Town hall wrap up

Capt. Robert Rabuse, Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples commanding officer, conducted a town hall meeting Monday, Nov. 8. The following issues were discussed before the audience Q & A started.

During recent electrical power outages at the Support Site, some of the housing units' AFN television amps were damaged. Funding was secured for replacement equipment, new parts were ordered and some of them have arrived. Repair work commenced Nov. 12, and PW expects to have the affected Support Site units back online by Nov. 22.

As the holidays approach, safety is of the utmost concern. Italy recently made its drinking and driving laws stricter. If a driver is under 21 or had a license for less than three years, the BAC is .00. For other drivers, the BAC is .05. Local law enforcement authorities are cracking down hard; they have been setting up check points in towns and on the roadways. If you are waved over to a check point, please stop and comply with the officer's direction.

NSA has many ways of communicating with you both daily and during an emergency: AFN TV/radio, print media, sandwich boards, PAO Notes, Naples' CNIC website, Facebook, and now Twitter. Recently, you may have received warning through your computer desktop notification system (CDNS) of imminent bad weather. This will not happen every time there is bad weather inbound as Italy does not have a Doppler weather tracking system and the information is not readily available. However, when we are notified of the possibility of extreme weather, we'll get the word out.

There are obvious trash issues in Naples and Campania. Just like in America, no one wants a landfill in their backyard. NSA is keeping pressure on the local government to maintain trash collection services at the Support Site. The trash pick up is now pretty regular, but is subject to the same Regional collection issues as the rest of the Province. Sometimes a collection or two might be missed, and NSA is working on plans to establish a new emergency trash area farther away from housing units on the Support Site. Because the trash is a national issue and controlled by local governing authorities, it is illegal for NSA or our landlord to move trash off base unless Italy declares a trash crisis state of "emergency." **If you live on the economy, do not bring your trash to the Support Site. If you live on the Support Site, remember bulk items are not allowed in the trash areas.** Call ahead and have your mattresses and sectional sofas taken away. A lot of the trash around the Support Site could be recycled. The recycling sites at the Support Site are open for sorted recyclables. Ensure non-recycling doesn't contaminate recyclables. Also, much of the trash and recyclables are not crushed and take up extra space. Flatten recyclables and trash to keep the numbered collection sites from growing unnecessarily.

How much are you willing to pay to go fast?

The Tutor System on the Tangenziale and A-1 is successfully doing its job of catching speeders who disregard traffic laws. In recent months, the Polizia Stradale issued over 450 tickets to Allied Forces Italy (AFI) registrants in the Naples community. These tickets are being delivered to FPO addresses. Most of the fines range from €340 to €500. Some members are getting multiple tickets; the largest infraction recorded to date is 11 tickets for separate speeding events during a three-month period. Unfortunately, the service member's heavy foot will cost him or her over €3,740, or \$5,069 at today's exchange rate.

The economic loss to the Naples military community and individual service member is staggering. Speeding as little as five kilometers per hour over the speed limit may result in a fine of €154. The speed limit on the Tangenziale is 50 mph

(80 km). On the SS7, the speed limit is 55 mph (90 km) except where posted at lower rates of speed. On the A-1, from the Caserta toll booth to the Sorrento toll booth, the speed limit is 62 mph (100 km). When lower speed limits are not posted, the speed limit on the Autostrada is 80 mph (130 km).

Speeding can have a negative effect on your budget by increasing your insurance premiums, paying tickets and fines, paying for off-base legal counsel and court costs and scraping your vehicle due to accident damage. Service members who refuse to pay fines or take appropriate legal action

to refute the tickets can have their vehicles impounded. Service members bear all costs associated with towing, storage and impound fees for a minimum of 90 days. For excessive speeding infractions, the installation commander could potentially pull your AFI driver license and/or vehicle registration privileges.

If you get an off-base speeding ticket, contact the U.S. Region Legal Service Office at 081-568-2953/5258 for specific information on how to fill out the payment voucher and/or take steps to refute the citation.



No long term parking on roof of Capo west parking garage

Effective immediately long term parking is no longer allowed on the roof deck of the west (front gate) parking garage and has been shifted to basement level 2. This is to accommodate the upcoming construction of a 300KW solar photovoltaic system on top of the garage.

This project will install a new solar panel system that will use the sun's energy to gen-

erate approximately 390 MWh/year of energy at no cost to the Navy. This exciting project will help the Navy meet the goals of the Energy Policy Act of 2005 and has the dual benefits of decreasing our impact to the environment while saving electricity costs paid to the power company (ENEL) by the Navy.

Italian News Briefs

Keats-Shelley house to offer a 'taste of England'

Rome's Keats-Shelley House is preparing to open a small café so visitors can have a "real taste" of England, complete with a cup of English tea and a piece of carrot cake or banana bread. The memorial house of the two most famous English poets was established in the early 1900s when a group of American intellectuals decided to heed an appeal by poet Robert Underwood Johnson to save the house. The house is located adjacent to the Spanish Steps and sometime in 2011, will also open the doors to its terrace so visitors will be able to sip their tea while enjoying the view of the famous Piazza di Spagna, said the curators of the house.

Italian food traditions honored

Italy's famous Mediterranean diet gained world heritage status from the UNESCO's list of 'intangible' treasures Tuesday. Agriculture minister Giancarlo Galan said this was a historic achievement for food traditions and the entire culture of Italy. The head of the Italian farmers' organization Sergio Marini was at a mass spaghetti party in Rome's Campidoglio square and stated that food traditions are a cultural heritage of Italy, which doesn't just have monuments and history. The Mediterranean diet, over which Spain and Greece also have historic claims, became Italy's third entry after the Sicilian puppet theater and Sardinian shepherd songs. Venetians are pushing for the gondola to be added next.

Furthermore, the bell peppers from the town of Pontecorvo, in the province of Frosinone near Rome, received the European Union's coveted Protected Designation of Origin (DOP) seal. This seal assures consumers that products and foodstuffs are produced, processed or prepared in a specific geographical location using recognized methods. The peppers are more easily digestible than regular bell peppers. They can be recognized for their "sheer flesh and sweet taste."

Italy seizes more than a ton of cocaine

In the port of Gioia Tauro in the Calabria region,

police seized more than one ton of cocaine valued over than €250 million. The seizure was the biggest haul in Italy in over 15 years. The drugs, probably destined for the Italian and central-northern European markets, were found inside a container that arrived from Brazil. The port of Gioia Tauro is the largest container port in Europe. Investigators believe it is becoming part of a new smuggling route run by the Calabrian organized crime syndicate Ndrangheta, whose drugs profits are the equivalent of three percent of Italian GDP.

Fiat 500 returns to US

After 27 years, the Fiat 500 returns to American markets. The first U.S. edition of the Cinquecento will be available in a standard version in three basic colors: white, red and gray. Later, a convertible model will be released, and in 2012, an electric version. The cars sold in the North American market will be produced at a Chrysler plant in Mexico. The motors will be made at Chrysler's main plant in Dundee, Michigan. Fiat will initially produce between 100,000 and 130,000 of the cars each year, half for the North American market and the other half for Latin America, where Fiat is a top-selling brand. After the Cinquecento, Fiat plans to re-introduce the Alfa Romeo to the American market.

First private train debuts

Italy's first private train company started its journeys from Turin to Milan Monday. The company offers passengers a chance to complete their errands—even grocery shopping and drying cleaning—en route. Passengers shop by placing pasta, baked goods, salami, vegetables, meat and desserts into a virtual grocery basket and picking up their real selections at their point of departure. Customers can also leave their laundry on the train and pick up it three days later, either on the train or at three pick-up points around the city. Arenaways is the first company to challenge the monopoly of Trenitalia, a part of the state-controlled Ferrovie dello Stato.

A dog park at the Support Site is at least three months away from fruition. Funding and contract authorities need to be approved to move the security system around the area, and then the gate work needs to be completed.

The lights on the Support Site soccer field are out. Parts to repair the light boxes have been ordered. Repairs will commence as soon as parts are received and are expected to be completed by Nov. 26.

A photovoltaic system will be installed on the roof of the west garage (front gate) at Capo. Some of the parking spots in this garage will no longer be available, and long-term parking will move down to basement level 2. There are typically about 150 empty parking spots in the garage on a daily basis. NSA is looking into the possibility of adding an extra bus to the current bus schedule to ease any inconvenience during the project.

Members of the audience asked Capt. Rabuse the following questions:

Q: Are there any plans to standardize and/or change the hours of the recycling site?

A: It is important to ensure that the recyclables are not mixed with general waste, to allow them to be collected as recyclables by the local authorities. NSA is not funded for this extra level of oversight, so the Support Site landlord has posted personnel to provide that support. NSA will talk to the landlord and will look into adjusting the hours.

Q: The hours of the recycling site are off. Usually the staff is not there during opening hours, or they close early and arrive late.

A: The landlord also has a limited staff with which to work, and may have to pull people away from the recycling center to address urgent issues. We will work with the landlord to ensure the sites are open during the stated hours. Specific experiences can be relayed to the housing trouble desk, 629-4285/6.

Q: Some people, who looked like soldiers, were recently cleaning up the trash sites at the Support Site. How can we volunteer to help keep our community clean?

A: You can always volunteer to organize a cleaning party. Some members of the community have made it their personal project to keep the trash site near their home clean. About a month ago, NSA sent a 25-man working party of sailors and Seabees to clean up the trash sites and get base cleanliness back on track. We look to the community to help keep it that way. Some of the other personnel you may have seen cleaning up are conducting command directed community service.

Q: In the future, will it be possible for Support Site tenants just to have internet instead of paying for both phone and internet when only one is needed?

A: Housing and NCTS share responsibility for managing this and will look into the options available to us and provide a response.

Q: Some of the trash sites at the Support Site are haz-

ardous to our children. We cannot recycle because there is such a mess of broken glass.

A: First, children should be reminded not play near the trash areas. The sites need to be maintained, they are still trash collection sites. NSA will review options for additional cleaning at the trash sites. In the meantime, proper disposal of trash into the dumpsters will help avoid the scattered debris.

Q: There are many different size carts between the Commissary and the NEX. Are there any plans to standardize the carts? We want to get our euro back.

A: There is currently no plan to standardize the carts. As the community has grown, the NEX and Commissary have purchased additional carts to keep up with the demand. There are about four different types of carts, and it would be a major financial expenditure to get them all standardized. About one year ago, the euro machines were added to each cart, except for a few of the children's carts, to encourage patrons to return their carts to the designated areas vice leave them scattered all over the Support Site. NEX and Commissary employees are working hard to restack the carts and keep like carts together.

Q: People living on the Support Site recently completed an e-mail survey about cable channels. What is the time frame to install cable in the residential units at the Support Site?

A: The results from the survey just came back. We are currently looking into creating a cable channel package based on the results. In the next few months, several homes around the Support Site will be testing the proposed cable technology. By spring, Support Site residents should have the ability to subscribe to a 30-channel cable TV package in addition to the current AFN selection.

Q: Are you aware of the security issues at Parco Le Ginestre? Are there any plans to improve security?

A: Yes, my staff has briefed me on the issues. NSA is working with the landlord, who is looking into installing a monitored security system for the Parco. As the Parco is on the economy, NSA is not empowered or authorized to have its own security personnel patrol the site. If an incident occurs, you should call the Emergency or Non-Emergency Dispatch number. They will facilitate the reporting and notification process with the local law enforcement authorities. Capt. Rabuse will address these issues during his next meeting with the prefect of Caserta. Be vigilant and keep your property secured. Lock all your windows and doors every night. Set the alarm and if necessary, move pets to a room that allows you to set your motion sensors.

Q: Is there any solution to streamline the bill paying process for people living on the Support Site? Some bills are paid by checks, some credit cards only, and some, like the Culligan water bill, have to be paid in one area and ordered in another. Often, the personnel at the Residential Services will be helping a new person set up all of his utilities and a person who just needs to order water will have to wait for 30 minutes to an hour.

A: The NEX will review this process for possible improvements. In some cases, each of these services is managed by a different company or agency, and they each have requirements specific to their contract.

NATO ship rescues stranded sailor while patrolling in eastern Med

Spanish ship ESPN Marques de la Ensenada was alerted to a small craft in distress after the lone passenger in a stranded boat fired a signal flare Nov. 17. Upon approaching the six-meter launch, the crew discovered that passenger Mr. Hassan Hamut had been adrift for several days after an engine failure. He had also run out of food and water.

Mechanics tried unsuccessfully to repair the engine, and the Cyprus coastguard, alerted to the situation, requested Marques de la Ensenada tow the vessel to a rendezvous point with a search and rescue vessel. Mr. Hamut was taken on board the Spanish warship and is reported to be safe and well.

ESPN Marques de la Ensenada, which operates under the command of the Allied Maritime Command in Naples, is part of a multinational Standing NATO Maritime Group 2 currently carrying out surge operations in the central and eastern Mediterranean as part of Operation Active Endeavour.

The group currently consists of 12 ships and is under the command of Commodore Michiel B. Hijmans of the Royal Netherlands Navy.

Safe sleep for your baby!

When we were kids, our parents didn't worry keeping us in a car seat until we were eight years old or making sure we were wearing our helmets before we pedaled off on our bicycles. Because of technology, safety tests and awareness, many changes have been made to raising children over the last 20 years. While there are an infinite number of methods to raising children, all parents want to help their children remain as safe as possible—beginning at birth.

Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) can help you keep your baby safe. They are providing educational material to the Naval Support Activity Naples community about Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS), also known as "crib death." SIDS is the sudden unexplained death of an infant younger than one year of age. In an effort to promote SIDS awareness, FFSC will host a booth in the NEX food court at the Support Site. Parents can find information on ways to provide a safe sleeping environment and other steps to take to reduce the risks of SIDS.

Providing a safe sleep environment is the single most important step you can take to reduce your baby's risk of SIDS, suffocation and accidental death. According to the

Back to Sleep Campaign, begun in 1994 to educate parents, caregivers and health care providers about SIDS, the easiest way to reduce your baby's risk for SIDS is to place healthy babies on their backs to sleep.

Additional recommendations for reducing the risk of SIDS are:

- Early prenatal care,
- Prenatal smoking cessation and a smoke-free environment,
- Breast-feeding,
- Placing baby on his or her back to sleep,
- Keeping your baby's sleep area close to, but separate from where you or others sleep. (Don't use a sofa as baby's bed.)
- Placing baby on a firm sleep surface, such as safety approved crib mattress. (Don't use pillows, quilts, sheepskin or other soft surfaces.)
- Keeping soft objects, toys and loose bedding, like pillow bumpers, away from your baby's face and sleep area.
- Avoid letting your baby overheat during sleep. Dress baby in light sleep clothing and keep the room at a temperature comfortable for an adult.

Turkey time safety tips

Once again, it's time to break out those deep fat fryers to cook up a yummy turkey feast. But, it's also time to remember some safety precautions while preparing Thanksgiving dishes.

Even though cooking may come easily to you and in the past nothing has ever happened, the NSA Naples Fire and Emergency Services would like to share a few tips on how to make your Thanksgiving one to remember. Though deep fat fryers and turkey fryers are not prohibited on base or in base housing, everyone must be aware of the inherent dangers associated with these cooking appliances. Follow the safety tips below for an enjoyable cooking experience:

- Never leave fryers unsupervised.
- While small, kitchen-sized fryers are generally stable, turkey fryers can easily tip over.
- Always follow the manufacturer's directions when using these appliances.
- Leave enough space in the fryer for the turkey; never overfill with oil.
- Most turkey fryers do not have thermostat controls, so monitor the unit closely to avoid overheating.
- Handle with care. The sides of the cooking pot, lid and pot handles get dangerously hot and pose severe burn hazards.
- Keep an ABC Dry Chemical Fire Extinguisher nearby. Never use water to extinguish a grease fire.
- Turkey fryers and barbecues should always be used outdoors at a minimum distance of 15 feet from buildings.
- Never use turkey fryers and bar-

- beques on wooden decks or in garages.
- Make sure fryers and barbecues are used on a flat surface to reduce accidental tipping.
- Deep fry your turkeys in the driveway or parking lot away from vehicles.
- Never leave cooking food unattended.
- Never let children or pets near the fryer and barbecue when in use.
- Make sure food is completely thawed before frying. Be careful with marinades. A spillover effect can occur, which can also result in a fire.
- After you are done cooking, turn off the fryer and let the oil cool completely before handling.
- Never pour cooking oil down the drain or into the soil.

Stuff your turkey, not your trash

Just because you may be stuffing yourself and/or a turkey, doesn't mean you need to stuff your trash can, too.

Did you know that almost all of the waste generated on Thanksgiving Day can be recycled? Here's just a few of the items that can be sorted and recycled:

- All used paper plates, napkins or paper towels can be composted;
- All food waste can be composted;
- All the metal cans from cranberry sauce, green beans, etc. can be recycled after a quick rinse;
- All plastic bags and packaging from fresh and frozen vegetable can be recycled;
- All glass bottles and containers can be recycled, too;
- Even the unfortunate broken ceramic plates are recyclable!

For Support Site residents, the recycling areas will be open on Thanksgiving and the following day from 6:30 to 9:30 a.m. and again from 4 to 6 p.m. Remember to place your recyclables in transparent bags—not necessarily clear bags—like the ones available from the Housing Maintenance Center.

Holiday cooking tips

Whether it's your first time whipping up a golden, juicy turkey or your 15th, those once-a-year Thanksgiving meal preparations can create anxiety in any cook. Each year, moms and turkey hotlines alike receive thousands of calls from distressed cooks looking for answers on everything from the correct oven temperature to carving techniques.

Student chefs in Marcia Webster's culinary arts class at Naples High School offer some cooking tips to help make your holiday meal a success.

1. *How to make a pie crust that doesn't get soggy:*
Add ice water to the flour and butter mixture by hand. A food processor can easily over mix and toughen the dough.
2. *Plan ahead of time:*
Buy ingredients four to five days ahead of time.

3. *Set everything out before you start cooking.*
3. *Use rubber gloves to handle your turkey:*
You'll have a tight grasp on the turkey, so you won't drop it.
4. *Cook your mashed potatoes the day before:*
Peel, cook and mash potatoes the day before Thanksgiving. Cover and refrigerate. Microwave or reheat at a low temperature.
5. *Don't cook your turkey in the oven:*
Use an alternate source for cooking the centerpiece, whether it's turkey, ham, etc. Try barbecuing, deep frying or smoking.
6. *Baste your turkey with cheesecloth:*
Cover your turkey with cheesecloth or a T-shirt soaked in melted butter or olive oil. Remove it during the last 30 minutes of baking to let the skin brown.
7. *Don't go to Thanksgiving dinner hungry.*
We often eat faster and more food when we are hungry. Eat breakfast and lunch to avoid overeating at dinnertime.



The Navy Outdoor Recreation (NOR) Center located at Carney Park recently opened its ski shop for the 2010/11 winter sports season.

"Our winter activities season begins with a focus on our customers," said Michelle Wolfe, a NOR Center recreational specialist. The NOR Center provides the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples community a place to purchase brand name sporting gear, rent outdoor recreation equipment, sign up for sporting excursions and repair and maintain their personal equipment.

Now's the time to dust off your skis and snow boards and bring them into the NOR Center, so you're ready for your first trip up the mountain. Scratches and gouges may be visible on the base of the board or a ski, or equipment might just need a fresh coat of wax.

NOR center recreational specialist Pete Slater, who's been tuning snow boards and skis for 15 years, guarantees the quality of the work done on winter sports gear brought into the shop by NOR Center patrons. "I understand that people often have a lot invested in their winter sports equipment, and I care about the quality of work done to bring snow boards, skis and boots back up to peak condition after being stored," said Slater. "I perform or directly oversee the work to condition our customers' winter sports gear and offer a guarantee that equipment brought to the NOR Center will be tuned correctly and ready to go, as good as new."
