

NSA CO hosts safety meeting with Motorcycle Club

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain — Naval Support Activity, (NSA) Bahrain Commanding Officer, Capt. Rick Sadsad, met with members of the NSA Bahrain motorcycle club to discuss the importance of motorcycle safety, July 19.

As part of NSA's summer safety program, Sadsad spent multiple days meeting with the installation and tenant commands' leadership to ensure every service member and DoD civilian understands motorcycle safety guidelines, base access policies and conduct abroad.

Sadsad tasked the club to be role models for local riders as well as sources of information for arriving enthusiasts as well as new motorcycle owners.

"You can provide a wealth of information by relating your riding experiences here in Bahrain, the things you've seen and how to be safe out on the roads," he said.

NSA Bahrain motorcycle club Vice President, Chief Warrant Officer Marcus Watkins, said that the club will meet

Sadsad's request to be model riders, but it also hopes to be considered as the go to source of information among the NSA motorcycle community. "Whether someone is a seasoned rider, novice, or just considering purchasing their first motorcycle, we're here to answer any questions concerning motorcycle regulations and policy," he said.

Watkins added that adhering to the regulations that govern personnel's ability to bring motorcycles on board NSA and ride is fundamentally important to ensuring personal safety regardless of motorcycle type.

"Regardless of whether [the individual] rides a Harley, a sport bike, a touring bike or even an All-Terrain Vehicle, the regulations and policies ensure that individuals have acquired the special skills needed to operate one of those types of vehicles and to do it in the safest manner possible," Watkins said.

To ensure that personnel adhere to the highest degree of rider safety, NSA maintains several requirements that individuals must meet before receiving authorization to

CMF ship USS Anzio disrupts pirate activity

GULF OF ADEN — Just after 5:30pm on July 22, Combined Maritime Forces (CMF) warship USS ANZIO (CG 68), assigned as the CMF's counter-piracy mission Combined Task Force (CTF) 151 flagship, intercepted a skiff, successfully disrupting the activities of a group suspected of attempting acts of piracy.

USS Anzio first heard of the suspected pirate activity after receiving a report from a merchant vessel that it had been attacked, including being fired upon, by suspected pirates in a skiff.

It was reported that the suspected pirates were armed with a rocket propelled grenade launcher and AK-47 assault rifles, and that the attack had been unsuccessful. "This large merchant vessel avoided being pirated through adherence to 'Best Management Practices' which is another reminder of how effective these practical precautions are," said Captain James Gilmour, RNZN, who is the Commander CTF 151.

After clarifying details of the attack with the merchant vessel, ANZIO received orders to pursue the suspected pirate vessel and intercept it.

FFSC Bahrain earns accreditation

MANAMA, Bahrain — Naval Support Activity, Bahrain's Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) received its accreditation for full compliance with Commander

Naval Installations Command (CNIC) authorized standards.

Every three years the Fleet and Family Support Center goes through an accreditation visit to ensure all records and training programs meet CNIC standards. There are

29 standards with multiple parts that the inspectors look for. The process ensures continuous organizational improvement, and consistent, high quality services in support of the Navy's mission, values, personnel, and families.

Accreditation is public recognition of the quality of programs and services provided to NSA Bahrain and its tenant commands. The accomplishment for FFSC Bahrain, was that they achieved a perfect score on the inspection. To understand how prestigious full compliance is, in FY10, 28 FFSCs went through the accreditation process, and only 10 were found fully compliant. In FY11, 18 FFSCs have gone through the process and NSA Bahrain is the 5th to receive a fully compliant rating.

The FFSC earned this achievement through months of hard work and dedication by its staff members.

"The FFSC team here in Bahrain was doing a great job before I arrived in February of this year. I simply worked with the staff to make sure what we were doing was encapsulated around the required accreditation standards. It was truly a team effort,"

said Carolyn McCorvey, NSA Bahrain's FFSC director.

The staff admits it was a challenge but one that was worth the effort. The sense of pride and level of achievement they feel has made it all worthwhile.

"It was a lot of hard work but the staff is dedicated to providing high quality services to the community in which it serves and they met and exceeded my expectations. Having our new Director, Carolyn McCorvey added the right leadership and guidance we needed to take the extra steps necessary to become an awesome team," said Work and Family Life Supervisor Terri Johnson-Salter.

The staff at FFSC Bahrain are not resting on their laurels though; they plan to continue to build on the momentum they have achieved. In the future they plan to do more command outreach, revamp and revitalize existing classes and workshops and add new ones that have not been offered before. Their goal is to become a more integral part of the NSA community and develop even stronger partnerships. The best is yet to come!

MANAMA, Bahrain — Commander, Expeditionary Strike Group (ESG) 5 conducted a community relations event with the University of Bahrain's American Studies Center (ASC), July 2.

As part of the U.S. Navy's community relations program, Rear Adm. Peg Klein spent a few hours speaking to, and fielding questions from a diverse group of students at the ASC.

The student group, led by John Hillis, director, American Studies Center, was comprised of students ranging from freshman to juniors, and included students from a variety of majors at the university.

The goal of the center and engagements

with speakers like Klein is to, "Make students aware of the important aspects of American culture such as literature, politics government and history, in addition to improving their English because English is a very important factor in terms of employment and many other things," said Hillis.

In line with the group's themes of leadership, bridging the gap between American and Bahraini culture, and womens empowerment, the conversation with Klein ranged from how to be successful in college, choosing a career, leadership, and Klein's personal and professional challenges of being a naval officer, wife and mother.

"Studying what interested me was very important, as I wanted to balance my professional and personal life," said Klein. "I studied something I was passionate about."

According to Sahresh Shahzad, president, ASC Activity, the true value of the program is the personal interaction. "She [Klein] talked about it from a very personal perspective and she talked a lot about her experience," said Shahzad. "It will help us because it comes from a person directly rather than reading a magazine or getting the information from online."

Klein also shared advice on balancing career and family. "What caused me to want to balance my Navy career with my family is the fact that they have much in common. The Navy is all about teamwork and relationships, and in my personal life, I very much value teamwork and relationships."

The conversation concluded with the group and Klein commenting on the mutual benefit of such engagements.

Naval academy accepting enlisted applications for Class of 2016

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (NNS) — The Navy announced July 12 the U.S. Naval Academy's admissions cycle for the class of 2016, entering in July 2012, is open to enlisted Sailors.

Top enlisted performers who possess strong leadership potential, have been recognized as Junior Sailors or Bluejackets of the Quarter or who graduated in the top 20 percent in their "A" and "C" schools are encouraged to apply by Jan. 31, 2012.

To be eligible, top quality Sailors and Marines must meet competitive standards based on academic, military and physical performance.

Academically, applicants must possess strong high school grade point averages and SAT scores, and have completed four years of mathematics and English and one year of chemistry.

Applicants must be physically fit with no record of disciplinary action within three years preceding application. They must not have passed their 23rd birthday by July 1, 2012, and cannot be married, pregnant or have incurred obligations of parenthood.

The Naval Academy, located in Annapolis, Md., provides approximately 1,000 officers to the Navy and Marine Corps every year, with many entering as prior enlisted men and women from the regular and reserve components of the Navy and Marine Corps.

Students at the academy are designated midshipmen and receive midshipman pay plus tuition, room and board. Upon graduation, they receive a Bachelor of Science degree and a commission in the Navy or Marine Corps.

The Naval Academy offers 23 academic majors in engineering, science, mathematics, social sciences and the humanities. In addition to the academic curriculum, students also take military professional courses in navigation, naval engineering, weapons, leadership, naval history and law.

To be eligible, top quality Sailors and Marines must meet competitive standards based on academic, military and physical performance.

The deadline for initial application to the Class of 2016, is Jan. 31, 2012. All completed applications and recommendations must be received by March 1, 2012, to be considered.

From the Desk of the Command Master Chief

Guidance for personal behavior and civilian clothing policy in 5th Fleet AOR during Ramadan.

Ramadan is a time of personal sacrifice for Muslims. Observant Muslims do not eat, drink (including water), or smoke from sunrise to sunset.

Eating/Drinking:

As foreigners and guests in this region, we are not expected to fast during Ramadan, but we must respect the observance and refrain from eating (including chewing gum), drinking (even water), smoking or chewing tobacco in public during daylight hours. 'In public' includes riding in a bus or car (even your own), walking or exercising. Eating, drinking or smoking by a non-Muslim in public during the day is considered a civil offense by many local laws, which may result in a fine or confinement.

Alcohol:

Drunkenness is particularly offensive

during Ramadan and the local

authorities will be far less tolerant. Consumption of alcohol by U.S.

military personnel in any off-base venue is prohibited, with the exception of USO/MWR operated facilities, private off-base dwellings, or hotel rooms occupied by service members under PCS/TAD allowances.

What not to wear:

As always, military uniforms, tank tops, halter tops, strapless tops, string tops, tops that show midriff or chest, and clothing with military affiliation via logos or text are inappropriate attire while on liberty. In addition, shorts shall not be worn for liberty off base (including coming to or leaving base, even for PT) during Ramadan. On base attire rules remain the same.

What to wear:

Females over the age of 13 are required to wear shirts that extend below the elbow. Females are also required to wear pants or skirts long enough to cover their knees (even when seated). Capris and tea-length skirts (calf-length) are appropriate attire for females.

For males, wearing long sleeved shirts is strongly encouraged, however short sleeved shirts, such as polo shirts or appropriate t-shirts in good repair are permitted. Long pants are required.

If you are unclear on acceptable attire or conduct, contact your chain of command. Our conduct reflects upon the armed forces and the United States. Our behavior must be respectful of the culture and beliefs of our hosts.

Remember, liberty is a mission.

MANAMA, Bahrain — Commander, Task Force (CTF) 56 held a change of command ceremony at Naval Support Activity Bahrain July 11.

Capt. Daniel M. Colman relieved Capt. Vincent R. Martinez as commander of CTF 56.

CTF 56 plans and executes expeditionary combat support throughout the U.S. 5th Fleet area of operation (AOR). The task force encompasses nine task groups whose missions range from explosive ordnance disposal and Navy diving, Naval construction forces and expeditionary logistics support, maritime interdiction operations and maritime security to embarked security teams and combat camera.

The task force and its assigned task groups employ 5,500 Sailors who work throughout the U.S. 5th Fleet AOR from Lebanon, throughout the Gulf nations all the way to Afghanistan.

"It's impressive to see what this organization does. CTF 56 touches more regional partners, more frequently than anybody else. The leadership engagement, and also the engagement at the deckplate level is unmatched" said Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command Vice Adm. Mark Fox, who presided over the change of command ceremony.

"The (U.S. 5th Fleet) is a marathon at a sprinter's pace. Capt. Martinez has just finished a year in Afghanistan followed by 25 months here back-to-back. Thanks for your hard work," said Fox to the outgoing commodore.

After his commission, Martinez served his initial tour aboard USS Bolster (ARS 38), then attended explosive ordnance disposal training to serve as an EOD officer. He assumed command of CTF 56 in June 2009 and will transfer to the Naval War College in Washington, D.C.

Fox awarded Martinez the Legion of Merit for his work as commodore of CTF 56 at the ceremony.

Colman enlisted in the Navy in 1984 as a Submarine Electronics Technician and was accepted into the Broadened Opportunity for Officer Selection and Training (BOOST) program in 1986 and subsequently was commissioned as a surface warfare officer in 1990. He became a diving and salvage officer in 1993 and reports from Navy Expeditionary Combat to the Office of Chief of Naval Operations (OPNAV N857).

"When I was (looking into) orders to come (be the commodore of CTF 56), I have always admired the warrior ethos of NAVCENT and really fought hard to come out here so I could be part of something great," said Colman.

bring their motorcycles on board the installation:

- All motorcyclists must have the proper endorsements on their individual state licenses.
- Demonstrate they maintain proper insurance and registration.
- Completion of the Basic Rider Course. Completion of Experience Rider and Sport Bike courses are highly recommended.
- Maintain and utilize required personal protection equipment.

- Approval from the NSA Pass and ID office.

Service members who own a motorcycle, even though they may not wish to ride on base, must report ownership to their chain of command. All military personnel who wish to purchase a motorcycle must notify the first khaki in their respective chain of command prior to purchase.

Capt. Gilmour said: "It was very pleasing that this event resulted from a collaborative effort between CTF 151, NATO (TF 508), a Japanese Maritime Self-Defense Force vessel and a Japanese Maritime Patrol Aircraft to locate and apprehend the suspected pirate vessel."

"This cooperation culminated in the suspected pirates disposing of weapons and equipment that could be used for further piracy attempts, with the remaining suspected pirate paraphernalia being disposed of when the vessel was intercepted by a CTF 151 warship," he added.


