

NSA receives Retention Excellence Award

MANAMA, Bahrain — Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain was recently honored with the Commander, Navy Installations Command Retention Excellence award for fiscal year 2010.

A culmination of successfully meeting retention goals for at least two of four fiscal quarters, NSA was selected along with more than 85 other Navy shore installations to receive recognition for retention excellence.

NSA Bahrain Installation Command Career Counselor, Chief Navy Counselor Jean-Hero Lamy said the award did not reflect the efforts of any one individual, but instead highlighted the hard work of leadership and mentors who compose the command's retention team, and especially the Sailors who chose to stay Navy.

"The U.S. Navy is a good product and it's the best job you could have in terms of security, benefits and guaranteed pay," Lamy said. "The credit for this award goes to the Sailors who decided to take advantage of that."

To qualify for the award, NSA needed to retain a percentage of service members in each of three zone categories, which are used to identify Sailors based on years of service. NSA was considered to receive the award after meeting retention goals for half the previous fiscal year and passing an onsite inspection by Commander, Naval Region Europe, Africa and Southwest Asia to assess the strength of the command's career development program.

NSA Bahrain Commanding Officer, Capt. Rick Sadsad, said the award highlighted the efforts of the command's retention team whose focus has always been on taking care of Sailors.

"My hats off to the team and I'm looking forward to their continued efforts of providing outstanding service to our Sailors," he said.

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Mullen urges peaceful resolutions in Middle East

ABU DHABI, U.A.E. — Citing "a time of enormous change" in the Middle East, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff Adm. Mike Mullen today challenged regional leaders to step forward to ensure differences are resolved "peacefully, without loss of life."

Mullen met with leaders here during the third stop of his multinational trip to reassure U.S. allies amid regional unrest.


"I really came to the region to both listen [and] to understand what the concerns are on the part of the leaders who are here, as well as reaffirm the relationship and look at how we address these issues together," he told reporters after meeting with Mohammad bin Zayid Al Nahayhyan, Abu Dhabi's crown prince and deputy supreme commander of the nation's armed forces.

"We discussed a wide array of issues, in

MANAMA, Bahrain — Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain's library helps ease separation stress for service members and their families through the United Through Reading Military Program.

"This program started here two years ago," said Library Aide Remy Bautista. "This is important for the kids to see their father or mother reading books for them especially during holidays. This is a good way for them to communicate."

Bautista said anyone could walk in the library and schedule an appointment or use the facility on the spot if it is available.

"We provide them a DVD, a video camera and place where they can record themselves," said Bautista. "Each video is 30 minutes, so they can either read a book or talk to the camera."

When the member is finished, he or she is responsible for sending the footage back to their families.

"We had about five people who came in and participated in this program last month," said Bautista. "It makes me happy to know that we are helping members stationed here keep in touch with their loved ones."

Lt. Cmdr. Damian Viltz from Combined Task Force Shore Battle Space, stationed

here on Individual Augmentee orders took advantage of the program for the first time.

"I think this program is important because it allows me to stay in contact with my daughter who will be 8 months old in a few days," said Viltz. "I will be here for a year so it's important for her to see my face and hear my voice. This is more than entertainment, it's educational."

Viltz heard about the program from his previous command as part of his check out process. A month after checking on board NSA, he saw advertising in the library and asked one of the librarians for more information about it. It caught his interest and he scheduled his first appointment.

"I bought a collection of children's books so I will come to the library and read every two weeks," said Viltz. "Every other week my daughter and my wife should receive a package from me that contains a book and a DVD so they can watch and read it together."

United Through Reading is a nonprofit organization founded in 1989 that unites families separated due to deployments by facilitating the bonding experience of reading aloud together. This helps relieve emotional stress of separation from deployed service members.

The benefits of love

A man moved from the city to the suburbs and spent a lot of time and money on his lawn. Then, up came a crop of dandelions. He tried everything he could think of to get rid of them, but nothing helped. Finally, in desperation he wrote to the Department of Agriculture and asked them what they thought he should do. Two weeks later he received this reply. "We suggest," said the letter, "that you learn to love them."

"God loves us," wrote C.S. Lewis, "not because we are loveable, but because he is love; not because he needs to receive, but because he delights to give." St. John, calling on us to love one another, adds, "Whoever fails to love, does not know God, because God is love," (1 Jn 4:8). We are urged to love all people since God loves everyone. God makes His sun shine on the good and the evil, and He makes His rain fall on both the just and the unjust without discrimination. Love is genuine only when it embraces all.

There are four ways of expressing the different facets of the word love in Greek. There is "stergein," the Greek verb to love, but it means the love family mem-

bers have for each other. The verb "philein" is used to describe the warmth and trust that real friends have for one another. The verb "eran" with its accompanying noun "eros" is used in reference to sexual love and often refers to lust. Finally there is that heroic love expressed by the verb "agapan": this is unconquerable love, and it means that no matter what a person might do to you, you would continue to love that person. To love with "agape" means never to become bitter or vindictive toward another, even though you might have every reason in the world to feel bitterness toward that person (W. Barclay).

We must endeavor to love him or her whom once we did not love, we have condemned, or who may have done us an injury. To love all human beings is difficult but it can be learned, if we closely consider the benefits of loving all people. One benefit surely is that it unites people. Modern technology may be useful for uniting people; however, without love, machines can easily separate people. Another benefit of love is that it makes the one who loves, very happy. If you hate even one person, all the joys will leave your heart. God wanted us to be happy, but happy in our belonging, and hence endowed us with a longing for love. Hence we will be happy only when we all love one another. We are like stones joined in an arch and are bound to collapse unless we support one another with love. To be in love with all people is the greatest good and the greatest happiness.

A student one time asked a professor, "Would it be possible for all the people of the world to live in the State of Texas?" Black Engineer of the Year Awards showcase Navy’s top talent

WASHINGTON (NNS) — Three Navy members took top honors at the 25th annual Black Engineer of the Year Awards (BEYA) Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Global Competitiveness Conference Awards Gala in Washington, D.C., Feb. 19.

Rear Adm. Bruce Grooms, assistant deputy chief of naval operations for operations, plans and strategy (OPNAV N3/N5B); Victor Gavin, SES, Naval Sea Systems Command executive director for the program executive officer for littoral and mine warfare; and Kerry Nichols, Naval Air Systems Command; received awards at the gala, which recognized the significant accomplishments of African-Americans in government and industry, who have achieved exceptional career gains in the fields of STEM.

Grooms, winner of BEYA’s Professional Achievement in Government Award, was recognized both for his significant accomplishments in STEM and his service as a role model and leader for other minorities. Grooms, who was one of only seven African-Americans to command a submarine in the twentieth century and the first African-American commandant of midshipmen at the U.S. Naval Academy, was also recognized as a key mentor in the submarine community who takes time to meet with educators to build on partnerships to train future officers as nuclear engineers.

Gavin, a recipient of BEYA’s Career Achievement in Government Award, was lauded for his leadership of eight program management offices and more than 179 employees, both military and civilian, who oversee the design, development, procurement, fielding and sustainment of 220 registered programs for the Department of the Navy. He was also recognized for his efforts in promoting small business innovation research integration and mentoring young engineers.

Nichols, a computer engineer and Wind Systems Software Lead with Naval Air Systems Command (NAVAIR), was awarded with BEYA’s Outstanding Technical Contribution Award for his work as a leader in NAVAIR’s Moriah Wind System program, a software-intensive wind and navigation system integrated on approximately thirty-five Navy vessels.

Additionally, twenty-three Sailors and Navy civilians were honored with Modern Day Technology Leadership awards at a luncheon Feb. 18, which recognized their efforts as technologists and engineers at the top of their respective fields.

The three-day BEYA conference, sponsored by Career Communications Group (CCG), attracts thousands of STEM professionals and also serves as a learning tool for students interested in pursuing professional interests in engineering.

According to Tyrone D. Taborn, CCG chairman and CEO, this year’s winners represent some of the brightest minds in STEM today.

“In the past 25 years, we have seen a stunning shift in almost every aspect of our everyday lives,” said Taborn. “These technologies would not exist without the intrepid individuals who have devoted themselves to getting us a bit closer to tomorrow, today. Their work is what we will remember 10, 15, 25 years from now, when we reflect upon the advancements that changed our individual lives and charted a bold new course for us as a planet.”

The Navy was also a sponsor of the Feb. 18 Stars and Stripes Dinner, which honored the leadership of African-American flag and general officers, as well as several African-American pioneers of naval aviation and current and former African-American naval aviation commanding officers.

Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Gary Roughead, keynote speaker at the dinner, expressed the importance of STEM in the Navy and how organizations like BEYA contribute to the success of the Navy.

“Navy participates with BEYA and other activities that stress STEM and diversity

because we really believe that as a Navy, we will be a better Navy if we represent all of America,” he said.

The Navy has participated in BEYA for the last 20 years. Additionally, in 2008, the Navy signed an agreement with CCG to promote further Navy participation in CCG events in an effort to reach a diverse workforce.

Commitment to BEYA represents the

Navy’s campaign to develop future engineers and scientists, and retain top-performing Sailors and civilians whose diverse backgrounds, experiences and skills are necessary to meet today’s challenges.

Today, there are nearly 89,000 African-Americans serving in the Navy, including 19 active and reserve flag officers, 105 command master chiefs, and 16 members of the senior executive service.

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great part focused on events in the region, but not exclusively,” Mullen told reporters after that meeting.

There’s particular concern about violence in Libya, where Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi’s government and military have launched a violent assault on pro-democracy demonstrators.

Asked by reporters about the situation in Bahrain, Mullen praised Crown Prince Salman bin Hamad al-Khalifa’s decision to “pull back the forces” and begin a national dialogue to address protestor’s

concerns. His decision to engage “has relieved a number of the leaders I have talked [with] in terms of easing the tensions,” Mullen said.

The admiral reiterated confidence in the U.S.-Bahraini relationship and Bahrain’s role hosting the U.S. 5th Fleet.

“I’ve been in touch with our leadership there in Bahrain,” Mullen said. Bahrain’s support for the 5th Fleet and its people “continues to be very strong, and I look forward to that being the case in the future,” he said.


