Elementary, middle and high school students should bring the following documents/information:

1. Birth certificate
2. Child's Social Security card
3. Mississippi immunization record
4. Last report card from former school
5. Mailing address of former school
6. High school students will need a copy of their transcripts.

All new students who live with their parents or guardian(s) will verify residency as follows. Parents must provide at least two of the following items:

1. State of Mississippi Road and Privilege Tax Registration Receipt (Vehicle Tag Receipt).
2. Mortgage documents or property deed
3. Apartment or home lease
4. Homestead Exemption application
5. One utility bill displaying the current address
6. Affidavit and/or personal visit by a designated school district official
7. Any other documentation that will objectively and unequivocally establish that the parent or guardian resides within the school district; and, in the case of a student living with a legal guardian who is a bona fide resident of the school district
8. Certified copy of filed petition for guardianship if pending and final decree when issued

Other procedures apply to students who are homeless or who live with adults other than parents or legal guardians.

NOTE: All new students who do not register during the designated times will not be allowed to register until a future date.

All other students who were enrolled in a Lauderdale County school the previous year will receive their class schedules on the first day of school, August 6, 2013.

Navy Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP)

The Navy's Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP) serves military families with special needs. The EFMP is a mandatory enrollment program for sponsors with qualifying family members. Enrollment in the EFMP ensures maximum provision of services to the family throughout the sponsor's career.

The EFMP includes identification of the family member's special needs and enrollment in the program, assignment coordination and family support. The Program assists Sailors during the assignment process by addressing the special needs of their exceptional family members (EFM) and ensuring they are assigned to areas where they can access necessary resources.

Special needs include special medical, dental, mental health, developmental or educational requirements, the requirement for adaptive equipment assistive technology devices and services and/or wheelchair accessibility.

The **Fleet and Family Support Program** is the Information and Referral (I&R) conduit for questions regarding EFM resources in the local community.

The **Military Treatment Facility** conducts overseas and suitability screening, and assists with EFMP enrollment.

EFMP Coordinators located at Military Treatment Facilities:

- ✓ Oversee the identification and enrollment of eligible service members and their families.
- ✓ Provide enrollment forms, offer help in the preparation of the forms, review completed forms for accuracy, and forward the enrollment package to the Central Screening Committee.
- ✓ At overseas MTFs, coordinate with the DoDDs and the local Educational and Developmental Intervention Services program.
- ✓ Partner with the FFSC EFMP Liaisons to provide EFM Program information, education and marketing.

EFMP enrollment is mandatory and required immediately upon identification of a special need. DD Form 2792 (PDF), Exceptional Family Member Medical and Educational Summary and DD Form 2792-1 (PDF), Exceptional Family Member Special Education / Early Intervention Summary are used for enrollment.

Exceptional Family Member Program Respite Care is specifically designed for Navy families who have children identified as Exceptional Family Members (EFM), category IV or V. This includes exceptional family members whose medical condition requires assignment near major medical facilities in the continental United States, or whose needs are complex and specialized requiring continuity of care.

Why Attendance Matters, Starting In the Early Grades

Succeeding in school requires developing good habits, and attendance is one of the most important. As early as kindergarten, too many absences can cause a child to start to fall behind academically, research shows. In the early grades, it is especially problematic for poor children whose families lack the resources to make up for time lost on task. For *all* children, learning to attend school regularly can help them develop the skills of persistence and perseverance which can help them succeed in school and, ultimately, in life.

Yet, research shows that one in 10 kindergarten and 1st grade students miss 10 percent of the school year, the point at which absences start to affect test scores. By middle school, chronic absenteeism can predict high school dropout rates. By 9th grade, it's a better predictor than past 8th grade test scores.

Sometimes it's hard for parents and teachers to recognize when a child is missing too much school. Absences don't always come in a row. Students can still get into trouble academically if they are miss a day or two every few weeks.

Absences are not just a problem for the children who aren't in class. Whole classrooms can be affected if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up. Schools can lose money when state funding depends partly on attendance. Parents play a key role in getting their children to school on time every day. Even with teenagers, parents should not underestimate the impact they can have by monitoring attendance and helping youth understand why going to school matters.

What Parents Can Do About Attendance

1. **Send your children to school every day**, starting in kindergarten, to teach your children that attendance counts. Continue to monitor their attendance through high school
2. **Don't let your child miss school without a good reason**. Try to avoid medical appointments during the school day or vacations when school is in session.
3. **Create routines and stick to them**. Set a regular bed time and morning routine to get ready for school. For older students, be sure they get enough sleep.
4. **Keep an eye on what's happening with your children's education**. Look for signs that they are bored, struggling with school work or having trouble with friends. Seek out tutoring, talk with teachers. Nurture interest in being in school by finding engaging afterschool activities and encourage involvement in sports.
5. **Learn about the school's policies**. What incentives do teachers offer for good attendance? What counts as an excused or unexcused absence? What are the penalties?
6. **Find your own ways to reward good attendance**. You know best what motivates your child.
7. **Be open and honest with school officials**. Make sure the school has your up-to-date contact information. Work with the teacher, counselor and principal on problems your children are experiencing.
8. **Seek medical help when absences pile up**. Anything from asthma to a bad bout of head lice can keep kids out of school. Work with your doctor or school nurse.
9. **Turn to other families who can help you** with dropping off or picking up children and with babysitting.
10. **Seek help when you have a problem**. If absences result from family issue—a sudden illness, a lost job, foreclosure or a broken-down car—the school can connect you to other families or to social service providers.

Child and Youth Behavioral Military and Family Life Counselor Program

Naval Air Station Meridian is excited to introduce a new resource on our Northeast Lauderdale campuses for the 2013/14 school year, a Child & Youth Behavioral Counselor from the Military & Family Life Counseling Program (CYB-MFLC). This program provides a full time counselor on our school campuses who will be available to provide valuable services and support to military families at no additional cost to the families or the school district.

The CYB-MFLC services are designed to offer extra support to assist with the unique challenges that military families experience. CYB-MFLC counselors are licensed clinicians who have demonstrated expertise in working with children. They can provide short-term non-medical counseling support in a variety of different ways: through individual meetings with children, presentations about life skills issues, skill-building group discussions, and meeting with parents and families at their request for additional counseling/coaching support. While meeting with children, CYB-MFLC counselors always remain in line of sight of a teacher, staff member, or a parent.

The primary focus of the Military & Family Life Counseling Program is prevention, education, and counseling support; the services are provided confidentially, and no case records or documentation is kept. The counselors do not assess or diagnose, and when they encounter more in depth issues/diagnoses, they offer to connect military families with other helping agencies available on the installation or in the community.

Some of the common issues that CYB MFLCs help with are:

- Stress management and coping skills
- Anger management/conflict resolution
- Deployment and reintegration issues
- Feelings associated with separation and divorce
- Grief and loss reactions
- Self esteem and confidence
- Communication skills
- Leadership skills

All military parents will be given the opportunity to consent or opt-out from this free service offered to their children by the Department of Defense. The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children

When military families are happy and successful, service members are too. Strong military families help the retention and strength of our armed forces, so it is important to minimize the impact of the mobile military lifestyle on military families and their children. Frequent moves to new duty stations can be challenging, especially for parents with school age children. Parents want to provide a smooth transition from one school system to another, but often times are concerned that their children won't be enrolled in the classes they need, or be allowed to play their favorite sports, or even graduate on time. The Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children (the Compact) is designed to eliminate these concerns!

The Compact is an agreement among participating states to alleviate many of the school transition problems encountered by military families. As a military parent, you need to be aware of what school transition issues the Compact addresses and how to make sure your child benefits.

Overview of the Compact

Each state that has joined the Compact agrees to address specific school transition issues in a consistent way and minimize school disruptions for military children transferring from one state school system to another. The Compact consists of general policies in four key areas: eligibility, enrollment, placement, and graduation. It's up to member states to work together to resolve specific transition issues for individual students.

As of June, 2012, forty-three states have passed legislation to become members of the Compact, including most of those with large numbers of military residents. The Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA) cannot be a member of the Compact but is complying with its provisions in both overseas and domestic schools. In return, the Compact states have agreed to treat students coming from a DoDEA school as though they were transferring from a member state. Enrollment

Military parents are accustomed to delays and frustrations in getting their children enrolled in a new school. The Compact has provisions for member states to facilitate enrollment in these areas:

- **Educational Records.** When a family leaves a school district in a member state, the parents may receive a set of "unofficial records" to carry to the new school in another member state. It will include all the information the new school needs to enroll and place the child until the official records are received. In addition, the Compact requires all "sending" school districts within member states to send official transcripts within ten days of a request from the "receiving" state school district.
- **Immunizations.** If a child transferring to a member state needs additional immunizations, he or she is allowed to enroll and begin school. Parents then have thirty days to see that the child gets the required immunizations. If a series of immunizations is required, it must be started within thirty calendar days of enrollment. Tuberculosis (TB) testing is not covered under the Compact since the TB test is not an immunization but rather a health screening.
- **Kindergarten and first grade entrance age.** If the entrance age requirement in the new school system is different, transitioning children may continue in the same grade if they have already started kindergarten or first grade in a school where the family was previously

stationed. This provision also allows children to move up to first or second grade regardless of age requirements if they have completed kindergarten or first grade in another state.

Placement and Attendance

Students from military families often miss out on appropriate placement in required classes, advanced placement, and special-needs programs while awaiting evaluation at the new school. The Compact requires cooperation in these areas:

- **Course and educational program placement.** A receiving school district in a member state must initially honor placement of a student based on his or her enrollment in the sending state, provided the new school has a similar or equivalent program. The receiving school is allowed to evaluate the student after placement to ensure it is appropriate, but it may not put children into "holding classes" while they await assessment. The receiving school may allow the student to attend similar educational courses in other schools within the district if the receiving school does not offer such educational courses.
- **Special education services.** Students covered by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) will receive the same services (although not necessarily identical programs) identified in the individual education plan (IEP) from the sending state. This is a parallel requirement under federal law.
- **Placement flexibility.** School districts are encouraged to determine if course or program prerequisites can be waived for students who have completed similar coursework in the sending school district.
- **Absence related to deployment activities.** Students in member states may request additional, excused absences to visit with their parent or legal guardian immediately before, during, and after deployment. Schools have flexibility in approving absences if there are competing circumstances such as state testing or if the student already has excessive absences.

Eligibility

The Compact asks school districts in member states to examine their rules for eligibility to allow children of military parents to have the continuity they need.

- **Enrollment.** When a child of a deployed parent is staying with a non-custodial parent, a relative, or a friend (officially acting in place of the parents) who lives outside of the home school district, the child may continue to attend his or her own school as long as the care provider ensures transportation to school. The Compact also stipulates that a power of attorney for guardianship is sufficient for enrollment and all other actions requiring parental participation or consent.
- **Extracurricular participation.** When children transfer to a new school, their participation in extracurricular activities will be facilitated -- provided they're eligible -- even if application deadlines and tryouts have passed. Schools must make reasonable accommodation but are not required to hold spaces open for military-related transferees.

Graduation

School transitions can be especially challenging for high school students. The Compact requires school districts to make the following accommodations to facilitate on-time graduation:

- **Course waivers.** School districts in member states may waive courses required for graduation if similar coursework has been completed in another school. Such waivers are not mandatory under the Compact, but a school district must show reasonable justification for denial of a waiver.
- **Exit exams.** Under the Compact, a school district may accept the sending state's exit exam, achievement tests, or other tests required for graduation instead of requiring the student to meet its own testing requirements. States have flexibility to determine what tests it will accept or require the student to take.
- **Transfers during senior year.** If a student moves during senior year and the receiving state is unable to make the necessary accommodations for required courses and exit exams, the two school districts must work together to obtain a diploma from the sending school so the student can graduate on time.

Parent's responsibility

If you have school age children, you'll want to understand all of the provisions of the Compact and also understand its limitations. For example, the Compact does not address the quality of education or require a state to change any of its standards or educational criteria. If you have a concern about a provision of the Compact as it relates to your child, it's best to contact the school first. But if your state is new to the Compact, don't be surprised if some local school personnel are not yet fully aware of the Compact's provisions. The School Liaison Officer (SLO) at your installation can help you work with the school to get your questions answered or give you information on next steps to take if your concern cannot be successfully resolved.
