

NSA remembers Battle of Midway

MINA SALMAN PIER, Bahrain — Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain held its annual Battle of Midway Memorial Ceremony aboard USS Sirocco (PC 6), June 7.

NSA Bahrain Executive Officer, Cmdr. Kevin Boykin spoke about the 70th anniversary of the battle and what it meant to the Navy.

“It was our most decisive naval victory in World War II in the battle of the Pacific,” he said. “It’s a very significant moment in our naval history as we were such a smaller force after Pearl Harbor going up against the superior Japanese force that had set its sights on moving to Hawaii or all the way to the West Coast.”

The Battle of Midway took place June 4-7, 1942. During the battle, U.S. Navy carrier strike forces defeated an Imperial Japanese navy carrier task force. Left without air cover, and unable to prevent land and sea-based air attacks against their surface ships, the Japanese invasion forces retreated.

Sirocco’s crew and distinguished guests from the NSA Bahrain community watched as Deputy Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command, Rear Adm. Kevin D. Scott, and Sirocco Commanding Officer, Lt. Cmdr. Ryan T. Easterday, conducted a wreath laying ceremony in remembrance of those who bravely fought and to honor those who lost their lives during the Battle of Midway.

Easterday said it was an honor to perform the ceremony on his ship.

“We commemorate this anniversary [of the Battle of Midway] to celebrate our heritage and make sure that we all understand where we came from,” he said. “It’s a pleasure to be able to support NSA Bahrain in commemorating this event and it really helped my Sailors get a sense of why we’re out here and what we’re doing.”

Boykin, the master of ceremonies and guest speaker, said the ceremony meant a lot to him.

“I love naval history,” he said. “I think many of us in the service do. To be able to give my personal touch to the event by giving the speech, was a great honor.”

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Note from the NSA Bahrain Safety Office

Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain kicked off the 101 Days of summer with a safety standdown for NSA as well as tenant command civilian and military staff members, May 21-23.

At NSA, safety awareness is everyone's job. It cuts across all levels of a person's daily surroundings whether it's crossing a busy intersection as a pedestrian on the streets or enjoying an outing, like shopping at a mall or just getting to and from work in a privately-owned vehicle. Safety becomes a key factor for service members regardless of their vocation — be it tactical, technical, professional or supportive.

The standdown focused on off-duty recreation safety, an area of concern for command leadership, due to the many hazards associated with the summer months.

"Safety is not what we do," said NSA Bahrain Safety Officer, Lt. Cmdr. Aaron McGowan. "It's a product of our professional conduct. It's a result of us doing the right thing, following guidelines and using proper procedures. It's doing things the right way and doing them safely."

"Safety standdowns, such as this one, refocuses Sailors on recreational safety," said Safety Specialist Gilbert Fernandes. "We spend a lot of time during the week talking about work safety and typically Sailors are safe at work. It's when they go home that they have accidents or safety incidents, biking accidents, trips and falls."

Fernandes said the standdown reminds Sailors to pay attention in their own homes.

"Our goal is to increase the knowledge of the Sailors and by doing so we add the focus on recreational safety, which translates to fewer mishaps. It gives the leadership an opportunity to reengage their Sailors as well."

The training focused on different areas including heat stress, traffic safety, driving under the influence and fire prevention.

Fernandes said statistically, safety standdowns result in fewer mishaps, but the effectiveness does not last forever. He encourages departmental leaders to continue to engage their Sailors and employees in more personal conversations about off-duty safety to reinforce formal training.

Sailor wins 1st Place in local Triathlon with support

— A member of Naval Support Activity Bahrain's Security Reaction Force (SRF) took 1st place in the Sofitel Sprint Triathlon in Bahrain, May 18.

Master-at-Arms 3rd Class Bradley Haag ran 5 kilometers, cycled 20 kilometers and swam 820 meters, overtaking 81 other participants, in 1 hour, 6 minutes and 38 seconds.

Haag, a 21-year-old Salem, Ore., native, is self-sponsored and has been training for years because he enjoys the effort.

"I am always training on a big goal and I do these events for fun," he said. "I am competitive and I want to win, but I am always training for the big goal."

Receiving only two weeks notice for this event, Haag said he did not mind because he loves the sport.

"My goal here is to keep building my fitness," he said. "I love the community of being in a triathlon. People are very friendly and open. Anyone is welcome."

Haag has completed 13 triathlons but his first event in Bahrain was last April where Haag competed in a duathlon, which is a run-bike-run event. He came in second place against Christophe Sargis, an internationally known triathlete. Haag said his new motivation became beating Christophe.

"This last one, I really focused, I really wanted to win," he said. "It was a short distance, but I wanted to push myself and I really wanted to beat Christophe."

Haag said in these events, time is everything so you need to mind the transition periods between each event.

"I got out of the water in fifth for the transition and saw my rival Christophe leaving transition," he said. "I hopped on the bike and caught up with him but I didn't realize that I was in third. I came into transition again, racked my bike and slowly got the guy in first. We were stride for stride until the very end. I had a kick-in-sprint and took it."

Haag's first place finish left Christophe finishing third by more than two minutes.

"Being in the military, it's a very humbling experience," Haag said. "People from all over the world compete and I felt like I was representing America for the overall win. It was cool."

Competitors hailed from Europe, the Middle East and Australia. Haag said he was probably the only American.

"It was great being part of that diversity," he said.

Haag trains twice a day running, swimming and cycling three to four times a week in addition to physical training with his shipmates. He also cycles approximately 70 miles every Friday with a biking group in southern Bahrain named the Awali Wheelers.

"It's very addictive," said Haag. "After people finish their first triathlon, they become addicted. Most people start just for fun and after they finish, they feel like they could have done better if they trained more."

He said your body becomes in tune with the fitness and simply wants to work more.

"It's a good way to get in shape and spend your time," he said.

Haag said that shipmates have asked him how to get started training in this regimen.

"Just go for it," he said. "Don't worry about competition until you knock down your first one. Just find a club, show up and have fun. SRF is a close group and having the support of my shipmates is really important. I really appreciate the effort and support they give me. It helps me succeed."

SRF Division Leading Petty Officer, Master-at-Arms 1st Class (EXW) Lee Eckert, said he's really proud to have Haag in his division and hopes he continues to excel in the future.

"He trains really hard and has shown a tremendous amount of dedication to his sport," Eckert said. "MA3 Haag helps instill positive peer pressure, as well as a culture of fitness and nutrition resulting in the division's 100 percent pass rate on the Cycle 12-1 PFA."

Haag's next big event is in November when he heads to Thailand for the Asia Pacific World Championship.

Shipping Pets?

Commercial carriers have suspended shipping pets for the duration of the summer in or out of Bahrain. This leaves AMC as the only option for personnel transferring in July and August (and possibly into September based on temperatures). The one exception is that DELTA/KLM has offered the possibility of accommodating DOD travelers on PCS Orders on a case by case basis when booked out of Bahrain (by CTO Bahrain only).

Pet space availability is extremely limited and AMC only allows two pets per family with no waivers allowed. We recommend travelers submit their PRRs as early as 90 before the requested departure date and the travel performance window for members shipping a pet as accompanied baggage is 20 days (i.e., NAVPTO/CTO

may confirm a flight up to 20 days from the requested transfer date). If we are unable to confirm pet space on AMC, we will attempt to coordinate a DELTA/KLM Flight, but the only other option is to ship the pet as cargo which increases the cost to the member significantly.

Please be advised that the member is responsible for ensuring all export/import documents are completed and available for customs inspectors and for paying the cost of shipping the pet as accompanied baggage or cargo. Additionally, if indirect routing is used to accommodate pets shipped as accompanied baggage, the additional transportation costs must be paid by the member.
