

## Artesia, NM Hosts TRAWING-5 Detachment

Training Air Wing FIVE deployed a detachment of aircraft and personnel to Artesia, New Mexico for ten weeks to conduct primary flight training operations.

Artesia was chosen for detachment operations after careful statistical analysis of different weather metrics that impact U.S. Navy primary flight training operations showed that the clear skies of Southeastern New Mexico would allow for more sorties than at NAS Whiting Field during the same time frame. Good weather in New Mexico affords the wing to fly students more often than possible if training was conducted exclusively at Whiting. The detachment is deployed with the intent of improving efficiency and reducing the cost of producing a combat ready pilot.

The close proximity of the Municipal airport at Artesia to the forward operating base at the Roswell International Air Center, combined with Artesia's long, wide runways also made it an ideal location for conducting landing pattern training for fledgling Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard pilots.

"We're very fortunate to enjoy the close cooperation of the Roswell Air Traffic Control Facility to in-

crease safety and prevent negative impacts to the civilian aviators in the area while we practice our maneuvers in the vicinity of airports like Artesia. Additionally, with the enthusiastic support of local airfields such as the Artesia, we've been able to increase our training effectiveness and

## Williamson Signs 'Military Saves Week' Proclamation

Rear Adm. Rick Williamson, Commander, Navy Region Southeast, signed a proclamation in support of Military Saves Week on board Naval Air Station Jacksonville Feb. 6.

Military Saves Week runs from Feb. 24 through March 1 and is intended to encourage service members to make responsible financial decisions to build wealth and reduce debt. The proclamation officially recognizes the week and calls on all service members throughout the Southeast Region to take action to improve their individual and household financial situations.

"Personal financial stability is an important issue for all of our Sailors," Williamson said. "It's very difficult for Sailors and families who are experiencing financial difficulties to focus on the mission. Our goal with Military Saves Week is to encourage everyone to assess their financial situation and ask themselves what they can be doing to improve it. We have financial advisors and resources available through the Fleet and Family Support Centers (FFSC) for those who could use a little help."

Military Saves is a social marketing campaign to persuade, motivate and encourage military families to save money every month and to convince leaders to be aggressive in promoting automatic savings. It is a part of the Department of Defense (DoD) Financial Readiness Campaign and has been a partner with DoD since 2003.

"The campaign has been a success for more than ten years now," said Carol Lucius, Southeast Region work and family life coordinator. "If a Sailor has a certain financial goal, whether it's setting up an emergency cash fund, getting out of debt or saving for retirement, Military Saves can help them develop those goals and take action."

The program focuses on helping service members achieve their financial goals by providing savings advice, financial tools and resources, and motivation. According to Lucius, the program has a tremendous

impact on service members because they routinely face extraordinary circumstances.

"Deployments and frequent moves can be big financial strains on military households and good financial planning for both events is essential for success," Lucius said. "FFSC personal financial managers (PFM), who are accredited financial counselors, will sit down with a family and help them execute a comprehensive financial planning worksheet to illustrate their current financial situation and to help them plan for the future. Whether a family is in good financial shape or not, PFM's will work with them to improve their financial situation."

The Military Saves campaign is not only targeted at service members, but at the entire family, because spouses and children also play a huge role in overall financial stability, Lucius said.

"The personal financial readiness of our service members and their families directly supports mission readiness, and engaging our military spouses is important, as they play a vital role in maintaining financial discipline and stability within a military family," she said. "Another important aspect of the campaign is helping kids develop financial skills. The Military Youth Saves program is specifically designed to encourage kids and

Feb. 19

1900 - President William McKinley signs an Executive Order, placing Tutuila (Samoa) and nearby islands under the Navy Department.

1942 - The Japanese attack Darwin, Australia in the largest attack by a foreign power on country.

1945 - Following pre-invasion naval gunfire and aerial bombardment, U.S. Marines land on Iwo Jima, securing the island on March 16. Fleet Adm. Chester Nimitz describes the invasion, from which 27 Medals of Honor were given, as one "where uncommon valor was a common virtue."

1942 - The overnight Battle of Badoeng Strait begins when the allied naval force (ABDA) commanded by Dutch Rear Adm. W.F.M. Doorman engages the Japanese in an attempt to stop the invasion force in Bali. USS Stewart is damaged. The Japanese continue the capture of the Dutch East Indies.

Feb. 20

## NAS Whiting Field Prepares for Military Saves Week

NAS Whiting Field Fleet and Family Support Centers (FFSC) will once again be participating in the Military Saves Week Campaign, Feb. 24 – Mar. 1, to promote change in personal financial behavior and encourage savings. Military Saves is part of the DOD’s Financial Readiness Campaign in a partnership with America Saves and is a social marketing campaign directed at persuading, motivating, and encouraging financial wellness and savings for service members, and their families. NASWF will provide events and educational opportunities throughout the week in support of this campaign.

The importance of financial wellness cannot be overemphasized as it is not just a concern for personal well-being but professional as well.

According to Eugene Jackson, FFSC Financial Educator, “It is important that we take actions to be proactive in our financial health as opposed to reactive. Mission readiness can be compromised due to a loss of security clearances. The number one reason for the loss or denial of a security clearance is financial considerations.” When an individual says that they cannot afford to save for the future, Jackson responds with, “They cannot afford not to.”

The Goal of the Military Saves Week Campaign is to encourage those who work on NASWF to “Set a

safety by evenly distributing our operations and preventing the over-crowding of any single field," said Lt. Col. John Payne, TRAWING-5 Operations Officer.

Primary students in Artesia are receiving instruction in visual – flight relying on visual cues outside the aircraft as opposed to instruments inside the cockpit, - aerobatic, and formation flying, as well as instrument and visual navigation.

The Primary Flight Training Syllabus takes approximately 28 weeks for a student to complete. While only deployed for 9 weeks, Training Air Wing FIVE has carefully selected students for training in New Mexico who are in a phase of the syllabus that requires the best weather, minimizing the impact that bad weather has on "time to train" back home. While the detachment will be on the ground in New Mexico for about 10 weeks, most students will be on site for only about 2 to 3 weeks at a time as they take advantage of the weather they need to advance in the visual portion of the syllabus.

Costs associated with securing the necessary airport facilities and rental vehicles as well as providing lodging and meals to the deployed force will likely total around \$900,000 over 10 weeks.

"Experience has proven that conducting training detachments in favorable locations actually improves the regularity and quality of training during the challenging winter months back home. This in turn reduces student pilot "time-to-train" and generates a net savings in the process – a good value for all concerned," Payne explained.

## TRICARE Notes

### INVITE A PROVIDER TO BECOME TRICARE-AUTHORIZED

If you know a provider who is not yet TRICARE-authorized but is interested in treating TRICARE beneficiaries, let him or her know that it is not necessary to become a network provider by signing a contract with your regional contractor. Most providers with a valid professional license (issued by a state or a qualified accreditation organization) can become TRICARE-authorized, and TRICARE will pay them for covered services.

### NAS Whiting Field to Participate in Security Exercise

According to research provided by America Saves, 86% of individuals reported an increase in savings with a financial plan in place whereas only 43% reported progress who did not implement a plan. These statistics support the importance of having a savings plan and maintaining it. This campaign encourages individuals to set up a plan of automatically deducting money from each paycheck into a savings account in order to reduce debt and promote wealth, as well as establishing good credit.

The NASWF Fleet and Family Support Center is teaming up with Pen Air Federal Credit Union, Morale, Welfare, and Recreation (MWR), the Commissary, and Exchange to inform those who work on NASWF of opportunities in which they can save on base.

NAS Whiting Field Commanding Officer Capt. Matthew Coughlin will also show support by signing the Military Saves Proclamation declaring the week of Feb. 24 - Mar. 1 as Military Saves Week.

One of the main events during the campaign is the Poker Run organized by MWR. The Poker Run consists of "running" to

each designated location (FFSC, MWR, Commissary, Exchange, Pen Air) to learn about the services and opportunities that are provided. After completing the task, at each of the five locations, the participants will receive one playing card and the individual with the best hand at the completion of the run will win a prize.

The FFSC Financial Advisors will set up financial display booths around base throughout the week as well and provide classes covering such topics as Thrift Savings Plan, Home Buying Process, Budget Planning, Saving and Investing and Credit Management.

"Taking The Saver Pledge is one of the most important aspects of this week. It is my goal to not only reach military service members, but also their families, including children," said Jackson. "I am not focusing on a specific target group; I am hoping this week provides support to everyone. It is my hope to reach everyone and open up dialogue so that I may help individuals financially before their habits become problematic and overwhelming."

## SECURITY CHECKPOINT



Ways of avoiding getting a ticket on Naval Base part II. 1) Watch your speed while driving on base. All roads on Naval Base's have the speed limit posted along the side of the road. Be aware of the slow speed limit when you are entering and exiting the gates. Driving too slowly; impeding the flow of traffic will get you a ticket too. 2) No California rolls at stop signs. A California roll is where you slowly come to a stop sign and keep going without stopping. You should come to a complete stop at stop signs. 3) Yield for vehicles when you come to a yield sign. 4) Don't drink and drive or drive under the influence of drugs, enough on this. 5) Not wearing protective equipment on motorcycles, scooters and mopeds. 6) Don't follow too close to the vehicle in front of you. 7) Leaving your vehicle running unattended will get you that little pink ticket. 8) Parking in non-parking areas or reserved parking spots. 9) Accidents are sometimes avoidable, but if you're at fault be prepared to receive a ticket. 10) Being uncooperative and belligerence or use of profanity toward a Police Officer (civilian or military) will get you one. Now there are other things that would get you ticket aboard a Naval Base, from loud music to failure to stop for a school bus.
