

CFC-O Kicks Off, Celebrates 50th Anniversary At NSA Bahrain

MANAMA, Bahrain — The Combined Federal Campaign-Overseas (CFC-O) celebrated its 50th Anniversary and officially kicked off its 2011 season at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain with an opening ceremony, Oct. 3.

The CFC-O aims to promote charity through a voluntary program that is employee-focused and cost-efficient, providing all Federal employees the opportunity to donate to approved charitable organizations.

Vice Adm. Mark Fox, commander, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command, presided over the ceremony and offered a few remarks to kick things off.

Fox said service members are fortunate to have the many advantages that being in the military offers, and it's important to give when they can, to those in need.

"The combined federal campaign is one of the ways that we as U.S. service members can give back," said Fox. "This campaign is unique because it allows you to pick and choose what organizations are special and meaningful to you and your community."

Additionally, Fox pledged the first donation of the season by giving a contribution to the campaign.

Last year, NSA raised a combined total of \$194,000 for the 2010 CFC season. This year's goal is to raise \$200,000 by holding fun runs, bake sales, raffles and other fundraisers, in addition to Sailors' direct donations.

The campaign will run from Oct. 3 through Dec. 2, and anyone wishing to donate needs to look no further than within their own command or department CFC-O representative.

Service members can also go to www.cfcoverseas.org to complete a paperless contribution via credit card, debit card or e-check, or donate via payroll allotment, cash or check on a paper pledge card through their departmental representative.

Detailer Visits Bahrain Sailors

MANAMA, Bahrain — A Navy Personnel Command representative visited Sailors at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, Sept. 27-28.

Master Chief Navy Counselor (SW/AW) Steve Cullen, lead detailee for Navy Counselor, Legalman and Mass Communication Specialist ratings, provided information for Sailors of all rates about the Navy's Career Management System/Interactive Detailing (CMS/ID) and Perform to Serve (PTS) programs.

In addition, he spoke about overseas extensions, explained what detailers can and cannot do, and how to take full advantage of the orders negotiation window.

"It's the career counselor's responsibility to make sure PTS is submitted and that a Sailor negotiates for a set of orders whenever they're in the negotiating window," Cullen said. "[Career Counselors] also prepare them to reenlist or to transition, but at the end of the day, it's the Sailor's career and they have to prepare themselves for the future."

Cullen said the unique situation of one-year billets in Bahrain gives Sailors limited time to make important career decisions compared to Sailors at other commands.

"In Bahrain, you don't have the luxury

[of multiple career development boards (CDBs)], so that first reporting CDB is not just your reporting CDB, it's a reporting, transfer and goal setting CDB all up front," he said. "You've got to pay attention at that CDB."

Cullen said PTS provides options for Sailors to ask for an in-rate, conversion or selective reserve quota.

"If you're a Sailor who loves your rate and doesn't want to do anything but your rate, then it's your option to try to get an in-rate quota," he said. "But as you get deeper into that window, you want to make sure you're looking at all your options."

Cullen said a career counselor can help Sailors maximize their options by looking at conversion opportunities which will help them make a decision before they get to their seven-month mark, when they only have one more chance to get a PTS quota.

Master-at-Arms 1st Class Sean Stockwell, assigned to Naval Security Forces, said the brief was informative, not just for junior Sailors, but for leaders as well.

"You've got to find ways to motivate Sailors that aren't getting these [PTS] quotas right away, that take awhile to get approved, or don't get approved at all," Stockwell said. "If they are in an overmanned rate, it may be best to guide them into a rate that will better apply in the civilian world."

- * Express mail Military Service: N/A
- * First-Class Letters/Cards/Priority Mail: Dec. 3

- * Parcel Post: Nov. 12

For mail addressed from all shore FPOs (except 093):

- * Express Mail Military Service: Dec. 17
- * First-Class Mail (Letters/cards, priority mail): Dec. 10

- * Space Available Mail: Nov. 26

Express Mail Military Service (EMMS) is available from selected military post offices. If mailing to an APO/FPO address, check with your local post office to determine if this service is available.

Parcel Airlift Mail (PAL) is a service that provides air transportation for parcels on a space-available basis. It is available for Parcel Post items not exceeding 30 pounds in weight or 60 inches in length and girth combined. The applicable PAL fee must be paid in addition to the regular

surface rate of postage for each addressed piece sent by PAL service.

Space Available Mail (SAM) refers to parcels mailed to APO/FPO addresses at parcel post rates that are first transported domestically by surface and then to overseas destinations by air on a space available basis. The maximum weight and size limits are 15 pounds and 60 inches in length and girth combined. From overseas locations, items mailed at Parcel Post rates are sent to CONUS by air on a space available basis. The maximum weight and size limit are 70 pounds and 130 inches in length and girth combined.

It is also recommended that customers check with their local civilian or military post office for information on size restrictions and possible need for customs declaration forms. Additionally, customers are advised that certain mail restrictions apply and some items can not be mailed.

Examples are: switchblade knives, pornography, controlled substances, and explosive or incendiary devices. If in doubt as to

what can or cannot be sent through the mail, contact your local civilian or military post office. As a final note, customers are cautioned that packages must not be mailed in boxes that have markings related to any type of hazardous material, such as bleach, alcohol, or cleaning fluids. Parcels found by the U.S. Postal Service with such markings or labels on the outside of the box will not be processed.

Task Group 56.1 Sailors Conduct Qualification Dive

MINA SALMAN PIER, Bahrain — U.S. Navy explosive ordnance disposal technicians and divers assigned to Task Group (TG) 56.1 and Explosive Ordnance Disposal Mobile Unit 11 (EODMU 11) conducted a dive supervisor qualification exercise, Sept. 22.

The qualification involved dive casualty scenarios, followed by a written test and oral board to determine each diver's aptitude and fundamental knowledge.

Explosive Ordnance Disposal Technician 3rd Class Brandon Ross, assigned to EODMU 11 said this training is vital to every diver's safety during a dive.

"These are the guys in charge of me if something goes wrong when I'm diving," he said.

During Ross' dive, he participated in

a lost diver scenario. Once found, the lost diver needed to be treated for an arterial embolism, a potentially life threatening condition.

Another scenario involved a diver who became fouled on an anchor line. The supervisor had to react quickly and calmly, apply first aid and transport the casualty to a medical treatment facility.

"If we don't train and simulate these types of causalities, these skills can become dull," said Chief Navy Diver William Feser, current operations chief of TG 56.1. "During any Navy dive we have a safety supervisor in control of the evolution. Our main goal with this type of training is to ensure they are making decisions with safety in mind."

TG 56.1 supports maritime security operations and theater security cooperation efforts in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility.


