NSF Sailors and Bahraini Coast Guardsmen Graduates

MANAMA, Bahrain — Twelve Sailors assigned to Naval Security Forces (NSF) Harbor Patrol Unit (HPU) and three Bahraini Coast Guardsmen marked the completion of a three-week Coxswain training academy at a graduation ceremony held at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, July 7.

The course was the first occasion NSF and the Bahraini Coast Guard have worked together to conduct the joint training.

HPU Officer in Charge, Chief Warrant Officer Troy Barber said the joint training was critical to developing the cohesive working relationship necessary to protect high value assets that enter the harbor.

"The Bahrain Coast Guard and our harbor security personnel both offer escort and protection services to vessels coming in and out of port," Barber said. "By training together, we develop our mutual understanding of each party's capabilities and tactics while facilitating idea sharing and information exchange."

During the training, students learned skill sets necessary to proficiently operate the HPU's Boston Whalers and Metal Shark classed boats. Additionally, trainees learned

steering, anchoring, mooring and towing techniques, as well as use of charts, radio communications and day and night-time navigation.

Bahrain Coast Guard Lt. Hamad Al-Sharbati, the training and North Area operations officer, said that he considered the training to be valuable to Bahrain's Coast Guard personnel.

"I saw the training syllabus and I understood [the course] to be very useful," Al-Sharbati said.

NSA Commanding Officer, Capt. Rick Sadsad remarked that the Coxswain training was just one step in the establishment of future joint training operations.

"Joint training opportunities like these, really enhance our readiness and improve our interoperability with the Bahrain Coast Guard," Sadsad said.

Sadsad added that the need to maintain such interoperability reflects the larger positive engagement between the U.S. and Bahraini governments.

"[We have] a very good relationship between the U.S. Navy and Coast Guard," Al-Sharbati said. "We just have to pick up the phone and relate our goals together to get them accomplished."

Bahrain School hosts Drug Education Program

MANAMA, Bahrain — Twenty-four children marked the conclusion of an eight-day Drug Education For Youth (DEFY) training program during a graduation ceremony held at the Bahrain School, July 13.

The ceremony symbolized the successful completion of phase one of the school's newest two phase program designed to empower military youth by building positive and healthy lifestyles as drug-free successful citizens.

DEFY Lead Program Coordinator, Electronics Technician 1st Class James Warren, said the youth received instruction in identifying the negative effects of drugs and alcohol in the body, conducted teamwork exercises, how to build up peer self-esteem and held a physical fitness challenge.

The program also taught the children how to choose role-models and included

educational trips to the Bahrain National Museum, a local wildlife park, and the Grand Mosque he added. Together with his volunteer staff of 22 mentors, the group also hosted fun activities including swim time in the school pool and a trip to a local bowling alley.

"The program is geared toward children between the ages of 9 to 12 years old because, statistically, that's when kids are approached for the first time to do drugs," Warren said. "Although drug use and abuse is not a real problem here in Bahrain, the program really sets the children up for success when they go back to the states and are introduced to these issues."

With the completion of the first half now behind them, the children will move into phase two of the program beginning in September when they will continue to meet with their mentors on a monthly basis for the duration of the school year. During that time the children will continue to be exposed

to the program's principles of fostering leadership and character development through outreach and education.

"During phase two we continue to mentor the youth by meeting with me, discussing problems and assisting with schoolwork where needed," Warren said. "We've also planned to host more fun and educational activities, such as a swim with dolphins and a demonstration with the local fire department and a K9 unit."

After completing both phases of the program, children have an opportunity to return as junior mentors and work with future groups of kids. During the program, junior mentors work with their senior peers to help the youth successfully navigate the program.

Thirteen year-old Janessa Lopez graduated from the program last year in Key West and Orlando. She decided to return as a DEFY junior mentor to share her experiences with the group.

"I wanted to work with and help teach the children, but I also wanted to learn more and see how the program differed in various locations," Lopez said.

In its 18th year of operation, DEFY is a DoD funded program and is available worldwide to all branches of service.

Turn your burdens over to god

He then asks the students again if the jar was full. They agree it was. The professor next picks up a box of

sand and pours it into the jar. Of course the sand filled up everything else. He asks once more if the jar was full. The students respond with unanimous "yes". The professor then produces two cups of coffee and pours the entire contents into the jar effectively filling the empty space between the sand. The students laugh. "Now," says the professor, "I want you to recognize that this jar represents your life. The golf balls are the important things — the graces of God... and if everything else was lost and only they remained, your life would still be full. Turn it over to God, your feelings of being overwhelmed with financial burdens, the down times in your marriage, the boring aspects of your continual concern for your children, your health concern, your parents... That said, there are plenty of resources out there to check your records. Bupers Online (BOL) contains your Official Military Personnel File (OMPF) as well as links to most all of your service applicable data. Visit <https://www.bol.navy.mil> to make sure your record is up to date. Your chain of command is always available to assist however, you MUST take ownership of your career and know the policies and programs that affect you. Remember YOUR CAREER...YOUR RECORD...YOUR RESPONSIBILITY.
