Marine's quick thinking saves life

Marine Gunnery Sgt. Christopher Thomas, a drill instructor at Officer Training Command (OTC), Newport, was awarded the Navy Achievement Medal on Feb. 8 in a ceremony at Beirut Memorial Hall by Capt. Kenneth Gray, Commanding Officer, OTCN, for providing life-saving first aid to a Naval Station Newport civilian employee who suffered a violent seizure.

While in the vicinity of Nimitz Field on Oct. 10, Thomas noticed Bruce Moniz, 22, a Ney Hall galley employee, lying on the McCool Track having

a seizure. Thomas, having extensive first responder and first aid training, quickly responded and performed life-saving first aid.

Thomas directed two bystanders to run to the Nimitz Hall Quarterdeck and call 9-1-1. Thomas continued to apply first aid to Moniz until emergency medical services arrived. He restrained Moniz with the proper amount of force to prevent further injury during the seizure and ensured the victim's tongue was not obstructing his airway.

Once the seizure began to subside, Thomas placed Moniz in a comfortable position while continuing to monitor his status until emergency

medical services arrived.

In part the award citation read that Thomas performed his duties "instinctively and without hesitation as a first responder during a medical emergency."

Gunnery Sgt. Thomas's actions were the embodiment of our 'no one gets left behind mentality,' " said Master Gunnery Sgt. Mark Frye, chief, drill instructor.

"Thomas's actions also benefited the candidates greatly to see a staff member's ability to remain confident, competent, and disciplined while dealing with a medical emergency," Frye said.

Author believes War of 1812 changed, but united nation

As the U.S. Navy prepares to celebrate the bicentennial of the War of 1812, the Naval War College Museum responded to their patrons growing interest with an Eight Bell Lecture last Thursday with author George Daughan who wrote, *1812: The Navy's War*.

"This was the second lecture we had with an author who wrote about the War of 1812," said Director of Museum Education John Kennedy.

Speaking to a full house on the second-floor of the museum, Daughan admits that many Americans overlook the War of 1812 because of the emphasis placed on larger conflicts such as the Revolutionary War, the Civil War and World War II.

"The War of 1812 is important because it changed us as a nation," said Daughan. "After the war, political divisions in America were gone, our country committed itself to a reasonable defense force,

and the whole world took the United States more seriously because we were truly united."

Daughan told the crowd his book describes the reasons why America went to war with Great Britain.

"President Madison declared war on Britain

because one, American Sailors were being seized on the seas and forced to serve in the British Navy; two, Britain was not being an equal trade partner; and finally, Indian attacks on American settlements were

Leave recipients approved

2 DoD civilians at NAVSTA seek donated leave

Two employees at Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport have been approved as recipients for donated leave, under the Voluntary Leave Transfer Program, due to a medical issue that requires a lengthy period of recovery.

Wendi Carvalho, Center for Service Support (CSS), Newport; and Ann Price, NAVSTA Newport Security Department, are authorized to receive donated leave from their co-workers.

The Voluntary Leave Transfer Program allows employees to donate annual leave to co-workers for absences due to a medical emergency or family medical emergency.

A medical emergency is a medical condition of an employee or a family member of the employee that is likely to require an employee's prolonged absence from work and would result in a substantial loss of income because of the unavailability of paid leave.

A donor may not donate

more than a total of one-half of the amount of leave accrued during a leave year in which the donation is made. The minimum donation amount is one hour.

Any DON civilians who wish to voluntarily donate annual leave from their personal leave accounts to Carvalho and Price may do so by completing a Request to Donate Leave, OPM Form 630-A, and forward it to the employee's payroll customer service representative (CSR)

immediately for processing.

Robotics class offered on unmanned aircraft

"Killer drones" are often in the headlines, both in the United States and around the world. Well, there is a lot more going on in the realm of robotics and unmanned systems than is evident from the screaming headlines.

The Naval War College is offering a limited number of seats for officers and/or civilians (GS-11 and above) who would like to enroll in the highly-rated 30-hour elective course entitled, "Unmanned Systems and Conflict in the 21st Century."

Over a 10-week period, students will study the full range of air, ground, and maritime systems, including Predators; Reapers; Fire Scout, the Navy's unmanned helicopter; UCAS, the Navy's Unmanned Combat Aircraft System that will fly from a carrier in fiscal 2013; MAAR, the Modular Autonomous Armed Robotic System; and Global Hawks and BAMS

The course is offered one afternoon per week, from 1:30 to 4:30, between March 14 and May 24. Classes are held on the NWC campus in Newport.

There is no cost to enroll in this course, and all books and materials will be provided.

Dredging proposed near piers

The U.S. Coast Guard has proposed to dredge along the quay wall between Pier 1 and Pier 2 at Naval Station Newport to create deeper water for maneuvering and mooring its four vessels in Coddington Cove.

The First Coast Guard District in Boston wants to berth three buoy tenders between the piers. They are the ocean buoy tenders Juniper (WLB-201), Ida Lewis (WLM-55) and Willow (WLB-202) which are currently berthed on the north side of Pier 2.

The coastal patrol boat Tiger Shark (WPB 87359), which relocated to Coddington Cove from Goat Island last year, is berthed at the south side of Pier 2.

This dredging is part of the overall quay wall project which will enable the ships to remain homeported at NAVSTA past the serviceable life of Pier 2 (2014).

A Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) and the Final Environmental Assessment (FA) for the project is available at the Newport Public Library on Spring Street, and at the Middletown Public Library on West Main Road.

2012 Navy-Marine Corps Relief drive readied

The 2012 active duty fund drive in support of the Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society will be conducted March 1-31 onboard all Navy and Marine Corps commands, including Naval Station Newport.

The Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society (NMCRS) is a 108 year-old charity designed to provide financial, educational and other support for active duty and retired Sailors, Marines and their eligible family members in time of need.

Although sponsored by the Department of

the Navy, the Society is a private, non-profit organization whose programs and services are totally funded by charitable donations.

In 2011, NMCRS processed 96,750 cases worldwide, disbursing more than \$48 million in financial assistance.

The NMCRS Newport office assisted 103 clients with nearly \$60,000 in interest-free loans and grants during 2011.

Assistance ranged from basic living expenses such as food, clothing, housing and household setup, utilities and phone bills; to emergency transportation and car repairs; to CO-verified pay problems to funeral expenses and Quick Assist Loans.

NMCRS also provided budget counseling and referrals for other services, conducted "Budget for Baby" sessions and distributed layettes, and accommodated over 4,500 patrons at the base Thrift Shop. The local NMCRS office is supported by 23 volunteers, including caseworkers, office assistant, layette knitters and Thrift Shop staff.

A team of activity coordinators from various Newport commands have trained key persons to plan the Fund Drive kick-off event with Rear Adm. John Christenson, PNWC., scheduled for March 1 at noon in the Building 690 Atrium.

NWC recognizes two top civilians

The Naval War College (NWC) recognized its top two civilians of 2011 during an awards ceremony in Spruance Auditorium, Feb. 6.

This year's recipient of the Junior Civilian of the Year award was Dennis Zambrotta, NWC Library classified library technician, and the Senior Civilian of the Year award went to Shirley Fernandes, Protocol and Events Department event coordinator.

"As with every awards board we have here, there are so many great nominations. It was a very difficult decision," said NWC Chief of Staff, Capt. Russell Knight. "Competition was close this year, but we chose our very best. We're all extremely proud of both Shirley and Dennis for their

hard work and dedication to the College. They truly set the standard for faculty and staff."

For Zambrotta and Fernandes, news of the award came as a surprise. The longtime employees each received enormous amounts of congratulatory sentiments from around the college.

"People told me 'it's about time' and 'well-deserved,'" said Fernandes, a 41-year NWC employee and Fall River native. "I'm very grateful to be the recipient of this award, but it's not about me. It's about everyone around me."

That was a common theme between Zambrotta and Fernandes, who each credit the NWC team for the accolades.

"For me, civilian of the year is not an individual award," said Zambrotta who's served at NWC for

more than 31 years. "It's the teamwork in my department and our desire to help staff, faculty and especially the students."

When asked what the secret to their success was, they each mentioned having a can-do attitude and accommodating the students.

"In the line of work I'm in, it's all about having good communication skills," said Zambrotta, a Navy veteran, who began working at NWC as the president's gardener in 1981. "We're dealing with students who just got back from Iraq and Afghanistan, and they've been through a lot. While they're here, we

try to make research at the library easier for them. The students are our product, our customer."

Fernandes echoed his mission-focused approach. "For me, it's the work I do. For example, at graduation, I like to see all the moving parts of the event come together," Fernandes

explained. "Seeing the end result is what motivates me...to see the students step off the stage with their diplomas."

While both Zambrotta and Fernandes are honored to have been recognized as the NWC's leading performers of 2011, they have no plans to rest on their laurels.

Culinary training courses reviewed

SAN DIEGO (NNS) — Navy military and civilian culinary experts from around the fleet joined the Center for Service Support (CSS) at the command's learning site in San Diego Jan. 23-27 for a comprehensive revalidation and review of three culinary training courses.

CSS, based at Naval Station Newport, R.I., is dedicated to providing Sailors in the administration, logistics and media communities the knowledge and skills to support the fleet's war fighting mission.

The 23 culinary professionals conducted Human Performance Requirements Reviews (HPRR) on the Records Keeper, Food Service Administration and Galley Watch Captain courses.

The HPRR process helps Naval Education and Train-

ing Command (NETC) learning centers produce quality training that best meets current and future fleet requirements by allowing fleet stakeholders and customers to thoroughly examine curriculum, lesson plans, lesson objectives, equipment, classroom instruction, and other course documents. HPRR participants may also sit in classrooms to see training first-hand.

"All NETC courses are required to be reviewed using the HPRR process," said Colette Recupero, CSS curriculum manager. "The HPRR process is designed to validate training requirements or identify new training requirements that apply to a rate, grade, course or fleet operating procedure. Also, it is an opportunity for stakeholders, (type commanders),

NAVSTA recycling shows success

Naval Station Newport achieved a 61 percent diversion rate for the month of January in the new single stream recycling effort, reports Scott Mello, Integrated Solid Waste Operations Manager. He said 158 tons of waste was recycled during the month, and so far in Fiscal 2012 NAVSTA is at 53 percent overall diversion rate.

Since the program began last year, as of Jan. 31, NAVSTA has recycled over 550 tons.

A "diversion" rate measures the percentage of potentially recyclable material that is diverted out of a landfill. This high increase in diversion rate is because of 40 tons of outdated furniture from the recent barracks renovation being re-cycled through the Defense Reutilization Management Office.

NAVSTA also reduced its overall solid waste to 102 tons for the month. This is the lowest amount on record since 2006. To put this in perspective, consider that at this point last year NAVSTA was at a 39 percent diversion rate, Mello said.

Since implementing single stream recycling, the barracks was of my top priorities. I wanted to ensure every room had a recycling container and a single stream flyer to explain the program.

"It is everyone's responsi-

bility at Naval Station Newport to recycle and help lower our solid waste costs," Mello said. "The program's success depends on everyone's participation, and reaching the Department of Defense goal of a 50 percent diversion by 2015."


Eight military and civilian volunteers from SWOS assisted the athletes during the Saturday competition.

Electronics Technician (SW) Matthew Rukstela led the effort. Several SWOS instructors and students came out to cheer on the athletes, including



resource and requirements sponsor representatives to review existing training, identify redundant or unnecessary training, and ensure alignment of training based on new or revised requirements."

Learning centers, like CSS, maintain NETC courses and perform internal reviews as required. But to ensure curriculum continues to meet fleet

standards, CSS also must open its doors for fleet review.

"Without fleet involvement, then (CSS) would not know how the current training affects those out there actually doing the job," said Chief Culinary Specialist Matt Compton, from Fleet Logistics Center Norfolk and the Navy Food Management Team. "CSS needs to know what's going

on in the fleet. The representation here this week definitely brought this input to the table."

Participants of the week-long HPRR event recognized that the role they played in the process is an important one, and without their involvement and expertise, Navy culinary training could fail to produce qualified Sailors to perform duties required.

versity of Puerto Rico (UPR) and at that time also submitted his first patent disclosure. In his 10 years at NUWC Newport, he has made numerous contributions to the Navy's field of underwater sensor and weapon systems.

As the principal technologist in charge of the Navy's large aperture bow array modeling effort for submarines, Perez demonstrat-

ed a methodology to predict self-noise and array performance through physics-based modeling that has been independently confirmed with at-sea tests.

Perez received his award at the 26th Black Engineer of the Year Science Technology Engineering and Math conference on Thursday in Philadelphia.

NUWC Division Newport

is one of two divisions of the Naval Undersea Warfare Center. NUWC Division Newport's mission is to provide research, development, test and evaluation, engineering and fleet support for submarines, autonomous underwater systems, undersea offensive and defensive weapons systems, and countermeasures.

being aided by Great Britain," said Daughan.

Daughan also explained President Madison thought victory was certain even though the U.S. was much weaker militarily than Britain. Madison, like many others, assumed Napoleon Bonaparte would conquer Russia and then eventually the rest of Europe. This, the author said, would draw British attention and resources.

"Nothing went our way during the first part of the war, June 1812 through February 1813," said Daughan. "Napoleon suffered a great loss in Russia, America's invasion of Canada failed, but our Navy pri-

vateers were being successful against the British Navy."

According to Daughan, Great Britain turned its full attention to the War after Napoleon's defeat and intended to teach America a lesson. Great Britain planned to invade America from Canada and New Orleans while attacking coastal cities along the East Coast. Their aim was to break off New England and Louisiana from the Union.

"Historians disagree about this," said Daughan about Britain's strategy. "But I think there is enough evidence to support this and that's what is in my book."

The American naval successes in the Battle of Lake Champlain, Baltimore and eventually New Orleans are what Daughan credits as the reason why we won the war. Responding to a question from the crowd asking how the Navy won despite what appeared like superior British maritime strength, Daughan explained a big difference between the two navies.

"America had superior naval officers and crews," said Daughan.
