“This is the nicest place we’ve been in our nine years of coming to the Middle East,” he said. “We usually end up playing for a lot of troops at forward bases so it’s nice to come see a place as nice as Bahrain. # Enlisted early transition program extended

**MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS —** With the release of NAVADMIN 142/11, April 22, the Navy has extended the Enlisted Early Transition Program (EETP) to Sept. 30, 2013.

Due to the Navy's unprecedented retention and successful recruitment, Sailors are being offered a voluntary early separation option.

"Our end strength and our over-manning in certain ratings was a consideration for the extension of this program," said Mike Dawson, head enlisted community manager, Navy Personnel Command. "Our community managers have also received a lot of feedback from Sailors and the Fleet that they would apply for an early-out if they were eligible."

EETP differs from the Early Career Transition Program (ECTP) which allows Sailors to transition into the Selective Reserve (SELRES) prior to their End of Active Obligated Service (EAOS) by submitting a request three to 15 months in advance. EETP allows Sailors to request early separation up to 24 months prior to their scheduled EAOS or extended EAOS.

"The ECTP is a program that regardless of the time a Sailor has left on his EAOS, he or she can transition to SELRES," said Dawson. "Technically, a Sailor could have just signed a six year contract and decide today that they want to complete the remainder of their commitment in SELRES. EETP, on the other hand, is an early-out."

Qualified Sailors may submit their request for early separation to Commander, Navy Personnel Command (COMNAVPERSCOM) via their commanding officer (CO). Commanding officers have

final disapproval authority under this program and should not forward a request they cannot support. COMNAVPERSCOM has final approval authority for requests with positive CO endorsement.

MILPERSMAN 1910-102 requirement for "separation by reason" does not apply to this program. Sailors are not required to state a reason for making the request since this is a voluntary program.

Approval for Sailors with critical Navy Enlisted Classifications (NEC) will be based on individual community requirements.

Early separation requests will not be approved for Sailors:

- In nuclear ratings;
- In receipt of permanent change of station orders;
- Identified to fill or currently serving on a Global War on Terrorism/Overseas Contingency Operation, or Individual Augmentee assignment whose rotation date would be affected;
- In the National Call to Service Program;
- In any sea warfare combat program;
- Sailors serving in a rating and/or holding an NEC listed in any enlistment bonus, Selective Re-enlistment Bonus, or similar special and incentive pay program in effect at anytime within the fiscal year of the request or separation;
- Assigned to a Department of Defense area tour and have not completed the tour requirement, including overseas tour extension incentive program for which a benefit has been received; or
- Who are retirement eligible.

"Sailors who are no longer interested in staying in the Navy are highly encouraged to apply," said Dawson.

# Vinson buries Bin Laden at sea

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Osama bin Laden received a Muslim ceremony as he was buried at sea, a senior defense official said in Washington, D.C., May 2.

The religious rites were performed aboard the aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70) in the North Arabian Sea and occurred within 24 hours of the terrorist leader's death, said the official.

"Preparations for at-sea [burial] began at 1:10 a.m. Eastern Standard Time and were completed at 2 a.m.," said the official.

The burial followed traditional Muslim burial customs, and bin Laden's body was washed and placed in a white sheet, said the official.

"The body was placed in a weighted bag. A military officer read prepared religious remarks, which were translated into Arabic by a native speaker," the official added.

Afterward, bin Laden's body was placed onto a flat board, which was then elevated upward on one side and the body slid off into the sea.

The deceased terrorist was buried at sea because no country would accept bin Laden's remains, a senior defense official said.

Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and Defense

Department officials are sure it was the body of bin Laden. CIA specialists compared photos of the body with known photos of bin Laden and said with 95-percent certainty it was the terrorist leader, a senior intelligence official said.

In addition, bin Laden's wife identified the al-Qaida leader by name while the strike team was still in the compound, said the intelligence official.

CIA and other specialists in the intelligence community "performed the initial DNA analysis matching a virtually 100-percent DNA match of the body against the DNA of several of bin Laden's family members," the official added.

## NEX rewards students with its A-OK Student Reward Program

MANAMA, Bahrain — The Navy Exchange wants to help its customers pay for their children's college education through its A-OK Student Reward Program. Four times per school year, four students will be the recipients of a \$5,000, \$3,000, \$2,000 or \$1,000 U.S. savings bond, denominations at maturity. The next drawing will be held at the end of May 2011.

Any eligible full-time student that has a B-grade point average equivalent or better, as determined by their school system, may enter the drawing.

Eligible students include dependent children of active duty military members, reservists and military retirees enrolled in first through 12th grade. Dependent chil-

dren without an individual Dependent Identification Card must be accompanied by their sponsor to submit their entry. Each student may enter only once each grading period and must re-enter with each qualifying report card.

To enter the drawing, stop by any NEX with a current report card and have a NEX associate verify the minimum grade average. Then fill out an entry card and obtain an A-OK ID, which entitles the student to discount coupons for NEX products and services. The Navy Exchange Service Command (NEXCOM) has been offering students a chance to win a savings bond through its A-OK Student Reward Program since 1997. Since the program began, NEXCOM has awarded \$504,000 in savings bonds with the help of its generous vendor partners.



## From the Desk of the Command Master Chief

Shipmates,

With the record high retention and very low attrition within our Navy, Navy Personnel Command is taking action to shape the force and keep the Navy's manning within mandated End Strength.

The FY12 quota-based Enlisted Retention Board is how we will reduce our enlisted end strength by 3,000 Sailors. The board will review the records of third class Petty Officers (E-4) through Senior Chief Petty Officers (E-8) in the ABF, AD, AE, AG, AM, AS, AT, AWF, AWR, AWV, AZ, BU, CE, CM, EA,

EMSW, EO, ETSW, FC, GSE, MMSW, MN, MR, OS, PR, PS, RP, SH, STG, SW and UT ratings who have greater than seven but less than 15 years of cumulative service as of Oct. 1, 2011.

Those selected by the Board will be separated no later than June 30, 2012. Unlike the E-7 thru E-9 Continuation Board, this board has a specific quota. However, there is an opportunity to change ratings prior to 1 June 2011. There are several ratings listed in NAVADMIN 129/11 that are open to conversion. You must be qualified to serve in the rating you choose, whether it is your ASVAB score, Security Clearance or any other factor listed in MILPERSMAN 1440-010.

For the purpose of this board however, there are limited waivers to Time in Service, PRD, EAOS and others factors, see the NAVADMIN (129/11) for details. Shipmates, I can not encourage you enough to review/update your record, get a CDB, and have a plan.

It is imperative you know when you stand and have the opportunity to make informed career decisions. Review the NAVADMIN, and see your CCC/LCPO for more details. You can read more about this board as well as other programs and policies at: <http://www.public.navy.mil/bupers-npc/Pages/default.aspx>


