A tasty salute to America's best

The Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples community gathered together on Veterans Day to honor and remember the sacrifices and acts of courage made by the brave American men and women who have served our country and fought for our freedom. A patchwork of hungry people, from service members and spouses to retirees and children, assembled in the Naples High School cafeteria for "A Salute to America's Best," a steak and eggs breakfast generously donated and prepared by volunteers from Cooks from the Valley.

For about 25 years, Cooks from the Valley, a volunteer group of businessmen and their families from Bakersfield, California, has shared their generosity and appreciation for the men and women who have worn the uniform of the United States Armed Forces. Mr. Tom Anton created the organization after he visited the crew of the USS Chandler, who pulled into port in California. Mr. Anton and his friends and family rounded up as many steaks as they could find to feed the crew of 300. To date, Cooks from the Valley has cooked more than 120,000 steaks to thank our troops for their selfless service.

This Veterans Day, Cooks from the Valley recog-

nized service members throughout the European theater. They flew over 13,000 Harris Ranch steaks across the Atlantic along with the cooks who prepared them. Three thousand of the steaks arrived at NSA Naples Tuesday. They were lovingly marinated in a combination of oil, garlic and a secret seasoning Wednesday and were then grilled to pink perfection on Veterans Day.

Morale, Welfare and Recreation generously donated the rest of the breakfast sides, including eggs, rolls and potatoes. Other organizations in the community also participated to show their commitment to America's heroes; the JROTC Color Guard paraded the colors, the Girl Scouts collected tickets, the Fleet and Family Support Center offered door prizes, to name a few. Scooby Do, Tigger and clowns were on hand to entertain children and the Navy band performed for all in attendance.

Italian News Briefs

Veneto devastated by flood

Italian Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi, his coalition partner Umberto Bossi and Italy's civil protection chief Guido Bertolaso visited the northeastern Veneto region, which was devastated by floodwater last week. Five people died in the flood caused by heavy rain, and the area sustained at least €1 billion of damage. Thousands of people were evacuated from their homes and over 150,000 livestock drowned, while entire crops of tobacco, fruits and vegetables were destroyed, according to the Coldiretti farmers union. Thousands of hectares of farmland are still under water, as are local small and medium businesses. The government promised substantial and immediate aid coming from Italy's 2011 budget and from the European Union.

Police arrest 16 terror suspects

Police arrested 16 people in Naples suspected of having links to a terrorist cell. Most of the arrested were Algerians, Tunisians, Moroccans and two Italians. They allegedly provided logistical support to terrorism by trafficking false documents, counterfeiting bank notes and abetting illegal immigration. The operation carried out by the Carabinieri recovered forged driving licenses, identity cards and official stamps.

Rome museum named 'World Building of the Year'

Rome's MAXXI museum, designed by Zaha Hadid, was named the "World Building of the Year" during the World Architecture Festival in Barcelona, Spain. The futuristic new art museum was unveiled in May after 10 years of work. The 27,000 square-meter concrete and glass structure is located one kilometer northwest of Rome, in the Flaminio neighborhood. This is the first national public center of contemporary art in Italy and houses an auditorium, library and media library, a bookshop, a cafeteria, a bar/restaurant and galleries for temporary exhibitions and performances.

Italy to remove public Wi-Fi restrictions

In January, Italy will remove restrictions on public Wi-Fi access to the internet, said Interior Minister

Roberto Maroni. Restrictions required that businesses had to obtain a special license from police in order to offer Wi-Fi access to the public, and users had to produce an official identity document. These restrictions were introduced for security reasons five years ago. Maroni said citizens will be free to connect to Wi-Fi systems without the restrictions which have been superseded by technological advances. Politicians of all political colors welcomed the move, but Antonio Di Pietro, leader of the Italy of Values opposition party, said he first wanted to see how Maroni planned to balance the demands of free navigation and security.

House of the Gladiators collapses in Pompeii

Last Saturday, a 2,000 year-old house in Pompeii that was once used by gladiators to train before going to fight in an amphitheater, collapsed after hours following heavy rains. The house was partially destroyed during WWII, and the roof and some of the walls were repaired in 1947 using reinforced concrete. Many critics aroused saying the site and other archeological sites in Italy were at risk of a similar fate. President of the Italian Republic Giorgio Napolitano said it was a "disgrace for Italy" and asked for an explanation. The government cut €280 million from culture budgets over the next three years, including €58 million a year from the Ministry of Culture alone. Funding, which is due to decline, will significantly affect Pompeii, which has an annual budget of €79 million, as well as museums and other archeological sites. In March, part of the ceiling of Roman Emperor Nero's Domus Aurea near the Coliseum in Rome collapsed following rains.

Vatican Library exhibit opens

A new exhibition on the treasures of the Vatican opened Wednesday at the Braccio Carlo Magno, on the left side of the colonnade in St. Peter's Square. The exhibition called "Understanding the Vatican Library: a History Open to the Future" remains open until Jan. 31. Lovers of ancient books can touch some of the world's rarest documents, like the edition of Dante's "Divine Comedy" from 1564. The exhibition recreates a mini-version of the frescoed rooms of the Vatican Library, which houses more than 1.6 million books, manuscripts, coins, first editions and wax seals.

"Breaking Up Is Hard to Do" opens Thursday

NSA Naples gets into fighting shape with combat aerobics

Sailors and other members of the local military community have an opportunity to get into fighting shape by attending a new combat aerobics class at the recently reopened Fit Zone at the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Capodichino base.

Sara Spiga, a fitness specialist and personal trainer, is leading the class for active duty service members, their families and Department of Defense employees.

"This is not cardio kickboxing or Tae Bo," said Spiga. "This is extreme high-intensity training and conditioning based on techniques taken from combatives."

Similar to cardio kickboxing, combat aerobics focuses on a total body routine that uses the proper physics of motion and techniques utilized in Chinese Kenpo and the Filipino fighting

arts. This includes footwork drills, ducking, punching, kicking, floor exercises, leg raises, lunges, sit-ups, push ups and various striking techniques. However, unlike fitness routines based on martial arts, combat aerobics is not choreographed, but instead utilizes Fartlek interval-type training to control the pacing of the activities. "This is pure combatives-based conditioning," said Spiga. "There is music during the routine but it is only used to help maintain a certain mental state; it isn't used to control or influence the pacing."

"I think the class is great because you're getting to work your arms, your legs and your whole body," said Eliana Caffarelli, water aerobics instructor and swimming pool lifeguard at the fitness center. "I took the combat aerobics class and wow, it was very hard!"

The Fit Zone staff hopes the course developed as part of a new

series of group exercise classes during the gym renovation proves popular. "A gym is more than just expensive equipment," said Jeffrey Harris, facility manager of the Fit Zone. "We decided to focus on our group exercise programs, and we're looking to see more active duty in our classes, as well as more participation from men in general for our group cardio sessions. We think Sara is the instructor to help reach that goal."

The combat aerobics class is held three times a week every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 11 a.m. and lasts 50 minutes. "All levels of skill and fitness are welcome," said Spiga. "People should try the class, and I think they will be surprised at how much fun they have and how much they get out of it."

The love of Italian cuisine inspired Naples High School Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) instructor Senior Chief Vince Gilfoy and special educator Vito Vitulli to team up to give a special needs student an authentic Italian experience—harvesting olives.


With the help of Naples High's Junior ROTC students and Gilfoy, Patrick, a special needs student, picked olives from four olive trees just outside the Naples Elementary and High schools. Typically, these trees remain untouched each year. Patrick beamed with excitement as he and the JROTC students participated in this Italian tradition.

"I wanted to show the kids how Patrick likes to have fun just like everyone else," Vitulli said. "It was a chance to see a group of students interact with a student that they wouldn't typically interact with."

The group picked 10 kilos of olives (22 pounds). Vitulli and Gilfoy began the curing process in a salt and water brine. Later, bay leaves, oregano and citrus fruit will be added to the brine for flavor. They hope the olives will be ready to eat in about a month and a half. Gilfoy added, "We are going to make sure that every student in the school has the opportunity to taste these olives and know that they came from the trees in front of the school."

The kids couldn't help but have fun interacting with each other. The olive harvest was an opportunity for the students to learn and explore outside of the classroom. "I'm sure that they have learned through this activity," Vitulli said. "And it was every bit as important as any book they're going to pick up in their high school, college or military career."

Price differences up to \$5 will be honored on the spot at any NEX cash register. A price difference over \$5 will require model and price verification by a store supervisor. Customers should bring a competitor's sales flyer to the NEX showing the price difference. However, depending on the dollar amount, approval by a supervisor or the store manager may be required.

The NEX also offers a 14-day price guarantee on any item originally purchased from the NEX. If the identical item is offered at a lower price by the NEX or a local competitor within 14 days of purchase, the customer is entitled to a refund of the difference. Customers are required to bring a copy of the advertisement and receipt to the NEX customer service counter.

For customers who prefer not to use credit, the NEX offers a layaway program. A minimum deposit of 10 percent of the purchase price plus a \$5 non-refundable layaway fee is all that is required. Once all payments are made, customers can bring the

merchandise home. Depending on the category of merchandise purchased, payments can be spread over 180 days. Customers are encouraged to check with their local NEX for other specific details relating to layaway as some stores may limit the number of items permitted on layaway due to space constraints.

Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy. This is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application.

NATIONALS OF ANY STATE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COMING TO ITALY DO NOT REQUIRE ANY VISA OR SOJOURNER PERMIT.

As part of the Area Orientation process, the U.S. Region Legal Service Office (RLSO EURAFSWA) assists in the preparation and oversees the acquisition of the Sojourner Permit for all personnel attached to U.S. Navy commands in the Naples area. Army and Air Force personnel stationed at JFC must apply through the Carabinieri at the JFC Provost Marshall's Office, Building L.

Periodic health assessment

In support of the war on terrorism, the potential for planned and unplanned immediate deployments to many commands all around the world is real. With this knowledge, it only makes sense to have up-to-date medical and dental records, if for no other reason than to have peace of mind during the onslaught of requirements prior to deployment.

Since the implementation of the periodic health assessment (PHA) in 2007, we in Navy medicine have been taking steps to ensure our service members' are medically ready at a moment's notice when the need to deploy arises.

Since 2007, the requirements for service members to complete a five-year physical was withdrawn and replaced with the PHA. This proactive process was implemented to increase individual medical readiness and help sailors maintain a deployment-ready status.

Now several years later and many lessons learned, some of our sailors are still having problems. Whether it is due to a lack of knowledge or it just does not quite reach the top of our daily priority list, we must ensure our annual PHA is completed.

According to SECNAVINST 6120.3 this process will be used to review, verify and correct individual medical readiness (IMR) deficiencies, verify compliance with various elements of deployment health to include pre- and post-deployment health assessments and the post-deployment health reassessment (PDHRA) to ensure a healthy and fit fighting force ready to deploy.

We all have responsibilities within this process.

- Commanding officer is responsible for his or her members scheduling and completing the PHA.
- Command fitness leader is responsible for the physical fitness assessment. As this is a readiness issue, a current PHA must be completed within 12 months to participate in the Navy semiannual PFA.
- Individual is responsible to make and keep a PHA appointment yearly during his or her birth month.
