

## NOSC gives away \$60,000 in scholarships

The Naples Overseas Spouses Club (NOSC) gave away \$60,000 worth of scholarships to high school, undergraduate and graduate students during a scholarship award ceremony May 19.

NOSC is an organization which provides its members opportunities to participate in social and fundraising activities and projects that benefit both the military and civilian communities in Naples, Italy.

NOSC's Forgotten Treasures Thrift Store, run by volunteers, is the organization's largest fundraiser. The money earned from sales goes right back into the community in different ways; one of those ways was the scholarship money.

NOSC President Paula Waller thanked the Thrift Shop volunteers during the ceremony, emphasizing just how important their efforts are to the community. She also issued a challenge to all scholarship recipients, "I would like to challenge all of you here to take a second to go into the Thrift Store and say thanks to each one of the volunteers that works there."

One of the scholarship winners, Mary Henderson, had been taking courses in Naples for the last two years and had never heard of the NOSC scholarship. "I had been attending UMUC [University of Maryland University College] for two years in Naples at that point and never heard about the NOSC scholarship before. So I went to their website and realized that they didn't require any financial information or base the amount on pay grade. They based it

## Italian News Briefs

### Moonlight tours of Pompeii

Pompeii's popular sound and light tour, "Moon of Pompeii," will run every weekend through the last weekend in October. Hour-long tours are offered in Italian, English and Japanese. Visitors walk through the ancient site with a special soundtrack synchronized with the light show and mingling ambient noise with a narrative voice illustrating the various highlights and ending in a re-enactment of the 79 A.D. volcanic eruption that buried Pompeii. This initiative offers visitors not just a simple show, but a stroll through the digs that reveals an "unusual, poetic side" of the ancient city, organizers say. The tour kicks off at the Terme Suburbane and then winds its way up the main road, pointing out the curious cart ruts, craftsmen's shops and famous villas. The grand finale comes in the heart of the old city, the forum, when four giant projectors beam a special-effects-laden video reconstruction of the wrath of Mt. Vesuvius, which smothered the city and its lesser-known but equally fascinating neighbor Herculaneum in ash and cinders. ### Italian children missing

Italian police announced that more than a thousand children disappeared from Italy last year. Officials spoke at a meeting at the child help line Telefono Azzurro, adding that 222 children went missing from January to March of 2010. Most of the children are foreign who arrived in Italy and were left in care homes or community centers. The President of the Italian Republic Giorgio Napolitano sent a message to the child help line advising officials to introduce a help line dedicated to the missing children.

### Dog owners face fines in Trieste

People living in Trieste, northern Italy will risk a fine of up to 600 Euros if they don't keep their dogs on a leash, or if their dogs urinate on the tires of cars, motorcycles, scooters and bicycles. If the proposed ordinance is passed by the council, owners will be fined up to 600 Euros if they don't have a scooper, plastic bag or other cleaning tools, and people leaving a mess behind could be forced to pay from 250 to 1,500 Euros. There are 200,000 citizens and 12,000 dogs in Trieste.

### Rare Etruscan house discovered in Tuscany

Archeologists found an Etruscan home outside Grosseto, in Tuscany region dating back more than 2,400 years. It is a rare, intact Etruscan home probably built between the third and first centuries B.C. According to the archeologists, these findings were the best ruins that

they ever found in Italy with a great quantity of items revealing the construction techniques of the Etruscans. They discovered a basement where the family stored foodstuffs, an earthenware pot and an olive press. They also found pieces of vases at the house, and the walls were made of sun-dried clay bricks.

### "Good Samaritan" organ donations approved

The Italian Health Minister Ferruccio Fazio announced that Italy will have "Good Samaritan" organ donations. That means that live, unrelated strangers can donate an organ they can live without, such as a kidney, without any money changing hands. It already takes place in the United States and a few other countries. The minister said that the first 10 cases of "Samaritan" donations need to be a part of a national program run by the National Transplant Center. They recommended that privacy is respected and that there shouldn't be any contact between donor and recipient. Donors should have a psychological and psychiatric checkup carried out by doctors who are independent from the clinic or hospital performing the transplant.

### Zaha Hadid designed contemporary arts museum opens in Rome

The first national museum dedicated to contemporary arts is opening in Rome this Sunday. The Maxxi National Museum was built on the site of an old army barracks, and it cost 60 million Euros. It will show contemporary art and architecture. It was designed by Zaha Hadid, Iraqi-born architect, on almost 30,000 square meters with two museums in one: one focuses on art and another on architecture. Works by Andy Warhol and British artist Anish Kapoor are among the 300 works in the museum's permanent art collection. The museum also hosts workshops, conferences and performances.

### Italy's first champion magician

Luca Bono is Italy's first champion magician at the age of 17. He defeated 19 other finalists at Italy's first magic championship in Saint Vincent, in Valle d'Aosta region last Saturday. He became famous two years ago when he made his Nimbus 2000 broomstick fly around the packed hall of the Palais de Saint Vincent. The illusion left many people astonished. Last Saturday, more than 1,500 people stared open-jawed into the air. He said he is very confident when manipulating ropes, handkerchiefs, doves and playing cards, and his friends don't want to play cards with him.

## USS Elrod encounters suspected drug smugglers in Mediterranean

USS Elrod (FFG 55) encountered three suspected drug smugglers off the coast of Morocco in international waters in the western Mediterranean Sea May 25 while conducting routine operations in the U.S. Sixth Fleet area of operations.

At approximately 8 p.m., while conducting a surface search mission, a SH-60B Seahawk helicopter assigned to Elrod spotted three individuals discarding multiple packages into the sea from their rigid hull inflatable boat (RHIB).

The helicopter relayed the information to Elrod, which then altered course and attempted to establish radio communication with the unknown RHIB. Upon

arrival, a search and rescue swimmer was deployed and recovered several packages, two of which tested positive for narcotics.

A seven-man visit, board, search and seizure (VBSS) team conducted a consensual boarding on the RHIB to verify the vessel's registration and country of origin. Upon discovering the suspected smugglers were from Morocco, the ship notified Moroccan authorities and loitered nearby until a transfer of the suspected smugglers could be facilitated. Elrod has since coordinated with Moroccan authorities who apprehended the suspected drug smugglers the morning of May 26.

Elrod, an Oliver Hazard Perry-class frigate homeported in Norfolk, is on a regularly scheduled deployment in the U.S. Sixth Fleet area of operations.

## Phoenix Express kicks off from Souda Bay

Phoenix Express 2010 (PE-10), a two-week, two-phase, multinational, maritime exercise among regional partners from Africa, Europe and the United States is set to conduct its kickoff pre-sail conference and conclude its in-port training portion of the exercise.

The in-port phase, which began in Rota, Spain and continued in Souda Bay, Greece, focuses on medical training, maritime interdiction operations (MIO), helicopter operations and safety, damage control, navigation, deck seamanship, search and rescue (SAR), small boat operations and a leadership round table.

Ships and personnel involved will depart Souda Bay later this month and sail into international waters in the central Mediterranean Sea.

During the underway portion of PE-10, countries will track and board suspect vessels carrying suspicious cargo and Maritime Patrol Aircraft and Automated Identification Systems, along with MIOs like SARs and visit, board, search and seizures will be performed.

U.S. commanders believe PE-10 is invaluable to theater partners because it fosters mutual understanding and improves international military partnering.

"Phoenix Express demonstrates theater partner nations' commitment to regional stability and maritime security," said Capt. Martin Beck, Commander, Task Force 68, whose task force is in command of the exercise. "During this exercise, maritime professionals will further develop the capacity to maintain maritime domain awareness. When they meet in the future to conduct combined peacekeeping or humanitarian operations, or to counter trafficking in drugs, people or weapons in this region, they will be better able to respond and work together."

Twenty countries are expected to participate in the exercise as either an active participant or observer. U.S. units participating in Phoenix Express include the USS Gunston Hall (LSD 44), homeported in Virginia Beach, Virginia; USS John L. Hall (FFG 32), homeported in Mayport, Florida; military sealift command ships USNS LCPL Roy M. Wheat (T-AK3 016) and USNS Laramie (T-AO 203); and members of the U.S. 6th Fleet staff.







## Skin cancer: answers to common questions

### I'm young and healthy; do I really need to be concerned about skin cancer?

Worldwide, one in three cancers is skin-related. By World Health Organization (WHO) estimates, 132,000 cases of malignant melanoma, 66,000 deaths and more than 2 million cases of other skin cancers occur annually. In the U.S., one in two cancers is skin-related with an estimated 1.1 million skin cancers annually. These figures are on the rise, and the WHO expects the skin cancer epidemic to accelerate. The annual incidence rate for melanoma is estimated to have more than doubled in the last 30 years in the U.S. There are three types of skin cancer: malignant melanoma, basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma.

### What are the best ways to prevent skin cancer?

The best way to prevent skin cancer is to avoid the sun. Realistically, however, this is rarely an option, unless you live in Seattle. For those of us who do not reside in Seattle, the options have improved dramatically over the last decade. As a general rule, a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 30 is sufficient. Beyond 30, the numbers start to become clinically meaningless. An SPF of 60 does not double the protection, it is only marginally better. Do not search for the highest SPF, instead make sure that you reapply. The best way to prevent sunburn is to apply sunscreen 30 minutes before any sun exposure, and then reapply as soon as you get out there! Another interesting fact is that the SPF only measures the protection against ultraviolet B (UVB). The role of ultraviolet A (UVA) in causing skin cancer and aging of the skin is becoming more apparent.

Three ingredients are currently available in the United States to protect against both UVB and UVA: zinc oxide, titanium dioxide and Parsol 1789 (avobenzone). However, in the U.S. there is no number on the bottle to tell you the level of UVA protection. A couple years ago, the FDA approved meroxyl in the United States, which data suggests to have the best ability to block UVA. Therefore, physicians recommend products that at least have one of the first three ingredients for UVB protection plus meroxyl for UVA protection.

Another newer item on the market with regards to sun protection is clothing. Look for clothing items that have a 50+ ultraviolet protection factor (UPF) for life. It should be easy to find products with this stringent of a claim now as there is one company that recently was awarded the American Academy of Dermatologist Seal of Recognition.

If you don't want to spend large amounts of money on clothing (especially for children who will grow out of them), there are some laundry additives that enhance the level of UV protection provided by your existing clothes. However, the protection provided by these additives will wash out over time and it only works on cottons.

### How do I know the difference between a simple mole and one that could be skin cancer?

#### MOLE WARNING SIGNS

- "ABCDE" rule and melanoma danger signs

Finding melanoma early is the key to treating this life-threatening cancer. Learn the ABCDE mnemonic for recognizing moles and growths that might be cancerous. Though most (if not all)

of your "suspicious" moles will turn out to be normal non-cancerous moles, it is much better to be safe than to not see, or ignore an early melanoma. American Academy of Dermatology recommends that everyone does a monthly skin examination to properly look for abnormal growths.

*If your mole or growth has one or more of the ABCDEs, you should show it to your physician!*

- Asymmetry

Asymmetry can be assessed by comparing one half of the growth to the other half to determine if the halves are equal in size. Unequal or asymmetric moles are suspicious.

- Border

If the mole's border is irregular, notched, scalloped or indistinct, it is more likely to be cancerous (or precancerous) and is thus suspicious.

- Color

Variation of color (e.g., more than one color or shade) within a mole is a suspicious finding. Different shades of browns, blues, reds, whites and blacks are all concerning.

- Diameter

Any mole that has a diameter larger than a pencil's eraser in size (> 6 mm) should be considered suspicious.

- Elevation

If a mole is elevated, or raised from of the skin, it should be considered suspicious.

#### Other danger signs of malignant melanoma:

- Change in color, especially multiple shades of dark brown or black; red, white and blue.
- Change or spreading of color from the edge of the mole into surrounding skin.
- Change in size, especially sudden or continuous enlargement.
- Change in shape, especially development of irregular margins or border.
- Change in elevation, especially sudden elevation of a previously flat mole.
- Change in the surface texture of a mole, especially scaliness, erosion, oozing, crusting, ulceration or bleeding.
- Change in the surrounding skin, especially redness, swelling or new moles.
- Change in sensation, especially itching, tenderness, or pain.

Basically, any mole or growth that is CHANGING needs to be checked by a doctor.

*In summary, skin cancer is preventable and we recommend the following:*

1. Do not get burned. Avoid sun tanning or tanning beds.
2. Generously apply sunscreen with UVA and UVB protection with SPF 30 or greater to all exposed skin at least 30 minutes prior to sun exposure and then reapply every 2 hours liberally.
3. Wear sun protection such as long-sleeved shirts, pants, wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses when possible.
4. Seek shade when appropriate, remembering the sun's rays are the strongest between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.
5. Use extra caution near water, sand and snow as they reflect the damaging rays of the sun which can increase your risk for sunburn.
6. Remember your ABCDE rules of skin cancer detection. Make an appointment to see your doctor if any moles are suspiciously changing.

Excessive speed, fatigue and not wearing a seatbelt are common factors in fatal automobile accidents. Summer activities require more time on the road. Trip planning, maintenance and rest stops are good survival tools for use during the summer season. Using defensive driving skills could keep you from being the victim of another driver's mistake.

Leaders at all levels must stay engaged with service members and their holiday plans, and do everything possible to make this a safe and enjoyable holiday weekend.

## NEXCOM and AAFES reconnect bankrupt phone company cardholders

Soldiers, airmen and sailors left holding inoperative "C-3" ("Tele2") phone cards are being advised to visit their nearest NEX, PX or BX for a full refund after telecommunications vendor C3 Europe Limited filed for bankruptcy in a United Kingdom court late last week.

Available in denominations of \$10 and \$20, "C-3" phone cards were sold through vending machines at and at the counter of Navy Exchanges in Naples, Rota and Sigonella. The phone cards were also sold through vending operations at Army and Air Force locations in Germany, Italy, UK and Spain.

As of May 16, the supplier has blocked all of the activated vended cards.

Exchange shoppers in possession of non-functioning "C-3" cards with remaining minutes can go to the customer service area of their nearest Exchange to receive full refunds for the face value of the card.

"C-3" cards are distinguished by an image of the Earth along with the words "Keeping YOU Connected." Other, non-vended, phone cards, such as AT&T Global Prepaid Phone Cards, are unaffected by C3 Europe Limited's bankruptcy.



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## Naples High School girls varsity soccer team wins tournament

The Naples High School varsity girls' soccer team earned the Division II European tournament crown Saturday, May 22. Playing at Ramstein High School's stadium, the girls topped AF North High School 3-2. After falling behind 0-2 early in the second half, the Wildcats fought back against a determined AF North defense. Seventy minutes into the match, a foul in the penalty area saw junior Sofia Cianciaruso setting up a flawlessly executed penalty kick to tie the match. Two minutes before the final whistle, Cianciaruso teed up a direct free kick, this time from 40 yards out. Her shot was perfectly placed into the top left corner of the goal, out of the AF North keeper's reach to win the title.

The Wildcats were undefeated throughout the four-day tournament, beating Baumholder, the International School of Milan, Hohenfels, Black Forest Academy and Mannheim enroute to the championship game.

matches, the Wildcats only saw three goals scored against them, placing senior goalkeeper Aleksandra Stasiak at the top of the heap with three clean slates and 39 saves.

In addition to the tournament win, three Wildcats were named to the All-Tournament team: Haylea Witz (*sophomore*), Demi Holbrook (*sophomore*) and Cian-

ciaruso. Witz was named as the tournament's Most Valuable Player making more than 26 shots and scoring three goals. In addition to Cianciaruso's two crucial goals at the final, she scored three, and Holbrook netted five.

This is the first year since 2003 that the Girls' Division II Soccer Championship has come home to Naples.
