## French takes helm at CNIC

Vice Adm. William D. French relieved Vice Adm. Michael C. Vitale as Commander, Navy Installations Command (CNIC) during a Change of Command ceremony in CNIC Headquarters at the Washington Navy Yard, Feb. 3, 2012.

Vitale has served as the chief officer leading the Navy's entire shore infrastructure for nearly three years and was the third Commander in the history of CNIC. This infrastructure, also known as the CNIC Enterprise, includes 11 Navy Regions, 70 Installations, and 127 Naval Operations Support Centers, and is responsible for 31 business lines and 122 critical shore capabilities across three major categories; opera-

tions, quality of life, and facilities management.

Throughout his tenure Vitale lead efforts to standardize, align, synchronize and innovate new methods and processes that furthered CNIC's mission to deliver effective and efficient readiness from the shore that sustain the fleet, enable the fighter, and support families.

Vitale praised the numerous accomplishments of the personnel under his command and of the entire CNIC Enterprise; from molding the Navy Family Accountability and Assessment System (NFAAS) into the model Personnel Accountability System used across the services, to the development of new shore integration methods and a Total

Workforce, capable of continuously supporting operations and services.

"The personnel here at the Headquarters, and throughout the entire Enterprise have faced growing numbers of issues and challenges," said Vitale, "I've had the pleasure of witnessing this Enterprise solve complex and dynamic problems, some self-imposed, some caused by outside forces, and forge a way ahead toward a model of shore integration that has forever changed how we do business and provide service the Fleet, Fighter and Family."

Vitale also thanked the many Navy communities throughout the world that support and

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

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# Road Closure due to new PT Route

In order to improve the safety for runners on the road and minimize delays to vehicle drivers, the following changes to running routes will become effective Feb. 13:

(ORANGE) Colby Ave south of 7th Street to Commission/1st Street – Open to units for running and closed to vehicle traffic from 6:30 to 8:30 a.m. Residents of Pinewood West will travel through

Pinewood to access 1st Street. All roads around the crane yard and golf course – Open for units for running and restricted vehicle traffic. Note: All paths on the old golf course are open for runners.

(PINK) Colby Ave north of 7th Street and 11th Street from Colby to west most entrance to family housing – Closed to units for running.

(GREEN) Marvin Shields and 5th Street – Open to units and vehicle traffic.

Units in formation have the right of way at all times. Units must also have/use required number of road guards.

Base officials are submitting additional projects for unit running paths along the full length of Colby as well as throughout the Seabee Recreation Park.

## New physical therapist hired at Branch Clinic

"Everyday is a learning process when it comes to treating patients, knowing about the diagnosis process, and applying my clinical skills, but I've considered my purpose in life is to help people get better," states Blackmer.

Working in partnership with physical therapists, LPTA's develop patient treatment plans, implement the plans and adjust them as necessary. For every one physical therapist, two physical therapist assistants are needed.

"I'm glad to have her on board. It frees up our physical therapist and approves access to care for our beneficiaries," said Lt. Cmdr. Joe Mastrangelo, NBHC officer in

charge.

LPTA Blackmer's arrival benefits the patients of Doctor Edward Goodnite, NBHC's sole physical therapist and LPTA Chandler Ivy, the only other LPTA.

According to Mastrangelo, having two assistants will not only accommodate Dr. Goodnite's needs but will benefit the needs of the patients. With two LPTA's, Dr. Goodnite now has more time to study the patient's symptoms, provide a diagnosis and prescribe a course of treatment.

The LPTA's are then able to help with administering the treatments to the patients.

Physical therapy assistants working in conjunction with physical therapists to treat patients with physical conditions that are painful or limit their mobility due to disease, disability, surgery or injury.

# Local spouse honored on national game show

Military members far and wide can attest being a spouse of a military member is one of the toughest jobs out there. The game show Wheel of Fortune felt compelled to honor those who play that supporting role and one local spouse was lucky enough to be selected.

"During military spouse's week it's not just about the men and women serving," said Pat Sajak, Wheel of Fortune Host. "It's about the men and women behind the scenes, the wives, husbands and kids who are doing without someone for a while, they're making sacrifices as well."

Michele Ponte, wife of Chief Warrant Officer Thomas Ponte, commanding officer of the Gulfport Coast Guard Station, never imagined she would be getting a call from the producers of Wheel of Fortune to try out for the show. But, that is exactly what happened in September. She headed to Little Rock, Ark. to

test her skills.

"I was so nervous about trying out," said Ponte. "I really didn't know what to expect during the tryout, but was so excited when I got the call to go."

Ponte, who volunteers for the Navy Marine Corps Relief Society on board the Naval Construction Battalion Center, received the call she had been selected and would appear on the first Wheel of Fortune dedicated to military spouses in the show's history.

"It's a way to honor them and to remind all of America that there are a lot of people behind this effort," said Sajak.

"I am so honored to be chosen as one of the first to represent this illustrious group of people," said Ponte. "It is also great that I could represent spouses along the gulf coast," said Ponte. "There were definitely some tear jerker/goose bump moments during a couple of the tapings of the show."

Eighteen spouses of service members were chosen to com-

pete for cash and prizes on the 41-year-old game show, and were filmed on a redecorated set to honor the United States military.

"When I walked in the room, I actually knew another person; another Coast Guard spouse," said Ponte. "I was worried we disqualified each other when legal came in and asked if any of us knew each other." She said she was thankful they weren't. They just made sure the two were on different shows.

Being surrounded by military is nothing new to Ponte, her father, uncle and cousins have served.

"Being married to my husband for 11 years has taught me how tough being the supportive military spouse that job can be," said Ponte. "But, I wouldn't change it for the world."

Ponte traveled with her friend Becky Smith to Culver City, Calif., Jan. 12 to join other military spouses featured as contestants at Sony Pictures Entertainment Studios. Her

## Navy Tax Centers open for business

More than 100 Navy Tax Assistance Centers around the world are now open for business, ready to assist Sailors and their family members with their taxes.

Tax Assistance Centers (TAC) provide Sailors, retirees and their dependent family members, as well as Reservists in limited cases, and DoD civilians overseas or deployed with the U.S. Armed Forces, the ability to get help with their taxes for free by IRS-trained volunteers.

The purpose of this program is to help out Sailors, primarily junior enlisted Sailors and their dependents, by providing a means for them to get their taxes done at no cost. It is a great service that takes care of the Sailor so that they can focus on accomplishing their mission.

Navy tax assistance centers are a

terrific resource for Sailors to get free assistance with their taxes almost anywhere around the globe and afloat. Sailors who electronically file their taxes at our tax centers can expect to receive their refund within eight to 15 days.

During the 2010 income tax season, Navy volunteers with the VITA/ELF program filed more than 58,000 federal and state tax returns, saving service members and their family members more than \$6.9 million in commercial tax preparation fees. The tax centers expedited \$75 million in tax refunds, with 59% of those for pay grades E-1 to E-6.

This year, Naval Legal Service Command is transitioning to self-service tax assistance at its tax assistance centers within the continental U.S. and Hawaii. This will not affect overseas locations and Guam or tax assistance at most fleet-run sites.

The self-service program educates

Sailors on tax preparation and promotes self-reliance and financial accountability, a life-long skill.

Under self-service, Sailors and their families file their own tax returns using free tax filing software on computers established in Navy tax centers with the assistance of IRS-trained volunteers.

Taxes are submitted electronically, and refunds are deposited directly into a Sailor's bank account on an average of two weeks from the date of transmission.

Sailors using a tax assistance center will save money. Commercial tax preparation companies charge on average, more than \$170 for the average electronically-filed return. There is no charge for VITA/self-service tax preparation.

Using a tax assistance center also reduces errors that can occur when preparing taxes on your own. Tax



## NMCB 74 project great for NAS, even better for training Seabees

Training to be a Seabee requires more than studying manuals or sitting in a classroom. To excel in all aspects of construction, today's Seabees need real world, hands-on experience. The Construction Training Exercise (CTX) is designed for that very purpose.

Naval Mobile Construction Battalion (NMCB) 74, has a team of 21 Seabees building a boat ramp to support Naval Air Station (NAS) Corpus Christi, Texas. The homeport project gives Seabees an opportunity to maintain their core construction skills outside of a classroom, while also improving quality of life conditions at the base.

"It gives them a sense of ownership and they are enjoying what they are doing," said project Assistant Officer-in-Charge, Senior Chief Construction Electrician Raquel Jeffers. "It gets them out of the classroom and they get the hands-on

experience. To see them work through the challenges is really rewarding," she said.

CTX projects give Seabees on-the-job training, while also exposing them to the elements outside the rigid controls of the classroom. Steelworker 3rd Class Alan Moiles said the boat ramp project is complex but it gives the young Seabees a great opportunity to improve their skills.

"It's very different since we don't get the mud and the water in the classroom," he said. "I've done rebar work before, but nothing like this."

In the classroom, even during the labs in class, everything is controlled said Construction Electrician 2nd Class Joshua Guerreiro, the project crew leader.

"The things we have encountered out here, building the boat ramp, the demolition, the rain and mud, it has made us think outside the box and come up with things they don't

teach you in the classroom to overcome obstacles."

Jeffers said learning to adapt to and overcome environmental changes, while still completing a project, is a skill all Seabees need. The different skills needed to build the boat ramp also translate to projects Seabees take on during deployments, such as building schools and airfields. Practicing those skills during homeport projects makes the Seabees more efficient when they are in harsh, deployed environments.

"Most everybody on this crew has come out of the desert, so we're good at building Southwest Asia (SWA) huts," Guerreiro said. "This project will give us a lot of rebar work, a lot of concrete work, things we have never done before and it will really expand our skills," he said.



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# Department of Defense begins prorating Imminent Danger Pay

Service members now will receive imminent danger pay only for days they actually spend in hazardous areas, Pentagon officials said Feb. 2.

The change, which took effect Feb. 1, was included in the 2012 National Defense Authorization Act, which President Barack Obama signed into law Dec. 31.

"Members will see the prorated amount in their Feb. 15 pay records," Pentagon spokesman Navy Capt. John Kirby said.

The act called for DOD to pay service members imminent danger pay only for the time they spend in areas that qualify for the pay. In the past, service members received \$225 per month if they spent any time that month in an area where the pay was authorized. "This is a more targeted way of handling that pay," Kirby said.

Now, service members will receive \$7.50 a day for days spent in these areas. Personnel who travel to the designated areas for periods less than 30 days should keep track of the number of days they are in the area to verify that they are paid for the correct number of

days, officials said.

The military services are working to waive or remit debts for members who may have been overpaid for January, officials said. The services can waive this

“when there is no indication of fraud, fault, misrepresentation, or when members were unaware they were overpaid,” Pentagon spokeswoman Eileen Lainez said.

Proration is based on a 30-day month, which translates into a rate of \$7.50 per day. It does not matter if the month is 28 or 31 days long, officials explained; if service members serve in affected areas for the complete month, they will receive the full rate of \$225 per month.

The Defense Department defines imminent danger pay areas as places where members are subject to the threat of physical harm or imminent danger because of civil insurrection, civil war, terrorism or wartime conditions.

Service members who come under fire, regardless of location, will receive the full monthly hostile-fire pay amount of \$225.

Service members will receive notification of the change via emails, on the MyPay system, on social media sites and via the chain of command.

# Emergency updates help Sailors and Families

When disaster strikes or an emergency occurs the fastest way to ensure you are updated is through AtHoc™, the emergency mass notification system, and Navy Family Accountability and Assessment System (NFAAS).

AtHoc is a personalized emergency update system available to service members, civilians and families on board Naval Construction Battalion Center (NCBC) Gulfport. The feature is easy to use and takes a few seconds to update the information.

AtHoc has been installed on most NMCI computers. When updates, inclement weather, emergencies or exercises are announced, they pop up on the NMCI enabled computers. To ensure you are receiving updates, AtHoc and NCBC Emergency Update Team encourage users from NMCI computers to visit <https://waansecdap01.nmci.navy.mil/SelfService/Entry.aspx?pid=2033880> to sign up for AtHoc announcements.

The website will verify your DOD certificate and take you to a self-service page where you can update your contact information. Select "My Info" and update your information.

Once your information is updated, select the "Devices" tab. Enter and verify your contact information. Once completed, select the "save."

When the base enters an exercise, an emergency on base occurs or inclement weather is expected, AtHoc sends out a "blast" to all individuals listed. You may receive a pop-up on your computer or a call or text to your phone with the update.

The Emergency Management division on board NCBC Gulfport is in the process of creating a "add/remove" page on the CNIC Gulfport website under the Emergency Management Page. Individuals will be able to enter information to be included in the AtHoc blasts as well as remove profiles when relocating from the area. Details to follow.

The NFAAS system is for Navy service members, civilians, families and overseas contractors who have been affected by a declared emergency. If a declared emergency has been made log onto <https://www.navyfamily.navy.mil> or call 1-877-414-5358 to update contact information or to report immediate needs such as food, water or shelter.

To update contact information, select "Navy Military, Civilians, OCONUS Contractors, and their Families."

Select Login Method: (1) Common Access Card (CAC); (2) Username and Password, or; (3) Personal Information. If you are a family member or on

a computer that is not CAC enabled, personal information is faster but is "update-only access." Ensure the web address is <https://> before you enter sensitive information. Enter the Sponsor social security number, the sponsor's date of birth and the last name.

If you are updating contact information during a "non-crisis" time, it will inform you "that you are not in any affected areas, so there is no need to Muster for yourself at this time." You can, however, update your contact details to ensure they have the most recent updates.

In order to update information that is listed as "on file," the user must use the CAC or username and password feature. If an emergency has been declared, the NFAAS system will walk the user through how to muster and who to muster. The assessment will take the user through the steps to note your current location, contact information as well as assess the needs as a result of the event.

If the sponsor left prior to the emergency they can log onto NFAAS through their phone browser. There are simple steps to guide the user through accountability, location and contact update, and assessment (if required).

## Exercise and cold weather: Staying safe indoors

Though old man winter has seemingly forgotten us this year, most weather forecasters are predicting a winter catch-up period in February and March where the mild temperatures and dry weather will give way to colder and wetter than average conditions. However, you don't have to let cold weather spell the end of your exercise. With these tips for exercising during cold weather, you can stay fit, safe and warm when the weather turns chilly.

First, dress in layers. One of the biggest mistakes you can make while exercising in cold weather is to dress too warmly. Exercise generates heat — enough to make you feel like it's much warmer than it really is. Yet, once your sweat starts to dry, you can get chilled. By dressing in layers you can remove clothing when you start to sweat and then put it back on as needed. Next to the skin, wear a thin layer of synthetic material such as polypropylene to draw sweat away from your body. Remember: cotton kills, so avoid it. Cotton stays wet and will increase your heat loss if it's next to your skin. The next layer should be fleece or wool for insulation. Top this with a waterproof, breathable outer layer. If you're lean, you may need more insulation than someone who is heavier.

Pay attention to the weather forecast. Exercising when it's cold and raining can make you more vulnerable to the cold. If you get soaked, you may not be able to keep your core body temperature high enough, and layering won't help if your clothes are wet.

If it's very cold, you should wear gloves and a hat. Protecting exposed areas of your body prevents frostbite. Skin freezes at 28 degrees. If the ambient temperature is 30 degrees, wind chill produced by a 5 mph wind drops the temperature to 25 degrees. Wind chill extremes can make exercising outdoors unsafe even if you dress warmly. The wind can penetrate your clothes and remove the insulating layer of warm air that surrounds your body, and any exposed skin is vul-

nerable to frostbite. Know the signs of frostbite and hypothermia.

Remember sunscreen. It's as easy to get sunburned in winter as in summer. Wear a sunscreen that blocks both UVA and UVB rays and has an SPF of at least 30. Additionally, use a lip balm that contains sunscreen.

Head into the wind. If possible, do the second half of your workout with the wind at your back. This way, you're less likely to get chilled, especially if you've worked up a sweat.

Drink plenty of fluids. Dehydration can occur in the winter just as easily as in the summer but you may have a harder time noticing its signs. Drink water or sports drinks before, during and after your workout, even if you're not really thirsty.

Know your conditioning level. A person with a low fitness level loses more body heat because they tire more quickly than a fit person. Additionally, make sure you get enough rest. A sleep deprived person is more susceptible to hypothermia.

Flexibility. While stretching before and after an activity is preferred, a high number of muscle injuries occur when a cold muscle is improperly stretched. Muscles prior to exercise will not have the same range as the same muscle after exercise. If warming up with light activity for 10 minutes prior to exercise is not possible, then ease into the conditioning activity gradually and slowly increase your effort.

Finally but most importantly, after you finish your workout, be sure to stretch. Remember that a muscle stretch should be comfortable enough to hold for 25 - 30 seconds. Repeat the same stretch five to six times to get the best results. Don't rush! To help prevent muscle tightness, stretch again two hours later. Remember, good flexibility is your primary tool in preventing muscle injuries, especially in cold weather.

# NMCB 11 deploys to Afghanistan

In the pre-dawn hours of Monday, Jan. 30, about 300 Seabees gathered at Naval Construction Battalion Center (NCBC) Gulfport to begin their long journey to Afghanistan.

center volunteers are trained and certified by the IRS and are very knowledgeable on how to prepare your taxes.

Sailors using a tax center will also avoid being marketed a short-term, high-interest loan that they do not need by tax preparation companies.

Taxes are due this year April 17, and tax assistance centers in the U.S. will be open through this date to accommodate Sailors.

Sailors overseas will receive an automatic two-month extension to file their taxes; so overseas VITA centers will stay open for that time.

Sailors deployed to a combat zone or who are part of a contingency operation get an automatic extension to file their taxes for at least 180 days upon their return. Tax assistance centers in large fleet concentration and areas such as Norfolk and San Diego assist Sailors who are returning from a deployment year-round.

Sailors who are deployed to a combat zone and wish to file 'married filing jointly' but did not give their spouse a power of attorney may still

file their taxes. The spouse must attach a signed statement explaining that the Sailor is currently serving in a combat zone.

The VITA program and self-service program is available to those who qualify for legal assistance, includ-

ing active duty military and their dependent family members, retirees and their dependent family members, Reservists in certain circumstances and Department of Defense civilians in limited circumstances when overseas, in a combat zone or

on a contingency operation.



## Navy tuition assistance policy updated

Policy changes to the Department of Defense Tuition Assistance program and Navy Voluntary Education were announced in NAVADMIN 029/12, released Jan. 24.

The changes were needed to provide better quality control over courses taken by service members as well as to reflect the realities of fiscal pressure to reduce Department of Defense (DoD) spending.

"Navy leadership is committed to providing Sailors the opportunity to pursue their education goals," said Chief of Naval Personnel Vice Adm. Scott Van Buskirk. "We know the investment we make in Sailors comes back to the Navy in numerous ways. It's an investment well made in our workforce to make them better critical thinkers, performers and ultimately, better Sailors."

DoD instruction 13222.25 released in March 2011 required a signed Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with academic institutions and DoD by January 1 to be eligible to receive TA funding. DoD recently moved the due date to April 1. As a result, the Navy's policies for authorizing Tuition Assistance (TA) have changed and Sailors will not be able to use TA for courses at institutions without a signed MOU by April 1. To help Sailors through this transition process, Sailors who meet all requirements for TA and submit a command-approved TA request prior to April 1 for courses beginning between April 1 and May 1 will be approved for TA regardless of their institution's DoD MOU status.

Sailors who meet all the above requirements but whose TA request is submitted after April 1 will be approved for TA only if their institution has a signed DoD MOU. Sailors can check the DoD MOU status of the academic institution they are attending by going to [www.DODMOU.com](http://www.DODMOU.com) and clicking on the "Participating Institu-

tions" tab.

Sailors enrolled in Navy College Program for Afloat College Education (NCPACE) courses will not be affected by the DoD MOU requirement.

The NAVADMIN also outlines the requirement for Sailors to obtain a satisfactory grade of a "D" for undergraduate-level courses and a "C" for graduate-level courses. Sailors who fail to obtain a satisfactory grade will be required to payback TA funds.

The Navy will continue to provide TA funds up through the master's degree level for both officers and enlisted personnel. However, effective with the release of the NAVADMIN, the Navy will no longer authorize TA funding for new program starts above the master's degree level. The approximately 550 officers and enlisted actively pursuing doctoral-level degrees before the release of the NAVADMIN will be able to continue until completion of their degree program.

The combined cap for tuition and fees remains at \$250 per semester hour for up to 16 semester hours of course work a year.

Sailors are encouraged to talk with the Navy College Office or Virtual Education Center counselors about their options, including changing schools, and use of GI Bill benefits or scholarships. Another consideration for Sailors in pursuit of a degree is to choose academic institutions that award maximum credit for military training and ratings as evaluated by the American Council on Education (ACE). Those credits, along with the college credit exam program offered by the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support (DANTES), can help Sailors maximize non-traditional credits and may get them closer to a degree with less expense.

Officer, Lt. Cmdr. Craig Clutts, sees the project as a great training opportunity for the battalion Seabees.

"In my two years with NMCB 74, back in 2006-07, we were deployed to Iraq, Afghanistan and Guam," he said. "We had three personnel out of 600 trained to oversee quality control of overhead concrete pours, the type of work these Seabees are executing on this base today."

The quality of life improvement on the base is also a big part of the CTX concept since these projects, while giving the Seabees an invaluable training experience, also leave something behind the customers can use. Clutts said the base on Corpus Christi has lost several units over the past few years and this boat ramp will be extremely important in supporting base operations and

Morale, Welfare and Recreation's (MWR) mission of supporting the service members stationed there.

"This project will revitalize MWR for the base," Clutts said.

Since the project began, Jan. 4, people working on NAS Corpus Christi have been clear in their appreciation for the Seabees' efforts.

"Everyone knows us now," Moiles said. "They see the uniform, and there aren't a lot of Seabees here, so they are really appreciative of what we do."
