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



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Lt. Dan Band honors service members

Hundreds of community members turned out to see the Lt. Dan Band perform a free MWR- and USO-sponsored concert at the Support Site Central Park July 10, dedicated to service members and the families who support them. The band, which includes Vietnam War veteran Kimo Williams, understands what many military families are going through, especially with the ongoing war in the Middle East. "It's a tough time we're in, and we have to do everything we can to keep [the troops] strong," expressed Gary Sinise, "CSI: NY" actor and band guitarist. "I just feel like I'm doing my part."

The 16-member Chicago-based cover band, which got its name from Sinise's celebrated role as Lt. Dan Taylor in 1994's "Forrest Gump," kicked off the concert at 8 p.m. The band covered popular songs from all eras and styles. "It's a lot of rock music, country, pop. We even do some tunes from the '40s. Something for everybody, so everybody has a great time," Sinise explained. Anyone who saw the crowd of children and their parents dancing to numbers from Aretha Franklin, Beyoncé, Bruce Springsteen, Linkin Park, Santana, Lee Ann Womack and The Who could tell everyone at the concert had a fantastic time.

The crowd roared at the first notes to The Who's "Teenage Wasteland," the theme song from "CSI: NY." Sinise waved to the audience, hoisting his bass guitar triumphantly.

"This is awesome and so much fun, thanks to Gary Sinise and the USO! I brought the whole family out," said Jamie Dobraniecki, a civilian contractor with Navy Region Europe, Africa and Southwest Asia.

"It is obvious a lot of time and effort went into this. We are thankful that there are people out there that give of themselves and their time for all our troops," said Dobraniecki. "Being stationed

USS Eisenhower pulls into Naples

Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69) set anchor July 13 off the coast of Naples, Italy for a scheduled port visit. The aircraft carrier deployed January 2 to the U.S. 5th and 6th Fleet areas of responsibility in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and maritime security operations. This visit to Naples is Ike's final port call before heading back to its homeport in Norfolk, Virginia.

Capt. Dee L. Mewbourne, Ike's commanding officer, is pleased with the deployment and last port call in Naples. "The crew's morale is very high," said Mewbourne. "They feel they've had a successful deployment with many accomplishments. Now they're looking forward to being here and afterward heading home. Naples is a fantastic city with many opportunities, not just downtown, but in the surrounding area as well."

Rear Adm. Phil S. Davidson, commander, carrier strike group eight, also expressed his enthusiasm for this final stop. He told Italian media that Naples is a personal

favorite among port calls. "This is my favorite place to be whenever we're in the Mediterranean," Davidson said. "We've been out to sea for quite a stretch of time now, and the crew is very excited to see Italy and enjoy liberty."

When asked about the Ike carrier strike group's mission during its current deployment, Capt. Roy J. Kelley, commander, Carrier Air

Wing Seven, offered some highlights. "We flew nearly 3,000 missions, the vast majority of which were non-combatative in support of international security forces on the ground," Kelley stated. "We provided surveillance from FA-18s and EA-6Bs and escorted convoys by ensuring paths were clear and free of improvised explosive devices and ambushes."

In April, I assumed command of the "Best Hospital in Navy Medicine." This isn't just my opinion; it is based on numerous and rigorous health care inspections the hospital underwent this year. Town hall wrap-up

Capt. Robert Rabuse, NSA Naples commanding officer, held a town hall meeting June 30 at the Reel Times theater on the Support Site in Gricignano. While some of the information is dated, here is a list of the questions and answers in the order they were asked.

Q1: Can you please pass the strike details and timeline?

A1: The unions have announced that there will be two separate "strike" actions, July 7 and 14. The strike is for 8 hours (or entire duration of shift) starting at the beginning of each work shift for the 24 hour period. You should expect minimal impact to after-hours shift workers, but for services supported by normal working hours, you can expect

delays and in some cases no services. I cannot predict nor ask which employees intend to come to work.

Q2: Why is there such a shortage of CDC employees?

A2: Due to the workforce realignment, there is currently a base-wide freeze on hiring new local nationals while we work to place current employees. CDCs are established and resourced to provide childcare to single military parents and dual working families, all other care is space available based upon current enrollment. Building additional capacity for drop-in care is not a primary mission of the CDC. We will continue to align our care providers and centers to be well-positioned to provide all of its

core services. There are unfilled job opportunities for spouses (GS and NAF) at the CDC.

Q3: What are our child care options out in town?

Q3: There are several options for child care services on the economy. NSA Naples cannot support or recommend any of these services over the other. Child development homes (CDHs) are another available option.

Q4: Where does the produce sold in the Commissary come from?

A4: The majority of the produce sold in the Commissary comes from a large produce market in Padua, in northern Italy. Other items are marked with their actual countries of origin. A small portion comes from a regional produce provider.

Q5: When will the new restaurant on Support Site be completed?

A5: The last two dates given for the restaurant (Bambusa, owned by an Italian restaurateur and offering American and Italian

Italian News Briefs

Duck, duck, goose

The residents of Scanno, a mountain town in the Abruzzo region, got fed up with the constant honking and droppings produced by the geese at a local lakeside. Last week, they packed the geese off to another lake near the small town of Villalago, where they continue to bother tourists and motorists. The residents of Villalago have threatened to move the geese back to Scanno, where they claim the geese belong. So far, there hasn't been any word from Scanno's mayor, though Villalago's mayor has issued an ordinance making it clear the geese do not belong to his town.

Over €1 billion in assets confiscated from local mafia

Police confiscated about €1 billion worth of assets from the Casalesi clan, an organized crime group operating from Casal di Principe, in the form of apartments, land and even tourist sites. According to police, in addition to the seizures, 17 people were arrested on suspicion of mafia association, money laundering and bid rigging. Among those arrested was a regional adviser. The investigation uncovered evidence of criminal infiltration in the city of Caserta's public works. Since 2008, the Italian police have arrested hundreds of mafia suspects and confiscated billions of euros worth of assets.

Caravaggio night in Rome

If you're in Rome this weekend, or you're planning to visit the Eternal City soon, don't miss Caravaggio night. Three churches and the Galleria Borghese will stay open all night July 17 and 18 to allow Caravaggio fans to admire some of the artist's most famous works on the 400th anniversary of his death. The three churches are San Luigi dei Francesi, the Basilica of Sant'Agostino and the Church of Santa Maria del Popolo.

Massive raid against organized crime, 300 arrested

A massive mafia raid led to the arrest of more than 300 people July 13 on charges of money laundering, drug and arms trafficking and extortion. Among those arrested was the boss of the 'Ndrangheta, one of Italy's most feared organized crime groups. Most suspects were arrested in the Calabria region, but others were rounded up in Milan, where police confiscated real estate, weapons and drugs worth millions of euros. Interior Minister Roberto Maroni said the 'Ndrangheta had become one of Italy's most active crime organizations between Latin America and Europe. Members of the Italian Senate applauded the news of the arrests when it reached them. More than 3,000 police officers were involved in the operation.

Italian scientists make breakthrough in diabetes research

Italian scientists Giovambattista Pani and Tommaso Galeotti, who work at Rome's Cattolica University, may have discovered the key gene in the onset of diabetes in people who eat poorly and in great quantities. They say the p66 gene, which was discovered years ago by researchers in Milan, appears to trigger the development of diabetes in those who eat too much unhealthy food. Pani and Galeotti managed to "turn off" the p66 gene in obese mice, which led to a decreased risk in those mice developing diabetes. Scientists also claim the p66-free mice appear to live longer, despite remaining obese. The gene acts as a food sensor, causing the accumulation of fat and the development of hyperglycemia and diabetes, explained one of the scientist. The p66-blocking drugs are in pre-clinical trials, though the final goal is to use the blockers to prevent or treat disease. Pani and Galeotti's study was published in the proceedings of the National Academy in Sciences.

Medal of Honor recipient, U.S. Air Force Col. (ret) Leo K. Thorsness, addressed Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples sailors at U.S. Naval Hospital Naples July 10. The former senator, from the state of Washington, survived six years as a prisoner of war (POW) in the infamous “Hanoi Hilton” and is one of only 90 living Medal of Honor recipients.

Thorsness received the military’s highest honor for an engagement as a F-105 pilot during a surface-to-air missile suppression mission over North Vietnam in 1967. He was shot down two weeks later, while on his 93rd mission—just seven missions shy of completing his tour. During his speech, Thorsness shared his thoughts on being a recipient of the nation’s highest honor. “I have often wondered, ‘why me,’” said Thorsness, speaking about the day President Richard Nixon placed the award around his neck. “There were many other men, who, while in prison, were stronger and braver than I was. I am so average—there are certainly those more deserving than me.”

Thorsness displayed the sense of humor and perspective that helped him make it through six long years of captivity. “I can honestly say that I never spoke an angry word to my daughter during her teenage years,” said Thorsness with a sly grin. “Of course, I missed most of her teenage years.”

The service members in attendance were moved by Thorsness’ account of events during his time as a POW. “I was just shocked and astonished and moved by the bravery of the folks under that kind of mental and physical pressure,” said Chief Hospital

Luke's legacy and www.wikinapoli.com

It's relatively easy to pass through each duty station without leaving much of an impression that you've been there. However, leaving a lasting legacy is a fulfilling experience—just ask Luke Swartz.

Swartz is the force behind www.wikinapoli.com, a website about the Naples area that is informative regardless of how long you've been here. The site includes extensive information about the best places to eat (including ethnic restaurants!), Italian hand gestures, landlord reputations, upcoming events, nightlife and more. The included information, like GPS coordinates for most of the recommended sites or the vocabulary hints for links that are only in Italian, helps readers navigate through Italy and Italian culture.

Wikinapoli had a modest start as a "gouge list," e-mailed to incoming submariners by personnel working for CTF69. The list of information eventually grew to be over three pages long. In late 2008, a friend of Swartz's suggested that he check out Google Sites, to put the list online. Swartz bought the Google site address www.wikinapoli.com

and expanded the gouge list in his spare time. "It just so happened that the easy technological solution presented itself at the same time as the idea," said Swartz. The original gouge list is available at www.wikinapoli.com/benvenuti.

Swartz, who is in his last four weeks of duty in Naples, recently began sharing his knowledge and experiences with the Naval Support Activities Naples community in person. He will teach free 30-minute classes to boost familiarity with the Italian language every Tuesday and Thursday from 11:30 a.m. to noon in Capo, Admin I, Room 030, until his departure next month. The language classes are less about conjugation and more about understanding what the Vodaphone woman's message is saying. Swartz, who only picked up Italian in his two-year tour in Naples, understands the difficulty of learning the language. He is an engaging and knowledgeable teacher.

While offering language classes is a new venture for Swartz, compiling lists of useful information is not. "When we were in Nuclear Power School in Charleston, South Carolina, my friends and I made a list of all the best restaurants in the area," Swartz said. He added that he had done the same thing in Seattle, his previous duty station, before carrying on the tradition here in Naples.

Wikinapoli's objective is to provide tips, tricks and information on an enormous variety of subjects, including "Italian for French Speakers" and guides to using public transit, for people living in the Naples community. The site has information for everyone. Also, since the site is a wiki, like Wikipedia, anyone can edit or contribute. "Sometimes one person recommends just one restaurant...[other people] post all the time," explained Swartz. About a dozen Naples residents have done so, posting their favorite restaurants, travel tips, etc.

The site will continue in Swartz's absence, with a core group of volunteers to keep the current events updated. However, what the site really needs is for more people in the community to contribute. "I need other people's help. More people can contribute than have been," remarked Swartz.

Sea Breeze 2010 kicks off in Odessa, Ukraine

Sea Breeze 2010 officially kicked off in Odessa, Ukraine with an opening ceremony and combined press conference with senior Ukrainian and U.S. naval leadership at the Ukrainian Southern Operational Command July 12. Sea Breeze is an invitational joint maritime exercise in the Black Sea with the goals of

enhancing Black Sea maritime security capabilities and cooperation strategies.

"It is a great pleasure for me to announce the opening of exercise Sea Breeze 2010," said Ukrainian Vice Adm. Viktor Maksimov, commander-in-chief of Ukrainian naval forces, during a speech to more than 300 military and civilian members of the 12 participating countries. "In response to common threats facing the world today, this exercise will be dedicated to anti-piracy operations."

Sea Breeze's robust training agenda includes counter-piracy training operations, non-combatant evacuation operations and vertical, board, search and seizure training. Additionally, ground forces will conduct non-lethal weapons training designed to combat unlawful fishing, piracy, trafficking of people, drugs and illegal weapons.

Rear Adm. Gerard P. Heuber, U.S. Naval Forces Europe-Africa director for policy, resources, and strategy, thanked Maksimov and the Ukrainian navy for hosting Sea Breeze and spoke about the importance of the exercise. "Sea Breeze is about strengthening maritime partnerships in the Black Sea in spirit of partnership for peace and is invaluable to all participating countries because it promotes regional stability and maritime security."

Sea Breeze is the largest naval exercise this year in the Black Sea; it consists of 20 ships, 13 aircraft and more than 1,600 military members from Azerbaijan, Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Georgia, Germany, Greece, Moldova, Sweden, Turkey, Ukraine and United States.

Following the ceremony, a press conference was held with 57 journalists from 41 news organizations. The ceremony was followed by a reception aboard USS Taylor (FFG 50).

Summer sports dangers: motorcycling

Although both the military and U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) have put an increased emphasis on motorcycle safety, military personnel continue to be involved in a large number of motorcycle accidents, particularly between Memorial Day and Labor Day. The Naval Safety Center (NSC) reported sailors and marines were involved in 86 fatal personal motor vehicle accidents in 2009; 26 of these accidents occurred during the summertime.

The driving conditions in Europe create additional hazards for motorcyclists. "Riding a motorcycle in Europe can be even more dangerous than riding in the U.S.," said Jim Dickinson, a Naval Support Activity Naples safety officer who has been riding motorcycles in Europe for 11 years. "It's legal to split lanes here, which is only legal in two states. Local drivers also split lanes with cars and drive on shoulders—when you round corners there may very well be a vehicle coming at you in your lane. Drivers don't stop at the normal stop line either. They come into the intersection in order to see around illegally parked cars."

Despite the additional dangers posed in Europe and the high number of serious accidents, sailors and marines were involved in 40 percent fewer fatal summertime motorcycle accidents in 2009 than the previous year. This dramatic decrease correlates strongly to the Navy's efforts to improve motorcycle rider safety.

The NSC and the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) offer three safety courses to ensure motorcycle riders are prepared

for all types of potential riding hazards and conditions: basic rider course (BRC), experienced rider course and military sport bike course (MSBC).

"The military's motorcycle safety courses are successful because they are mandatory and enforceable," said Dickinson, who is also an MSBC instructor. "In Naples, your gas coupons can be shut off for not completing the course. Also, most military [personnel] look out for other riders and talk to them about riding habits."

The BRC is mandatory for all military motorcyclists and designed for beginning riders. The course consists of approximately five hours of classroom instruction and 10 hours of riding exercises in a controlled environment. For those personnel who do not yet own gear, a loaner motorcycle and helmet are provided during the course. The MSBC, which was developed in 2008, is a similar course for sport bike riders.

In addition to completing the safety courses offered by the Navy, service members should wear proper safety gear while riding a motorcycle. "Dress for the crash and to be seen, not the comfort of the weather," said Dickinson. Proper safety gear includes sturdy leather boots or over-the-ankle shoes, heavy pants or jeans, a long-sleeved shirt or jacket, leather motorcycle gloves, a reflective vest and most importantly, a DOT-approved helmet.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) estimates helmets saved the lives of 1,829 motorcyclists in 2008. According to NHTSA, helmets are estimated to be 37 percent effective in preventing fatal injuries to motorcycle rid-

ers and 41 percent for motorcycle passenger fatalities. If all motorcyclists involved in seri-

ous crashes had worn helmets, an additional 823 lives could have been saved.

Riding a motorcycle does not have to be an unsafe summer activity. "Stay hydrated and ride within your individual skill limits, not the group you're riding with. And, most important-

ly, always look out for the other drivers," Dickinson urges. Taking appropriate precautions can also help minimize accident potential. For more facts and tips about safely riding a motorcycle, visit the NSC website at www.public.navy.mil/navsafecen/Pages.

Changes in processing of Tuition Assistance applications

The Virtual Education Center (VEC) in Dam Neck, Virginia now processes all Tuition Assistance (TA) applications for sailors stationed in Italy. As of July 15, when a sailor enters his application into the WEB TA program, it will go directly to the VEC, streamlining the application process.

TA, which is available to service members who have completed one year in their first permanent duty station, assists sailors in earning college degrees at any accredited college or university. TA pays for up to \$250 per semester hour, with a limit of 16 semester hours per fiscal year. (A good time for a sailor to start his college career in Naples is Fall Term I, which runs from August 23 through October 17.)

The Naples Navy College Office helps sailors develop education plans; all sailors must have an education plan in order for the VEC to process their applications. The office will also work with sailors to ensure TA eligibility requirements are met. Sailors should submit their applications to the automated system at least two weeks prior to the beginning of each term, allowing time to correct any issues. The VEC is unable to process late or incomplete TA applications.

Interested sailors can visit the Navy College Office to learn more about how to earn a college degree and develop an education plan. Sailors can also contact the VEC directly at DSN 312-492-4684 with questions about TA, Monday through Friday from noon to 3 a.m. (Central European Time). Yearly physical health assessments keep sailors and marines prepared

An initiative to keep all active duty sailors and marines fit, healthy and ready to deploy requires them to complete a yearly physical health assessment (PHA). This assessment consolidates medical, dental, occupational health and risk screening services, medical record review, preventative counseling and risk communication into a single annual appointment.

During a PHA, a service member meets face-to-face with health care professionals during his birth month. "The PHA is designed to maintain total health," said Cmdr. Jaye


Bayles, head of the community health department at U.S. Naval Hospital Naples. "It is our way to evaluate and support the service member's physical and mental health needs by trying to address every aspect we can during the appointment."

According to Kendall Natrop, a hospital corpsman, it takes a full hour to prepare for each service member's PHA appointment, in order to ensure that the appointment runs smoothly. "To prepare for a PHA, we pull all the patient's records, verify them and see exactly what the service member needs to take care of during his appointment, such as immunizations, cholesterol testing, hearing exams and dental checkups," explained Natrop. "A yearly

PHA is very important to do on time because not only does it keep the service member healthy, but it can also help catch issues that some people are unaware of."

"The PHA is also designed to help prevent the time crunch that some service members experience around the biannual physical fitness assessment (PFA) time frame. Completing your PHA is mandatory to pass the PFA, so taking care of it in your birth month helps service members meet the requirement on time," Bayles advised.

cuisine), have come and gone. Work is progressing rather well, and it's probably safe to say that the restaurant will be completed by Labor Day.

Q6: Will the bus schedule be affected by the Strike?

A6: The bus schedule is supported by both a contractor and Public Works employees. Unless the bus cannot physically access the Support Site or Capodichino, the contract bus should not be affected, but the PW bus will depend on driver availability.

Q7: What is the status of the dog park on Support Site?

A7: The dog park is awaiting contractor provided project work to move the security systems from the interior fence to the new external perimeter fence. No date for completion of that work has been provided yet. Given the current fiscal situation, NSA Naples is not going to build a temporary dog park while wait-

ing for completion. Point of contact for the dog park will be NSA Housing. When you see the security systems on the outside fence, the community will be notified on the Grand Opening!!!

Q8: Why is the trash on Support Site not being picked up regularly?

A8: Recycling is building up as the pick-up of trash is prioritized. The local commune and provincial trash consortium is struggling to perform routine services for the entire community—not just Support Site—as they continue through a restructuring in the region. However, one of the largest issues causing the heaps at the trash points is partly our inability to properly sort and compact the recyclables. The Naples community needs to continue to sort, compact and contain by secure means all recyclable material. If you are an off-base resident, your recyclables need to be handled by your specific commune, DO NOT bring your recyclables or non-recyclables onboard any NSA Naples Installation.

Q9: What documents should you carry while traveling around Europe?

A9: Carry your U.S. tourist passport, not your official no-fee passport, when traveling around Europe. The no-fee passport (the one with your Visa) allows dependents to accompany sponsors on official orders beyond 90 days in Italy. Always have in your possession a copy of your Sojourner Permit, regardless of how far from home you are traveling.

Safety Tip

Head for high ground



Never underestimate the power of flood waters. Just six inches of fast moving water can knock you down. Floods usually develop over a few days, and you may be alerted by broadcast warnings and given instructions about evacuation. However, flash floods can occur without warning and cause more deaths than any other kind of weather condition. Flash floods result from heavy rain, dam failure or collapse of a natural debris dam. Flash flood waters can reach the height of a two-story building and move with great speed, carrying trees, large rocks and debris. They can destroy bridges and buildings. Whether you can swim or not, you could quickly drown in moving water.


Here are reminders about staying safe during flood emergencies:

- Wear an approved personal flotation device when working in or around water.
- Do not walk in floodwaters.
- Supervise children closely. Do not allow them near high water, storm drains and other water hazards.
- Observe all hazard warnings on roads.
- Take the recommended routes. Do not try shortcuts.
- Avoid areas subject to frequent flash flooding, such as gullies and creek beds, particularly during wet weather or thunderstorms.
- Watch for flooding at low areas on the highway, bridges and overpasses.
- Never drive a vehicle into water if you are not certain of the depth.
- If the vehicle stalls in rising water, get to safety rather than attempting to restart. Climb to higher ground. Nearly half of all flash flood fatalities are auto-related.
- Be extra cautious at night when it is harder to recognize flood dangers.
- Don't work or travel alone in a flood.
- Never go sightseeing during a disaster.
- Avoid the waterfront during disaster situations. There is a danger of storm surge during a hurricane. This high water, caused by wind, is the greatest killer during hurricanes. The torrential rain of a hurricane can also trigger flash floods inland. Following an earthquake, a tsunami, a high wave caused by a quake, can sweep over the oceanfront resulting in loss of life.

Floodwater is treacherous. The possibility of drowning is very real if you attempt to cross the water on foot or if you are caught in rising water while operating heavy equipment or an automobile. During a flood, stay safe and dry.

World Cup wrap-up

Every four years, national soccer teams from around the world battle to become one of 32 teams skilled enough to make an attempt at winning the FIFA World Cup. Major upsets in World Cup qualification—like Russia's defeat by the smallest country in the tournament, Slovenia, and France's shut-out of Ireland—promised to make 2010's tournament, held in Durban, South Africa, thrilling from day one.

Fumbles early in the tournament from heavily favored teams like France, Germany, Italy and England surprised spectators. Most shocking was the 1-1 tie between the reigning champion, Italy, and New Zealand, a country where cricket and rugby often take precedence over soccer. Italy's fans waited anxiously for the squad to get fired up in their usual fashion, but were sorely disappointed to see Italy finish last in their group.

American fans, who bought more tickets than any other country, went in expecting great things from their team. Around Naval Support Activity Naples, fans gathered at O'Rhys Pub

to show national pride and World Cup spirit by watching every U.S. game, until the U.S.A.'s Cup hopes were crushed by Ghana in the knockout round—the same round and the same team as 2006.


A few lucky fans got to watch the games in person, like YN2 Rafael Flores, who went to South Africa for 10 days. "I enjoyed it so much that I've already started a saving for the 2014 World Cup....I would definitely recommend it to anyone, even if you're not really into soccer; after going to a World Cup and taking part of the BIGGEST sporting event in the world, you won't be able to help falling in love with the 'beautiful game.'"

Flores witnessed some beautiful moments in the "beautiful game," like America's comeback against Slovenia. That was the game the American team found itself in the middle of a refereeing controversy, after FIFA referee Koman Coulibaly disallowed an on-side goal that would have made the team's 85th minute score against Slovenia the biggest second-half comeback in World Cup history.

Coulibaly's controversial call

reignited a long-standing debate about the need for instant replay during games. Many players and spectators argue referees have too much impact on the game. This proved true in the 2010 World Cup: the "off-sides" goal in the U.S.A. v. Slovenia game and the questionable red card given to Brazil's Kaka in the Brazil v. Ivory Coast game demonstrate how instant replay can alter a game's outcome.

One surprising characteristic of the 2010 World Cup was the lessened importance of individual stars. Team play was valued over solo scorers when it came down to who advanced in the tournament. Notable star-studded teams, like Portugal (Cristiano Ronaldo), England (Wayne Rooney, Ashley Cole), Argentina (Lionel Messi) and Brazil (Kaka), did not advance as far as predicted. The finalists, Spain and Netherlands, have a few high-profile players of their own, but by watching their games, it is evident they have mastered playing as a team.

In the end, Spain won the July 11 final with a goal by Andres Iniesta in extra time. Spain's victory is amplified because it is celebrating its first World Cup title in the history of the tournament. Spain, who went into World Cup ranked number one, can now truly be recognized as champions of the soccer world. This victory comes two years after winning the European final against Germany.

Lt. William Sheridan was in Barcelona for the final. He described the intense celebration scene: "They had set up two large monitors in one of the main plazas and there were thousands of Barcelonans watching the final. Everyone was wearing a Spanish flag and Spanish colors. When they won everyone was screaming, honking horns and blowing vuvuzelas."

Germany also did well in the tournament, with a third place finish against Uruguay. Winning titles in World Cups is nothing new for Germany and Uruguay, who have three and two wins respectively. Uruguay's fourth place finish was considered the biggest surprise of the tournament. No doubt Uruguay's Diego Forlan, who was formally recognized as the best player in the tournament as the recipient of the Golden Ball, helped his team finish strongly.

Lastly, followers of the World Cup will remember their introduction to the vuvuzela, the long plastic tubes that filled the stadiums—and living rooms—with an irritating buzzing noise. They might also remember Germany's "Paul the oracle octopus," who correctly predicted the results of all of Germany's tournament games and the final match between Netherlands and Spain. Paul's keepers would lower two boxes of food with the flags of the two teams playing and Paul would eat out of the box of the team that would win. His predications had an overall 86 percent success rate. However, Paul's newfound celebrity has endangered his life. In response to Paul's prediction that Argentina would lose, Argentine chef Nicolas Bedorrou posted a recipe for an octopus dish on his website. Luckily for Paul, the prime minister of Spain has offered him state protection.
