In-Service Engineering Facility is latest BRAC building

Navy officials held a ribbon-cutting ceremony Sept. 24 for the In-Service Engineering Facility onboard Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake.

“Our mission here is to make sure the men and women in the fleet

can use and deploy their weapon systems to support and promote peace around the world,” said Scott O’Neil, Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division executive director. “The fundamental purpose of this building is to support that mission and I envision a lot of work being done in this facility directly in support of the warfighter.”

The 20,000-square-foot facility, located at the NAWCWD China Lake Propulsion Laboratory, will be used for in-service engineering sustainment, including the inspection, maintenance and packaging of bombs and missiles. It will accommodate up to 30 personnel, and consist of three

Ribbon-cutting ceremony opens new ordnance storage facilities

Navy leadership celebrated the opening of new ordnance storage facilities onboard Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake with a ribbon-cutting ceremony Sept. 24.

“These are state-of-the-art facilities that will take us leaps and bounds ahead of the 1940s structures that they are replacing,” said Capt. Rich Burr, Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division vice commander.

The project includes a total of nine magazines, one metal building

for inert storage and one for packing and crating, a loading dock, and expansion of parking, roads and utilities to support the new facilities.

“The additional ordnance storage capacity ensures our

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

If nine out of 10 people who played the lottery actually won, who wouldn't want to try their chances?

When it comes to flu shots, it's the same odds. Nine out of 10 healthy people who get a seasonal flu shot, don't get the flu, according

to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

With flu season right around the corner, trying that "lottery" could keep you from getting sick. Seasonal flu vaccinations are available as a shot or nasal spray and are a TRICARE-covered benefit.

The flu shot this year, according to the CDC, will protect against the

three most common forms of flu, including the headline-hogging H1N1 virus from last year.

Where to get a flu shot

Active duty service members will need to visit their assigned military clinic to receive a flu shot. The shot will be at no cost to them. Additionally, a TRICARE beneficiary may visit his

Breast Cancer Awareness: For you, for your family ... get a mammogram

In 2006, more than 110 women died every day—from one disease.

Breast cancer.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), these are the facts. However, here's the kicker:

That death rate is an improvement.

The Susan G. Komen website says, in the past 35 years, the death rate from breast cancer in white women, including Hispanic, has declined. Unfortunately, the rate for black women has increased slightly. As screening programs have become more popular, more cases of breast cancer are caught early, making them more treatable.

That screening boils down to one word: Mammogram.

Get Screened and Join the Fight

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month, a time when women and their families come together and bring awareness to this deadly disease. As part of that

mission, women can take action to lower the breast cancer death rate even more, by getting their mammograms.

A woman who saves her life is doing it for others besides herself—her husband, her children, and maybe even her parents. No one wants to bury their mom or child because of breast cancer.

The CDC says that mammograms or x-rays of the breasts are the best method to detect breast cancer early, when it's easiest to treat. For women 40 years or older, the CDC recommends having a mammogram every one to two years.

Women who are TRICARE beneficiaries can receive their mammograms at no cost. TRICARE covers one mammogram every 12 months for women older than 39. If a woman is considered high-risk for breast cancer, she can begin receiving mammograms at 35 years old.

So this October, don't just wear the shirts or sport the pink ribbons. Take action. Get a mammogram. And help slow the number of women that breast cancer claims each day.

Just talk to someone: Suicide awareness and prevention

The Navy has reported 46 Active Duty/Selective Reserve suicides for 2009, and 18 for the first half of 2010; however, civilian statistics are not as current.

In late 2009, the Total Force Strategy and Management Department, in concert with its Civilian Employee Assistance Program (CEAP), launched a plan to train each member of the workforce (for the Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division, NAVFAC (Public Works), and Commander, Navy Region South West organizations) on Suicide Awareness and Prevention.

The three main messages of the training were:

- We all must work together to discontinue the rise in suicides within the Department of Navy
- Be aware of your coworkers' states of mind
- Help is readily available

The reason for the training was that suicides in the Department of Navy – among a combination of military, civilian, and contractor personnel – have been on the rise in the last few years. The Navy has reported 46 Active Duty/Selective

Reserve suicides for 2009, and 18 for the first half of 2010; however, civilian statistics are not as current. In 2007, California reported 2871 reported suicides (more than 10 percent of the US total of 27,509). Moreover, there are nearly one million suicide attempts in the United States each year. The Department of Navy's goal is not just to have a decline in suicides, but rather to have zero suicides in the future.

Since many suicides are preventable, attendees were provided information on possible signs that coworkers may be depressed, need help, and/or may actually be contemplating suicide. The warning signs that we should pay particular attention to are: a prior suicide attempt, talking about suicide and making a plan, giving away

prized possessions, preoccupation with death, signs of depression, hopelessness and anxiety, and increased drug and alcohol use. Some estimate as many as 80 percent of those thinking about suicide desire recognition of their emotional pain and want someone's help to stop them from dying.

Get Help Immediately – If you feel like you might harm yourself, or know someone who might, there is hope and you should call a CEAP Counselor at China Lake (760) 939-2480, Point Mugu (805) 989-8161, or the 24-hour hotline 1-800-991-5272. Many people have overcome suicidal feelings by getting help – which is easily available. Please reach out to somebody whenever you experience

Cooperation key to managing water resources

Water ... It is essential to all life and throughout history has been a hotly contested commodity, particularly in the western United States. Yet, ask some people where their water comes from and don't be surprised if the response is, "From the faucet, of course." We tend to take our water resource for granted though it is likely one of the most important resources dictating our quality of life. Worldwide, more than 1 in 6 people, nearly one billion people, do not have access to safe drinking water. We, in the Indian Wells Valley, are fortunate to have a local source of clean, safe groundwater. According to the California Department of Water Resources, in 1995, an estimated 13 million Californians, nearly 43 percent of the state's population, were served by groundwater. That demand is expected to increase significantly as California's population grows to a projected 46 million by the year 2020. The droughts the west has experienced in recent years have

pushed water issues to the forefront of state politics. In 2009, the Legislature passed legislation consisting of three policy bills and an \$11.4 billion bond to address California's growing water challenges in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta area. This legislation will be presented to voters on the Nov. 12 ballot. In recent years funding through a series of state assembly bills has also been made available to study local water issues and support water-related projects. The Indian Wells Valley has been the recipient of two such grants.

In our valley, stakeholders with

an interest in our groundwater resource have long recognized the importance of our only current water source. Discussions began in the early 1980's to draft the framework of a cooperative agreement to manage the water resources in the Valley. These discussions resulted in the "Cooperative Groundwater Management Plan for the Indian Wells Valley" being signed in September 1995 by 10 stakeholders and producers representing approximately two thirds of the total production from the aquifer. The 10, known as the

Indian Wells Valley Cooperative Groundwater Management Group, include Naval Air Weapons Station (NAWS) China Lake, Indian Wells Valley Water District, Bureau of Land Management, City of Ridgecrest, Kern County Water Agency, Inyokern Community Services District, East Kern County Resource Conservation District, Inyokern Airport District, Quist Farms, and Searles Valley Minerals. Kern County became the eleventh signatory to the agreement in 2006. This group simply has agreed to share resources and facilitate the

acquisition and open exchange of information regarding groundwater management in the valley. This shared knowledge is used to develop and implement improved management practices among the signatories intended to prolong the life of the groundwater resource.

In coming months, you may learn more about this group as well as some basic information about our groundwater resource and the tools available to collect and understand the data critical to managing it responsibly. If you can't wait and wish to find more information about the Indian Wells Valley Cooperative Groundwater Management Group, please visit the group's website at www.iwvgroundwater.org. There you will find links to relevant studies and reports and access to a wealth of data pertaining to the groundwater resource in the valley. The Group meets the third Thursday of the month, at 1 p.m., in the board room at the offices of the Indian Wells Valley Water District. Meetings are open to the public.

MyCAA program resumes for military spouses

Beginning Oct. 25, the Military Spouse Career Advancement Account (MyCAA) program will reopen for enrollment and will be limited to spouses of Service members in the pay grades of E1-E5, W1-W2 and O1-O2. The program had been put on hold to undergo restructuring by the DoD to its "original intent" of providing funding for spouses to achieve portable careers.

Eligible spouses can receive a total of \$4,000 in DoD-funded financial aid, with a cap of \$2,000 per fiscal year. Funding must be used to obtain an Associate's degree, licensure or certification and the program of study must be finished within three years from the start date of the first course. A waiver may be granted when fees for licensure or certification require an up-front fee greater than \$2,000 and up to the total maximum assistance of \$4,000. Four-year and Master's degree programs will no longer be funded after Oct. 25.

Education counselors will help military spouses develop career/educational plans while helping to navigate all available federal education benefits. - Sail the "Great Green Fleet": DON will demonstrate a Green Strike Group in local operations by 2012 and sail it by 2016.

- Reduce Non-Tactical Petroleum Use: By 2015, DON will reduce petroleum use in the commercial vehicle fleet by 50 percent.

- Increase Alternative Energy Ashore: By 2020, DON will produce at least 50 percent of shore-based

these feelings of hopelessness.

or her military clinic for a flu shot at no cost; however, they should call the facility first to find out when the shots are available.

All individuals with TRICARE Prime who choose not to receive a shot from their military clinic will need to visit a TRICARE network provider—such as their primary care manager or a pharmacy—to have the shot at no cost. Some network doctors'

offices may still charge a small co-pay for the visit, though. The same rules apply for those using TRICARE Standard and Extra, or enrolled in TRICARE Prime Remote, as long as the vaccine is administered by a TRICARE-authorized provider.

CDC recommendations for flu shots

Everyone, six months or older, should receive a flu shot the moment it's available, as recommended by the CDC. Additionally, receiving

a flu shot is especially important for certain high-risk groups to decrease their risk for severe flu illness. These groups are:

- Young children
- Pregnant women
- People with chronic health conditions, such as asthma, diabetes or heart disease
- People 65 years and older
- Health care workers
- Caretakers who live with people at high risk (such as those listed above)

Prevention methods to stifle the flow of flu

One of the best methods to prevent the spread of flu is adequate hand-washing. Individuals should wash their hands often with soap and water, properly scrubbing their hands together. A quick, fast rinse will not do the trick. Additionally, covering one's nose and mouth with a tissue when sneezing or coughing, then throwing the tissue away will help keep others from

getting sick.

A few other tips from the CDC are:

- Avoid touching eyes, nose and mouth
- Avoid close contact with sick people
- If sick, remain home for at least 24 hours after the fever has stopped, except to receive medical care
- If sick, limit contact with others as much as possible.

Traffic alert still in effect for NAWS China Lake

A contractor will continue repairing the cracks on Inyokern Road through Oct. 8.

The plan is to start work on Inyokern Road at the front gate to the traffic circle after 8 a.m. each day, one lane at a time. Once that

large, open-bay work areas, storage rooms, and support areas.

"What we do is all about the warfighter," said Dave Janiec, director for the Weapons and Energetics Department of the Naval Air Systems Command at Naval Air Warfare Center Weapons Division. "This facility will be key because we expect to be doing even

more with existing weapons and working to extend their lives."

The facility is part of the overall Base Realignment and Closure 2005 plan that makes China Lake the Naval Integrated Weapons and Armaments Research, Development, Acquisition, Test and Evaluation Center of Excellence. It is the third of 10 BRAC construction projects at China Lake.

"We're welcoming this facility

into the China Lake family," said Bettye Moody, head of the Propulsion and Energetics Division "This building will allow us to enhance our current capabilities and improve our efficiency in the assembly and disassembly of systems."

The prime contractor for this \$9 million project was Barnhart Inc. KMA Architecture and Engineering provided architecture and engineering services for the

design/build project.

"As we head into the last year of BRAC 2005 execution, the completion of this project symbolizes the combined efforts of a dedicated team of people," said Ruth Hogan, head of the Weapons and Armaments Implementation Team for NAWCWD. "Every person on this team demonstrated a level of commitment that went above and beyond."

missile submarines continuously patrolled, ensuring strategic deterrence. Other ships, aircraft and Sailors provided conventional deterrence that was achieved through demonstrations, such as the exercises off the coast of Korea following the Cheonan sinking, as well as other exercises with global partners.

- **Sea Control** – The Navy maintained sea control to enable joint and interagency operations and maintain freedom of maneuver and access. The submarine force and other anti-submarine warfare platforms conducted exercises year-round to hone their skills to ensure sea control was maintained.

- **Power Projection** – From CSG operations such as Abraham Lincoln CSG in 7th Fleet or Harry S. Truman CSG's support of Operation Enduring Freedom, to ARG deployments in the Gulf of Aden, the Navy extended its capability globally from America's shores.

- **Maritime Security** – Drug, weapons and human trafficking, piracy and other crimes at sea require global response. The Navy worked alongside coalition partners in Combined Task Force-151 on anti-piracy operations in the Gulf of Aden, bringing safety and security to mariners. From keeping freight safe around critical chokepoints to stopping vessels from carrying illegal drugs to our shores, America's Navy operates cooperatively around the globe to protect U.S. and global interests.

- **Humanitarian Assistance and Disaster Response** – America's Navy is making the world a better place. Navy ships deployed to provide proactive humanitarian assistance with global partners in missions such as Pacific Partnership and Continuing Promise in the Caribbean. And, when disaster struck, as with the devastating earthquake in Haiti or the floods in Pakistan, the Navy responded compassionately.

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



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
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
