Fitness Center formally dedicated to memory of fallen Kingsville Sailor Ronchester Santiago

Naval Air Station (NAS) Kingsville held a ribbon-cutting and dedication ceremony for the command's new Fitness Center on June 7. The ceremony dedicated the facility to the memory and service of Petty Officer 3rd Class Ronchester Santiago, U.S. Navy, a Kingsville native who died in the October 2000 terrorist attack on the USS Cole in Aden Harbor, Yemen.

Santiago graduated from H.M. King High School in June 1996, and enlisted in the U.S. Navy. He attended recruit training in Great Lakes, Ill., then was assigned to USS Constitution for his first duty station. Santiago received orders to USS Cole in 1998 and was two months shy of completing his enlistment when the Cole was attacked on Oct. 12, 2000, in Aden Harbor, Yemen.

"Cole made it home; MS3 Santiago did not," said Capt. Mark McLaughlin, NAS Kingsville commanding officer.

"To make sure his legacy lives on for-

ever, we are naming this facility in honor of Petty Officer Santiago," McLaughlin added. "He paid the ultimate sacrifice in the service of his country.

"We know you will always carry a heavy heart for the rest of your life," McLaughlin said to Ronchester's parents, "but we hope, that on behalf of the U.S. Navy, you will accept having your son's name on the front of this building forever."

Following the brief remarks, a ribbon cutting and plaque unveiling in the Fitness Center's vestibule was held.

Capt. (Sel) James Ginder flew in from Washington, D.C., to attend the dedication. Ginder was the NAS Kingsville administrative officer from December 1998 to June 2001 and the Casualty Assistance Calls Officer (CACO) for the Santiago family beginning in October 2000.

Although his official CACO duties had concluded more than 11 years ago, Ginder said he has never forgotten the Santiagos.

"They have always held a special place in my heart and I wanted to be here for them in recognition of their son's sacrifice,"

Ginder said. "I think a special bond exists between CACOs and the families they support."

For several months in late 2000, then-Lt. Ginder was the Santiago's official liaison to the Navy beginning with a knock on their front door with initial notification, through a memorial service in Norfolk with President Clinton, followed by a funeral mass and

Navy League to host Navy Ball Golf Tournament June 29

The Kingsville Chapter of the Navy League will host their annual Navy Ball Golf Tournament at the L.E. Ramey Golf Course in Kingsville on Friday, June 29. The event is open to teams from all commands throughout the air station and the local community. A maximum of 20 teams will participate, and registration will be closed once the 20-team cap has been reached. Tournament volunteers are always welcome.

The Kingsville Navy League hosts this tournament each year as their sponsorship of the NAS Kingsville Navy Birthday Ball in October. All proceeds from sponsorship for this tournament are donated to the Navy Ball Committee to help with the costs of hosting the annual Navy Ball and offset admission to the Navy Ball for junior enlisted personnel.

Teams will be made up of four golfers playing a scramble format. Entry fee is \$40 per person, and includes green fees, cart, ditty bag, BBQ, and tickets for door prize drawings. Prizes will be awarded to the top three teams, with additional prizes for closet-to-the-pin on all par 3 holes, and the longest drive on a selected hole. Mulligan's (do-over's) will be available for purchase.

The competition in this annual tournament has been pretty close over the years, and over the past three years the difference between first and second place has been no more than two strokes. Last year's championship team, Absolute Trucking Solutions of Corpus Christi, which finished second in 2010 and first in 2009, turned in a 21-under-par score of 51. Team Crisman, the 2010 champs, finished second, and the City of Kingsville led by Mayor Sam Fugate, finished third at 18-under-par. Team NAS Kingsville, led by Capt. Mark McLaughlin, Cmdr. Scott Wilmot and Master Chief Charlie Ratliff, came in fourth place at 15-under

Household goods goes "social"

NAVSUP Global Logistics Support (GLS) Household Goods (HHG) services initiated social media campaign June 4 to reach out to customers and further reduce confusion and make a household move easier on families.

HHG is now employing the public web, YouTube and Facebook to unravel some of remaining mystery associated with moving, shipping and storing household goods.

"Our number one goal is easing the whole moving process for families moving across the country or around the world," said Deborah McGlennon, program manager, Household Goods and Global Distance Support Center in San Diego. "We're choosing new mediums to reach out and social media will help us reach our audiences with a message that we know how hard a move is, and here's how we can be there to help you.

"We believe our web presence, plus YouTube and Facebook Fan Page will provide relevant and interesting information to Navy service members and civilians initiating a household goods move. In addition, the YouTube Channel provides customers with instructions to set up their household goods move using the Defense Personal Property System (DPS)," McGlennon said.

The idea is to use YouTube as a source for education. According to McGlennon, even as the process incorporated www.move.mil and the Defense Personal Property System (DPS), the process can still be a bit daunting. The YouTube and Facebook sites are designed to ease families into the www.move.mil and DPS process.

Many of us may wonder where Father's Day observance derived from. Some scholars believe the day of observance dates back more than 4,000 years, from a clay card, carved by a young boy named Elmesu, wishing his father good health and a long life, was found in the ruins of Babylon.

There are other theories as well. One of the most modern beliefs is that Sonora Louise Smart Dodd was responsible. She had listened to a Mother's Day religious sermon in 1909. She then pushed the idea to friends and family, and received support from the Spokane Ministerial Association and the Young Men's Christian Association (YMCA), resulting in the first known Father's Day celebration on June 19, 1910. This celebration was later supported by our 28th President, Woodrow Wilson, which he approved in 1916.

The idea of a national Father's Day was later supported by President Calvin Coolidge, and President Lyndon Johnson signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day in 1966. In 1972, President Richard Nixon established a permanent national observance for the day, and Dodd was later honored for her contributions to the holiday develop-

ment at the 1974 World's Fair in Spokane.

postal clerks at these locations have been instructed to question patrons and check customs labels for any declarations of lithium batteries or electronic equipment to determine whether lithium batteries are in the shipment," said NAVSUP Navy Postal Subject Matter Expert Tom Rittle. "Upon identification of packages containing lithium batteries, customers will have the option to remove the batteries or not mail the package."

The prohibition applies regardless of quantity, size, watt-hours, and whether the cells or batteries are packed in equipment, with equipment, or without equipment.

USPS prohibits lithium battery mailing

Naval Supply Systems Command (NAVSUP), which oversees Navy postal operations, announced recently, it is providing guidance to the fleet about new United States Postal Service (USPS) prohibitions regarding lithium batteries.

According to the USPS announcement, beginning May 16, mail to or from APOs/FPOs are prohibited from containing lithium or products containing lithium. The prohibition also applies to international mail. The prohibition is in effect pending further USPS review of investigations for safety.

T-45 Goshawk crash near Encino investigation continues

The investigation into the cause of the crash of a T-45 Goshawk from Training Air Wing TWO May 30, near Encino, Texas, continued this week as investigators finalized their work at the crash site. The Aircraft Mishap Board (AMB) team had been looking over the crash site and examining wreckage debris on a remote section of a private ranch west of Encino, gathering data that would help determine the cause of the crash.

Two pilots, an instructor and student, safely ejected from the aircraft. They were airlifted from the site back to the air station by an HH-60 Black Hawk helicopter from the U.S. Army Reserve's 11th Aviation Command MEDEVAC Squadron based at NAS Kingsville.

Lt. John Supple, public affairs officer for the Naval Air Training Command, stated that the pilots ejected safely from the aircraft and suffered only minor injuries. "The pilots were taken to Christus Spohn

Hospital-Kleberg for further evaluation," Supple added, "and they were released shortly afterwards listed in good condition. They are now assisting with the crash investigation."

Firefighters from the NAS Kingsville Fire and Emergency Rescue Department were the first to arrive on scene after the crash. Due to the remote location, the firefighters had to ask for assistance in locating the site from the U.S. Customs and Border Patrol, which dispatched a helicopter to guide the NAS Kingsville team.

Once at the site, the firefighters extinguished a few minor fires and inspected the wreckage. The team remained at the site for several hours before declaring the site secure and returning to Kingsville. The NAS Kingsville Security Department then took control of the area to preserve the integrity of the crash site. The team manned the site around-the-clock despite temperatures during the day that reached nearly 100 degrees.

"We placed our remote com-

mand post at site and provided a rotating schedule for our people to allow the staff to stay hydrated and rested," said NAS Kingsville Security Officer David Taylor. "Our main concerns out there were the safety of our people and the protection of our assets."

The AMB team completed their work at the crash site last week and turned the site over to environmental specialists from NAS Kingsville and Naval Facilities Engineering Command (NAVFAC) Southeast. The environmental team will now begin the process of cleaning up the site and remediating any environmental contamination, working closely with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality which governs environmental remediation procedures for the state of Texas.

It could take several months before the official cause of the crash is determined. It is Naval Air Training Command policy to not release the names of injured personnel due to privacy issues.

SOAR, don't 'slide,' this summer

With military children having access to SOAR (Student Online Achievement Resources), students can use the summer to review or learn the standards for their grade level or a particular course.

This online program focuses on math, reading, and language arts for students in grades 3-12. It allows parents to manage their children's education with cutting edge technology.

Students initially take a test on any of the state learning standards, receive immediate feedback, and then are directed to a tutorial, which will improve their skills, where needed.

Parents can then monitor their progress from anywhere in the world. In addition, parents will be provided with resource materials to assist their children in areas of deficiency.

SOAR is not a placement program. It is a program designed to help students and parents:

- * identify strengths and areas where students may need improvement;
- * address the specific needs of a student;
- * gain practice with remediation and enrichment resources;
- * examine curriculum standards in any U.S. school district; and
- * use free ACT and SAT prep programs.

Go to <http://www.soarathome.org> to register your child and explore the parent resources. The tutorials are short, entertaining, and kid-friendly. Even if your child did

not fail a grade or a course this year and just did poorly in a particular course, he can use the program to either avoid the summer "slide" or to accelerate his skills for the next grade in school.

Once vacation is over and your child returns to school next year, SOAR can continue to be used for enrichment resources or for remediation, if your child has to stay home due to an illness.

SOAR can provide engaging online activities to supplement the work sent home from school. Students can search the Skill Resources from their home page to find activities on a specific math or reading topic they might be studying at the time.

Even if you don't need this article for summer remediation, save it for Winter or Spring Break! You just don't know when you'll need help to keep them SOARING in school rather than "sliding."

New web-based housing early application tool available

Commander, Navy Installations Command (CNIC) announced the phased Navy-wide release of the Housing Early Application Tool (HEAT) that was implemented last month. This web-based tool will allow Sailors and their families to apply for housing online from any computer.

"HEAT makes the Navy house hunting process smoother and less stressful for our Sailors and their families. By providing the early housing application online, Sailors and their spouses can use HEAT to review housing and community information, and make an informed decision on a home before receiving their permanent change of station (PCS) orders," said Vice Adm. William French, Commander, Navy Installations Command.

HEAT uses authoritative systems to reduce the amount of personal information and to streamline the online process. HEAT can be securely accessed from any computer with an internet connection.

Service members or their spouses can use HEAT prior to receiving permanent change of station (PCS) orders, to request information about community housing or check on their eligibility for military and privatized housing. They may also submit HEAT requests to multiple installations, if they are not sure where they may be stationed next.

"Our goal with HEAT is to reach out to

Sailors early in the PCS process to reduce stress and provide proactive support when moving from one duty station to another," said Corky Vazquez, CNIC housing program manager.

"With HEAT, Sailors and their families are able to make contact with our Navy Housing Service Centers and Privatization Partners to discuss their housing needs and learn about their housing options at any time. HEAT makes it easy to connect with our housing professionals and make informed decisions before even having orders."

HEAT is being deployed Navywide by Navy Regions. It should be implemented Navywide by June 30.

In May, the following regions went online: Naval District Washington, Navy Region Mid-Atlantic, Navy Region Midwest, Navy Region Southwest, Navy Region Southeast, Navy Region Europe, Africa, Asia and Navy Region Hawaii.

This month, the following regions are going online: Navy Region Japan, Navy Region Korea and Singapore Area Coordinator, and Joint Region Marianas.

Family members' records may now be digitally verified

RAPIDS Self Service (RSS) (https://www.dmdc.osd.mil/self_service/) is now available for Common Access Card (CAC) holders.

The RSS website allows CAC-holders to update their information and verify family members for DoD ID card reissuance. In order to use the RSS website, you must be a sponsor with a DoD CAC and have a CAC enabled personal computer.

Prior to RSS, the process of verifying family member's records in RAPIDS for card reissuance required the physical presence of the sponsor or a DD Form 1172-2, Application for Identification Card-DEERS Enrollment, with the sponsor's original signature.

Now with RSS, CAC-holders do not have to accompany eligible family members to verify eligibility for issuance of DoD benefits, including the DoD ID card.

Sponsors can now verify family members, digitally sign and save the DD Form 1172-2 through RSS to the family member's record. The family member may print and bring along a copy of the digitally signed form for card issuance. The digitally signed DD Form 1172-2 serves as the sponsor's electronic verification. The family members just need to inform the ID card facility that the sponsor has verified them and that the DD Form 1172-2 is available in their DEERS record.

burial in Kingsville, and ending with completion of a large amount of required paperwork.

"Throughout the entire process," Ginder added, "the family was appreciative of the Navy's efforts to answer their questions and meet their needs during that extraordinarily difficult time. Today, it is certainly fitting that NAS Kingsville permanently memorialize Petty Officer Santiago and his sacrifice as a Kingsville native, and I'm happy to have the opportunity to attend and support the family once again."

"It is really unbelievable that the Captain could make this a reality and dedicate this (facility) to my son," said Rogelio Santiago Sr., Ronchester's father, after the ceremony. "... (this) is a great honor for me and my family."

Santiago hopes the community will continue to remember his son, and that the younger generation will continue to serve our country to help keep our freedoms. He added that the naming of the facility in his son's honor will help him and his family give closure.

"We are deeply honored," Santiago said. "There is nothing better to honor the duty of our son."

The \$12.5 million, 28,000 square foot facility, includes a basketball court, volleyball court, free-weight area, group exercise rooms and racquetball courts. Outdoor features include a 25-meter/6-lane swimming pool with zero-depth entry, 6-lane 400-meter track, synthetic turf football field and jogging trail.

Ceremony closes out 22-year career for NAS Kingsville Senior Chief

Senior Chief Electronics Technician Kirk D. Hurst, a native of Port Isabel, Texas, closed out his 22-year active duty career June 8, with an official retirement ceremony at the NAS Kingsville Captain's Club. More than 100 friends, family and shipmates turned out to help send Hurst and his family ashore as they embark on a new and challenging career in the civilian sector.

Retired Master Chief and former NAS Kingsville Command Master Chief Charlie Ratliff served as guest speaker for the ceremony.

"As his former boss, I can tell you that Senior Chief Kirk Hurst will find challenging employment in the civilian sector and he will succeed," Ratliff said. "I can say that because I've seen his competition. You don't just be advanced to Chief Petty Officer simply by taking a written test like other E-7's in other branches of the military. The Navy looks for the Sailor who has taken the tough assignments – like service at sea – and excelled in them. They look for the Sailor who has demonstrated sustained, superior performance in challenging leadership positions. They look for people like Senior Chief Kirk Hurst."

Ratliff added that only the most qualified and tested Sailors are chosen for advancement into the Chief Petty Officer Community.

"Only 10 percent of eligible enlisted Sailors are selected for Chief Petty Officer, and only 5 percent make Senior Chief during their career," Ratliff stated. "So, you

see, Senior Chief Hurst has accomplished what few Sailors have during his career. And after working with him, I can tell you that no matter what he chooses to do in his civilian career he will succeed."

Hurst enlisted in the Navy in 1989, and after completing Electronics Technician 'A' School in Orlando, Fla., and UHF Technician 'C' School in San Diego, he reported to USS Walter S. Diehl (TAO 193), forward-deployed to Subic Bay, Republic of the Philippines. Aboard Diehl, he served as a UHF communications system technician and underway replenishment team leader, and completed a deployment to the Persian Gulf in support of Operation Desert Storm.

During his career Hurst would serve on four Navy ships and complete two deployments to the Persian Gulf, three deployments to the Western Pacific, and participate in three Mine Countermeasures (MCM) crew swaps. He also completed an assignment with the Expeditionary Combat Readiness Center, and an eight-month deployment to Combined Joint Task Force Horn of Africa, where he served as Electronic Materials Officer and Tactical Communications Division leading chief in support of Operation of Enduring Freedom.

Hurst was also fortunate to spend 16 years in South Texas, bouncing from four ships homeported at Naval Station Ingleside, to NAS Kingsville, NAS Corpus Christi and back to NAS Kingsville for his final tour of duty.

During his final remarks during the ceremony, Hurst praised those who pushed him in the right direction to succeed.

"I am a very lucky and blessed man to

be standing here today," he said. "I am a firm believer that as long as humans remain imperfect life has never been – and never will be -- fair.

"I believe that all suffer hardships and disadvantages," Hurst added, "but we all have God-given gifts and we are born with a distinct desire to succeed. It is through hard work, personal responsibility and what you do with the gifts you are given that makes a difference. I was lucky enough to have some exceptional people in my life, and this day, for me, is all about them."

Hurst became emotional when he spoke about his family – from his grandparents to his wife Kathy and sons Kirk and Trevor. "I cannot thank you enough for your support," he said as he pushed back tears.

When it came time for Hurst to address the Sailors he has led for the past three years at Ground Electronics, Hurst praised them for being professional, loyal and dedicated.

"Some of the finest technicians in the Navy walk through the doors of Bldg. 4973 every day before, during and after the planes are flying. Thank you for your work ethic and remember: teamwork, teamwork, teamwork. Keep your standards high, and always remember rule number one: you're not underway or sucking sand, so you have nothing to complain about.

"You have it good right now," Hurst added. "It has been an honor and a pleasure to have served with all of you. I thank the Navy for the great people that I have met during my career, the lessons I have learned, and the opportunity and experiences I have gained."

NAS Kingsville Executive Officer Cmdr. Scott Wilmot presented Hurst with a Navy-Marine Corps Commendation Medal (Gold Star in lieu of third award) for

South Texas Navy commemorates Battle of Midway aboard USS Lexington

South Texas Navy commemorated the 70th anniversary of the turning point in the Pacific during World War II, with a Battle of Midway ceremony aboard USS Lexington Museum on the Bay on June 4.

Among the guests at the ceremony was retired Chief Bob McKinley who served on USS Enterprise's flight deck during the battle that changed history, according to Capt. Chuck Hollingsworth, chief of staff for Chief of Naval Air Training who was the guest speaker at the ceremony.

"We take a few minutes to remember some of these men and some of their deeds, and we honor those who lived it," Hollingsworth said to the assembled group.

"And, young Bob McKinley here with us today was on the flight deck releasing the hooks of carrier aircraft coming aboard."

Hollingsworth tied the Battle of Midway to South Texas adding that the local Flour Bluff High School's mascot, the Hornet, was named after USS Hornet (CV 8), one of the three aircraft carriers that helped the U.S. Navy win the battle.

Also, one of NAS Corpus Christi's outlying fields was named for Lt. Cmdr. John Waldron who is best remembered for his sacrifice and courage during the battle.

On June 4, 1942, under his command, 15 bombers of Torpedo Squadron 8, left USS Hornet to engage the Japanese, sacrificing

themselves to help change the tide of the war.

"Cmdr. Waldron typified the core values

of our Navy," Hollingsworth said.

"Today, we honor the veterans and those who made the ultimate sacrifice during this battle's inspirational legacy," Hollingsworth said.

"We remember that with the man behind me (retired Chief McKinley) lives a heritage that connects the past to the future and serves as a shining example of acting with honor courage and commitment.

"Chief, we offer our deepest gratitude and respect."

"In the Navy we have two traditions that we hold annually," said Lt. John Supple, master of ceremonies for the commemoration. "In October, we observe the Navy's birthday to celebrate its establishment by the Continental Congress in 1775, and then, in June, we pause to acknowledge a moment in modern history where our ancestors showed to the nation that its faith and trust in our Navy is worthwhile.

"This annual event rests a little closer to our hearts," Supple added, "because we can see behind the curtain, so to speak, and into the history that is not often glorified, or understood, by most – yet it is extremely significant to our Navy's successes at Midway."

The ceremony ended with a wreath laying from the deck of Lexington to the Gulf of Mexico.
