Naples' 'doll hospital'

Not far from Naples' Via San Gregorio Armeno ("Christmas Alley"), is a waiting list at the "doll hospital," where, for over 110 years, "doctors" in white lab coats have specialized in repairing broken dolls, stuffed animals and plastic toys that have sentimental value to their owners. The doctors there use extreme care and modern technology to repair hand-painted porcelain dolls dressed in hand-stitched velvet and lace costumes. Old techniques are used to fix broken rocking horses and early electric trains.

EU to lift quality seal on 'true' Neapolitan pizza

A year ago, the "Vera" Naples-style pizza was given the European Union quality seal protecting label (TSG), but it may now be lifted because the ingredients and method used in making the pizza were registered, but not the names. Last Friday, the EU Commission approved plans to revamp labeling regulations in the 27-nation area in an effort to make them simpler for consumers and ensure they indicate the origin of products used. The protected Neapolitan-style pizza is now only known as Pizza Napoletana TSG and must be made in a specific way. However, pizza Napoletana as a brand has not been trademarked and exists even if it is Neapolitan in name only. Experts said that in order to avoid losing its EU label, a new application must be made with the traditional ingredients and method linked to a specific registered name like "Pizza Napoletana Verace" (Real Neapolitan Pizza) or "Pizza Napoletana Tradizionale" (Traditional Neapolitan Pizza), the experts said. Once the new EU rules are adopted, there will be a transition period. Neapolitan pizza-makers fought for 25 years to have their unique product put on the EU's list of protected foods. Real Neapolitan pizza must be made only of durum wheat flour, fresh yeast, water and sea salt, with a topping of olive oil, San Marzano tomatoes (in slices no thicker than 8mm) and mozzarella di bufala—the fresh cheese made of buffalo milk. The pizza from Naples is universally recognized as the benchmark for pizza everywhere.

Rome is number one choice for holidays

According to a survey which analyzed Christmas and New Year's Eve reservations, this year, Italians prefer to spend the holidays in Rome, followed by London and Paris. London is the most expensive destination in the month of December. Compared to London, Rome has cheaper prices: a double room costs an average of €110 per night, only 2 percent more than in December 2009. In Rome, there are major cul-

tural events during the holidays, including a concert by veteran singer-songwriter Claudio Baglioni at the Roman Forum and an exhibition on Vincent Van Gogh at the Vittoriano museum. Italians who love the mountains prefer to spend their winter vacation in the northern Italian region of Trentino Alto Adige—home to the Dolomites. The most searched city in the region for 2010 Christmas is Merano, where the magical Christmas markets, famous in northern Italy, are open until Jan. 6.

New Year's celebrations darkened in

Castellabate

The town of Castellabate in the province of Salerno in the Campania region banned New Year's fireworks, firecrackers and paper bombs. The mayor has forbidden the illegal possession and selling of the most dangerous firecrackers sold in non-authorized shops. The ordinance also bans the ignition and explosion of fireworks, firecrackers, whistling rockets and pinwheels on public roads and among crowds. Official shops can sell small fireworks. Anyone who breaks the rules, will face criminal penalties and fines up to €103.

Italy's art exhibits

Here is a city-by-city guide to some of Italy's art exhibitions:

Florence - Palazzo Vecchio until May 1: "For the Love of God," features Damien Hirst's famous diamond-encrusted skull in only the third outing since its creation in 2007.

- **Palazzo Strozzi until Jan. 23:** "Bronzino, Painter and Poet at the Medici Court," includes 90 works in world's first monographic show.

- **Palazzo Pitti through April 30:** "Vinum Nostrum: The Art, Science and Myths of Wine in Civilization" explores prehistoric winegrowing to Dionysus cult, Etruscan and Roman use. Show features oldest surviving wine container, on loan from Georgia.

- **Bargello until Jan. 10:** "Giovanfrancesco Rustici and Leonardo," examines links of 15th century sculptor with da Vinci, Verrocchio and others.

Forlì - Musei Civici di San Domenico until Jan. 9: 400 ancient Egyptian artifacts found by great Egyptologist Ernesto Schiaparelli (1856-1928) including works from Queen Nefertiti's tomb.

Will the real Santa please stand up?

It's that wonderful time of the year again, in which people of all faiths and traditions celebrate and observe gift giving in some way. Many refer to the time as "the holidays," but most people, regardless of their religious background, simply call it Christmas.

I've spent many years in the Orient, specifically in mainland Japan, and was surprised to see that Japanese people are avid observers of Christmas and are unashamed to call it that. There are Santa Claus figures, trees, decorations and Merry Christmas signs all over the place, along with many other traditional Christmas (and usually Christian) symbols—even European-American Christmas carols waft through the air in stores and malls all over the country.

Speaking of Christians, here in Italy, Christianity is the dominant religion, and so the celebrations of the birth of Christ are quite evident and out in the open. Christians celebrate not only the birth of Christ as the greatest gift to all humanity, but gift giving in general as a reflection of their faith and desire to be "Christ-like" in their lives (which, by the way, is where the label "Christian" first came from).

The ultimate image of this "Christ-likeness" in gift giving, besides that of Christ himself, is the image of a jolly old man in a red suit who brings gifts to people everywhere in the world the night before Christmas. Yes, I'm of course talking about Santa Claus, or St. Nicholas as his name is known in the Greek language. The legends and stories of the life of this great man have taken many twists and turns over the centuries, but they all essentially carry the same message. He typified the ultimate in giving to the poor and destitute and was always gracious, humble and displayed no "self-seeking" qualities. The real story of St. Nicholas is too long to tell here, but I will tell you enough to at least wet your appetite to find out more about this great individual from the annals of historic record and the tradition of early Eastern Christianity.

Born sometime in the late 3rd century in a small coastal town in Turkey called Patara (now Anatolia), Nicholas was the only son of very wealthy parents. He was a devout Christian from his earliest years, and came to be known not only for his great generosity from the wealth left to him by his parents, but for his defense of the faith, and the many, many miracles he performed, just as Christ and His Apostles had done in earlier times. But without going into the many miracles, let me tell you about how he became known in the small town in which he lived.

One day, late in the year when Nicholas was the local parish priest, God revealed to him in prayer the detailed plans of one of the men in town who was in

great distress. The man had been very wealthy, but had fallen on hard times and became poor and destitute. He had two daughters, but could no longer afford their dowries with which they could become respectable wives. He decided to open a brothel, where he would "feature" his daughters for hire. About to commit this desperate act, an unusual thing happened: A mysterious man came in the night with a large sack over his shoulder. He tossed the sack through an open window into the home of the poor man. When morning came, the man discovered the sack and found a large amount of gold inside. Rejoicing in his newly found fortune, he thanked God, paid the dowry for his oldest daughter to be married, but wondered who his mysterious benefactor was. Later, after praying that God would reveal the identity of the secret giver, another sack appeared in the night through the window. The Lord enabled the man to awaken just as the second sack was being delivered, and he arose quickly to follow the mysterious man through the snow. Catching him in the night, the poor man discovered it was the priest Nicholas who had been providing the riches secretly. Nicholas told the man God had shown him what he had been planning, and in order to prevent him from committing a grievous sin, gave him the money he needed. Nicholas wanted to remain anonymous, and upon being discovered by the poor man, made him take an oath that he would tell no one of the incident. Nevertheless, the story got out and soon many were telling of mysterious gifts that had appeared in their homes over the years.

Later on, in the early years of the 4th century, Nicholas went on to become Bishop of the entire region of that part of Turkey, called Lycia. The main city of the region was Myra, which was the city of his Apostolic rule.

Time and space will not permit me to scratch the surface of what this great man accomplished in his lifetime...and beyond. But suffice it to say that this and many other stories are what make believing in the "real" Santa Claus so fascinating and meaningful, especially at Christmas time. Merry Christmas everyone!





Individual Force Protection Plans (IFPP) for travel

In accordance with COMNAVREGEURNOTE 3500, IFPP's are mandatory for all traveling Department of Defense personnel and their adult family members if one of the following criteria is met:

- If the destination country or region has a State Department Public Announcement or Travel Warning in effect.
- A U.S. Mission (Embassy/ Consulate) is not present and the State Department or respon-

sible Chief of Mission is not in a position to accord normal consular protection services to the U.S. citizens.

- Travel to any of the following locations; Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Belarus, Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Israel, Lebanon, Albania, Kosovo, Serbia and all African nations.
- Travel out of the EUCOM AOR, as required by AOR Commander. (CONUS, Alaska, Hawaii, and U.S. territories are exempt).

Are Your Halls Too Bright?

One path to energy savings runs just outside your door—the hallway. Halls usually need only 5 to 10 foot candles of light.

Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy. This is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application.

NATIONALS OF ANY STATE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COMING TO ITALY DO NOT REQUIRE ANY VISA OR SOJOURNER PERMIT.

As part of the Area Orientation process, the U.S. Region Legal Service Office (RLSO EURAFSWA) assists in the preparation and oversees the acquisition of the Sojourner Permit for all personnel attached to U.S. Navy commands in the Naples area. Army and Air Force personnel stationed at JFC must apply through the Carabinieri at the JFC Provost Marshall's Office, Building L.


Electrical hazards

Almost any kind of job you can think of today involves using electricity. That is why it is important for everyone to understand how to avoid electrical shock.

There are many different kinds of electrical hazards, depending on the kind of place where you work. Some jobsites have high voltage installations and some use small electrical equipment. But whether the electrical shock comes from an overhead transmission line or an incorrectly grounded power tool, the results can be equally fatal.

Besides electrical shock, electricity can also cause other hazards. Electrical shock can cause the startled victim to fall from a ladder. Electricity causes burns, including severe internal burns. Electricity can cause fires, for instance when circuits are overloaded and the resulting heat sets off a fire. Electricity can cause explosions, as would be the case if an electrical spark occurred in the presence of a flammable vapor, gas or dust.

When electricity enters the human body, it can affect the heart beat, brain function and breathing. It can cause immediate death or serious injury. Under the wrong conditions, even small amounts of electricity can kill, so never take any electrical device for granted.



Follow these tips to avoid electrical shock:

- Always make sure all electrical equipment you use is in good repair. Report any problems so the equipment can be repaired or replaced.
- Never do repairs on electrical equipment unless you are authorized and qualified to do so. Fatal accidents have been caused by poorly repaired equipment.
- Use only correctly grounded equipment. Never use three-pronged cords which have had the third prong broken off. Make sure grounding connections are secure.
- Watch for wires and connections which are damaged, worn or broken.
- Use a Ground Fault Circuit Interrupter (GFCI) when using electrical equipment outdoors or in a damp area. Do not use electrical equipment which is damp or which may have been submerged in water. Do not handle any electrical equipment, including cords and plugs, with wet hands.
 - When unplugging a cord, pull on the plug rather than the cord.
 - Never use a ladder made of aluminum or one with metal reinforcement when doing any electrical work. This includes changing a light bulb.
 - Determine if there are any overhead hazards such as power lines and electrical installations. Take precautions to not come into contact with them when using an object such as a ladder, pole or pipe.
 - Don't ever use water on an electrical fire. Use only an extinguisher designed specifically for electrical fires. Know where to locate and how to use this extinguisher in your workplace.



Always be alert to electrical hazards no matter what kind of work you do. Be sure to use electrical safety sense at home, too.

Domestic violence is a silent infiltrator, quietly influencing numerous lives within our Navy community. Not only destructive and sometimes lethal, domestic violence negatively affects the physical and emotional well-being of our sailors, marines and their dependents, while impacting fleet readiness. Domestic violence concerns more than intimate partners; it can involve children, elderly dependent parents, the disabled and dating teens.

Did you know...

- Over 40% of new U.S. Navy recruits have experienced family violence.
- Of female murder victims in 2008, 35 percent were killed by an intimate partner.
- Fifteen percent of teens who have been in a relationship report having been hit, slapped or pushed by their boyfriend or girlfriend. Thirty percent of teens who have been in a relationship have worried about their physical safety in a relationship.
- The most recent survey of adult protective services found that 191,908 reports of elder abuse and neglect of people age 60 or older were substantiated in 2004; of those reports, 20 percent involved caregiver neglect; 15 percent involved emotional, psychological or verbal abuse; 15 percent involved financial exploitation; 11 percent involved physical abuse and 1 percent involved sexual abuse.
- Every 5 years, domestic violence kills as many people as who died in the Vietnam War.
- Domestic violence is the third leading cause of injury-related death among women ages 15-44.
- About 45 percent of all female intimate violence victims live with children under 12.
- Thirty-one percent of pregnancy-related deaths were homicides.

Characteristics of domestic violence:

- Primarily occurs between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m.
- Interracial;
- Females are more likely to be the victim than the aggressor;
- A majority of incidents occur in the home;
- The use of alcohol or drugs was a contributing factor in approximately 42 percent of reported cases between 2001-2005.

What can trigger domestic violence?

- Job loss/threat of job loss/financial strain
- Pending divorce, child custody battles
- Alcohol abuse
- Depression
- Obsessions/suspicions about partner infidelity
- Alcohol/drug problems
- End of a relationship
- Money/religion

If you or someone you know is being harmed by domestic violence, don't go it alone. Please reach out to your local Fleet and Family Support Center (081-811-6372), law enforcement/base security (Support Site: 081-811-4391; Capo: 081-568-5414; NCIS: 081-811-7463) or the National Domestic Violence Hotline (1-800-799-SAFE (7233)).

NCIS has implemented a collaborative Crime Reduction Program (CRP) to proactively fight crime, including domestic violence, within the military community. CRP highlights the precursors of crime and victimization. Military personnel, their dependents and civilian employees often face tremendous stress in their lives, and potential threats to their safety. The CRP speaks with one voice and addresses crime reduction from multiple angles—a single message, designed to educate and increase awareness, providing information and resources from all Department of the Navy organizations.

Possible home inspections in Licola

A section of the Licola Polizia Urbana have begun random inspections of residential buildings to verify tax records and prevent fraud. For example, they may inspect the infrastructure to verify it contains the same square meters as official documents indicate. NSA Naples Housing Office is working with the local authorities to try to provide advance notice to American residents of economy houses, but as of now, advance notice is not guaranteed.

Minimal inconvenience can be expected by residents living in houses chosen for inspection. If they show up to inspect your house, contact your landlord and Housing at 081-811-4466 to ensure they get all the appropriate documents necessary to conduct a full inspection. You, as a resident, should not have to provide any documents or information, but have a copy of your lease handy in the event the officials request it.

Inspections are being conducted by the Polizia Giudiziaria - Abusivismo Edilizia (a section of the Polizia Urbana, not part of Carabinieri or Guardia Di Finanza), and appear to be limited to the Licola area at this time.
