There were countless smiles shared with parents, friends and volunteers all day, as kids wolfed down hundreds of slices of pizza and hot

dogs for lunch, during the hike down to the lake, and even after the last fish were tossed back in the water.

In fact, bringing the local Air Force community together with its neighbors is part of the Friends of Hickam mission. They serve as facilitators between Hickam Airmen and the Hawaii community, and seek to support, promote and foster stronger community relations.

"Friends of Hickam have done an awesome job with this tournament," said parent and Pacific Air Forces Band singer Tech. Sgt. Richard Vasquez. It was his first time at the event.

"I'm kind of sad it took us so long to attend this venue because it's so beautiful here. We'll be out here as often as we can now," he said.

"Every person I see out here is smiling and having a great time," he said, gesturing to the fresh-water lake as the afternoon sun shone upon the water. "You can feel the aloha spirit out here."

The tournament was divided into boys' and girls' categories, and awards were handed out for most fish and the largest fish.

Catching the most fish for the girls was Molly Golovach, 7, with 12 fish. For the boys, Randy Raquino, 7, caught 25 fish.

The largest fish winner for the girls was Maya Archer, 5, who caught a 10-1/2 inch fish. For the boys, Tyler Brown, 8, caught a 12-inch fish.



Big innings rally 613 AOC past 17 OWS

Lt. Cmdr. Brian Tague went 4-for-4 with two inside-the-park homers and five runs batted in to help the division-leading 613th Air and Space Operation Center (613 AOC) defeat the 17th Operational Weather Squadron (17 OWS), 13-6, in a Hickam Tuesday Division intramural softball game at Hickam Fourplex, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on June 7.

The win raised the 613's regular-season record to a perfect 8-0, while the 17 OWS fell two games under .500 at 4-6.

"I was basically playing the field and I always watch where they're shifting," said Tague about his outstanding evening at the plate. "Then, I just place the ball."

Leading off in the bottom of the first, the 613 opened with a single by Tech. Sgt. Jeff Camacho and a double by Tague, before Staff Sgt. Jason Gaddis stroked a one-out single to drive in the first run.

The 613 went on to rap out three more hits to drive

in three runs and take a 4-0 lead after an inning of play.

In the second inning, Camacho picked up his second single of the game and was driven in when Tague sliced a shot down the right-field line for the first of his two inside-the-park home runs.

The ball, which appeared headed for foul territory, hooked back into play at the very last moment and got past the 17 OWS right fielder for the two-run hit.

"I waited and waited thinking that it was going foul," Tague said. "Then it started drifting back in and that's when I started running."

The drive began another rally for the 613, as the team followed up Tague's hit with four singles and two more runs to double its advantage at 8-0.

In danger of a mercy-rule loss, the 17 OWS came back to score its first run on an RBI single by leadoff-hitter

Jared Countess, before scoring three more runs in the top of the fourth.

A bases-loaded single by Aerographer's Mate 2nd Class Daniel Croakman drove in two of the 17's three runs, but teammate Nicole Pruitt was thrown out in a close play at third to end the team's rally in the fourth.

With the score narrowed down to 9-4 going into the bottom of the fifth, the 613 stepped up its offense once again to bump its lead back up to nine by adding four runs in its turn at-bat.

The big hits in the inning were a three-run, inside-the-park homer by Tague, which was followed by a solo shot over the left-field fence by Maj. J.B. Wills.

"If the pitch is there, I'll take a swing at it," said Tague about his second bases-clearing drive.

"Fortunately for me, it got through their outfielder and I took advantage of it."

Although the 17 OWS was able to post two more runs in its final turn at-bat, the deuce was too little and too late.

Aerographer's Mate 2nd Class Dan Hicks, shortstop for the 17 OWS, said that while the 613 AOC is a very good team, the loss was more likely the result of his squad's inability to come up with clutch hits.

"Our biggest problem was that we just couldn't put our hits together," Hicks said.

"Hitting is really contagious and we just couldn't get that bug tonight."

While 17 OWS struggled

at the plate, the 613 AOC, led by Tague, wasn't having any trouble at all in accumulating base hits.

Nearly every player in the 613's batting order picked up two or more hits in the team's seven-run win over the 17 OWS.

"This is the best team that I've played with in years," Tague said. "It's just a great feeling to know that we can have no outs or two outs and then just rally. Our team is pretty good. We're solid, dedicated and very consistent. We definitely have a shot at it."

One bright spot for the 17 OWS was the play of Hicks, who was

solid at fielding his position at short and hit the ball hard each time he came to bat - finishing with a single and double.

Wearing a Boston Red Sox hat, Hicks also had to fend off some friendly ribbing from Yankee supporters along the first-base fence.

"I play on another team with all these guys, so I don't mind," Hicks said. "They just got to remember that it's the Red Sox that are in first place, not the Yankees."

Top-seeded Saints march to undefeated season

The 12U Saints topped off a tripleheader sweep by defeating the Chiefs, 19-6, in a Morale, Welfare and Recreation Youth Flag Football League game at Quick Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on June 4.

The win, which was called shortly after halftime due to a lightning storm, put the Saints' division-leading, regular-season record at 8-0-1 and set the team up as the No. 1 seed in the June 11 tournament.

The four-team postseason also includes the Bears in the second spot, with the Chiefs and Jets rounding out the final two slots.

Kick off for the division's first tournament game is scheduled for 2 p.m., with the winner-take-all showdown set for 3.

While no one has yet to find a solution to upend the Saints, Bears head coach Master Sgt. Sam Nelson said he feels that the tournament could be up for grabs.

"I think at this age, it's all about how they're feeling that day," said Nelson, whose Bears fought the Saints to a 6-6 tie in the teams' second meeting of the season. "Any team can come out ahead, as long as they play their game and execute."

So far in the 12U division, it's the Saints that have been most successful in carrying out their game plan, as the team has steamrolled over its opponents in seven out of its nine games.

The Saints started off the season by reeling off three lopsided victories in beating the Bears, 31-6, Chiefs, 31-0 and Jets, 38-0, before being tied by the Bears and barely beating the Chiefs in a tight 13-12 win.

However, following the back-to-back slowdown, the Saints proved that they were right back on track in last weekend's tripleheader, as the team started off by defeating the Bears, 26-7, before grounding the Jets, 45-13.

In the Saints' final game of the day, the team broke out to a 19-0 lead and showed no signs of stopping, before game officials called the game off.

In their opening drive, the Saints

needed only three plays to travel 45 yards and a touchdown. The final 26 yards came on a completed pass for six from quarterback Ricky Escoto to receiver Alex Dela Cruz.

Escoto tallied the Saints next touchdown, when he picked off a pass from Chiefs quarterback Jordan Baldwin and took it to the end zone to increase his team's lead to 13-0.

Later, another interception derailed the Chiefs attempt to cut the lead in half, when Saints safety Dylan Magee stepped in front of a Baldwin pass inside the end zone and returned it all the way to give the Saints a 19-0 advantage.

Despite being down by three touchdowns, the Chiefs fought hard through the rest of the game.

Facing a third and long situation back at their own five-yard line, the Chiefs came up with their best play of the day, when Branden Applewhite passed the ball Baldwin, who made the reception and rambled into the end zone for the team's lone score.

Army Spc. John Schatzan, who coaches the Chiefs along with Spc. Greg Hall, said that although his team fell short against the Saints, he believes that Chiefs will do well in the postseason tournament.

Schatzan said that defense would be the key if the Chiefs expect to walk away with the postseason title.

"We pretty much pride ourselves on defense," Schatzan stated. "We probably got the most picks out of everybody. We score as much on defense, as we do on offense."

Nelson also believes that the Bears just might be the team to finally upset the Saints.

"I think our kids feel good," Nelson said. "I mean, they've learned a lot throughout the season and have always hustled. I have a bunch of good kids that want to learn, so things are looking pretty good."

Panthers aim for playoffs after clawing past Falcons

Jasmine Eustaquio scored two touchdowns late in the second half to turn a close game into a rout as the Panthers clipped the Falcons, 32-12, in a 10U Youth Flag Football League game at Quick Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on June 4.

The win raised the Panthers' divisional record to 6-1-1 and solidified their place as the No. 2 seed in the June 11 playoffs, while the Falcons will enter the tournament with an overall mark of 2-6.

Although the Panthers squared off against the Falcons as the favored team, the game was a hard-fought battle with both squads trading scores for the majority of the contest.

After being stopped in their first two possessions, the Panthers finally broke through by marching 45 yards on only four plays to take a 6-0 lead in the first half.

The big play on the drive came on a 22-yard scamper from quarterback Tayzhan Poindexter that placed the ball on the Falcons' 23.

Three plays later, Panthers center Cole Wortham scored on a six-yard, give-and-go to put the big cats up by six.

The Panthers extended their lead to 12-0 on their very next set of downs, when running back Jimmy Koonce got the ball on the team's first play from scrimmage and zigzagged his way for 45 yards and a touchdown.

Following the Koonce jaunt, the Falcons showed their toughness by bouncing back to punch in their first score of the game.

After a 10-yard gain by running back Tyler Stygles

put the ball on the 15, speedy Nikolas Dalton took the next handoff and raced downfield for 35 yards to help the Falcons close the gap at 12-6 going into intermission.

In the second half, the quickness of Koonce emerged once again, as the fleet-footed back took another long run to the end zone to put the Panthers back up by two scores at 19-6.

However, in the very next Falcons series, Dalton helped the team march to the Panthers eight-yard line, before quarterback Calin Farmer hooked up with Stygles for a short-

scoring toss that brought the birds back to within seven at 19-12.

With the game balancing on the line, the Falcons defense stepped up and stopped the Panthers on three downs.

As the Falcons maneuvered into position for a game-tying score, Eustaquio stepped in front of Farmer's pass near mid-field and took it to the house. The converted point-after-touchdown gave the Panthers a huge 26-12 lead with time running out.

"That was a game changer," said Panthers head coach Hospital Corpsman 1st Class Sid Sykes about

Eustaquio's pick six. "That's what she does every game. Jazzy is probably one of my better players - along with Jimmy. They are fast and elusive, and like the rest of the kids on this team, they work hard."

As it turned out, Eustaquio wasn't done after her game-breaking interception. Just moments before the game's final whistle, Eustaquio took a handoff at the Panthers' five-yard line and rambled all the way for 45 yards and team's last touchdown.

"I can't believe that some of them are second and third graders," said Sykes about the Panthers' season-

long performance. "They are awesome kids. They pay attention and they run hard."

Meanwhile, Falcons head coach Yeoman 1st Class James Hall said that although his team fell short this time around, the players can stand tall after holding its own against one of the better teams in the division.

If the Falcons continue to play hard, Hall said, the team could surprise many of its foes in the playoffs.

"We're going to do pretty good," Hall said. "When we execute, we're flawless. We need to execute our play fakes and play better

defense. We got a lot of speed. These kids are awesome."

Likewise, Sykes said he also has a good feeling about the Panthers' chances in the playoffs.

"We got a tough field," Sykes admitted. "We got to play the same team (Falcons) and they're a tough team. If we get past them, then we got the No. 1 seed the Buccaneers and they are extremely talented. But my team will be ready. That's the thing about our team. It's teamwork, play hard and you win no matter what the score is."
