

## Traffic Safety in Naples

Many Sailors and civilians deal every day with the traffic issues on the military bases here, as well as in the city itself.

In Naples, traffic is considerably different than what the average American is used to. Between motorists driving over the speed limit, ignoring traffic signs, and cutting each other off, driving is definitely an adventure.

"The biggest problem is getting to work because traffic is nightmare," said Chief Electronics Technician (SW) David Burch, assistant safety manager at Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Europe-Africa/U.S. 6th Fleet Headquarters. "Driving in Naples is quite different from driving in the States. All military personnel must keep their heads on the swivel, slow down and drive defensively."

According to the Newcomer's Guide to Naples manual, the police will usually issue tickets on the spot, but your plate number could be taken down and a ticket could be mailed to you. If you receive one in the mail do not ignore it. The fine will triple in price after 15 days from the day it was mailed.

"If you are stopped by the police for a traffic offense, you may be asked to pay on the spot. Once you pay the fine, the officer will give you a receipt," said James Dickinson from Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Safety. "If a parking ticket is left on your vehicle or if you receive one in the mail, you must pay for those at an Italian post office. There is one located at the Naples Airport and one at Joint Forces Command in building L. Anytime you have a question about a ticket you can contact the Italian investigators with base security or the Navy Legal Office."

When a local police officer waves at you on the side of the road with a lollipop stick (red circle with white disc sign) he's saying that you must pull over. Ensure that you comply with the local law enforcement and remember that all Department of Defense personnel are under Italian primary jurisdiction.

"The biggest misconception of traffic safety is that Americans don't get tickets," said Dickinson. "If you are driving on the Autostrada or on the Tangenziale over the speed limit, even as little as 10 km, and the camera captures your license plate number, then there is a 99.9% chance that you will get a ticket."

Dickinson said that for more serious traffic violations, such as driving under the influence (DUI), the fine cannot be paid on the spot, and if you receive this type of violation, bring it to the Naval Legal Service Office for advice and appropriate action.

Italian law says that only a .05 blood alcohol level is considered drunk driving and if you refuse to submit to a breathalyzer test, you will lose your license for six months, lose your base driving privileges for one year, and receive a possible fine from the Italian authorities.

"If you have a BAC of .05 to .08, then you are suspended for one year on base, and off base for 6 months," said Rachael Curtis, Staff Judge Advocate Paralegal. "If your BAC is .08 to .15, then you are suspended on base for one year, and off base for one year; and if your BAC is .15 or higher, then you are suspended for one year on base, and for 2 years off base."

Having a designated driver is always a good idea, but if one is not available the Naples area Chief Petty Officers Association offers a complementary "Tipsy Taxi" service for sailors who had too much to drink.

"The 'Tipsy Taxi' is a program that helps Sailors cover their taxi fares when they go into town, have a couple of drinks, and realize that they either have no money and are unable to locate an ATM, and need to return back on base," said Senior Chief Yeoman (SW/AW) Alex Magee, president of the Naples area Chief Petty Officers Association. "Once Sailors get back on base, they should contact the base quarterdeck or the command duty officer, they will in turn pay the taxi fare. The program can be used at any time, but it is not a free service. Sailors are obligated to pay back their fare within two pay dates."

Sailors tend to agree that traffic on base is relaxed and normal by U.S. standards, however, once you leave the base it becomes challenging.

"The Master at Arms running security are doing a good job taking care of the traffic on base," said Electronics Technician 1st Class Grady Lott. "And off base, I give extra space on the roads because I know I will get cut off."

Keeping your gas tank at least three quarters full and having a Global Positioning Satellite navigation system is highly recommended in case service members get lost, said Burch.

Local drivers aren't the only things to be considered when driving in Italy. Even foul weather conditions can put service members at risk.

"When driving in Italy you must keep a safe distance," said Dickinson. "And when it rains, even 35 mph is considered fast, so you need to slow down especially during poor driving conditions."

Plain and simple authorities say, be a defensive driver. Look at your surroundings and play it safe. Safe, attentive driving practices will ensure you and your loved ones will get to where you're going in one piece.

"As the old saying goes, 'When in Rome, do as the Romans do' pretty much applies to Naples," said Lt. Cmdr. Robert Vance, a chaplain at Chaplain's Religious Enrichment Development Operations for NSA. "Being defensive and courteous is the key for enjoyable driving."

## Fleet Mail Center keeps the mail moving

One of our closest and strongest ties to home is the mail. Whether it is love letters, birthday cards, Christmas presents, bills or cookies from mom, the mail touches us every day.

Fortunately, mail service is relatively quick and efficient despite being stationed in the Naples, Rome, or Gaeta, Italy area.

Naval Support Activity (NSA), Naples, Italy, postal operations is a division of the NSA Supply Department. The Postal Division is a group of 42 U.S. Navy, Marine Corps, and DOD civilians.

"We receive and dispatch all of the mail for this area, which includes the support site, JFC, Capo Giata. We handle all of the USS Mount Whitney (LCC 20) mail and we receive surface containers for all of Europe. At our peak we process three 18 wheelers a night about 15 thousand pounds during the holiday

season," said Logistics Specialist Chief Petty Officer William Struck.

Postal services are spread out over a wide geographic area with a Fleet Mail Center (FMC) and a postal finance office at Capodichino, Mail Control Activity (MCA) at Rome's International Airport, a full service post office at Gricignano Support Site and an office at Joint Forces Command (JFC).

"I love working here, this is by far the best work center I have ever worked at. Said Logistics Specialist 2nd Class Timothy Henderson, Custodian of Postal Effects.

Form the subordinates all the way up through the chain of command everyone is really professional and we all work well together."

These 40 personnel, in addition to volunteers (and several dozen reservists during the peak mailing season), handle all the mail for the approximately 10,000 service men and women and their family members, retirees in the Naples area, and the U.S. Embassy and NATO Defense

College in Rome.

"When I got the opportunity to work here in Naples I jumped on it. It's very challenging working here, we serve various activities here in the Naples area and there is never a dull moment. Here at the FMC and I look forward to coming to work everyday," said Logistics Specialist 1st Class Ronald Hilterbrant.

The normal transit time for a letter mailed from the U.S. is currently 5-7 days (if your address is correct), packages mailed "priority" take about 7-10 days, and packages mailed parcel post will take approximately 30-45 days, depending on the season.

There is postal finance service available at one of the three offices at least six days per week. FMC is located in the Air Cargo Terminal, building 412. The Capo and JFC post offices operation hours are 10 a.m. -3 p.m. (Monday-Friday) and Support Site Post Office operation hours are 10 a.m. -4 p.m. (Monday-Friday) and Saturdays from 10 a.m. -20 p.m..

# Naples Public Health Evaluation

## FAQs: Permanent vapor intrusion mitigation system at Capodichino CDC

As reported in the March 26th issue of Panorama, Tetra Tech - lead contractor in the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE) - is beginning installation work on a permanent vapor intrusion (VI) mitigation system for the Capodichino Child Development Center (CDC). This permanent system will replace the temporary units installed last summer. The purpose of the VI mitigation system is to address the chemical PCE that was detected in soil gas and indoor air samples at the CDC. These samples were collected as part of Phase II sampling at Capodichino.

Here are some Frequently Asked Questions about the permanent VI system at the Capodichino CDC:

### Q: What is a VI mitigation system?

A: The basic components of the system were as described in the recent PANO article. To summarize, holes (commonly called "extraction points") are drilled through the concrete floor, plastic piping is then installed from these holes to a fan and then to a stack through the roof.

### Q: How does the system work?

A: The fan sucks any vapors that might come from the soil below the building slab and exhausts them through the roof before the vapors can even get into the building.

### Q: Are these systems commonly used elsewhere?

A: Yes. VI systems are used widely throughout the U.S. and overseas to address subsurface gas or vapor concerns to prevent them from getting into a building or home. As an example, this is the same type of system used to prevent radon gas from accumulating in homes.

### Q: Will my child be inconvenienced by construction work?

A: No, construction of the new system is being performed during off hours (evenings and weekends) so that services at the CDC will

not be interrupted.

### Q: When is the project expected to be complete?

A: The installation of the system will be complete by mid-May and will then be put into operation. Afterward, there will be some follow on testing to assure that the system is operating properly.

## Are you and your job a good fit?

Your safety, health, productivity and comfort on the job depend on how well your work environment, tools and materials suit you. Make sense? Welcome to the science of ergonomics, the study of the fit between workers and their tools and environment. Ergonomics is applied to deal with a number of problems, including safety and prevention of injuries.

You can play an important part in improving your individual work situation to best suit you. You and your supervisor can work together to improve your work environment to help you prevent problems such as back injuries and repetitive strain injuries.

• **Adjust your work station.** This might mean raising or lowering a chair, changing

the level of your work bench or obtaining a platform to stand on. Adjusting the angle of a drafting board or repositioning a computer screen can greatly improve comfort and performance. You can also rearrange lighting to see your work without having to lean forward.

• **Adapt your tools.** Adjustments to tools such as longer, padded, or angled handles can lessen repetitive strain. Avoid handles which cut into the hand. Use tools designed to keep your hands, arms and back in a comfortable, natural position while you are working.


• **Arrange your work.** Lay out materials so that you can reach them without excessive stretching, twisting or bending. If you are assembling materials, arrange them so you can pick them up with a

minimum of reaching. Avoid arrangements where you have to lean forward and reach at an angle. Store materials on a shelf rather than on the floor to minimize lifting.

• **Take a break.** Organize your work to allow you to switch from one task to another. This will help avoid back strain and repetitive strain. Take advantage of scheduled breaks to stretch and move around.

• **Be aware.** Pay attention to how you feel while you are working. Make adjustments in your work area to prevent strain on your muscles.

You can adjust your work situation to suit your physical capabilities and body type. This will help you to increase safety, health, productivity and comfort. Ergonomics is for everyone!

## Gunston Hall completes first phase of APS Mission

The Africa Partnership Station (APS) West platform USS Gunston Hall (LSD 44) completed the first APS phase of its mission, the "Ghana hub," here Mar. 30.

The ship and its embarked international staff graduated 65 embarked African partners from Benin, Ghana, Nigeria, and Togo at Sekondi Naval Base following 20 days of in port and at sea training. The sailors completed a rigorous program of courses designed to enhance their knowledge of maritime safety and security.

"The international aspect of the program is important," said Capt. Cindy Thebaud, APS West commander, during the graduation ceremony. "Maritime security is a partnership, it is not something that one nation or one group of people from one organization can do alone. The maritime security challenges transcend national and sub-regional boundaries, and so must the response."

After the African sailors embarked Gunston Hall, they experienced classroom and hands-on training for 20 days in areas including small boat operations, fisheries management, oil platform security, basic first aid, force protection, and search and rescue tactics from training teams from Italy and the United States.

"The instructors were able to break down the training material so we could better understand it," said Nigerian navy Petty Officer Obalaja Ademola, from Lagos, Nigeria, who did the small boat operations training. "I very much appreciate the training APS has provided me."

"The students I help teach are really enjoying the training that the team is providing. I just hope they will take it back with them to help with training their navy," said Operations Specialist 3rd Class (SW) Chirstelle Byll, a force protection instructor assigned to the Security Force Assistance Detachment of the Maritime Civil Affairs and Security Training Command (MCAST).

While some students were engaged in classroom instruction, other sailors were paired up with Gunston Hall Sailors in similar career fields to further develop their skills in that field.

"Our colleagues were very receptive and eager to learn," said Logistics Specialist 1st Class (SW/AW) Michauli Martin, a Gunston Hall Sailor who paired up with a Ghanaian logistics specialist. "We spent a lot of time talking and comparing the ways each of our Navies operate. I showed them how we order and inventory parts, using our supply system, and I compared that to the way they operated."

Martin also added that she learned a lot about the Ghanaian navy from this experience and that it was important to interface with African partners because it helps improve the maritime safety and security in West Africa.

"The training I received here was fantastic," said Godfred Darkwah, a Ghanaian navy Leading Seaman. "My trainer was excellent and I have never had an experience like this before. The quality of the training, how friendly the people were really helped me improve my knowledge of maritime safety and security. I learned a lot about logistics and I will take that training with me to my Navy to train others as I have been trained here."

While the ship and embarked staff worked with the African navies, Marines from Great Britain, Portugal, Spain and the United States assigned to the embarked Security Cooperation Marine Air-Ground Task Force (SC-MAGTF) and Seabees assigned to Naval Mobile Construction Battalion (NMCB) 7 provided disaster-relief training to the Ghana Armed Forces (GAF) in Tema.

"During the exercise we worked with the GAF on patrolling, squad level tactics, and enlisted leadership," said Marine 2nd Lt. Nicole Teat of the SC-MAGTF. "We hope to further hone the GAF's capabilities and to increase their interactions with the U.S. military."

Also in Tema, a joint Navy and Air Force medical team worked alongside local staffs at the Manhean and Pram-Pram health centers to provide medical and dental care to an average of more than 300 patients a day.

"It really felt great helping out all those people," said Air Force Capt. Eirleen Hyun, a dentist from the medical outreach program. "It wasn't just seeing people who needed a tooth pulled. A lot of our patients had not eaten for days because they needed a full mouth extraction. We were able to alleviate some of their pain so they could eat and work."

The APS/Gunston Hall team also conducted three community outreach projects. These projects included refurbishing St. Theresa's Early Childhood Development Centre, the Sekondi School for the Deaf, and the Sekondi Naval Base medical clinic.

Hospital Corpsman 1st Class (SW) Darren Maxwell, from Staten Island, N.Y., commented that working at the school for the deaf enabled him to give back to something that he said was very personal to him.

"My son is hearing impaired," said Maxwell. "Someday he's going to see or read about what we're doing here and I want him to know that his dad was a part of it. I want him to be proud

## USS Nicholas captures suspected Pirates

USS Nicholas (FFG 47) captured suspected pirates April 1 after exchanging fire, sinking a skiff and confiscating a suspected mother ship.

While operating west of the Seychelles in international waters, Nicholas reported taking fire at 12:27 a.m. local time from a suspected pirate skiff and returned fire before commencing pursuit of the vessel until the disabled skiff stopped.

At 1:59 a.m. personnel from Nicholas boarded the disabled skiff and detained three personnel. The boarding team found ammunition and multiple cans of fuel on board.

After taking the suspected pirates on board, Nicholas sank the disabled skiff at 2:59 a.m.

An additional two suspected pirates were captured on the confiscated mother ship.

The suspected pirates will remain in U.S. custody on board Nicholas until a determination is made regarding their disposition.

Piracy is an international maritime issue that consistently affects the safety and security of the sea. The U.S. Navy works to uphold maritime law in order to prevent an environment conducive to piracy.

Nicholas, an Oliver Hazard Perry-class frigate homeported in Norfolk, Va., is currently supporting U.S. Naval Forces Africa. U.S. Naval Forces Africa is the naval component in support of U.S. Africa Command.

With the help of Assault Craft Unit (ACU) 2 and Beach Master Unit (BMU) 2, the team delivered nutritional meals, books, pharmaceuticals and medical supplies to eight different schools, hospitals and medical clinics throughout Ghana as part of Project Handclasp. This also included a visit to Sao Tome and Principe to deliver 27 pallets of computers and wheelchairs. Seabees with NMCB 7 also assisted with some projects, including restoring a playground at St. Theresa's.

"We enjoyed being able to make our mark in Ghana," said Senior Chief Utilitiesman (SCW) Leslie Doyle of NMCB-7. "The partnerships we build today are going a long way for the future."

Gunston Hall and her international staff

now move into the final phase of the APS deployment. Their last round of activities will be based in Dakar, Senegal, where they expect to train with maritime personnel from Cape Verde, Equatorial Guinea, Liberia, Senegal, Sierra Leone, The Gambia and Togo.

Gunston Hall is on a scheduled deployment in the 6th Fleet area of responsibility in support of APS West, an international initiative developed by Naval Forces Europe and Naval Forces Africa that aims to improve maritime safety and security in West and Central Africa.

## Estonia: History, charm & beauty

Looking for an awesome place to visit in Europe? Check out Estonia. Located on the Baltic Sea, Estonia is a tiny country that is big on picturesque scenery. My visit centered on the cities of Tallinn and Narva, and I was quite impressed.


Tallinn's quaint and scenic old town center boasts a well-preserved medieval city wall complete with about twenty 14th-century towers of varying height and style. With its narrow cobblestone streets and picturesque multi-colored buildings with their decorative doors and windows, the old town is a treat to explore.

There is a great view overlooking the old town from Cathedral Hill in the Toompea district. Toompea boasts many interesting buildings, including a castle that is now home to the Estonian parliament and the beautiful Alexander Nevsky Russian Orthodox Cathedral, which was completed in 1900.

There are a wide range of shops and restaurants and many churches and museums to visit in the old town. Baltic amber is one of the most popular buys for tourists, and the

shops sell a wide range of jewelry with the various types of amber in sterling silver settings.

In several of the modern districts surrounding the old town you can still see the sterile concrete architecture, poverty, and urban blight of the Stalinist era. Like many countries caught in the Soviet web after World War II, Estonia suffered deprivation and oppression under the Russian yoke during the cold war until it gained its independence in 1991. Estonia joined NATO and the European Union in 2004 and is working hard to recover from its Soviet past.

I made two excursions from Tallinn. The first was a 90-minute ferry boat ride across the Gulf of Finland to Helsinki. I really enjoyed Helsinki, although it is much more of a modern city than Tallinn. Like Tallinn, it has a large cathedral

on the hill overlooking the city. I also took a three-hour bus ride east to the city of Narva on the border with Russia. This place really blew my mind. The River Narva forms the border between the two countries, and there are two immense medieval castles facing each other, one on either side of the river. The panoramic view of these two castles from the bluffs above the river is quite spectacular. Narva Castle on the Estonian side is now a nice museum that I visited. Unfortunately, I did not have the necessary visa to visit Ivangorod Castle on the Russian side.

I strongly recommend Estonia to anyone who wants a great adventure off the usual tourist trail. It is one of the best places out there where you can see and experience the old-world history, charm, and beauty of medieval Eastern Europe.


