, risk assessors, chemists, and environmental scientists then evaluate the data to derive its meaning. For example, do the results indicate that some health concern could exist in the media that was sampled and if so, what is the risk and what actions should be taken? In general, it takes about 14 to 16 weeks to complete the entire process.

As part of Phase II, Navy technicians sampled 202 homes throughout the Campania region. Phase I, which concluded in late April 2009, included the sampling of 166 homes in the nine study areas of Naples and Caserta, with an emphasis on places where there were known or suspected waste sites. Phase II expands on those results and involves a more spatially and geographically balanced sampling effort across the nine study areas.

The goal is to have the final Phase II report ready for public release by the summer of 2010.

Safety information for American students traveling abroad

As spring and summer breaks approach, many students are getting ready for a trip abroad. The majority of students traveling abroad will have safe and enjoyable adventures. However, even with the best-planned trips, things can go wrong.

Each year, more than 2,500 American citizens are arrested abroad – about half on narcotics charges, including possession of very small amounts of illegal substances.

Being arrested is not the only thing that can go wrong on a foreign vacation. U.S. citizens have been badly injured or have been killed in automobile accidents, falls, and other mishaps. Many of these incidents are related to alcohol and/or drug use. Others have

been sexually assaulted or robbed because they found themselves in unfamiliar locales, were incapable of protecting themselves because of drug or alcohol use, or were the victims of a "date rape" drug.

The most common cause of death of U.S. citizens overseas, other than natural causes, is by motor vehicle accidents. Students traveling abroad should be aware that standards of safety overseas might be different from those in the United States, or non-existent.

The Bureau of Consular Affairs Web site for American students traveling overseas, studentsabroad.state.gov, provides useful safety and travel information for students prior to their travel. Students are strongly urged to review the information on the site and sign up online at [\[registration.state.gov\]\(https://travel-registration.state.gov\) to receive the latest travel information from the Department of State. Signing up makes it possible for the State Department to contact the student traveler, if necessary, in case of a family emergency in the United States or because of a crisis in the foreign country.](https://travel-</p>


Naval Hospital Naples strives to protect the environment
