Naples Tiger Sharks swim to 5th consecutive title

The Naples Tiger Sharks swam to victory and for the fifth consecutive season retained their title as the European Forces Swim League (EFSL) Southern Division Champions.

Swimmers from all five teams in the EFSL Southern Division, including Naples, Sigonella, Vicenza, Aviano and Rota, competed at the Olympic-sized pool in Lignano, Italy Jan. 22. The 75 Naples Tiger Sharks swimmers earned a total of 1221 points, successfully defending their title as Divisional Champions. The Sigonella Swordfish, placed second with 604 points. Naples and Sigonella competed strongly against

one another throughout the season, which brought both teams into the meet with high expectations. This rivalry, the spirit of competition and the confidence earned from working hard throughout the season inspired many swimmers to achieve personal best times at the meet.

The Naples Tiger Sharks head coach Jane Higgins attributed the team's success to a combination of elements. "Team work, dedication, fast swimming, coaching staff and outstanding family support were all contributing factors to winning the championship for the fifth straight season," she said.

Libraries celebrate African American History Month

The libraries at Capodichino and Support Site are celebrating National African American History Month with book readings, quizzes and bulletin board displays.

"We do have several books by Black authors and about Black people, including Martin Luther King Jr., the biography of Frederick Douglass, good books about Abraham Lincoln and some Black history books that go from early 19th century to modern times," said Alessandra Borrelli, a library staff member.

Additionally, the Support Site library is hosting a special storytime for students. "I am very proud to be reading to the school children for storytime because I believe Black history is very important for kids," Borrelli said. "We, as a library, try to celebrate using colors, pictures and crafts that give them the idea of a free world, a united world and one-big-family world."

NSA libraries staff say celebrating Black history month is important because people need to remember what's beneath those words: 'black' and 'history.' Behind those words there is a different culture. Black refers to African Americans, who changed American history. The world is made by colors, no higher colors, no lower colors, just different colors. Skin color doesn't make any difference, minds do, and African Americans brought a different concept of the world through their viewpoints, experiences and accomplishments in every field.

National African American History Month originally started as Negro History Week. In 1925, Dr. Carter G. Woodson selected a week in February that included the birthdays of both Abraham Lincoln and abolitionist Frederick Douglass.

DoDEA Accelerated Withdrawal Policy

Accelerated withdrawal for second semester is May 19. Verification of the sponsor's departure (PCS or official orders) must be provided to the school to receive full academic credit. Within the military community, PCS orders may come in the middle of a school year rather than during the summer months. To make this transition smoother for students, the school system provides a process for students to withdraw with credit for the semester after a set number of instructional days have been completed. To receive semester credit, the student must complete classes and an arranged class work acceleration program and depart no earlier than 20 school days prior to the end of the semester. Ribbon-cutting ceremony in Gaeta

Capt. Rabuse, along with Italian navy Comandante Mesiano, Capitano Pacilli and contract project manager Riccardo Certosino, cut the ribbon to the beautified grounds of the new park at Naval Support Activity Naples Gaeta base Feb. 3. With new flag poles, a fountain, benches, stonework and plenty of greenery, the park welcomes personnel as soon as they enter the base.

As part of the project, contract crews from La Termica also teamed up with Public Works to install new safety features, including mounted explosive proof helicopter landing pad and pier lighting systems and a breakaway aluminum handrail that runs the entire length of the pier. Those working on the water's edge now have the ability to move the rail as needed to protect the safety of others embarking or disembarking the ships sailing into the pier.

4 Roma children die in fire at illegal camp

On the outskirts of Rome, three brothers and their sister, aged between four and 11, died in a fire at an illegal Roma camp Sunday. The fire was caused by an accident with a stove. The children's parents were out shopping, while their oldest daughter was out getting water. The mayor of Rome asked for special power to shut down all illegal camps and build legal and safe camps for Romanian and Bulgarian people who live in and around Rome. He declared a day of mourning in Rome and said he would ask for €30 million from the central government to deal with the emergency. There are about 150,000 Roma people living in Italy, and in the Rome province, there are about 100 camps.

British Library returns stolen manuscript to Benevento

During World War II, a 900-year-old religious manuscript went missing from the town of Benevento, in Campania region. A British lawyer, acting for the Archdiocese of Benevento, returned it personally after a decade-long legal battle. The manuscript is now kept in the chapter library, attached to the cathedral. During the heavy bombing raids of Campania by British and American aircraft in 1943, two-thirds of Benevento was reduced to rubble. During the chaos, the manuscript disappeared. It is not known whether it was stolen by a German, Italian or Allied soldier. It turned up in a second-hand bookshop in Naples at the beginning of 1944 when it was bought by a British officer who offered it for sale at Sotheby's. The British Museum bought it and transferred it to the British Library in 1973. The codex is the first item to be returned by a British institution since the UK adopted a law regarding the looting of cultural treasures during the Nazi Era to the end of the war in 1945. The Holocaust (Return of Cultural Objects) Act 2009 allowed the manuscript, written in a rare script, to be returned to the town of Benevento.

Trash still piled high in Naples

Naples officials estimate about 2,000 tons of uncollected garbage remain in the city's streets. They said the saturation of dumps and the opposition to new landfills have contributed to a slowdown in the collec-

tion of garbage. Urban Hygiene Councilor Paolo Giacomelli said they must find a solution soon to prevent the amount of uncollected garbage from growing. The situation is "critical."

Art exhibitions entice in Florence and Naples

The Palazzo Pitti in Florence hosts a remarkable exhibition of works from the world's largest museum of Russian art, the Russian Museum in St. Petersburg. The exhibition entitled "From Icons to Malevich" displays 40 works from the 16th century through the early 20th-century. The exhibit, located at the palace's Galleria d'Arte Moderna, L'Andito degli Angiolini, runs through April 30. The museum is closed Mondays. Tickets cost €12. From March 8 through June 12, the Uffizi displays "Fra Angelico to Leonardo." More than 100 drawings by Fra Angelico, Leonardo, Botticelli, Perugino, Raffaello and Michelangelo show the evolution of the Renaissance artistic discipline. The museum is open from 8:15 a.m. to 6:50 p.m. and is closed Mondays. Tickets cost €8.50. Naples hosts "Bill Viola" at Museo Nazionale di Capodimonte. Viola is an American video artist and is considered to be a leading figure in the generation of artists whose artistic expression depends upon electronic sound and image technology. The exhibit is until Feb. 27. The museum is open from 8:30 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. and is closed Wednesdays. Tickets are €7 and €6.50 after 2 p.m.

American mom sues Nutella for being unhealthy

A California mother of a four-year-old child sued the Nutella hazelnut company for allegedly claiming Nutella to be a healthy food. She claimed the popular chocolate spread is loaded with sugar and unhealthy saturated fat. The nutrition label shows that there are about 200 calories in each two tablespoon serving, about half of which come from fat. Its main ingredients are sugar, palm oil, hazelnuts and cocoa. A spokesperson for Ferrero USA said the company stands behind the quality of ingredients in Nutella hazelnut spread and the advertising for their product. In Italy, Nutella was created in the 1940s by Pietro Ferrero, a pastry maker and founder of the Ferrero Company.

NEX rewards students with its A-OK Student Reward Program

The Navy Exchange (NEX) wants to help its customers pay for their children's college education through its A-OK Student Reward Program. Four times per school year, four students will be the recipients of a \$5,000, \$3,000 \$2,000 or \$1,000 U.S. savings bond, denominations at maturity. Annual housing allowance survey coming to Italy

The annual Overseas Housing Allowance (OHA) Utility/Recurring Maintenance Allowance Survey for personnel stationed throughout Italy is set to begin Feb. 15 and run through March 14.

The survey is for all military personnel who have been residing in privately leased quarters for at least six months and are receiving an overseas housing allowance. The Defense Travel Management Office (DTMO) has set a goal for at least 70 percent of the affected personnel to participate, stressing the importance of this survey because of the direct affect it will have on service members' paychecks in Italy.

The DTMO will use the data to set OHA allowances in Italy and assist in the formulation of OHA rates for service members worldwide.

In a change to this year's survey, the DTMO will e-mail the survey Web link directly to eligible

members via the member's individual e-mail address as shown in the pay system. Participants will have to compute a monthly average for utility and maintenance expenses for the last 12 months.

Items that are reported in the survey include electricity, heating fuels, water for residence, trash pick-up, sewer charges, maintenance and minor repairs, insurance coverage required by customs or law, condo fees, police protection, guards, and taxes for which the tenant is responsible and must make a separately identifiable payment.

Cable TV, telephone bills, automotive expenses, including fuel, are not included in this survey.

The regional commander, Navy Region Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia, will be coordinating survey participation for all installations throughout Italy. If you have any questions or need more information, please contact the regional coordinators at 081-568-2551.

Tax season is here

It's that time of year again... tax season! The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) center is open and ready to file your 2010 income taxes. W-2s are now available at mypay.dfas.mil/. Volunteers who have been trained and certified by the IRS are ready to assist you.

The VITA center at Capodichino is located at the Naval Legal Service Office (NLSO) in Admin II. The center is open from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Taxes will be prepared by appointment only. If you are interested in making an appointment, call 081-568-4576. VITA volunteers are also strategically located within some NSA Naples commands to help service members directly from their work sites. If your command has on-site tax support, information is posted in your work space.

To facilitate tax preparation during your scheduled appointment, be sure to remember the following pointers:

1. Bring your identification card with you to the appointment. Only active

2. Wait for all of your tax information to arrive. If you have a mortgage, bank accounts, or investment accounts, those financial institutions will send you tax statements. If you have a spouse or children who worked, bring their W-2s as well. If you had a child in day care, you will need a statement from the child-care provider to receive a possible credit.
3. Bring correct Social Security cards and birth dates for your dependents.

4. If you are entitled to a refund and would like it deposited into an account, have the correct routing number and account number.
5. If you are filing jointly and your spouse cannot attend your appointment with you, please bring a current power of attorney.

Without the above information, volunteers may be unable to prepare your return, or it could be rejected by the IRS.

Registration mandatory for Wide Area Alert Network

The world we live in is filled with danger: hurricanes, blizzards, floods, terrorist attacks and civil strife occur every year. Would you know what to do if one of these happened at your installation? Commander Naval Installations Command (CNIC) has developed a way for you to be prepared during these situations.

It's called the Wide Area Alert Network (WAAN) and CNIC wants you to be a part of it.

"The WAAN's primary purpose is to provide real time emergency alerts and protective guidance to personnel in buildings, surrounding areas on board installations, and family members via three systems," said Steven Layne, the emergency operations center manager at Naval Support Activity Naples, Italy.

In order to quickly and effectively communicate to installations, the WAAN employs the Computer Desktop Notification System (CDNS), the Automatic Telephone Notification System (ATNS) and the Giant Voice/Indoor Voice (GV/IV).

The GV/IV is an interior and exterior voice loudspeaker notification system while the CDNS will notify personnel through pop-ups on their desktop. Sailors and civilian contractors are automatically connected to CDNS whenever they are logged into the ONE-NET network.

Originally developed and deployed to installations in 2008, recent crises such as severe winter weather in the continental U.S., evacuations of U.S. personnel from parts of North Africa and the Middle East, and flooding in Millington, Tenn., have reinforced the necessity for rapid communications.

"WAAN registration is therefore imperative and mandated," said Layne, "to ensure personnel are quickly notified of emergencies, including urgent or significant events such as gate closures and re-openings, severe weather warnings, school closures, etc."

GV/IV and CDNS are effective while on base or at work, but what if there is an emergency while personnel are off base, at home or on travel? ATNS is the answer. ATNS is what makes the WAAN truly effective. During a crisis, ATNS will send notifications to you via e-mail, voice recording and even text message.

The success and effectiveness of ATNS is reliant on personnel registering for the service inside of CDNS. The link is already on your desktop and ONE-NET users can register in two easy steps.

First, right-click on the purple globe in the taskbar located in the lower right side of the monitor and click on "access self service." Next, click on the "my info" tab and fill in all the appropriate information. Finally, click on devices and complete the sections. At a minimum, according to Layne, should be work e-mail, work phone and a cell number required to receive alerts via text message.

If personnel would like to register their family's devices, ATNS allows for both home e-mail and phone to be added during the registration process. Currently only 20 percent of personnel attached to CNIC installations are registered for ATNS. CNIC urges sailors and contracted civilians to register immediately.

"The purpose of mass notification is to protect life by indicating the existence of an emergency situations and instructing people of the necessary and appropriate response and action," said Layne, adding, the lack of registration "affects the effectiveness of [the WAAN] to a significant extent."

Guidance provided to sailors on DADT repeal provision

The Navy released NAVADMIN 041/11 Feb. 4 to provide sailors with additional information and guidance following the repeal of the Don't Ask, Don't Tell (DADT) policy.

The message, which is the second in what will be a series of NAVADMINs to inform leadership and sailors on the subject, details a three-tiered approach to how training will be conducted across the fleet in order to provide for a smooth transition once the final repeal has been issued.

The chief of naval operations (CNO) has designated Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command as the executive agent for delivery and tracking of the education and training and OPNAV N1 as the executive agent for the development of content.

"The path to repeal of DADT requires informed and proactive leadership at every level. I will ensure you remain fully informed as we progress. I am counting on

each of you to ensure that throughout this implementation period we do what we have always done: conduct ourselves with the highest level of professionalism and treat our shipmates with respect," said CNO Adm. Gary Roughead.

Command leadership teams will be used to implement training throughout the fleet, ensuring revised policies and standards of conduct are understood.

Sailors are reminded that the current DADT policy remains in effect. The final repeal will not occur until 60 days after the president, secretary of defense and the chairman of the joint chiefs certify to Congress that the repeal can be made in a manner consistent with the standards of military readiness, military effectiveness, unit cohesion and recruiting and retention of the Armed Forces. Additionally, no policies, regulations or benefits will change until 60 days after the final repeal.

In accordance with COMNAVREGEURNOTE 3500, IFPP's are mandatory for all traveling Department of Defense personnel and their adult family members if one of the following criteria is met:

- If the destination country or region has a State Department Public Announcement or Travel Warning in effect.
- A U.S. Mission (Embassy/Consulate) is not present and the State Department or responsible Chief of Mission is not in a position to accord normal consular protection services to the U.S. citizens.
- Travel to any of the following locations; Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Belarus, Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Israel, Lebanon, Albania, Kosovo, Serbia and **all African nations**.
- Travel out of the EUCOM AOR, as required by AOR Commander. (CONUS, Alaska, Hawaii and U.S. territories are exempt.)

Safety tip

Wear your helmet

Folks, it was recently brought to the attention of the Safety Office that there are people riding their bicycles around base without the use of a helmet.

Here is an experiment you should try. Get yourself two melons: strap one into a helmet and leave the other one unprotected. Raise them about 8 to 12 feet above the ground and then release. Now make sure you don't cheat: hard surfaces, like pavement, work best. After all, this is where you most likely ride. Now watch what happens to both melons. One will get its brain (seeds) splattered about. The other, while it may sustain a bruise here or there, will nonetheless remain whole.

What's the lesson learned from this experiment? Wear your helmet: it could protect your melon!

Here are some things to consider when choosing or wearing a bicycle helmet:

- A bicycle helmet only works if you wear it correctly.
- Make sure the helmet is safe. Look for a seal of approval from organizations such as the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) or Snell Memorial Foundation.
- Think about visibility. If the bicycle helmet straps block your vision, replace it. Likewise, make sure motorists will be able to see you.
- Wear the helmet flat on top of your head.
- Make sure the helmet covers the top of your forehead without tilting forward or backwards. The straps should form a V-shape under each ear.
- Fasten the chin strap below your chin, not the side or along your jaw. Remember chin straps to chin!
- If the helmet moves around, consider using the sizing pads that came with it to get a better fit.

Here is what OPNAVINST 5100.12H, the Navy's Traffic Program Instruction, says about the subject. All bicycle operators riding on a Navy installation SHALL wear a bicycle helmet approved by the Consumer Product Safety Commission or Snell Memorial Foundation. Further, all active duty members shall wear an approved bicycle helmet on/off Navy installations.

Remember, if nothing directs you to wear a helmet off base and you decide to exercise that right or you decide not to abide by the instruction requiring you to do so, a fugitive from the laws of average—that's who you are!

Boys undefeated in league play

The Saints did not have a prayer against the Naples Wildcats. The Wildcats outplayed the Aviano team in consecutive victories (42-28 and 61-34) Friday and Saturday. In the third quarter, scoring was low (Naples 6, Aviano 9), but Aviano held their lead and added to it to win the game (50-39). The teams will head up to Germany Feb. 23 through 26 to compete in Division II play at the DoDDS championship games.
